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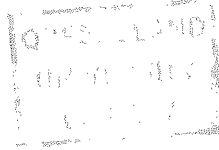

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FOREWORD

Any community which has a sense of responsibility for the social welfare of its citizens reaches a stage where it finds desirable a stock-taking and inventory of the services and resources available for those who need them.

It is good to see that Queensland has reached this stage, and that a progressive University Department has assembled together in a Directory of Social Services as complete a list as possible of the welfare services and facilities available in the State.

This, I understand, is the first such Directory to be available for general distribution. I predict that those who use it will be gratified at the extent and variety of services provided by both governmental and private bodies, and that a knowledge of these will do much to develop co-operation between statutory and voluntary social agencies.

Such co-operation should ensure not only the most effective use of existing resources, but also the wise and far-sighted planning of future welfare services to fill needs which may at present be unmet, or areas of assistance which are as yet unrecognised.

I have no doubt that those responsible for its publication will find this Directory will be of great value to every person whose work or concern it is to help fellow citizens with their many and varied human problems.

INTRODUCTION

With the increasing complexity of life and the increasing acceptance of democratic principles, social welfare has spread to many fields. Almost always State action has been preceded by the action of voluntary organisations. The twentieth century has produced a great social revolution and the manifestations of this are to be seen in the variety of social agencies recorded in this directory. Now the State provides education for its members, legislates for minimal wages for those in employment, ensures against unemployment, protects the health of its workers, provides for the sick and the injured, succours the orphan and the widowed, contributes towards the upkeep of the aged and the infirm, and concerns itself with the well-being of the prisoner and the education of the juvenile delinquent.

In Australia these social services are shared between the respective States and the Commonwealth. Although Governments, Commonwealth and State, have entered so strongly into the field of social services, yet they still lean heavily upon the voluntary associations to diagnose new needs and to suggest methods of meeting them. Here in Queensland this is evidenced in almost every field of social work—the pre-school child, the handicapped, the aged, the sick, the destitute and the deprived. This is strikingly apparent as one looks down the lists of agencies in this Directory of Social Services.

But in any community there is always the need to coordinate, extend and strengthen the excellent work being done by Federal, State and Voluntary Agencies through a Central Advisory and Co-ordinating Council for Social Agencies that should be a focus and growing point for the very many problems that arise in social welfare. It is through a Council that matters of importance in the field of social welfare can be given full consideration, and, if necessary, full publicity. More than that, a Council may be an agency for the exchange of information which is so necessary in modern communities in which the social structure is constantly undergoing change.

TRAINING IN SOCIAL WORK.

While some sections of a social service programme involve mainly the payment of money, the provision of equipment or help in kind, yet all forms of social welfare deal with human beings and hence involve consideration of human relationships. Often the care and skill shown in handling the human emotions involved are much more important than the money or the materials provided for the alleviation of the need. Here people trained in dealing with human problems are worth their weight in gold. Money and materials are not worth much without human understanding and psychological insight when minds and emotions have been confused, frustrated or starved. For this reason trained social workers are an important element in the social welfare programme of any community.

Social work is, of course, no new field of endeavour. It has flourished wherever and whenever men and women have worked in the interest of their fellows and for the betterment of social conditions. Only in the last forty years, however, has it been realised that kindness and good intentions are not sufficient qualifications for such work. The growth of the social sciences has provided the body of knowledge upon which social workers have based their practice.

Social workers may be vital links in maintaining and restoring cohesion in family life. The family group in modern society is exposed to many stresses and strains and as the rate and complexity of living increases so the possibility of break-down in family units increases. Many social organisations, state or voluntary, have increasingly found the need of skilled people to help in the human relationship side of their work.

To meet this need the University of Queensland has now introduced three courses of training which while primarily the concern of the Department of Education, are essentially the joint concern of the Departments of History, Economics, Social and Preventive Medicine and Psychology. One of these is a three-year course leading to the Diploma in Social Studies while the others provide for degrees in Social Studies.

NEED FOR RESEARCH.

If the social services provided by a community are to be sufficiently embracing and progressively effective in the fullest sense, then they require to base their functions and check their organisation on research surveys and investigations. Without research of a socio-psychological kind we delude ourselves into thinking that our social welfare is meeting all needs in the best way. First hand reports from the receiving end are often salutary to those who plan and administer social services. But also because the social pattern of every community is changing, particularly as regards family stability, there is the need continually to consider concepts and check schemes.

Finally, it is a pleasure to record that this first Directory of Social Service Agencies for Queensland itself represents a piece of social work in which Miss Betty Truesdale and Miss Jennifer Wagner, students taking the degree course in social work, played an important part in gathering the information, under the direction of Miss Faith Alleyne and Miss Hazel Smith. To Miss Alleyne goes the credit of organising the whole of the material and framing it in a form ready for publication. Miss Dorothy Hunt also helped by typing the manuscript.

To these people and to the University of Queensland Press who agreed to publish the Directory, the Faculty of Education gives its grateful thanks.

