MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY May 8, 1976

The Board of Regents of Murray State University met May 8, 1976, at 1:30 p.m., C.D.T., in the Board Room of Harry M. Sparks Hall on the campus of the University. The following members were present: Dr. Mark Cunningham, Mr. James A. Davis, Mr. Bob T. Long, Mr. A. B. Mitchell, Mr. Frank Paxton, Mr. O.' B. Springer, Mr. Frank A. Stubblefield, Mr. Tim Langford, and Dr. Charles E. Howard, Chairman, presiding.

Mr. William Carneal was absent.

Also present were Dr. Constantine W. Curris, President; Mrs. Patsy R. Dyer, Secretary of the Board; Dr. Thomas B. Hogancamp, Vice-President for Administration and Finance and Treasurer of the Board; Vice-Presidents Bartholomy, Julian and Read; members of the news media and visitors.

Chairman Howard called the meeting to order and Dr. Hogancamp led in prayer.

Resolution in Memoriam Dr. Morgan E. Sisk

The following resolution was presented and adopted by the Board:

IN MEMORIAM

Morgan E. Sisk

Resolved, That the Board of Regents of Murray State University adopts this resolution in tribute to the memory of Dr. Morgan E. Sisk, whose sudden and premature death on May 2, 1976, brought sorrow to the hearts of his multitude of friends and associates.

The University feels keenly the loss of a faithful alumnus, friend, outstanding professor for twelve years and more recently professor and director of the Murray State University Biological Station on Kentucky Lake. His interest and work in biological sciences and particularly research related to area fishes will long be remembered.

Resolved further, That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the official minutes of the Board of Regents and that a copy be transmitted to his wife, Jane, that we may extend to her, members of the family, and his colleagues an expression of our sincere sympathy and heartfelt condolence.

9. <u>Bachelor of Science in Business Administration</u> (Area in Hotel, Restaurant, and Tourism Management)

10. Baccalaureate Minor in Paralegal Studies

I recommend that the Board of Regents approve the establishment of a baccalaureate minor in paralegal studies. The growing specialization of the law and the increased cost for legal services have resulted in an increased number of lawyer's assistants (or legal assistants). These individuals are trained to assume much of the standard research and administrative responsibilities performed by the lawyer. The handling of these time-consuming duties by a professionally prepared assistant frees the lawyer to devote his time to the more demanding legal work which only he can prepare.

This proposed minor will allow the Murray State graduate to develop these competencies while majoring in another field of study. The program will aid those students desiring traditional disciplinary study to secure professionally related employment.

11. Gift to the University

I recommend that the Board accept the gift of \$29,000 presented by John E. Harms, Jr. of Prince Frederick, Maryland, to the Murray State University Department of Agriculture to purchase eleven Quarter horses from the Hunting Creek Farm, Prince Frederick, Maryland.

12. Report from the Dean of Admissions and Registrar

In keeping with the recommendation of the Dean of Admissions and Registrar, I recommend the Board award diplomas and grant degrees to the students completing the requirements and as listed on the attached reports for December 31, 1975, and May 8, 1976.

13. Agreement with Murray City Schools

I recommend that the Board authorize the President to enter into Laboratory Experience Program Agreement for our elementary and secondary education students with the Murray Board of Education (and subsequently other school systems). (See attached agreement.)

14. West Kentucky Livestock and Exposition Center

I recommend that the \$2.6 million exposition center recently constructed and now accepted by the University be known as the "West Kentucky Livestock and Exposition Center" at Murray State University.

5. Bachelor of Science in Veterinary Science Technology

I recommend that the Board of Regents approve the establishment of a Bachelor of Science degree program in Veterinary Science Technology. This program would be located in the Department of Agriculture, College of Environmental Sciences.

The Kentucky General Assembly has this year established a law which creates a new section of the Kentucky Revised Statutes dealing with "animal technicians." For the first time the Commonwealth will allow specially-trained non-veterinarians to treat animals and perform other duties under the supervision of a veterinarian. In establishing this law the General Assembly responded to the continually accelerating need for paraprofessional veterinary personnel in Kentucky. Murray State has for the past several years been studying ways to help alleviate the serious shortage of veterinarians which exists. This proposed baccalaureate degree program in Veterinary Science Technology is designed to provide the highly skilled and broadly educated technicians needed by our veterinarians for relief from much of their laboratory, animal nursing, and office work so that they may be more productive in the areas of diagnosis, surgery, and treatment.

Agreement with the Murray City Schools and the Calloway County Schools, Authorized

Mr. Paxton moved that the Board authorize the President of the University to enter into agreement with the Murray City Schools and the Calloway County Schools and subsequently other school systems to provide laboratory experience for our elementary and secondary education students.

MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY

LABORATORY EXPERIENCE PROGRAM AGREEMENT

- 1. The Murray Board of Education accepts responsibility with Murray State University to participate in the training of qualified teachers. This responsibility includes the opportunity for teacher education students to observe classroom instruction and to interact with students through participation in regular classroom activities.
- 2. The Board and the University agree that all arrangements in reference to this program shall be governed by, and consistent with, policies of the Board as well as those of the University.
- 3. Students placed in the Murray Public school system shall agree to abide by all policies, rules and regulations of the Board. Failure to abide by this provision shall be grounds for removal from the program.
- 4. The University shall provide pertinent information concerning laboratory experience requests in advance of student placement in the schools. University representatives will work with the school principal, classroom teachers, and other school personnel in structuring these placements and resolving any difficulties which may arise.
- 5. The Board shall designate a representative to serve as liaison between the Board and the University.
- 6. The University shall designate a representative to serve as liaison between the University and the Board.
- 7. The University shall provide adequate supervision for students during laboratory experiences.
- 8. This memorandum of agreement shall remain in effect continuously until terminated by one or both parties upon six months' notice.

