NO SMOKING EDICT OF U. S. G. PREXY AIMED AT WOMEN
 Los Angeles, Cal.—By D. U. Collegiate Press.—"Thou shalt not smoke" is the eleventh commandment recently put into effect at the University of Southern California by an edict of Rufus von Kleinfeld, president, who has decreed that there shall be no smoking either in the halls or society houses, or in any other place approved as a student residence for women by the committee on student welfare or at any student function under the auspices of the university.

Furthermore, the student welfare committee has voted that it will cooperate with the president, although the new regulation is the strictest in any college in the United States, and so-party girls there are indignant.

Realizing, however, that the ruling is severe, president von Kleinfeld has announced that leading women of the University will have an opportunity to confer with members of the faculty and, if the ordinance is deemed unfair, it may be repealed. Leniency will not be granted if the law is put into effect. For the president has decreed that any woman caught smoking after the rule has been finally decided just will be immediately suspended.

NEW YORK UNIVERSITY PLANS HUGE BUILDING
 The University of New York is planning a new three and a half million dollar building for the college of education. It has recently been announced. The building will cover almost an entire block and will be between fifteen and twenty stories high. The new structure will contain a complete model high school for eight hundred students, a cafeteria, two swimming pools, and an auditorium.

STUDENT IS JAILED IN KIDNAPPING CASE
 Norman, Okla.—A student kidnaping at the University of Oklahoma last year brought Lee Thompson, former president of the student council, a jail sentence of six months and a \$500 fine.

Thompson was found guilty in County Court of violating the State anti-masking law, enacted in 1923. His attorneys gave notice of an appeal.

Joe Crowe, a student at the university last year and now a school teacher at Camargo, instituted the prosecution, alleging that a masked band of which Thompson was a member abducted him from a meeting of the Scabbard and Blade, a military society, and mistreated him after taking him into the country. The abductors wore the insignia of the D. D. M. C., a secret student organization, which disbanded after the incident. Crowe testified.

It was brought out that both Thompson and Crowe were members of the Scabbard and Blade.

Thompson did not take the witness stand, his attorneys explaining he wished to avoid revealing the names of his companions.

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS OWNS POTASH BEDS
 Valuable potash beds are known to underlie extensive areas of land belonging to the University of Texas, and measures for their commercial development will be undertaken shortly by the Board of Regents. University lands have considerable oil resources as well, but competent geologists have affirmed that the potash beds far exceed them in wealth.

DEAN CHECKS MILEAGE
