CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

It is generally assumed that religion and conduct go hand in hand. Bible knowledge, as one phase of religion, would therefore be an item to be considered in any evaluation of personality adjustment.

As a rabbi, the writer has known people who had no actual knowledge of the Bible, but whose behavior and attitudes were, in the opinion of the writer, in every way in accordance with its teachings.

With this experience in mind, he has attempted in this study to determine as accurately as possible, the senior high school student's knowledge of the Bible; the relative knowledge of it which students of different denominations have; and finally the correlation between the student's knowledge of the Bible and his personality adjustment.

The conclusions were drawn from the scores which the senior high schools made on the Bible knowledge test formu-lated by the writer.

The personality adjustment was considered according to the ratings of three teachers for each student. It should be understood that these conclusions were based on these specific tests only, and no other conclusions can be drawn from them. The teachers' ratings would in this case be their opinion.

The writer has chosen the senior high school students, since he feels that a person's adult behavior patterns are formed in his adolescent years, and that what he is at seventeen or eighteen, he will probably be the rest of his life.¹ The behavior of the adolescent is not much different from that of the adult; it differs only in degree. "There is no behavior during the second decade of life that cannot be found in adulthood."²

I. DEFINITION OF TERMS

The terms <u>personality</u> <u>adjustment</u> and <u>social</u> <u>adjust</u>-<u>ment</u> were used synonymously in this study. They were used to mean behavior and attitudes which do not differ greatly from those of one's contemporaries.

The term <u>Bible knowledge</u> was used in accordance with the Bible Test given to the students. The test was composed by the writer and was selected from well-known parts of the whole Bible, both Old and New Testaments.

II. COURSE OF PROCEDURE AND SOURCE OF DATA

The Bible Test was administered by the respective teachers in the general assembly or in the homeroom. Approximately thirty minutes was given the student to answer all the questions including the "General Information" on the first page. Sixty-four answers were possible, and the students were expected to answer all the questions in order to have a perfect score. Credit was given for every correct answer, and in the case of "filling in the missing word," for all possible versions of the Bible. Credit was given also if the student twisted around the answers in the filling in of words, e.g., "O enter into His gates with praise (thanksgiving) and into His courts with thanksgiving (praise)," Part III of the Bible This consideration was taken into account since the Test. writer feels that a knowledge of it, even without the exact quotation, is knowing.

Personal adjustment was considered in this study according to the ratings given by the teachers and the respective dean. A personality-rating sheet as well as an instruction-for-personality-rating sheet was constructed by the writer after much constructive criticism and after approval by the thesis committee. The rating was done by three educators for every student. Five personality traits were considered: truthfulness, characteristic mood, sociability,

purposefulness, emotional control. Each trait had a value number of five for the highest score. The value taken was' the total of these five traits, since in this study weight was given to personality as a whole and not to any one trait alone. The final grade was the sum of the three ratings, i. e., seventy-five for perfect adjustment.

III. LIMITATIONS OF THE STUDY

This study was limited to senior high school students and to the school year 1943-44. The data were collected from the Terre Haute, Indiana, public high schools: Wiley, Garfield, Gerstmeyer, and State.

Data were collected from 384 students. The tests of 65 students were not considered, since they were not completely filled out.

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CHAPTER II ·

PRESENTATION AND ANALYSIS OF DATA

I. ORGANIZATION OF DATA

After the data were collected, the scores of the Bible Test and personality ratings were tabulated and correlation coefficients were computed. Tables and figures were constructed to show the frequency and the means of both sets of scores. Separate tables showing the correlation of the two for each high school were constructed; also, other tables showing the means and the rank of the respective schools and the different denominations; and also a table showing the frequency of church attendance and its percentage.

II. DENOMINATIONS

Below are the different denominations and the number of students from each who took the test:

There were 79 cases who did not answer to the question of denominational membership. In these "un-specified" cases were included for the purpose of computing the mean of this group one return with an answer "undecided," and one return with an answer "none."