Since its inception in 1932 as a Commonwealth instrumentality and as a statutory body under the Australian Broadcasting Act 1942-48, which Act and subsequent Acts now superseded by the Broadcasting and Television Act 1942-56, the A.B.C. broadcasts comprehensive programmes which are deemed to be in the interests of all sections of the community. In Queensland the Commission broadcasts through 4QR and 4QG Brisbane, also operating ten regional stations and two short wave transmitters (VLM and VLQ).

Within the range of Commission programmes are news bulletins, news commentaries, talks of general interest, active discussion groups with adult listeners, rural broadcasts, sessions for hospitals, youth education, children's sessions, broadcasts to schools throughout the Commonwealth and specific sessions designed to assist New Australians in their assimilation. Drama, plays and interpretations of historical events are also presented. There are talks with religious themes and daily readings from the Bible. Church services from the principal denominations are broadcast each Sunday.

Several overseas artists are engaged each year by the Commission and are presented in public recitals and orchestral concerts.

The Queensland Symphony Orchestra consists at present of fifty-five musicians and a resident conductor. The orchestra is subsidised by the State Government and the Brisbane City Council in conjunction with the A.B.C. Concerts are given throughout the year, a number of which are free. Tours of country centres are undertaken each year during which free matinee performances are given for school children and evening concerts for the general public.

Functions: The Social Welfare section has been established in recognition of the personal and family problems confronting New Australians, particularly those unaccustomed to our language and way of life.

A casework service is provided by the Department's social workers. They co-operate closely with churches and voluntary agencies to help in the assimilation of New Australians. They attend migrant accommodation centres and commonwealth hostels, and, as often as practicable, visit country areas.

The Assimilation Division of which the Social Welfare Section is a part, is responsible for assimilation of migrants, advice and counsel, provision of facilities for non-British migrants to learn English, encouragement of community activities, and liaison with voluntary bodies such as Good Neighbour Councils and New Settlers' Leagues.

Administration of assisted migration schemes and operation of migrant accommodation centres. At the present time holding centres operate at Townsville and Wacol. Registration of aliens; grants of permission to change names; noting of changes of address and employment.

Control of entry of non-Australian citizens into Australia, either for temporary or permanent residence. Issue of passports, travel documents and re-entry permits.

Special sections have been established to help with the employment problems of certain people e.g. youth, the physically handicapped and the professionally trained. The service is responsible for the employment placement of migrants.

Information is given to employers concerning labour market conditions and the availability of labour.

2. VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE SERVICE.

Purpose: The Department administers the Social Services Act 1947-1955 and the Aged Persons Homes Act 1954.

Services: 1. The provision of the following social service pensions and benefits.

i. Aged and invalid pensions.

ii. Allowances for wives and children of invalid pensioners.

iii. Funeral benefits in respect of deceased aged and invalid pensioners.

iv. Widows' pensions.

v. Maternity allowances.

vi. Child endowment.

vii. Unemployment, sickness and special benefits.

viii. Reciprocal social service benefits under agreements with the United Kingdom and New Zealand.

2. The making of grants under the Aged Persons Homes Act and the Federal Housekeeper Grant.

3. The provision of rehabilitation facilities for the physically handicapped through the Commonwealth Rehabilitation Service. "Kingsholme" is the centre where both day and boarding facilities are available. The Service is available to recipients of invalid pensions, unemployment and sickness benefits or tuberculosis allowances or persons eligible for the foregoing. Young persons aged 14-16 years are also eligible.

The disability must be remediable, and there must be a reasonable prospect of the person engaging in employment within a period of three years after the commencement of rehabilitative treatment.

4. The Department makes a number of payments such as tuberculosis allowances and public service pensions as agent for other Commonwealth departments. Pensions and allowances on behalf of the Imperial and other overseas governments are also paid on an agency basis.

5. The provision of a social casework service where necessary to recipients of Commonwealth social service pensions and benefits.

6. A library dealing mainly with the social welfare field is available for the use of any interested person. Books and periodicals will be mailed to any part of Australia.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR ASSISTANCE OR ENROLMENT.

The conditions of eligibility vary for each social service pension or benefit.

With the exception of maternity allowances, child endowment, pensions for blind persons and funeral benefits, each social service pension or benefit is subject to a means test. Aged, invalid or widows' pensions are payable only to British subjects, and together with unemployment and sickness benefits and child endowment are subject to a residential qualification.

Purpose: This bureau is operated by the Commonwealth Government of Australia to provide free legal advice for certain members and discharged members of the forces and their dependants.

Services: The Bureau acts as solicitor for clients seeking the enforcement and protection of their rehabilitation and re-establishment rights. Advice will be given with other legal matters and clients referred to appropriate solicitors.

Eligibility: Membership of the Australian Forces, or Women's Auxiliary Forces, during the 1914-18, 1939-45 Wars, or the Korean or Malayan campaigns. Membership of the forces of any Commonwealth country and of certain allied nations. The dependants of members who thus qualify are also eligible for assistance.

REDUCTION IN WIRELESS LICENCE FEES.

6. War Pensions Entitlement & Assessment Appeal Tribunals: Mary Street, Brisbane. FB 0331.

The Repatriation Commission is a body corporate under the Repatriation Act, 1920/56, and administers benefits for ex-service personnel of the Navy, the Army and the Air Force (and their nursing services and women's auxiliaries) where they were enlisted or called up for full-time duty at home or abroad.

