INTRODUCTION

Nationally, there is a trend towards greater openness & between Birth Parents (BPs) and Adoptive Parents (APs) in domestic adoption

Greater openness has been shown as beneficial for adoption children (Grotevant & McRoy, 1998)

The limited research with BPs regarding openness tends show benefits in their post adoption adjustment (Ge et al., Henney et al., 2007)

Objective

Explore associations between adoption openness and l parent adjustment over time

METHODS

Participants

- **554** Birth Mothers (BM) & 173 Birth Fathers (BF) in the Growth & Development Study
- BPs are part of a "yoked" unit, which includes the APs & (561 total yokes)
- Completed a domestic infant adoption between 2003-2
- Recruited from 33 adoption agencies in 47 states


