Repositioning tools, applications and infrastructure to transition data into actionable knowledge for the future was a fundamental theme in the Health Sciences Library and Informatics Center's (HSLIC's) work throughout fiscal year 2014–15 (FY2015).

Education

During FY2015, HSLIC's Director of Biomedical Informatics Research, Training and Scholarship (BioMIRTS) continued to lead the development of a clinical informatics fellowship at UNM in partnership with the Department of Internal Medicine. In the fall, the fellowship received approval from the UNM Hospital's (UNMH's) Rightsizing Committee, and work soon began on assembling the accreditation application to the Accreditation Counsel for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME). The program will begin efforts to recruit fellows this fall.

In November, voters passed a general obligation bond that included funding for the final phase of the Domenici Center for Health Sciences Education. This was followed by Gov. Susana Martinez signing a capital outlay bill in June that, combined with funding from the Health Sciences Center (HSC) and severance tax bonds, will add 85,700 square feet of education space to the campus. As managers of the Center's current buildings, HSLIC staff participated in planning for classroom technology in the building and for reconfiguring of the Interprofessional Healthcare Simulation Center (IHSC) to incorporate additional simulation space.

In celebration of the School of Medicine's (SOM's) 50th anniversary during FY2015, HSLIC displayed a commemorative exhibit in the lobby of the Domenici Center, July 2014 through June 2015. In April, HSLIC also hosted a traveling exhibit from the National Library of Medicine (NLM) in the Domenici Center's auditorium titled "Native Voices: Native Peoples' Concepts of Health and Illness." This exhibit explores the connections among wellness, illness and cultural life for contemporary American Indians, Alaska Natives and Native Hawaiians. In 2006, HSLIC had hosted a planning meeting for this exhibit on behalf of NLM. HSLIC faculty will take parts of the exhibit to rural NM communities in the fall. Native Voices will be displayed in the Domenici Center through October 18, 2015.

Research

The BioMIRTS Director completed the first year as principal investigator of a three-year study in partnership with the Centura Health System in Colorado, Hennepin County Medical Center, Stanford University and the University of Minnesota. This project is funded by a \$600,000 grant from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) and focuses on determining the specific design aspects of electronic health records most associated with user stress, fatigue and frustration. In FY2015, the research team developed and tested focus-group questions targeted toward physicians who practice in the ambulatory setting.

Other HSLIC research efforts during FY2015 focused on community outreach. The BioMIRTS Special Projects Librarian received funding from NLM to leverage the resources of the NM Department of Health, Albuquerque Public Schools and the local Citizens Corp to present workshops targeted at school

libraries about the Points of Dispensing (PODS) model for providing medications, vaccines and medical supplies to community in an emergency. This project included developing lesson plans for middle and high school students using disaster-related information resources. Other funded outreach projects in FY2015 included developing online continuing medical education modules for health care providers in rural New Mexico and continuing to promote NLM and HSLIC resources to consumers, students and health professionals, especially to the Hispanic and Native populations in the state.

In September, HSLIC's Native and Distance Services Librarian, Patricia Bradley, MLS, AHIP, received the 2014 Michael E. DeBakey Library Services Outreach Award from the Friends of the NLM. The award was created to honor practicing health sciences librarians who provide outstanding services to rural or underserved communities. Ms. Bradley was selected for her significant and positive impact in supporting New Mexico's underserved populations.

Library

One of HSLIC's largest projects during FY15 was moving the library catalog from Millennium to OCLC's WorldCat. The project involved the migration of bibliographic records, holdings, patron data, circulation transactional data (such as loans, holds, fines and fees) and item statistical data (such as total checkouts, YTD checkouts and date of last use). This project also included customizing the system and validating data for accuracy. HSLIC (RAD) developed training materials and provided training sessions for HSLIC faculty/staff and HSC users of the new system.

In January 2013, HSLIC made its interlibrary loan (ILL) services free to all HSC faculty, staff and students. During the past fiscal year, library faculty and staff worked to increase awareness of this benefit. As a result, the number of filled ILL requests in FY2015 jumped 44 percent, from 1,491 to 2,149. To enhance customer service, HSLIC's Service Point also promoted its free document delivery service for items copied from the HSLIC collection. This has led to an increase in document delivery of 656 percent over the past year.

Technology

Another significant HSLIC project was transitioning the HSC to a new email and calendaring system. On October 6, 2014, the HSC began using HSCLink, using Microsoft's Exchange and Outlook. HSLIC faculty and staff from across all units participated in the rollout, communicating with departments about the change, providing user training, configuring mobile devices and providing technical support.

One of the outcomes from the email project was HSLIC's adoption of a tiered support model for technology services. This model includes three tiers of support, beginning with the Service Point (Tier 1), which addresses all incoming service requests and incidents. Service Point staff quickly assess and resolve requests and, if needed, escalate requests to the Technology Support group (Tier 2). In turn, Tier 2 provides a second layer of support services and, if needed, can escalate an incident to the Systems Group (Tier 3). This tiered model allows for a more efficient and timely resolution to requests and incidents and has significantly reduced HSLIC's average time to resolve requests and incidents.

Also, in early 2015, HSLIC's Systems Group implemented a new disk-to-disk backup system for the HSLIC data centers. This system uses two storage devices: one as the primary backup and the second as

an off-site mirror of the first. This enhanced backup service provides more protection for HSC data and aligns HSLIC with industry best practices for off-site backups.

