My primary areas of research have focused on violence against women and institutional corrections. I also have been working on documenting the marginalization of women in criminology and criminal justice. I believe that, like other disciplines, we need to use quantitative research to demonstrate the invisibility of women and their work in mainstream publications. Along those lines, I would work with the division to continue to foster networks among women. Through networking I believe that we can promote the advancement of individual women as well as encouraging more widespread awareness of feminist scholarship. Thus, the division can play an important role in advancing individual careers by ensuring that all women have access to critical information about a variety of processes including publication, promotion, and tenure. Unfortunately this information is frequently conveyed through informal networks which exclude women. In addition, networking also facilitates opportunities for women to disseminate feminist research and offers opportunities for collaboration. While we have made great progress in many areas over the past eight years, there is still much work to be done. The Division has a leadership role to play in both the discipline and the Society. To serve as an officer of the Division in these exciting times would be an honor and a privilege.

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Jan Foraker-Thompson

I began my career in Criminal Justice in 1971 teaching college courses in Soledad Prison while I worked on my doctorate at Stanford. Since then I have worked at a Mental Health Center, Offender Treatment Program, Half-way House, State Police and directed a Statewide Restitution Program/Research Project funded by LEAA. I returned to academia in 1981 and have been a Criminal Justice professor ever since at BSU. I've also worked with Victims of Crime programs since 1974 - mostly women and children victims of rape, domestic violence and child sexual abuse. I would like to become an officer in DWB because I am tired of women in Criminal Justice being overlooked, marginalized and trivialized - both in the field and academia. Also sexually harassed. We need to work hard to end this and to get women and their contributions taken seriously. Work with our supportive male colleagues, educate, and insist on improvements and equal treatment, fairness, dignity. ASC should be honoring as many women as men. Criminal Justice men need to be educated to understand that "women's" contributions are just as important, vital and needed as theirs. As Carol Gilligan and Deborah Tannen have pointed out, just because women speak in a "different voice," it is not inferior, it is only different and represents 52% of the human race. No more Thomas-Hill debacles! It is time for women professionals to stand up and demand their fair share, place, recognition and appreciation.

Imogene L. Moyer received her Ph.D. in Sociology (Criminology and Deviance) from the University of Missouri at Columbia and has conducted research on Women and Crime. I have publications on women's prisons, police processing of women and ethnic/racial groups, child sexual abuse, women and academia, and women pioneers in criminology (e.g., the life and works of Ruth Shonle Cavan). The Second Edition of my book, The Changing Roles of Women in the Criminal Justice System was published by Waveland Press, 1992. Since 1984 I have been a Criminology/Women's Studies faculty member at Indiana University of Pennsylvania where I am the 1992-1993 Chair of the Criminology Department.

I have been an active member of the American Society of Criminology since 1979 presenting papers and chairing sessions on issues related to women and crime. I was a member of the steering committee of the ASC Caucus on Women's Issues from 1979-1983 and a member of the Women and Crime Division since 1984. As a member of the Minorities and Women Section for the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences and the founder and coordinator of the Women and Crime Task Force for the National Women's Studies Association, I have the opportunity to network with leaders in these organizations and to learn new strategies to be utilized by our Division. I would encourage the Division to increase our international emphasis and to strengthen our efforts to include women of color as well as persons of all ages, social classes, sexual orientations, and physical abilities.

Coramae Richey Mann, Professor of Criminal Justice at Indiana University, Bloomington, received undergraduate and graduate degrees in clinical psychology from Roosevelt University in Chicago and her Ph.D. in sociology (criminology) from the University of Illinois, Chicago. She was an American Sociological Association minority Fellow and a Ford Foundation Research Fellow. Her research has been directed toward those oppressed by the juvenile and criminal justice systems: youth, women, and racial/ethnic minorities. The author of numerous scholarly articles on these topics and two books, Female Crime and Delinquency and Unequal Justice: A Question of Color, Professor Mann is currently writing Women Murderers: Deadliest of the Species?

