



#### Inspiration:

'History resonates with the source of dance in many parts of the region where ancestors, spirits and the Gods (who are mainly understood as manifestations of the land, sea, plant and animal life) inform, influence or direct dance practices. Many composers of Pacific chants and songs and dance masters, receive their ideas in dreams and visions, often from spirits or ancestors' (Teaiwa, 2008)

### • Why the Arts?

### Va – the concept


- Ka'ili 2005, 'the spaces between people or things'


