WHY do this?

Documenting and graphing makes our work applicable to other departments and shows value. "Graphs show the overall shape and patterns in data..." (Few, 2012)

Statistical Narratives

Cataloging = **DISCOVERABILITY**!

Most people have no idea how a book becomes a *library* book. Explaining the sheer number of materials we handle in technical services can be eye opening.

How?

Statistical Narrative DEFINED:

InfoGraphics: Combining visual, textual and quantitative information to highlight key facts. (Gardener, 2016)


Keep a journal and especially note any irregularities or trends in any given month. Notes help you tell a story.

I used monthly numbers from Sierra and created graphs in Excel and Google Charts.


Create a "landing page" for your libraries' numbers. A Libguide organized with tabs for each department where you can share your work.





Annual Workflow Snapshot