As a life-long activist, I will continue to be quite vigorous in assuring that women, peoples of color, and any other oppressed persons, and, in fact, all persons, are represented and have a voice in the future of the American Society of Criminology and

the community-at-large. My aim is to be a dynamic force to bring people together to accomplish a common agenda of freedom, peace, and justice for those both in the system, and out of the system.

Helen Eigenberg

My primary areas of research have focused on violence against women and institutional corrections. I also have been working on documenting the marginalization of women in criminology and criminal justice. I believe that, like other disciplines, we need to use quantitative research to demonstrate the invisibility of women and their work in mainstream publications. Along those lines, I would work with the division to continue to foster networks among women. Through networking I believe that we can promote the advancement of individual women as well as encouraging more widespread awareness of feminist scholarship. Thus, the division can play an important role in advancing individual careers by ensuring that all women have access to critical information about a variety of processes including publication, promotion, and tenure. Unfortunately this information is frequently conveyed through informal networks which exclude women. In addition, networking also facilitates opportunities for women to disseminate feminist research and offers opportunities for collaboration. Finally, networking, both within the organization and with other women's organizations, offers the division opportunities to engage in activism in the larger social arena.

I received my Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Delaware in 1984. I was also a part-time instructor at that institution in the department of women's studies from 1980 to 1987. I earned my livelihood as assistant professor of sociology at the department of sociology at Delaware State College. I was compelled to resign from that job and now I am a research fellow engaged in research on drug addiction and AIDS at a private research organization in New York city.

I have been born and raised in India, where young women's lives are culturally defined by arranged marriages, dowry system and overall devaluation. I was experiencing an obscure feeling of outrage as I was growing up. The women's movement in the sixties and the feminist literatures gave words to my feelings and anger. That anger still lingers when I see and hear about denigration of women faculty, graduate students, administrators and non-academic personnel at criminology and criminal justice departments of academic institutions. I feel that the mission of the Division of Women and Crime should be to act as a forum for bringing women's lives to the forefront so that women are represented adequately in criminology and criminal justice research and that they do not suffer in silence.

CLARICE FEINMAN

Biographical Description

Clarice Feinman received her Ph.D. in History from New York University in 1976. She is Professor of Law and Justice at Trenton State College, New Jersey and has been with the Department since 1976. She has been a Research Consultant with the Australian Institute of Criminology, 1984; a Visiting Lecturer at the Institute of Criminology, Cambridge University, England, 1982 and at the University of Sydney Law School, Sydney, Australia, 1984; a consultant with the New Jersey Department of Corrections Training Academy and taught courses on "Women in Corrections," 1978-1981; and a Director of the Women's Development Unit Project, a rehabilitation program at the New York City Correctional Institution for Women, 1985-1986.

Dr. Feinman's research has focused on women in the criminal justice system: victims, offenders, prisoners, police officers, lawyers and judges, and correctional officers. Her cross-cultural works cover Afro American and Native American women and Australian Aboriginal women.

Dr. Feinman created and has been the Editor of the Journal, Women & Criminal Justice since 1988; it is an interdisciplinary and international Journal. A special theme issue, The Criminalization of a Woman's Body, published also in hardback and paperback, analyzes the effect of law and court decisions on women's autonomy, privacy, and control of their bodies.

She has published several books and numerous articles on women in the criminal justice system as professionals, offenders, prisoners, and victims. Her book, Women in the Criminal Justice System, (third edition forthcoming) has been used as a basic text since 1980. Her article, "Sex Role Stereotypes and Justice for Women," has been published in several texts and submitted as a document in the Congressional Hearings on Women Offenders in 1979-1980. The article presented historical evidence disproving the myths of "the new female criminal" and the link between female criminality and the women's movement. Her works have been pace setters that presented reality to replace myth about women in the criminal justice system. She has made fundamental contributions to the field, especially from women's points of view.




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