These benefits include:

1. WAR PENSIONS.

1. The granting of a pension is contingent upon a claim being lodged and whether the incapacity from which a member is suffering or from which he died can, in fact, be related to his war service. The Act provides two main grounds of eligibility:

(i) where a member served overseas, for incapacity or death from any occurrence happening during the period he was a member of the Forces;

(ii) in other cases where a member served only in Australia, incapacity or death must be attributable to or arise out of service.

2. There is a third ground, applicable to both overseas and home service personnel who have had at least six month's camp service. This provides that where a condition pre-existed enlistment, a pension may be payable if it is considered such condition was aggravated by service.

3. Pension is paid in accordance with the degree of a member's incapacity up to the general rate of 100%. There is provision for payment at a higher rate for those who are unable to engage in remunerative employment (see para. 6 below).

4. Reviews: Pensions for disablement, other than those for specified disabilities, are reviewed periodically, the period being fixed having regard to the evidence in each case.

5. Stabilisation of Pensions: A pension is stabilised, i.e. further reviews are dispensed with, when it can be reasonably stated that the degree of the pensioner's incapacity has reached a stage at which it may be regarded as permanent. Stabilisation is a matter for determination by a prescribed authority. A pension that has been stabilised continues at the stabilised rate indefinitely unless the pensioner himself applies for a review of the assessment.

6. Special rates: These are paid to:

(a) blinded, including those whose eyesight is so defective that they have no useful vision;

(b) totally and permanently incapacitated, i.e. those who, because of war-caused incapacity are precluded from earning other than a negligible percentage of a living wage;

(c) in cases of blindness (see (a) above) and other very severe disabilities, there may be paid an attendant's allowance in addition to pension;

Note: In the case of a member of the forces who, as a result of war service, has been blinded and also afflicted with total loss of speech or total deafness an allowance at a higher rate is granted for an attendant.

7. An attendant's allowance is not payable during any period the pensioner is in an establishment maintained at public expense.

8. Specific disabilities, such as an amputation of a limb, or total loss of vision in one eye, entitle the member to an extra allowance, (except in cases where he is in receipt of Special rate pension mentioned above), in accordance with the Fifth Schedule to the Repatriation Act.

9. Pulmonary tuberculosis: If the disease was contracted on service, and the member is incapacitated in consequence, then he is entitled to receive a war pension; the rate may be at the ordinary 100 per centum or it may be at the special rate. However, irrespective of how the disease was contracted if it is established that the member served in a theatre of war, he is similarly pensioned. (See also the reference to pulmonary tuberculosis under the heading "Service Pensions").

10. Widows: Where the death of a member has been accepted as attributable to his war service, his widow is entitled to receive a pension, the rate varying according to the rank of the member. In addition, she may receive an allowance known as a domestic allowance, if she:

(a) has dependent children (under 16 years of age);

(b) is 50 years of age or over;

(c) is permanently unemployable;

(d) has children over the age of 16 undergoing approved training.

11. Domestic allowance is not payable to any childless widow who is an inmate of a mental hospital.

12. The pension of a widow ceases to be payable in the event of re-marriage. A re-marriage gratuity equivalent to a year's pension is payable.

13. Children: The children (under the age of 16 years) of a member whose death has been accepted as attributable to his war service are pensionable. Pension is paid without regard to child endowment.

14. An additional rate of pension may be granted to the child of a deceased member:

(a) who has been deserted by his mother;

(b) who is neglected by his mother so as to necessitate his removal from her care;

or

(c) whose mother is an inmate of a mental hospital—if the child is in necessitous circumstances and is placed with a guardian.

15. Widowed mothers of deceased unmarried sons. A pension varying according to the rank of the member, may be granted to the widowed mother of a deceased unmarried son, provided that widowhood occurred either prior to or within three years after the death of the member.

16. Provision also exists for payment to parents and other dependants in certain circumstances. A means test is usually applied.

17. Method of paying pensions: Ordinarily, pensions are paid fortnightly in advance, and they may be collected at any post office nominated by the pensioner. Alternatively, the pensioner may arrange with the Department to have his pension paid into a bank account, but in that event payment will only be made every twelve weeks in arrears. Payment may be made fortnightly by cheque to:

(a) marriageable females who by reason of family responsibilities, age or illness find it difficult to collect at a post office;

(b) members who are either totally or permanently incapacitated or who have lost two limbs.

18. War Pension Appeal System: Should the claim of a member, or a dependant who claims a pension in respect of death, be rejected on the ground that the disability is not attributable to war service, an appeal lies to the Repatriation Commission. Should the Commission's decision be unfavourable, there is a right of appeal to a War Pensions' Entitlement Appeal Tribunal. The decision of this body is final, unless fresh evidence material to and having substantial bearing on the appeal, is produced.

19. If a member is dissatisfied with the rate of pension granted to him he may, within a period of three months of notification of the assessment, lodge an appeal with an Assessment Appeal Tribunal.

2. SERVICE PENSIONS.

1. This type of pension is not paid in respect of incapacity due to war service. It is more in the nature of a social benefit paid to those who, because of age or permanent unemployability, which need not be attributable in any way to war service, are incapable of earning an adequate livelihood.