For convenience' sake the Baptist, Catholic, Disciples of Christ, Methodist and Protestant¹ denominations, since more students belonged to these, were treated separately. Treated separately were those also who did not answer the question in regard to denominational membership. The denominations to which few students belonged were treated together rather than separately. These are Bible-Center, Christian Science, Congregational, Episcopal, Jewish, Lutheran, Pentecost, Presbyterian, Rumanian, United Brethren and Zion Reform.

In the Appendix will be found a table showing the

returns of the original (ungrouped) data. Tables as to Sunday school attendance were not considered, since the answers on this question did not represent actuality and were indefinite; e. g., students of seventeen or eighteen answered that they had attended Sunday school seventeen or eighteen years. Also such indefinite answers as "all my life" were received. Another reason for disregarding this question was that the great majority of the Catholic denomination gave the answer "None" and "We have no Sunday School," and yet Catholics do receive formal Bible instruction such as catechism and so forth; and since the intention of this question in the study was to find out how much of formal religious instruction the students got, these answers did not present information.

III. STATISTICAL METHOD

Throughout the study the central tendency of the schools and the different denominational membership were compared by the uses of the arithmetic mean. The correlation between the two factors, i. e., Bible knowledge and personality adjustment, was done by the Pearson Product-Moment Method.

The arithmetic mean was computed by the formula: M (true Mean) = M' (assumed Mean) + $\frac{\Sigma fd}{N}$ times interval

The standard deviation was computed by the formula:

The r (coefficient of correlation) was computed by the formula:

IV. CORRELATION BETWEEN BIBLE KNOWLEDGE

AND SOCIAL ADJUSTMENT

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The correlations included in Table I reveal the

following: There is low correlation between the two factors, i. e., Bible knowledge and personality rating, for the total number of cases from all schools combined. The correlation coefficient is $.302 \pm .034$. Wiley has a correlation of $.493 \pm .038$ which is somewhat higher but not high. Garfield has a correlation of $.143 \pm .074$; Gerstmeyer $.034 \pm .115$; and State .042 = .123. All correlations except those of the combined group and Wiley are less than four times the probable error and they are therefore unreliable.


V. BIBLE TEST SCORES

The Bible test papers were scored, and the means and standard deviations obtained. Table II and Figure 1 show

the scores obtained from all senior high school students. The highest score which is 58 was attained by one student, and the next high score is 56. The mean is 27.6, and the standard deviation is 10.4.

The tables below represent the different sections and classes of people in the different sections of the city of Terre Haute. Table III and Figure 2 show the distribution









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scores of State High seniors. The mean is 28.6, which is the highest mean of the schools considered, and the standard deviation is 7.5.

An attempt was made to study the differences between the means of the various schools, but the critical ratios of the differences indicated that they were unreliable in all cases.



VI. MEANS OF PERSONALITY INDEXES

The personality of the high school seniors as revealed from the ratings is quite high. The lowest rating for the combined five traits is 37, eight points less than the average personality index. Table VII and Figure 6 show the







the differences indicated that they were unreliable in all cases.

VII. CENTRAL TENDENCY OF THE RESPECTIVE DENOMINATIONS

It was the opinion of the writer that certain denominations would put more emphasis upon the study of the Bible than others. If the test used is a valid instrument, this study reveals that there is little if any difference in the knowledge of the Bible of the respective denominations. Table XII shows the mean and the distribution of scores on the Bible knowledge on the part of the senior high school students of the Baptist denomination. The mean is 30.7, and the standard deviation is 9.3.

The students of the Catholic denomination showed an



of the Methodist denomination differed slightly from those of the Disciples of Christ. The mean is 27.8, and the standard deviation is 9.5.

The mean of scores for the senior high school students of the Protestant denomination is 28.8 as shown in Table XVI, and the standard deviation is 11.6.

The last group, the one of unspecified denominational membership, ranked lowest. The mean as shown in Table XVIII is 25.7, and the standard deviation is 10.4

An attempt was made to study the differences between the means of the various denominations, but the critical ratios of the differences indicated that they were unreliable in all cases.

