

As the plebians of society



Late Night with Jimmy V.

The moment lives in his mind as if it were yesterday. The shot from the perimeter was going to fall a foot short. One second remained on the clock. NC State's Lorenzo Charles, however, pounced on the errant shot and scored befor the clock read :00. It was 1983, and Jimmy Valvano was head coach of the national champions.

Today, Valvano has traded his perch from the end of the bench to one on press row, donning headphones and drawing squiggly lines on the telestrator. Although the pressure of recruiting and winning in the competitive ACC is gone, Valvano has not lost any of his flair or charisma. As basketball analyst for ABC and ESPN, Jimmy V. still maintains a friendly relationship with the sport he so loves.

Valvano, 45, honed his basketball skills for the Rutgers Scarlet Knights in the sixties. He cracked the coaching ranks in 1969 with Johns Hopkins and later coached at Bucknell and Iona before taking over a disarrayed program at NC State in 1980. After managing a 14-13 de-but season, Valvano guided the Wolfpack to eight con-secutive post-season touriament appearance, including the 1983 NCAA championship. He compiled a career record of 346-212 after 18

seasons on the bench.

Valvano's intensity and his effervescent personality allowed him to succeed in a conference which boasted such NBA stars as Michael Jordan, Ralph Sampson, James Worthy and Mark Price. His talents as a technician, especially in the big games, and his ability to extract the most from his play-

ers enabled Valvano to Dick Vitale, nary an announcing duo could equal their knowl-edge of the college game. When asked about the

prospect of having Jimmy Valvano host Midnight Madness, Coach Barnes could hardly hide his excitement. "The one thing I've always liked about Jimmy is that he can relate," stated Barnes. "He's been on the college campus virtually his entire life and he knows what we're dealing with. The students will enjoy him and he'll have as much fun as any-

Aside from his duties as an announcer, Valvano spends countless hours offering his motivational skills to corporations across the country. The charitable Valvano also offers his time and services to civic organizations such as Easter Seals and the American Heart Association.

But on October 15th, Valvano will donate his talents to the festivities surrounding Midnight Madness. The vivacious Valvano should have little trouble motivating our eager and awaiting crowd.