2. It may also be paid to members who are suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis which is not related to war service. The service pension then is analogous to the aged or invalid pension paid under the Social Services Act.

3. Eligibility.

a. Service pension in respect of age: The applicant must have served in a theatre of war, if a man, and have attained the age of 60 years. If the applicant is a woman, she must have at least embarked for service abroad and have attained the age of 55 years.

b. Service pension in respect of permanent unemployability. The applicant must have served in a theatre of war, but age is not a factor. Eligibility is determined on the limitation of a claimant's earning capacity.

c. Service pension in respect of pulmonary tuberculosis: The qualifications relating to service in a theatre of war are not applicable.

4. Dependants: Benefits to classes (3) (b) and (c) include pensions to the wife and children, up to four in number.

5. A means test operates for the granting of a service pension.

6. No person can receive a service pension who is also receiving an invalid or age pension, except in the case of a person suffering from tuberculosis.

3. MEDICAL TREATMENT.

1. (a) Free medical treatment is made available under the Repatriation Regulations for members of the Forces in respect of disabilities which have been accepted as due to war service.

(b) In addition and under certain conditions, a member of the Forces may be given free medical treatment whether or not the condition is due to war service.

i. Pulmonary Tuberculosis: Irrespective of how the disease was contracted a member of the Forces who suffers from pulmonary tuberculosis may be entitled to receive free medical treatment for the disease.

ii. Any member who is in receipt either of a full rate war pension or a special rate war pension is entitled to receive remedial treatment for any disease or disabling condition he may contract other than—

a. infectious or contagious diseases, alcoholism, drug addiction.

b. chronic or incurable diseases, requiring in-patient treatment for longer than three months.

c. certain other conditions and accidents or diseases covered by workmen's compensation, insurance policy or friendly society benefits.

Note as regards (b) out-patient treatment is available.

2. Repatriation treatment centres are listed at the beginning of this entry. Where suitable local facilities exist, these are used for country residents.

Surgical aids are supplied. Medicines prescribed on Repatriation prescription forms are supplied free.

4. SUSTENANCE ALLOWANCE.

1. Provision exists for the payment of sustenance allowance where a member is prevented from engaging in his usual occupation through the necessities of treatment

for a disability which has been determined as due to his war service. The amount payable is such as will, together with any war pension, make the total payment the equivalent of the full general rate of war pension, i.e. 100% incapacity.

2. Provision is also made for payment of an additional allowance where a member is receiving in-patient treatment at a hospital for an incapacity due to war service which will, together with any war pension and sustenance paid, equal the special rate of pension paid under the Repatriation Act. Payment of this additional amount is subject to certain limitations of income except that sick pay is not taken into consideration when assessing "income".

5. PAYMENT OF FARES AND TRAVELLING EXPENSES.

Where it is necessary for a member to travel for the purpose of obtaining medical treatment and undergoing medical examination, fares and reasonable subsistence expenses are allowed. Subject to certain conditions a member may also be paid sustenance allowance or an allowance for loss of salary or wages.

6. MEDICAL BENEFITS TO WIDOWS AND CHILDREN OR TO WIDOWED MOTHERS.

1. Arrangements are made for the provision of medical benefits for widows and children (under 16 years of age) of deceased members, and for widowed mothers and widowed step-mothers of deceased unmarried members of the 1914 and 1939 Wars and the Korea-Malayan operations, (provided widowhood occurred either prior to or within three years of her son's death and provided the son's death was attributable to his war service).

2. These benefits are made available through doctors who have agreed to treat such dependants of deceased members. The medical practitioners prescribe on the same Repatriation prescription form as is applicable in the case of incapacitated members.

3. There are certain limitations governing the medical benefits available to these dependants. The scheme is not a full scale one in that it does not fully cover specialist, X-ray or other special services. Beneficiaries may only be admitted to a Repatriation General Hospital for treatment of an acute or sub-acute condition, provided that a bed in a suitable ward is available.

7. RECREATION TRANSPORT ALLOWANCE.

Monthly allowances not exceeding £10 are payable to certain severely handicapped members.

8. GIFT MOTOR CARS.

Subject to certain conditions the Commission is empowered to grant a motor car to a member who, as a result of war service, has had both legs amputated above the knee, or who suffers from complete paraplegia resulting in total loss of use of both legs. In addition £120 per year is paid for upkeep.

9. DRIVING CONTROLS AND DEVICES.

Under certain circumstances members are assisted with the cost of these devices.

10. SOLDIERS' CHILDREN EDUCATION SCHEME.

The children of deceased, of blinded or totally and permanently incapacitated members of the Forces, and of those members who have been granted a pension at

the maximum special rate for pulmonary tuberculosis and are likely to remain in receipt of a pension at that rate for a period of not less than three years from the date on which the child commences primary education, benefit under this scheme.

The Education Board governing the scheme is comprised of a panel of leading educationalists, and beneficiaries are given expert guidance on primary, secondary and tertiary education.

