



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
UNITED STATES REAL GDP GROWTH 1993 - 1999




CONSUMER INFLATION 1993 - 1999




UNITED STATES UNEMPLOYMENT RATE 1993 - 1999




INTEREST RATES 1995 - 1999






NEW MEXICO EMPLOYMENT GROWTH 1991:1 - 1997:3




NEW MEXICO PERSONAL INCOME GROWTH 1991:1 - 1997:2




NEW MEXICO'S MANUFACTURING SECTOR

- Growth In NM Manufacturing Output Has Been The Highest In The Nation Since 1987.
- NM Manufacturing Employment Has Increased 41.1% Since 1980 During A Period When U.S. Manufacturing Employment Has Fallen 8.4%.
- Growth in NM Manufacturing Sector Sustained The State's Economy During The Energy/Mining Sector Bust Of The 1980s AND Has Fueled The State's Economic Boom In The 1993-1995 Time Period.
- Average Earnings in NM Manufacturing (\$31,182 in 1994) Are Above The Statewide Average (\$22,849); However, They Are Still 22% Below U.S. Average Earnings in Manufacturing (\$39,971).
- Concentration in High Tech, Electronic Equipment Manufacturing in NM--High Average Earnings (\$43,783 per job), High Value Added (\$343,472 per job), and Export-Oriented (\$681.8 Million In 1996).
- Most Growth in NM Manufacturing Is Centered In Metro Counties (Bernalillo and Sandoval); Manufacturing In Rural NM In Decline.


NEW MEXICO EXPORTS, 1988 - 1996

New Mexico and Albuquerque Economy

- The New Mexico economy boomed in the 1993-1995 time period. But the economic expansion has slowed markedly. Job growth had been 5.0% for New Mexico--6.0 to 7.0% for Albuquerque--but it is now only 1.5-2.0%. Personal income growth had been 7.9% in 1995; now is only 4.7%.
- Why did the state's economic expansion falter? end of the Intel expansion....end of the housing boom....cuts in federal spending....layoffs at manufacturers....weak tourism sector.....squeeze on ranchers' profits.... continued problems in coal and potash mining.
- Bright spots in the state economy--Albuquerque continues to attract new businesses; the dairy and food processing industry in southeast New Mexico; the border region in Dona Ana county; copper in southwest New Mexico; oil and natural gas production.
- The Albuquerque economy will improve in 1998 and 1999, led by new jobs at Sun Healthcare, America Online, Citicorp, Western Wireless, Cavco, Karsten, Sumitomo, Gateway 2000, Fulcrum Direct, and Philips Semiconductor. Job growth should approach 2.5%. Construction will be flat; government will grow slowly; manufacturing will be restrained by Levi Strauss plant closing (521 jobs) and Intel retrenchment.
- Roswell will suffer with Levi Strauss plant closing (550 jobs). Another potash mine closed in Carlsbad. Dona Ana County/Las Cruces will benefit from border developments. The rest of the state will experience sluggish growth--2.0% job growth at best. Santa Fe's economy will be held back by downsizing of the state government and LANL.






NEW MEXICO EMPLOYMENT BY SECTOR 1997




UNITED STATES EMPLOYMENT BY SECTOR 1997




NEW MEXICO EMPLOYMENT BY SECTOR 1997
