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# COLLOQUIA ENTOMOLOGICA II: A REMARKABLE SALE OF VICTORIAN ENTOMOLOGICAL JEWELRY

The insect brooch was a popular *genre* of Victorian jewelry, and the late Dr. Moser Lyon Stadiem of New Orleans owned one of the finest private collections of Victorian jewelry in the United States. Dr. Stadiem's rarities, valued at over a million dollars, were obtained by the Famous-Barr Company of St. Louis five years after his death in 1964. 294 lots of the collection were sold at auction by Parke-Bernet Galleries, New York City, on 6 October 1969, and among these were some of the finest known examples of the great age of entomological jewelry.

The collector was no less remarkable than his collection. Dr. Stadiem was an eccentric character of the Vieux Carre (Latin Quarter) of New Orleans. A highly regarded physician and surgeon, he taught in Louisiana medical schools and served as doctor to the Monteleone Hotel, which granted him a rent-free room in which his hoard of jewelry was housed. He was well known in the Vieux Carre as a bon vīvant, as an inveterate bachelor, a contributor to charitable and philanthropic causes, a beau brummel, and a collector who enjoyed wearing as many as half a dozen of his antique watches at a time.

Dr. Stadiem's insect brooches were easily among the highlights of the auction. Even the distinguished publicity agents for Parke-Bernet were moved to describe them as "bizarre rarities;" wings seemed to "fly on their hidden coil springs at the slightest movement." The nineteenth-century entomological jewelry genre is interesting to the historian as a reflection of the widespread popular interest the Victorian era showed in insects and all other products of nature. We are fortunate in being able to print abbreviated descriptions of all entomological items (for full descriptions see Parke-Pernet's catalogue, 6 October 1969) as well as photographs of most, and actual sale prices of aii auction lots. The en tremblant jewelry, designed to simulate wing movement, naturally brought the highest prices








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Figs. 1-14. Victorian entomological jewelry.








