Diplomats pay tribute to Steven Biko VICTORIA BE VSVIKY Riot-equipped police watch thousands in mourning

(AP) - Almost 20,000 mourners, fists and voices raised in black-power salutes and songs, converged on an open-air sports stadium Sunday for the funeral of Steve Biko in an outpouring of anti-government fervor that is rare in tightly controlled, white-ruled South Africa.

They were joined by top U.S. diplomats and other foreign representatives in paying tribute to the 30-

leader whose prison death has become a focus for black dissent and international protest and an embarrassment for the

White riot police, some armed with semi-automatic rifles, patrolled this coastal South African town 720 kilometres (450 miles) south of Johannesburg. No major incidents were reported during the five-hour service. mysterious circumstances in a prison cell Sept. 12.

Andrew Young, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, sent a three-foot wreath inscribed: "No nation can afford to lose its most dedicated and creative leadership." Another from American tennis ace Arthur Ashe read: "A tribute to a dedicated leader." Both Young and Ashe are black.

The U.S. was the only one of 13 Western countries represented that sent ranking diplomats to the funeral—William Bowdler, ambasssador to South Africa, and Don McHenry, deputy ambassador to the UN. They placed wreaths on the open coffin at Biko's home before the funeral

procession began. Biko's coffin was drawn atop an ox wagon from the tiny, twobedroom house in segregated black township of Ginsburg where Biko had lived with his

mother, wife and two small sons.

As the wagon rolled into the stadium, mourners who gathered from throughout the country broke into the black nationalist anthem, God Bless Africa, and then listened as black leaders bitterly attacked the white-minority regime and its security police, blamed by antigovernment critics for Biko's death.

News reports

said an autopsy showed Biko died of severe brain damage. Officials have not yet released the results of the autopsy.

"Biko is dead at the hands of the beastly security police," said Faith Matlaupane, president of the all-black South African Students Organization which Biko founded while in medical school.

SHERBROOKE, (CP) — The Parti Quebecois approved a wide-ranging 'information action plan' Sunday aimed at winning the independence referendum "neighborhood by neighborhood, street by street, family by family."

Arms talks to continue

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet Union joined the U.S. on Sunday in pledging to strategic arms limitation treaty (SALT) while negotiations continue toward hammering out a new ac-cord.

A Soviet government statement reported by the news agency Tass said Moscow will avoid taking any steps incompatible with the current SALT agreement—set to expire Oct. 3—provided the U.S.

shows the same restraint.
U.S. State Secretary
Cyrus Vance issued a similar statement Friday after two days of arms talks in Washington with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei

Gromyko. The Soviet statement no mention of

problems remaining after the Washington talks. But U.S. officials and Gromyko had said afterward that the two sides moved closer together on the unresolved issues.

The statement said the Soviet Union will continue to abide by the expiring agreement "in accordance with the readiness expressed by both sides to complete within the near future the work on a new agreement ... and in the interests of maintaining the status quo while the talks on the new agreement are being concluded."

The expiring 1972 accord sets limits on land-based and submarine-launched intercontinental ballistic missiles. It does not limit heavy bombers that carry nuclear bombs or the number of missiles that can progress achieved or carry multiple warheads.

New oil port study revealed

East and west ports considered

VICTORIA CP-The federal government will release to the Thompson oil inquiry a study it is preparing on the subject, the head of the inquiry said Saturday.

today.

Dr. Andrew Thompson said the study is still being drafted but should be completed next month in time for public hearings.

Dr. Thompson had said last week that he was unaware of the independent study being done by the energy, mines and resources ministry, headed by Alastair Gillespie, but had added that it was not unsual for government departments to do their own studies on such matters.

The Thompson inquiry was established last March by the federal government to assess a proposal to build an oil port at Kitimat, B.C., 750 miles northwest of here.

It was later broadened to include proposals for Cherry Point and Port Angeles, both in Washington State. Thompson has held hearings in communities around B.C., and the inquiry is scheduled to re-open here

OTHER SITES Former B.C. Liberal leader David Anderson, representing the B.C. Wildlife Federation at the inquiry, said Saturday that the federal study lists six possible oil port sites on the east coast as well as the

As well as the Kitimat and

Anderson said the federal study also consider sites south of Vancouver, in the Maritimes, on the lower St. Lawrence River and at Portland, Me.