VIII. RANKS

The ranking of the respective schools as to the means of the Bible Test scores and the means of the personality

since there is low correlation between Bible knowledge and personality adjustment, as evidenced from Table I, the rank

of the Bible Test scores as compared with the ranking of the personality index does not follow in the same order. In this table it is shown that State High School ranked first in the Bible Test score, but ranked fourth in personality index. Wiley ranked second in the Bible Test score and second in personality index. Gerstmeyer High School ranked third in the Bible Test score, first in personality index; and Garfield High School ranked fourth in the Bible Test score and third in personality index.

The ranks of the different denominations are shown in Table XX. It is self explanatory and an explanation here would be valueless.

IX. CHURCH ATTENDANCE

It is shown in Table XXI that 183 students, 57.5 per cent of the total number, attended church weekly. Sixty students attended church semi-monthly, 18.8 per cent of the total; semi-monthly attendance is quite good. These two groups contain 243 students, 76.3 per cent of the total. The results of the study are based on a group of which over three-fourths attend church twice a month or oftener.

X. ATTITUDE TOWARD THE INSTITUTION

OF THE CHURCH

From Table XXII it is indicated that a favorable majority, 91.55 per cent of the total number of students have, in the opinion of the writer, a good attitude toward the church. When this table is read, it should be understood

that Order I, A5, B4, C2, D1, and E3 for example, is constructed according to the answers given by the students in this order of importance according to Section III on the general information of the Bible test; Order XV, C \checkmark , D \checkmark , should be understood that the students checked those lines instead of answering them in numerical value according to their importance.*

OrderXIV of this table shows that 20.37 per cent gave as their first answer "How to worship God properly" and

Sixty-four students out of the total added specific answers of their own, a table of which follows. Table XXIII for the specific answers under column F in Section III of the general information of the Bible Test, page 62, includes the seven students who gave answers of their own.

Table XXIII which contains the specific answers of the students under item "F" of section III in the "General Information" of the Bible Test, reveals the same thing. If we combine numbers 1, 2, 3, and 4, we obtain 68.5 per cent of the total 61, which the writer considered to be very good.

We see then, according to these answers, that a large majority of the students have a good attitude toward the church.

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CHAPTER III

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

I. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

In this study it is found that there is a correlation of $\pm .302 \pm .034$ between Bible knowledge and social adjustment. The correlation between Sunday school attendance, church attitude, and church membership and actual knowledge of the Bible is not revealed by this study. Bible knowledge will depend upon the individual and his background of training in the Bible.

The study shows also that the rating of personality as a whole is quite high. The majority of the students were considered adjusted socially; in fact practically all were above average.

It shows further that the great majority of the senior high school students do attend church regularly, regardless of denominational membership.

When we take in account that we live in a country which was founded on the ideals of religion and the Bible, we may anticipate that the government of the United States is helping in the promotion of Bible knowledge. "The recognition of the importance of religion on the one hand, and the guarantee of religious freedom on the other, are basic in our pattern of government."¹ We may also anticipate that the public schools are an educational institution which tries to promote Bible study. We find that on June 12, 1926, recommendations were made to give credit toward graduation in the public high schools for Bible study. "Thus, for sixteen years, Bible study for credit toward graduation has been a part of the senior high school program. The course of study recognizes Bible study as an elective for either one or two semesters' credit."²

II. CONCLUSIONS

It is the sincere belief of the writer that the Bible as a whole does influence the individual for good living and right conduct. It was found in this study that the senior high school students are well adjusted and that most of them have a fair knowledge of the Bible. On the other hand, the tests indicated that some students who had little or no knowledge of the Bible had a high personality rating. To meet this answer the writer thinks that we of the occidental world are so deeply rooted in the ideals and teachings of the Bible that even without an actual knowledge

of it we do behave accordingly. The ethics of the Bible have become a part of us; its laws and ways of living a part of our social heritage. Yet, the writer feels that every individual should know the Bible in actuality. The responsibility is upon the trained instructors to devote their Sundays in the church to the purpose of teaching the Bible. How much good a knowledge of the Bible does the individual the author cannot say but he is of the opinion that more Bible knowledge on the part of society would promote happiness and coöperation and would tend to eliminate hatred and race prejudice.