Benefits available are the supply of essential school requisites, until the child attains the age of 12 years. On attaining that age, an education allowance is made available and under special circumstances higher rates are payable if a child is living away from home. With the termination of war pension at sixteen years the allowance is again increased, and if the child's selected vocation is a trade, wages are supplemented during the years of apprenticeship.

Children selected for professional training are given liberal assistance during their course and in addition to the Education allowance, university fees are paid, together with the cost of books, instruments and travelling expenses.

11. RE-ESTABLISHMENT AND REPATRIATION BENEFITS.

Certain benefits were made available for the re-establishment of men and women in civilian life after their discharge from the Forces, but time limits on applications were imposed.

The list of benefits which are available is as under:

- Removal expenses and fares to employment and occupation.
- Vocational, professional and rural training.
- Removal expenses for widows.
- Tools of trade (gift or loan).
- Immediate assistance.
- Re-employment allowance.
- Business re-establishment allowances.
- Business re-establishment loans.

12. FURNITURE GRANT.

To assist in establishment of a home, a grant may be made to:

- a. totally and permanently incapacitated member, who becomes so disabled not later than five years after discharge.
- b. a blinded soldier, who becomes so disabled not later than five years after discharge.
- c. a widow with dependent children under the age of 16 years of a member who died while on service or within five years of discharge, subject to specified time limits on applications.

Furniture may be selected from any firm.

13. FUNERAL BENEFITS.

A grant may be made towards the cost of the funeral of a member of the Forces who dies:

- a. as a result of war service.
- b. in indigent circumstances.

c. in an institution or while proceeding to or from an institution to which he has been admitted or authorised to proceed on the authority of the Commission.

A grant may be made towards the funeral expenses of a widow or of a child under the age of 16 years, of a member who died as the result of war service, to the widowed mother or the widowed step-mother of such an unmarried member, if they were in indigent circumstances at time of death.

14. FEMALE MEMBERS OF THE FORCES.

1. Female members have the same pension rights and are eligible for the same general benefits as male members, but the position differs in regard to dependants. It must be proved that the claimant is, or was, necessarily dependent upon the woman member, and, in incapacity cases, the member must be in receipt of a war pension at a rate not less than fifty per centum of the rate for total incapacity.

2. In order to qualify as a dependant, a husband must have been married to the member before or during her war service, and a child must be under 16 years of age and be born of a marriage which took place before or during the member's war service.

15. MEMBERS OF THE FORCES OF THE KOREAN AND MALAYAN OPERATIONS.

A training scheme has been approved for members of the Forces who served in Korea or Malaya. The preceding references to pensions and other benefits are in a like manner applicable to these Forces, but compared with those of the 1914 and 1939 wars, there are differences as regards conditions of service.

WAR SERVICE HOMES DIVISION.

Department of National Development,
Coronation House, 109-117 Edward Street, Brisbane. FA 0251.
Director: S. Lucas, Canberra.
Queensland Branch: Deputy Director: A. C. Sayer.

Purpose: In accordance with the War Service Homes Act to provide homes for Australian ex-servicemen and their dependants.

Assistance: Is available for the following purposes:

1. To build a home.
2. To purchase an already erected home.
3. To complete a partially built home.
4. To enlarge a home.
5. Under special conditions to discharge a mortgage on a home already owned.

Maximum Loan: £2,750.

Deposit: Contract of Sale—5% on first £2,000 or part thereof and 10% on the balance in excess of £2,000. Mortgage: 10%.

Interest Rate: $3\frac{1}{4}$ % per annum calculated on a monthly reducing basis.

Repayment Terms: Loans are repayable over periods up to 45 years (50 years for widows/widowed mothers) by a monthly instalment due on the first day of each month and covering both interest charge and repayment of principal.

Eligibility: The War Service Homes Act defines the various classes of eligible persons and should anyone have doubt as to his/her eligibility, he/she could consult the Division.

Broadly speaking and subject to some restrictions as to conditions of enlistment, eligibility devolves from service in the first and second world wars from service in the Merchant Navy during those wars and from allotment for duty in Korea and Malaya during certain periods. Widows and in some circumstances widowed mothers of eligible persons, may also be assisted.

Application: Any intending applicant should consult War Service Homes Division before entering into a commitment in respect of a home, as various conditions must be satisfied before any loan is approved.

Applications must be lodged on a special form obtainable from the following offices: The Division, Regional Registrars of Social Service (see Commonwealth Department of Social Services).

Country offices of the Department of Labour and National Service.

Decisions regarding applications cannot be made until the proposal is fully investigated.

Applicants should ensure that any contract into which they enter is made subject to the condition that any deposit will be refunded without deductions should the Division decline to finance the proposal.

2. STATE

APPRENTICESHIP OFFICE.

Cnr. Edward and Margaret Streets, Brisbane. B 1934.

Purpose: To administer the "Apprentices and Minors Act 1929-54". Apprenticeship is controlled by an Executive consisting of equal numbers of employers' and employees' representatives with a permanent chairman.

Activities: To arrange practical and technical college training for all apprentices. Welfare Officers safeguard the interests of both apprentices and employers and are readily available to discuss any problems, industrial, educational or social which may arise.

