

Embedding PPI in an Allied Health Professions (AHP) Research Hub

Cheshire & Merseyside AHP Research Hub

The Cheshire and Merseyside AHP Research Network has been established to bring together academic and clinical AHP researchers within the Cheshire and Merseyside region to promote multi-professional research with the Allied Health Professions and engage clinicians who wish to pursue research but have not yet had the opportunity or support to do so.

The Cheshire and Merseyside AHP Research Network aims to provide professional leadership, an experience base, a signposting service for research funding, a toolkit of research methodology, mentorship and supervision.

The **Objectives** of the Network are:

- To build capacity for AHP related research
- To raise the awareness and profile of AHP related research
- To facilitate support for AHP related research and help to develop an environment in which such research can grow
- To provide information about existing research resources
- To share good practice and strategies for increasing research activity
- To encourage and support the dissemination of research outputs and findings
- To identify processes to support the implementation of research evidence into clinical practice
- To promote the benefits of cross-profession research for AHPs in both clinical and professional topics

Steering committee

Our steering committee comprises 17 individuals from eleven organisations. There are six academics, nine clinicians, one patient and public representative and one research facilitator (tables 1 and 2).

PPI in the Research Hub

Effective patient & public involvement in research is integral to the ethos and aims of the Cheshire & Merseyside AHP Research Hub. We want to encourage and support new and experienced AHP researchers in the region to develop research applications that fully satisfy ethics and governance requirements and are likely to be approved by funding agencies. Equally importantly, we want to ensure that they conduct high quality studies that are relevant to the needs of patients, their carers and families and contribute to improvements in health and social care services. For these reasons we will promote PPI in all the help we offer to the AHP research community.

The seriousness of our intent in this respect is evidenced by the early appointment of a PPI delegate to our Steering Group and our organisational affiliation to the North West People in Research Forum - a consortium of professional health and social care researchers/research managers and public contributors concerned with the promotion of PPI in the wider North West England region.

Encouraging PPI uptake by AHP Researchers

We will offer mentoring and advice to researchers on how to embed PPI in research and signpost them to opportunities for additional training to increase their confidence and competence in incorporating the process into their projects. We will also encourage the sharing of best practice, working in association with North West People in Research Forum and other national and local expert groups.

Through our networks we will be able to help in recruiting suitable lay candidates to contribute in various ways to planning, developing and carrying out projects through to dissemination and implementation of outcomes.

National AHP Research Network

The Allied Health Professions Research Network (AHPRN) was first founded as the National Physiotherapy Research Network (NPRN) in 2004. The AHPRN regional hubs welcome students, new and experienced researchers, clinicians, managers, consultants and academics from all Allied Health Professions with the aim of increasing research capability and capacity within, and between, the professions.


The network currently centres around 21 registered regional research 'hubs' and is able to provide research support by way of:

- peer review
- advice on research training and funding opportunities
- mentorship schemes
- sharing good research practice
- disseminating recent research outcomes
