- AGENCY. By Joseph L. Frascona. Englewood Cliffs: Prentice-Hall, Inc. 1964. Pp. xii, 115. \$1.95 paperbound. A survey of agency law intended principally for the layman. Documentation consists largely of citations to uniform acts and the Restatement.
- AMERICAN CONSTITUTIONAL LAW: INTRODUCTORY CASES AND SELECTED ESSAYS. By Alpheus Thomas Mason and William M. Beaney. Englewood Cliffs: Prentice-Hall, Inc. 3d ed. 1964. Pp. x, 588. \$10.00. A casebook which places the decisions in their historical and political context through introductory essays.
- THE AMERICAN LAW OF TREASON: REVOLUTIONARY AND EARLY NATIONAL ORIGINS. By Bradley Chapin. Seattle: University of Washington Press. 1964. \$6.00. A legal and historical study of the development of American treason law from its English roots.
- THE AMERICAN LEGISLATIVE PROCESS: CONGRESS AND THE STATES. BY William J. Keefe and Morris S. Ogul. Englewood Cliffs: Prentice-Hall, Inc. 1964. Pp. x, 498. §7.95. Two professors of political science examine the workings of legislative bodies, with particular attention to their relationship to lobbies and other external influences.
- AMERICAN THEORIES OF FEDERALISM. By Walter Hartwell Bennet. University: University of Alabama Press. 1964. Pp. 227. \$5.95. The author traces the development of various theories of the state-federal relation from colonial times to the present and assesses the present position of the states in our political system.
- BALLOTS & BANDWAGONS. By Ralph G. Martin. Chicago, New York, and San Francisco: Rand McNally & Co. 1964. Pp. 480. \$5.95. The story of five major presidential nominating conventions in this century, by a former member of Adlai Stevenson's national campaign staff.
- BOARDMAN'S NEW YORK FAMILY LAW. By Elliott L. Biskind. New York: Clark Boardman Company, Ltd. 1964. Pp. xxiv, 2197. \$35.00 looseleaf binder. A comprehensive guide to the law of domestic relations.

Pp. xiv, 327. §7.95. Accurately described as a "guide," this book emphasizes the practical problems of estate planning rather than fine points of law.

The author emphasizes the interrelationship of the domestic economic problem with international and political questions.

cations, Inc. 1964. Pp. xii, 98. \$3.95 clothbound, \$1.95 paperbound. Disarmament efforts are examined from the viewpoint of the lawyer.

- THE DISINHERITED AND THE LAW. By Dagobert D. Runes. New York: Philosophical Library. 1964. Pp. vii, 79. \$3.00. An indignant protest against the anomalies and injustices sanctioned by law.
- THE FARM BUREAU AND THE NEW DEAL: A STUDY OF THE MAKING OF NATIONAL FARM POLICY, 1933-40. By Christiana McFadyen Campbell. Urbana: University of Illinois Press. 1962. Pp. viii, 215. \$4.75. An historian's description of the relationship between the American Farm Bureau Federation and the Roosevelt administration, and the Bureau's influence on farm policy.
- FEDERAL CONFLICT OF INTEREST LAW. By Bayless Manning. Cambridge: Harvard University Press. 1964. Pp. xv, 285. \$6.95. A heavily documented study of the revised conflict of interest laws effective in 1963, by the Dean of Stanford Law School.
- FELIX FRANKFURTER: A TRIBUTE. Edited by Wallace Mendelson. New York: Reynal & Co. 1964. Pp. viii, 242. \$4.00. A collection of essays by lawyers, scholars, writers and others.
- FINANCING A THEATRICAL PRODUCTION: A SYMPOSIUM OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE LAW OF THE THEATRE OF THE FEDERAL BAR ASSOCIATION OF NEW YORK, NEW JERSEY AND CONNECTICUT. Edited by Joseph Taubman. New York: Federal Legal Publications, Inc. 1964. Pp. xxiv, 499. \$15.00. A look at the legal and financial side of show business, with particular attention to S.E.C. regulation.
- FOREIGN DIVORCE. By James H. Boykin. New York: Pageant Press, Inc. 1964. Pp. 79. \$2.50. A short general survey of the problems arising from the granting of divorces to non-residents.
- FREEDOM NOW! THE CIVIL RIGHTS STRUGGLE IN AMERICA. Edited by Alan F. Westin. New York: Basic Books, Inc. 1964. Pp. vii, 346. \$5.95. A collection of essays by civil rights leaders.
- FUNDAMENTAL LEGAL CONCEPTIONS AS APPLIED IN JUDICIAL REASONING. By Wesley Newcomb Hohfeld. New Haven and London: Yale University Press. 1964. Pp. xv, 114. \$4.00 clothbound, \$1.45 paperbound. Originally published in the Yale Law Journal a half century ago, this study attempts to make possible the more accurate solution of legal problems through semantic analysis.
- THE HISTORY OF PROSTITUTION. By Vern L. Bullough. New Hyde Park: University Books. 1964. Pp. ix, 304. \$7.50. A comprehensive study of prostitution throughout the world, with some incidental discussion of censorship and similar sociolegal questions.
- THE INTER-AMERICAN SECURITY SYSTEM AND THE CUBAN CRISIS: BACKGROUND PAPERS AND PROCEEDINGS OF THE THIRD HAMMARSKJÖLD FORUM. Edited by Lyman M. Tondel, Jr. Dobbs Ferry: Oceana Publications, Inc. 1964. Pp. xi, 96. \$3.95 clothbound, \$1.75 paperbound. A history of the inter-American security system and a discussion of questions of international law arising from the American quarantine of Cuba.
- INVERSE CONDEMNATION: THE CONSTITUTIONAL LIMITS OF PUBLIC RESPONSIBILITY. By Daniel R. Mandelker. St. Louis: Prepared under Contract No. CPR 11-682 between the United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of Public Roads and the Washington University School of Law. 1964. Pp. v, 122. Paperbound. A