He said certain portions of the federal study are "idiotic" because they assume Thompson will be making decisions on east coast ports.

"The federal government still doesn't know Thompson's terms of reference, he said. "Thompson can't be expected to make decisions about ice conditions on the St. Lawrence River."

The federal study was first revealed in a letter from Gillespie to another cabinet minister.

'We can smile wryly now at the obvious incompetence of this situation," said Anderson. "If the story about Gillespie's letter hadn't been printed, we can wonder if the federal study would ever have been Washington State sites, presented to the inquiry.'

Austere defence policies cause short supplies

Underequipped U.S. Army can't fight conventional war

WASHINGTON (AP) — The ability of the United States to fight a major conventional war has been seriously weakened by shortages in key weapons and ammunition and by other critical deficiencies.

"Stated frankly and simply, our army is outguined and inadequately equipped," said Gen. David Jones, U.S. Air Force chief of staff.

"We have had to live with underequipped tactical fighter units shortfalls in airlift capability, an austere ... air defence force ... and persistent shortages of aircraf spare parts and some types of muni-tions."

Jones said the Pentagon has started corrective actions, but a two month investigation by The Associated Press shows it will take two to six years to cure most of the

major shortcomings.
"It will take at least five or six years of concerted effort before the materiel condition of the entire fleet attains a sustainable satisfactory level," said the defence department, describing the U.S. Navy.

Unlike the conventional forces, U.S. strategic nuclear striking arms appear to be in good shape. These long-range missiles and bombers and missile submarines are designed to deter any nuclear attack on the U.S.

INCREASED CONCERN

During the last year, Congress and the Pentagon have shown concern about the readiness of conventional U.S. land, air and sea forces to deal with a possible attack on Western Europe by the Soviet Union.

This concern grows from a belief that the Russians may have developed enough hard-hitting, fastmoving ground and air power to attack Western Europe with little

warning.
Readiness problems also undercut
U.S. ability to use ground, sea and air forces effectively in the Far East, Middle East and the oil-producing Persian Gulf.

The investigation highlighted these significant weaknesses among others:

—The army has only 7,000 of the nearly 15,000 tanks planners believe it must have to defeat Soviet armor and replace anticipated heavy battle losses. The Russians outnumber Allied armies by about three to one in tanks in the crucial Central European sector;

—The air force has about half the advanced air-to-air missiles it needs as defence against enemy fighter

-The army national guard and reserve has few units rated ready for deployment. The air force, marines and navy are generally regarded as being in better shape; -The reserve manpower pool has

dropped to 429,000 from 1.6 million five years ago. Because the draft is dead, this individual ready reserve would be the main source of replacements for battle casualties in the first weeks and months of a war; -Poor reliability of some new aircraft, ships and other complex

weapons have caused major problems. During one recent period

fewer than 50 per cent of the Atlantic fleet's F-14 fighter planes were ready to fly. PERSONNEL DROPPING

The U.S. military services have about 2.1 million men and women in uniform-1.5 million less than the Vietnam war peak and the smallest number since before the Korean War in 1950.

The 468-ship U.S. Navy is nearly the smallest since before the 1941 Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. The fleet was reduced by retiring hundreds of older ships for economy

reasons.

But there are pluses as well as minuses.

The air force's tactical air command, which is responsible for preparing U.S.-based fighters for deployment, claims it can double the nearly 600 U.S. fighters now based in Europe in 96 hours and have them in combat almost immediately.

The volunteer military concept has been under criticism from Capitol Hill since the draft ended more than four years ago.

DEFENCE ESSENTIAL

A new defence directive, issued after months of study, reinforces what has been the major focus of U.S. military policy—to defend Western Europe as close to the Communist border as possible without yielding any more German soil than is necessary.

The AP learned that the European war reserves stocks contain only about 25 per cent of the tanks required, one-third of the am munition, no armored personnel carriers, and no longbarrelled, selfpropelled artillery, which division commanders say is vital to match the longer ranges of the Soviet field

The reserve stocks in Europe are important because the shortage of long-range airlift capacity makes it questionable whether enough fresh equipment and ammunition could reach Europe in time to influence the battle during the first 30 days.

