Dear Senator Byrd:

We, the members of the National Museum Services Board, are deeply disturbed by the recent actions of the Senate. The Interior and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill was amended to require the Institute of Museum Services to allocate a minimum of one-half of one percent of its grants funds to each state.

This provision undercuts the entire philosophy of the Institute of Museum Services. The competitive process is carefully designed to ensure that grants are based on impartial judgements of quality. Setting state minimums dilutes the impact of these grants. It also decreases the incentives for museums to improve their operations to qualify for grants. Further, private donors would no longer be certain that an IMS grant denotes a high quality institution. IMS also pursues several activities to help museums improve their operations and hence their competitiveness.


At our July 21st meeting, the members of the National Museum Services Board passed a resolution strongly opposing the provision requiring state minimums.

We sincerely hope you will seriously consider our views as the bill goes to conference.