Booklets relating to trades are published by this office. See in particular the career booklet—Apprenticeship, which gives information regarding the contracting of apprenticeship, educational entrance qualifications, etc.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HOME AFFAIRS.

William Street, Brisbane. FB 0381.

Director General: Dr. A. Fryberg.

This Department administers the following health and welfare services:

1. PUBLIC HOSPITALS.
2. CARE OF THE AGED.

See Eventide Homes at Charters Towers, Rockhampton and Sandgate. Jubilee Hospital for Aged Ladies, Dalby.

The policy of the government is that aged people should be provided with suitable care and accommodation close to the district in which they have always resided. Accordingly the following provisions are planned:

Homes at Charleville, Mareeba, Maryborough, Toowoomba and Wynnum.

The first section of the Maryborough Home, providing for 100 is nearing completion. On completion this home will accommodate 250.

A home for senile men similar to the Jubilee Home is being established at Toowoomba.

Senile annexes at Oakey, Roma and Wondai Hospitals are also planned.

The government pays a £ for £ subsidy to charitable and religious bodies towards the capital cost of aged persons' accommodation. This is in addition to the £ for £ Commonwealth subsidy paid on moneys raised.

To assist old people who are capable of independent living, the government also pays a £ for £ subsidy to local authorities for the construction of cottages.

3. CHEST CLINIC.

See separate entry—Tuberculosis Division.

4. DENTAL SERVICES.

(A) A dental service is provided for people in lower income groups who cannot afford private dental charges and for persons resident in areas where no dental service is available.

There are 32 country dental clinics and 43 part time branches. In areas where dentists have private practices, a means test is imposed upon those attending the clinics to ensure that the needy receive treatment.

(B) School Dental Service.

Sub-branch of School Health Service. All state primary schools beyond a 15 mile radius from dental clinics are visited. There are 4 rail clinics.

Cost: Area with no clinic but private dentist, school dentist examines all children and treats those who come within the means test. Areas where no other dental services exist, all children are treated free.

5. FREE RAIL TRAVEL.

Where specialist treatment is not available at a local public hospital, free rail travel will be provided for people unable to afford fares.

Application: Officer in Charge of local police or the Department.

6. FREE SURGICAL APPLIANCES.

These are supplied to people who are unable to meet the cost.

7. GOVERNMENT MEDICAL OFFICER.

See separate entry.

8. MARBURG INSTITUTION FOR INEBRIATES.

See Institution for Inebriates.

9. MATERNAL AND CHILD WELFARE SERVICES.

10. MENTAL HYGIENE.

**DEPARTMENT OF LABOUR AND INDUSTRY—RELIEF ASSISTANCE
BRANCH.**

Corner Edward and Margaret Streets, Brisbane. B 5494.

Officer-in-Charge: J. McCarthy.

Purpose: Assistance to indigent persons and pensioners.

Services: 1. Financial assistance to persons and their dependants in necessitous circumstances who are not eligible for Commonwealth benefits or who are awaiting the determination of their claims.

2. School requisites to primary school children where relief is being paid on their account.

3. Grants and subsidies to the Queensland Social Service League and the C.O.S. Welfare Services who assist people in areas not covered by the activities of this Department.

4. Funeral assistance—maximum amount paid is £10.

5. Medical and surgical appliances are provided on an easy repayment system.

6. Rail fares to persons who are proceeding to employment.

7. Rail passes for pensioners, aged, invalid and service, once every 12 months.

8. Special rail passes for visits to general and dental hospitals or in times of emergency, e.g. serious illness or death of a relative.

DEPARTMENT OF NATIVE AFFAIRS.

Sub-Department of Health and Home Affairs,

William Street, Brisbane. B 3475.

Director: C. O'Leary.

This is a sub-department of the Department of Health and Home Affairs and under the Aboriginals Preservation and Protection Act and the Torres Strait Islanders Act, 1939, is responsible for the administration of Native Affairs.

ABORIGINAL SETTLEMENTS.

Palm Island (Townsville).

Bamaga (Cape York Peninsula).

In addition there are 15 villages in the Torres Strait Islands.

Protectors control the employment of aboriginals and implement health measures. Primary education, manual and rural training is provided. Promising students are encouraged to proceed to church schools for secondary education. Social and welfare associations operate in the interests of the coloured people and are largely controlled by the aboriginals themselves.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

Special educational facilities are listed as under:

RESEARCH AND GUIDANCE BRANCH,

Block A, Technical College Buildings, George Street, Brisbane. B 4325, B 6849.

Principal: W. Wood.

Purpose: To provide educational and vocational guidance and other psychological services; to conduct research into education; to provide speech correction services in state schools; to administer the Commonwealth Scholarship Scheme in Queensland.

Services: 1. Guidance officers spend one day a week or fortnight in the largest metropolitan primary and all metropolitan state secondary schools in order to provide educational and vocational guidance. A number of provincial intermediate and high schools are visited for one week each year.

2. Educational and vocational guidance is available by appointment at the Branch.
3. Vocational selection is carried out for certain employers.
4. Clinical guidance services are provided by appointment.
5. Speech correction is carried out in the larger primary schools.
6. Advice on educational matters is available to newcomers.
7. Pupils are selected for admission to opportunity and other special schools.
8. Guidance is provided for Commonwealth scholars.

