#### GRADUATE FELLOWSHIPS

The Department of Anthropology probably will have between one and four graduate fellowships open for the academic year 1936-37. Obtain blanks from the Office of the Graduate Dean, and submit the filled-in forms to Dr. D. Brand, Head of Department.

#### "HERE TO STUDY?

Students planning to do special or advanced work in other schools should consult the catalogs and other material available in Dr. Brand's office. The Committee on Graduate Instruction, of the American Council on Education, has prepared a report upon institutions offering graduate work in one or more of thirty-five fields of knowledge. The institutions were rated as highly prepared, adequately prepared, and not equipped to prepare candidates for the doctorate. This issue there will be given only the highly prepared and adequately prepared institutions in Anthropology and Geography; and the highly prepared in Sociology and Philosophy.