Dead is Louis Hamel, 17, whose car apperently ran off the highway near the Kitimat River. Two passengers whose names are not yet known are in being treated in Mills Memorial Hospital.

PEKING (Reuter) — China's pragmatic new leaders have tightened their grip on the armed forces by naming southerner Wei Kuo-ching to direct the army's political

The key post was previously held by Chang Chun-chiao, one of the disgraced "Gang of Four" radicals purged last

A member of the party central committee, Wei has been serving as party first secretary in Kwantung province and first political commissar of the PLA units in Canton, the Kwantung capital.

During his temporary political exile last year, Teng is understood to have spent some time in the Canton area under the protection of local party and army leaders.

Army leaders have said a thorough purge of radical influence is under way in the military. As usual, the People's Daily gave no indication when Wei was appointed to his new post. It said merely he had attended an army cultural and artistic performance that

Fires dampened in district

Despite the return to identifying forest insects coler damper weather, and diseases and any cournew fires were reported resulting problems mthe cooler damper weather, four new fires were reported for the week ending Sept. 22, bringing the season total for the Forest District to 144

The new fires are either out or being mopped up by fire fighting crews.

Along with fire sup-pression, the Protection division is responsible for the detection, monitoring and control of forest insects and diseases in the Prince Rupert Forest District. All ages of forests are affected by insects and diseases, and by insects and diseases, and although not as dynamic as fire, these agents can cause serious problems to the forest manager. Serious growth loss, deformities and mortality are frequently associated with i insect and disease attacks; if left unchecked, an entire forest crop representing over 100 years of growth can be quickly destroyed.

detection The monitoring of insect populations and diseases is jointly carried out by the Canadian Forestry Service of the Federal Department of Fisheries and Environment and the Forest SERVICE. Two Federal Insect and Disease Rangers are assigned to the Prince Rupert Forest District for a five month season, and provide expert advice on insect and disease problems. Tje facilities and staff of the Canadian Forestry SERVICE, Pacific Forest Research Centre in Victoria are also made available to the Forest District. In addition to

Defoliators and bark-beetles. Defoliators eat needles and buds of trees, and cause growth loss, deformaties and mortality. Examples of defoliators in the Prince Rupert Forest District are the European Sawfly and Spruce Weevil, which defoliate shorepine and Sitka spruce respectively. Chemical control of defoliator infestations is often required, however, this method is used very sparingly and cautiously. No such control is being carried out in the Prince Rupert Forest District at

Little promise for peace

UNITED NATIONS CP- The opening phases of the new Middle East peace offensive have produced little promise of actual movement toward a peace conference in Genva this

Emissaries from Egypt and Israel vistied President Carter this weel to talk about possible resumption of the Geneva conference, which has been standing adjourned since just after the 1973 Yon Kippur War. Carter later is to talk with envoys of the two other Middle East belligernets,

Syria and Jordon.

His initial talks with Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmy of Egypt and Moshe Dayan of Israel were described as positive, useful and helpful in Washington but diplomats here saw no hint of progress on the insurmountable obstacle

of Palestinian representation in the Geneva talks.

"From the public image, we see no grounds for optimism and no hope of success," said one diplomat who keeps close tab on the Middle East negotiations. "From all appearances, the Arab and the Israelis would seem to be on a

collision course.' This velwpoint contrasted sharply with that expressed in Washington, where Dayan said an agreed formula for resumed Geneva talks might be found mefore the year-end and Fahmy also expressed hope the conference could meet

The aim of Carter's separate negotiations with Dayn and FAHMY, AND HIS TALKS NEXT WEEK WITH Foreign Minister Adbel Hallum Khaddan of Syrai and an envoy from Jordon, is to find a way around Israel's refusal to permit representatives of the Palestine Liberational Organization PLO to attend the Genva meeting.

Israelis regard the PLO, an umbrella organization representing various groups of Palestinian refugees made homeless when Israel came into being 30 years and

homeless when Israel came into being 30 years ago, as a terrorist organization dedicated to the destruction of

Only Israel, Egypt, Syria and Jordon- the four countries involved in the Yom Kilur War-were invited to the original 1973 conference when it was convened under the auspices of the United States and the Soviet Union. It was adjourned after a few brief sessions.