Eligibility: In general, the services listed above are available to persons under the age of twenty-one years. These restrictions do not apply however, to Commonwealth scholars, to those seeking advice on tertiary education, and to people who have attended before attaining the age of 21.

SPECIAL SCHOOLS.

1. CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOLS.

A. PRIMARY: College Road, Brisbane, B.19. B 6974.

Eligibility: City children 6 years and over must have a medical certificate indicating they are home bound.

Country children 5-10 years must live over 2 miles from a school.

Country children over 10 years must live over 3 miles from a school.

B. SECONDARY: 85 Brookes Street, Fortitude Valley, N.1.

Eligibility: Inability to attend a secondary school.

2. CRIPPLED. See Montrose Home and Queensland Spastic League.

3. DEAF AND BLIND.

A. SCHOOL FOR DEAF AND BLIND: Cornwall Street, Dutton Park. XA 1525.

Principal: A. J. Lobb.

This is a day and boarding school for boys and girls from 4 years of age onwards. Leaving age is 16 years.

Eligibility: Deaf and blind children whose hearing and sight loss is sufficiently severe to prevent satisfactory educational progress being made in a normal school class. Only children of sufficient intelligence to derive educational benefit will be enrolled.

Programme: Where suitable an oral method of instruction is used, otherwise this is supplemented by manual methods. With necessary modifications the curriculum follows that of the normal state schools.

A varied extra curricula programme is carried out, including sports, Scouting and Guiding.

Fees: The school both day and boarding is free. Tram and train passes are issued free to all children and escorts.

Admission: Application is made to the Principal. All children have to attend for a personal interview and an auditory examination. To enable the suitability of country children to be determined free travel to Brisbane is provided.

B. GLADSTONE ROAD SCHOOL FOR DEAF CHILDREN.

242 Gladstone Road, Dutton Park.

This is a day school only and is a department of the above school. Oral methods of instruction are used exclusively.

Eligibility: Hearing impairment sufficiently severe to prevent satisfactory educational progress being maintained in a normal school class.

Fees: None. Free travel.

Enrolment: Contact Secretary, Oral School Ascertainment Committee, Research and Guidance Branch, Block A, Technical College Buildings, George Street, Brisbane. Each child is then examined psychologically and medically and interviewed by the school principal. Children are admitted from 4 years. Leaving age is 16.

4. EPILEPTIC. See Willowburn Home.

5. EVENING TUTORIAL CLASSES.

Trocadero Building, Melbourne Street, South Brisbane.

Classes are provided for those wanting to proceed to Junior, Senior or Diploma Entrance Examinations.

6. HOSPITAL.

Children's Hospital: Herston Road, Brisbane.

7. SLOW LEARNING CHILD.

The following opportunity schools cater for those children who are educable but unable to make progress in normal schools.

Country: Bundaberg, Cairns, Ipswich and Rockhampton.

Metropolitan: Dutton Park, Fortitude Valley, Petrie Terrace Infants' and Sandgate.

Admission: Psychological examination and authorization by Principal Research and Guidance Officer.

8. SPASTIC. See Queensland Spastic Children's League and Queensland Society for Crippled Children.

DIVISION OF MENTAL HYGIENE.

274 George Street, Brisbane. B 0292.

Director: Doctor B. F. R. Stafford.

The Division provides care and treatment for people suffering from mental and nervous disorders as well as mental deficiency.

Patients may be admitted to hospitals either as voluntary or certified patients. In the case of the latter, two independent medical certificates and a request form signed by a relative or other responsible person must be furnished. For emergency admissions one medical certificate and a magistrate's order are sufficient.

Services: The following services are available for psychiatric patients:

Brisbane General Hospital, L 0111. Serves as a reception and acute treatment centre.

Brisbane Mental Hospital, Goodna, UY 4141.

Charters Towers Mental Hospital. At present male patients only. Expansion will later enable admission of females.

Ipswich Mental Hospital (Sandy Gallop). Includes children's wards and a criminally insane section.

Psychiatric Clinic, George Street, Brisbane. B 0292. See separate entry in Section—Care of the Handicapped.

Toowoomba General Hospital. Out-patients Clinic.

Toowoomba Mental Hospital.

Townsville General Hospital. Out-patients Clinic and some beds for treatment.

Wacol Pavilion. UY 4144. A section of the Brisbane Mental Hospital admitting ex-servicemen and male dependants with preference given to Repatriation cases.

Willowburn Epileptic Home, Toowoomba. Admits children and adults. A school is run in conjunction with the Toowoomba Mental Hospital.

MATERNAL AND CHILD WELFARE SERVICE.

184 St. Pauls Terrace. L 1081.

Director: Dr. H. C. Murphy.

Purpose: 1. The education of expectant mothers to prepare them for maternity.

2. The acquisition and dissemination of knowledge on all matters affecting the health of women and children.

3. The training of nurses and aides in the principles and practice of maternal and child welfare.

Services: 1. Ante Natal Clinics and Correspondence Service. Clinics are held at Brisbane and Caboolture and the correspondence service is available to any expectant mother who does not have access to adequate medical advice.

