#### **NEW MEXICO SUMMARY**

- New Mexico has an economically small and relatively poor regional economy.
- The federal government is the leading economic sector. New Mexico also has a diversified mining industry (oil, natural gas, coal, copper, potash, molybdenum, and uranium), significant tourism (recreation, arts and crafts, Native American and Hispanic cultures), and a small manufacturing base (only 7 percent of total employment).
- New Mexico's economy performed poorly in the 1980s because of the collapse of its mining industries. Current economic growth, however, has climbed back to the national average, led by strong expansion in manufacturing and tourism.
- The Albuquerque MSA accounts for 43.5 percent of total state employment and, until recently, the city's economy has outperformed the state. The current slowdown in Albuquerque's growth can be traced to an on-going correction in the construction sector, weak manufacturing and a slowdown in federal defense spending within the city.
- In the short run New Mexico's economy is expected to grow at the national average. In 1990 nonagricultural employment growth is projected at 2.2 percent, while state personal income will increase 6.8 percent.
- In the long run New Mexico's future is clouded by an overreliance on defense spending and mineral extraction as well as a small manufacturing sector.