- 1. The Calloway County Board of Education accepts responsibility with Murray State University to participate in the training of qualified teachers. This responsibility includes the opportunity for teacher education students to observe classroom instruction and to interact with students through participation in regular classroom activities.
- 2. The Board and the University agree that all arrangements in reference to this program shall be governed by, and consistent with, policies of the Board as well as those of the University.
- 3. Students placed in the Calloway County school system shall agree to abide by all policies, rules and regulations of the Board. Failure to abide by this provision shall be grounds for removal from the program.
- 4. The University shall provide pertinent information concerning laboratory experience requests in advance of student placement in the schools. University representatives will work with classroom teachers and other school personnel in structuring these placements and resolving any difficulties which may arise.
- 5. The Board shall designate a representative to serve as liaison between the Board and the University.
- 6. The University shall designate a representative to serve as liaison between the University and the Board.
- 7. The University shall provide adequate supervision for students during laboratory experiences.
- 8. This memorandum of agreement shall remain in effect continuously until termin: nated by one or both parties upon six months' notice.

Murray State University Copyright Policy, Adopted

President Curris reviewed the following Copyright Policy:

MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY COPYRIGHT POLICY

OBJECTIVES

A copyright policy is proposed for the University that will seek to protect and promote the traditional academic freedom of the University staff and students in matters of publication; that will seek to balance fairly and reasonably the equitable rights of authors, sponsors, and the University; and that will attempt to ensure that any copyrightable material in which the University has an equity

interest is utilized in a manner consistent with the public interest.

MATERIALS SUBJECT TO COPYRIGHT

The following types of material now or in the near future may be subject to copyright:

- 1. Books, journal articles, texts, glossaries, bibliographies, study guides, laboratory manuals, syllabi, tests, and proposals.
- 2. Lectures, musical or dramatic compositions, and unpublished scripts.
- 3. Films, film strips, charts, transparencies, and other visual aids.
- 4. Video and audio tapes and cassettes.
- 5. Live video or audio broadcasts.
- 6. Programmed instruction materials.
- 7. Computer programs.
- 8. Other materials.

OWNERSHIP AND DISPOSITION OF COPYRIGHTABLE MATERIAL

The University believes that the above-stated objectives will best be attained by defining the ownership and disposition of copyrightable material in terms of the following categories:

A. Ownership of all copyrightable material which is developed in the course of or pursuant to a sponsored research or other agreement shall be determined in accordance with the terms of the sponsored research or other agreement.

Normally, sponsored research contracts by the Government provide the Government with specified rights in copyrightable material developed in the performance of the research. These rights may consist of title to such data vesting in the Government or the reservation of a royalty-free license to the Government with title vesting in the author or University. Grants and other types of sponsored research agreements, whether by the Government or industry may, on the other hand, provide no specific provision concerning rights in such material.

The purpose of this provision is to ensure that the University will be free to dispose of all such data in a manner consistent with its obligations to the sponsor and to the public.

This provision is not intended to apply to copyrights on papers published in the usual way in journals, since such papers are normally the property of the journal.

B. All copyrightable material which is developed with the significant use of funds, space or facilities, including but not limited to classes and laboratory facilities, administered by the University but without any M.S.U. obligations to others in connection with such support, shall be the joint property of the University and the author with royalty ownership rights established in proportion to the contribution of each party.

The University shall exercise its rights in such material in a manner that will best further M.S.U.'s basic aims as an educational institution, giving full consideration to making the material available to the public on a reasonable and effective basis, avoiding unnecessary exclusions and restrictions, and providing adequate recognition of the authors.

In this respect M.S.U. recognizes and reaffirms the traditional academic freedom of its staff and students to publish freely without restriction. In keeping with this philosophy, M.S.U. will not construe the provision of office or library facilities as constituting significant use of University space or facilities, nor will it construe the payment of salary (including that salary paid for summer professional improvement leaves, sabbaticals, or Presidential Fellowships) as constituting significant use of University funds, except for those situations where the funds were paid specifically to support the development of such material. In addition, the University will not construe a direct contribution of less than \$1,000.00 as being significant.

Textbooks developed through the use of classes are excluded from the provisions of this category, unless such textbooks were also developed using University funds paid specifically to support such textbook development.

C. Copyrightable material not within the provisions of Categories A and B of this Policy is wholly the property of the author.

D. Royalty Sharing Provisions Under Categories A and B

Royalty income received by the University through the sale, licensing, leasing or use of copyrightable material under Category B, in which the University has acquired a property interest, will normally be shared with the author and the department, laboratory or center within the University where the material originated. Authorship shall be determined by an ad-hoc Committee for Copyrights.

At a certain time in the developmental stages of a fully University-supported or University-initiated production, it would be appropriate for all University employees to reach an understanding with the University, through the Committee, concerning the division of any royalty income that might result from copyrightable material.

Where, after review, authorship cannot be determined, the percent share of royalties intended for the author shall be distributed instead to the originating department, laboratory or center. (As used herein, the phrase "originating department, laboratory or center" means the department, laboratory or center which administered the funds, space or facilities used in developing the copyrightable material.)

The University reserves the right at its discretion to deduct from gross royalty income, prior to any such distribution, expenses, such as litigation, which may be incurred in enforcing or defending the copyright or in licensing the copyrightable material.

Upon the recommendation of the President, Mr. Stubblefield moved that the Board adopt the foregoing Copyright Policy. Mr. Long seconded and the motion carried.

Bachelor of Science in Veterinary Science Technology, Authorized

Upon the recommendation of the President, Mr. Long moved that the Board authorize the establishment of a Bachelor of Science degree program in Veterinary Science Technology. Mr. Mitchell seconded and the motion carried.