general study and state-by-state analysis of the cause of action given by the Constitution's eminent domain clause to landowners who suffer damages due to a highway improvement which were not compensated for in the original condemnation proceeding.

- THE INVISIBLE GOVERNMENT. By David Wise and Thomas B. Ross. New York: Random House. 1964. Pp. 375. \$5.95. Two newspaper men examine the influence of the "cold war" agencies, particularly the CIA, on our government and its policies.
- JUSTICE IN MOSCOW. By George Feifer. New York: Simon and Schuster. 1964. Pp. 353. \$5.95. This description of the workings of the Soviet legal system is based upon a year of observation by a young American in Moscow.
- JUSTICE ON TRIAL. By A. L. Todd. New York: McGraw-Hill Book Company. 1964. Pp. ix, 275, \$6.50. A detailed acount of the struggle over Justice Brandeis' appointment to the Supreme Court.
- LAW IN EASTERN EUROPE: No. S: INTRODUCTION TO SOVIET COPYRIGHT LAW. By Serge L. Levitsky. Leyden: A. H. Sythoff. 1964. Pp. 303. Dfl. 31,90. A thorough and well-documented survey, of interest to the general reader for its insights into Soviet attitudes on law, censorship and literature.
- THE LAW PRACTICE OF ALEXANDER HAMILTON: DOCUMENTS AND COMMENTARY. Vol. I. Edited by Julius Goebel Jr., et al. New York and London: Columbia University Press. 1964. Pp. xxiv, 898. \$18.50. This meticulously scholarly compilation includes virtually every document figuring in the legal career of Hamilton, from student notes to legal forms.
- LAW AND PUBLIC ORDER IN SPACE. By Myres S. McDougal, Harold D. Lasswell and Ivan A. Vlasic. New Haven and London: Yale University Press. 1963. Pp. xxvi, 1147. \$15.00. A comprehensive study of the major problems of international law in space.
- LAWYER'S PRACTICE MANUAL. By the Prentice-Hall Editorial Staff. Englewood Cliffs: Prentice-Hall. 1964. Pp. vii, 259. \$10.00. A "handbook" for lawyers, based on the Missouri Bar's study of the social and economic position of lawyers.
- THE MAKING OF JUSTICE: THE SUPREME COURT IN ACTION. By James E. Clayton. New York: E. P. Dutton & Co. 1964. Pp. 319. \$4.95. The everyday operations of the Court, and the personalities and philosophies behind it, are depicted by the Supreme Court reporter for the Washington Post.
- THE MORALITY OF LAW. By Lon L. Fuller. New Haven and London: Yale University Press. 1964. Pp. viii, 202. \$5.00. An examination of the relation between morality and law, based on the 1963 Storrs Lectures at Yale Law School.