2. Children's Home. Flinders Parade, Sandgate. 273. Approximately 45 pre-school children are accommodated during the illness of their mothers.

3. Maternal and Child Welfare Centres. 227 Centres offering advice on general health and feeding of infants exist throughout Queensland. Metropolitan Centres are as follows:

Activities: These homes admit babies with feeding problems and their mothers who are trained in correct feeding methods. Child Welfare assistants are trained at all these homes.

In addition to these activities many pre-school children attending creches and kindergartens are examined twice yearly.

Mothercraft lectures and demonstrations are given to schoolgirls in several high schools. Children admitted to the Red Cross Children's Home are examined.

Mothers who are unable to visit centres are called upon at home by sisters. Correspondence courses in antenatal care and child welfare are available.

PREMIER AND CHIEF SECRETARY'S DEPARTMENT.

- Services: 1. Interstate rail passes for indigent persons in emergency circumstances.
2. Rail concessions for incapacitated and limbless soldiers.

PRISONS DEPARTMENT.

There are seven institutions throughout Queensland.

Gaols: Brisbane—Annerley Road, South Brisbane. Males J 6150; Females J 3536.
Townsville—(Males Only).

Rockhampton and Thursday Island (used for short detentions only).

State Farms: Palen Creek, Numinhah and Stone River via Ingham. These are open establishments.

Parole Board: Established under the Prisoners' Parole Acts 1937-42. Recommends the release of prisoners on parole.

Children: Under the age of 17 are dealt with in the Children's courts.

PUBLIC CURATOR OF QUEENSLAND.

267 Edward Street, Brisbane. FA 0131.

Public Curator: A. Ford.

Purpose: This office was established by the State Government in 1916 as a Public Trust Office.

Services: To administer the estates of deceased persons and those dying intestate.

To safeguard the interests and estates of mental hospital patients and other inmates of government controlled benevolent institutions. The administration of estates of prisoners who are serving sentences of three years and upwards.

The curator acts under protection orders issued by courts in the interests of people who by virtue of age, illness, physical and mental incapacity may be subject to undue influence.

Moneys belonging to minors may be held in trust. Wills, appointing the Public Curator executor and trustee are prepared and held free of charge. A conveyancing service is available for a small fee.

Free legal advice is offered but court action is not undertaken. The Public Defender is attached to this office. He undertakes, without cost, the defence of accused persons of insufficient means in the criminal jurisdiction of the Supreme Court.

An accountancy and financial service is available. This includes advice and action in matters relating to accounting, auditing and taxation. The curator will act as attorney, agent, valuator and auctioneer.

Loans are made on improved freehold properties to assist buyers to acquire homes. Assistance is given to people participating in land ballots.

Fees: These are moderate and except in the case of rent collection the highest rate of commission charged is 3½%. Legal advice and the service of the Public Defender are free.

QUEENSLAND HOUSING COMMISSION.

State Government Insurance Buildings, Anzac Square. FA 0161.

Commissioner: H. Galvin.

The Commission undertakes the following activities in Brisbane and country areas.

1. To assist by means of loans the erection of houses on privately owned land.
2. To build houses and make these available for purchase at low deposit and repayment rates.
3. To build houses for rental.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES.

Department of Health and Home Affairs, William Street, Brisbane. B 8747.

Chief Medical Officer: Dr. P. R. Patrick. B 8319.

Purpose: Promotion of health in the school child. Supervision of the school environment. The detection and correction of dental and medical defects.

Activities: Every child has a medical inspection four times during his school life. No medical treatment is given but children are referred to appropriate practitioners.

Eligibility: The service is available to any child attending school.

STATE CHILDREN DEPARTMENT.

William Street, Brisbane. B 1462.

Director: H. Harris.

Purpose: This department administers the State Children Act 1911-1955, the Infant Life Protection Acts 1905-1935, the Adoption of Children Acts 1935-1952 and it is closely associated with the administration of Children's Court Acts 1907-1930.

Services: Functions of this department, broadly speaking come under seven headings:

1. To assist the widow, wife of an invalid pensioner or relative, with finance to rear her young family.
2. To care for under-privileged children who, for various reasons, become the responsibility of the State as its wards. To rear, educate, and to place them in employment.
3. To protect young life as required by the Infant Life Protection Acts and particularly to see that children of tender years are not permitted to be placed in undesirable and unsavoury surroundings.
4. To watch carefully the interests of infants placed for adoption and of prospective adoptive parents.
5. To assist with advice and practical help, child delinquents and their parents, and to undertake the responsibility of caring for those delinquents who are committed by the courts.
6. To control street trading (newspaper-selling, etc.) in which juveniles take part and to protect children from being exploited when taking part in public performances.
7. To act as delegate for the Commonwealth Immigration Minister in caring for young migrants who come to Queensland apart from their parents.
8. The Department has three receiving depots offering shelter to dependent and neglected children and a few children in the lower age group committed by children's courts.

 - c. Townsville Receiving Depot.
9. Farm Home for Delinquent Boys, see Westbrook.

Purpose: To promote British migration to Queensland; to receive and lodge personal and group nominations; to arrange migrant reception and settlement procedures.