Dayan tried to indicate some Israeli flexebility by saying Israel would accept at Geneva mayors of Palestinian towns on the occupied West Bank of the Jordon River or other Palenstinians known publicly to the PLO sympathizers.

Fahmy ridiculed that idea, ar that the West Bank mayors would have neither the stature nor the authority to represent the Palestinian population as a whole and could speak only for their own local areas.

If Washington could nail down Arab-Israeli agreement onnew Geneva talks, it would at the same time be able to head off a potentially embarrassing debate in the UN General Assembly over Israel's continued establishments of illegal Jewish settlements in Arab lands occupied in the

Egypt has served notice that it plans to seek such a debate and can be expected to push the issue if the Washington negotiations fall. This would put the U.S. in a spot because it joined the Arab nations last year in condemning the Israeli settlements program and could not avoid being caught up in a new debate in the General Assembly.

British Columbia is convinced Frime Minister Fierre Trudeau is preparing for a violent confrontation with separatist Quebec Premier Rene Levesque.

He says it could be the same kind of "apprehended insurrention" that led to imposition of the War Measures Act in the "October Crisis" of 1070 when Mr. Trudeau moved the country of a present the country of the country thousands of armed troops by air and armoured personnel carrier into Quebec against the terrorists of the Quebec Liberation Front.

A scary scenario? Even alarmist? Perhaps, except that the MP is Allan McKinnon, the Opposition Conservative Defence Critic in Parliament, a quiet, hard-working, 60-year-old veteran of World War Two and a former field officer who remains in close touch with the Armed Forces.

The "aprehended insurrection" that exploded into the "October Crisis" seven years ago had a long fuse that burned with the spark of "independence" that is smouldering in today's separatist ambitions of Rene

The Prime Minister's reaction to terrorism and the feared uprising, while slow, was sudden and furious. In went the troops, and some 300 arrests made.

Then things cooled out until last Novemeber 15 when Rene Levesque's separatists turned the rest of Canada by winning power and proclaiming that a referendum for "sovereignty and independence" of Quebec would be held within two years.

What has alerted Allan McKinnon has been the sudden spending by the federal government of \$127 million for new defence equipement, gas masks, and, oddest of all, 950 additional pairs of handcuffs.

Whatinitially aroused him that "something extraodinary is up" was the transfer from Edmontonof the crack Canadian Airborne Regiment to Defence Base Petawawa, just 10 miles from the Quebec border and 159 from Mon-

"You could look at any one of these things and suspect that some extraordinary measures are beingtaken," says Allan McKinnon. "But put these five separate things together and you've got a high defence priority of quelling He wrote tof ederal Defence Minister Barney Danson







DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 16-year-old girl and have an intimate sexual relationship with my 17-year-old boyfriend.

I am concerned as to whether I can become pregnant if my virginity is not taken. We use the withdrawal technique. Is there any possibility that I can conceive if the hymen is not ruptured?

My boyfriend is confident that no sperm can inundate the ovary if the hymen is still intact. Personally I tend to believe this too, but I am having apprehensions. I hope you can allay my fears.

I don't want to face the embarrassment and heartbreak that an unwanted pregnancy would bring on my family and myself.
DEAR READER — First of

all, the withdrawal technique is one of the least reliable forms of birth control, and it is the most commonly used method in active youngsters - including those who should know better.

It only takes one sperm cell united with an ovum to induce a pregnancy. A small amount of sperm at the vaginal opening can result in pregnancy. No, the hymen does not

have to be broken for pregnancy to occur. This membrane-like structure already has a hole in it or is torn at the time a girl begins menstruating. There is no other way for normal menstrual discharge to occur. The opening that permits passage of blood also will permit passage of sperm You might ask yourself why

you and your family would be embarrassed or have heartache if you were to become a mother. I suspect you will say that it is because your parents would not approve of your life style. I can't make your decisions for you, but you should resolve your feelings about this before you run the risk of pregnancy. Your own responses, your parents' responses, your partner's responses, and what happens to an unwanted baby are all things every girl should carefully consider in deciding what life style she will choose. It is better to confront these basic facts while one still has a choice rather than after it is too late.