- PATENT COUNSEL IN INDUSTRY. By Carl G. Baumes. New York: National Industrial Conference Board, Inc. 1964. Pp. 102. \$17.50 paperbound, with special prices for government agencies, students and teachers. No. 112 in the series "Studies in Business Policy" by a nonprofit fact-finding laboratory.

- PLUNGING INTO POLITICS. By Marshall Loeb and William Safire. New York: David McKay Co., Inc. 1964. Pp. xiv, 209. \$3.95. A how-to-do-it book for the political beginner. Heavy on anecdotes, light on serious analysis.
- *PROCEDURES AND POLICIES OF THE NEW YORK STATE LABOR RELATIONS BOARD. By Kurt L. Hanslowe. Ithaca: New York State School of Industrial and Labor Relations, Cornell University. 1964. Pp. viii, 216. \$4.00.
 - PUNISHMENT WITHOUT CRIME. By Isidore Zimmerman with Francis Bond. New York: Clarkson N. Potter, Inc. 1964. Pp. xiv, 304. \$5.00. A first person account of a man's 24 year struggle to overturn his wrongful conviction of felony murder, told in a reportorial style.
 - RELIGION AND THE PUBLIC ORDER (1963). Edited by Donald A. Gianella. Chicago and London: University of Chicago Press. 1964. Pp. x, 338. \$6.00. A collection of essays on the church and state relation by lawyers, theologians and historians, including an annual survey of developments.
 - THE ROBINSON-PATMAN ACT: SUMMARY AND COMMENT. By Daniel Jay Baum. Syracuse: Syracuse University Press. 1964. Pp. xviii, 167. \$5.75 clothbound, \$3.75 paperbound. A text which covers some related legislation in addition to Robinson-Patman. Includes considerable case-by-case analysis.
 - THE ROLE OF DOMESTIC COURTS IN THE INTERNATIONAL LEGAL ORDER. By Richard A. Falk. Syracuse: Syracuse University Press. 1964. Pp. xvi, 184. \$6.50. This third volume of the publisher's Procedural Aspects of International Law Series consists largely of a heavily documented study of the act of state doctrine. Includes a table of cases and a somewhat sketchy index.
 - THE STATES RIGHTS DEBATE: ANTIFEDERALISM AND THE CONSTITUTION. By Alpheus Thomas Mason. Englewood Cliffs: Prentice-Hall, Inc. 1964. Pp. xiii, 206. \$5.00 clothbound, \$2.45 paperbound. An analysis of the development of the Constitution between 1774 and 1790, with selected documents.
 - STATUS AND KINSHIP IN THE HIGHER CIVIL SERVICE. By Sidney H. Aronson. Cambridge: Harvard University Press. 1964. Pp. xiii, 274. \$5.95. An examination of the influence of social class on political appointments under Presidents Adams, Jefferson and Jackson.
 - STEEL DECISIONS AND THE NATIONAL ECONOMY. By Henry W. Broude. New Haven and London: Yale University Press. 1963. Pp. x, 332. \$7.50. The author analyzes the decision-making process in the steel industry and offers suggestions for governmental policy.
 - SUBROGATION IN INSURANCE THEORY AND PRACTICE. By Ronald C. Horn. Homewood: Richard D. Irwin, Inc. 1964. Pp. xxv, 371. \$6.95. Sponsored by a foundation supported by insurance companies, this text is intended for practicioners and serious students of insurance law.
 - TALES OUT OF CONGRESS. By Senator Stephen M. Young. Philadelphia and New York: J. B. Lippincott Co. 1964. Pp. 254. \$4.50. A largely political autobiography by the junior senator from Ohio.
 - THIS NATION UNDER GOD. By Joseph F. Costanzo, S.J. New York: Herder and Herder. 1964. Pp. 448. \$7.50. A conservative view on church and state.
 - WAR ON POVERTY. By Senator Hubert H. Humphrey. Toronto, London and New York: McGraw-Hill Book Co. 1964. Pp. 206. \$4.95. An outline of the Johnson administration's anti-poverty program.
