Comment

Kenneth Deffeyes, a professor at Princeton University and former Shell Oil geologist, delivers a sobering message in his new book, "Hubbert's Peak" - the 100-year petroleum era is nearly over. Global oil production will peak some time between 2004 and 2008, and the world's production of crude oil "will fall, never to rise again. Running out of energy in the long run is not the problem," Deffeyes explains. "The bind comes during the next 10 years: getting over our dependence on crude oil." The petroleum era is coming to a close. Fossil fuels are a one-time gift that lifted us up from subsistence agriculture and eventually should lead us to a future based on renewable resources."

Meanwhile the Australian government seems oblivious to what is becoming accepted wisdom. State road authorities continue to build freeways whilst investment in sustainable transport is negligible.

There is growing realisation and acceptance that this impending oil shortage is a reality. USGS geologist, Les Magoon, the originator of the term "Big Roll-over" (the term signals the change from an oil buyer's market to a seller's market) explains it is a fascinating topic that will affect us all and whilst there is debate on exactly how long oil will last, be assured that after the Big Roll-over, prices will rise astronomically. Economies will be plunged into recession and changes in lifestyle will be born of necessity. We have already seen the upheaval and anger caused by minor price increases at the petrol pump!

On behalf of the editorial committee I trust members will have an entertaining and informative read with this edition of The Queensland Surveyor.
