ABSTRACT

The present study aims at describing the classroom interactions in speaking class of English department of Muhammadiyah University of Surakarta: micro ethnography research. The objective of the study is to find out (1) the types of interactions occur in the speaking class; (2) the dominant types of the interaction; (3) the purpose of interaction in the classroom; (4) teacher roles during the interaction in the classroom. The type of the research is descriptive qualitative research. The writer uses observations and interviews in collecting data. The data of the present study consist of the result of the observations conducted by the researcher in speaking class of third semester students of English department of Muhammadiyah University of Surakarta. The observations were done in seven meetings during the odd semester. The observation would be reported descriptively based on what the researcher observed in the class. The interviews were conducted with the participants before and after the observations.

In analyzing the data, the researcher collected the result of the observation which were written in narrative. Coded were made to make it easier for the researcher to analyze the data.

The writer reaches the conclusion from this study as follows: (1) there are four types of interactions occur in speaking class, they are teacher – student interaction, teacher – students interaction, student(s) – teacher interaction, and students – students interaction; (2) teacher – students interaction was the most dominant type of interaction; (3) each types of interactions has its own purposes; (4) teacher roles as instructor, facilitator, and motivator during the interaction in the classroom.