Administration

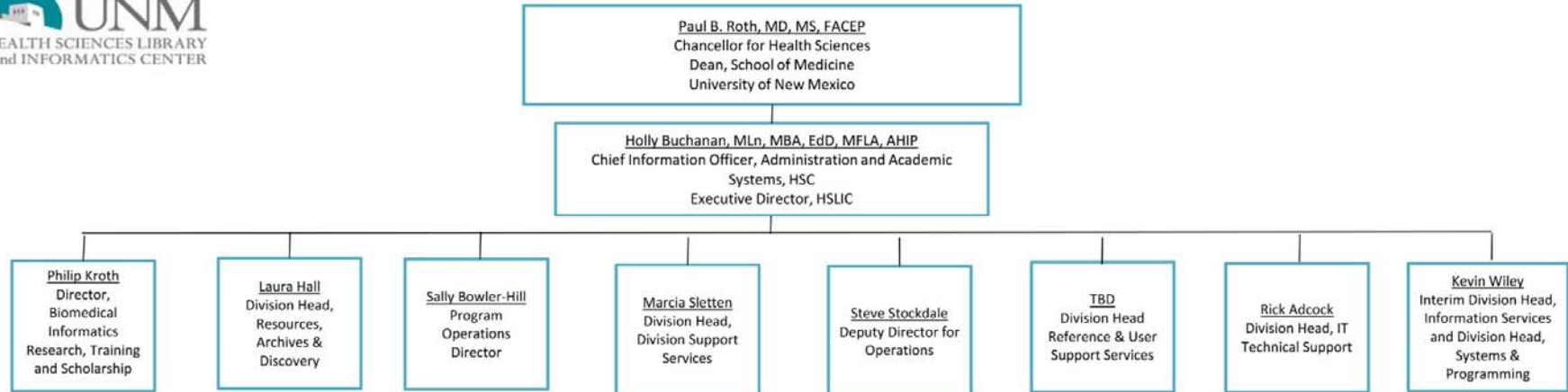
HSLIC continued to experience significant staffing changes during FY2015. Fourteen employees left HSLIC, while 11 were hired. The Division Head of RUSS retired in December after 12 years of leading HSLIC's public services faculty and single-point-of-service desk. The Chancellor's Office enlisted HSLIC's Manager of Division Support Services to provide support to the newly created HSC CIO Office on a part-time basis. As a result, some of her duties were shifted to other Business Services staff members.

HSLIC hired a new Deputy Director for Operations, who began in early 2015. This newly created faculty position's purpose is to facilitate cross-functional efficiencies within HSLIC and among other HSC organizations. A member of HSLIC's executive team, this position leads the faculty liaison (Envoy) Program and is the service owner for the data management planning service.

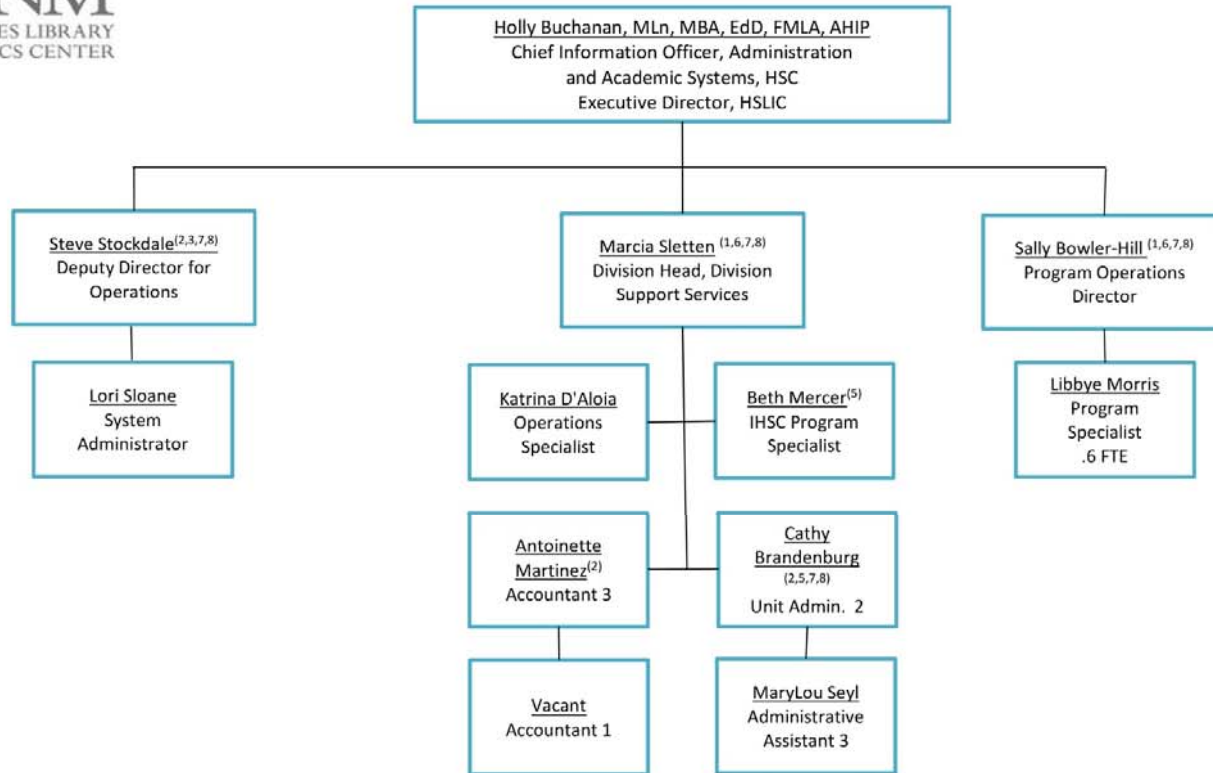

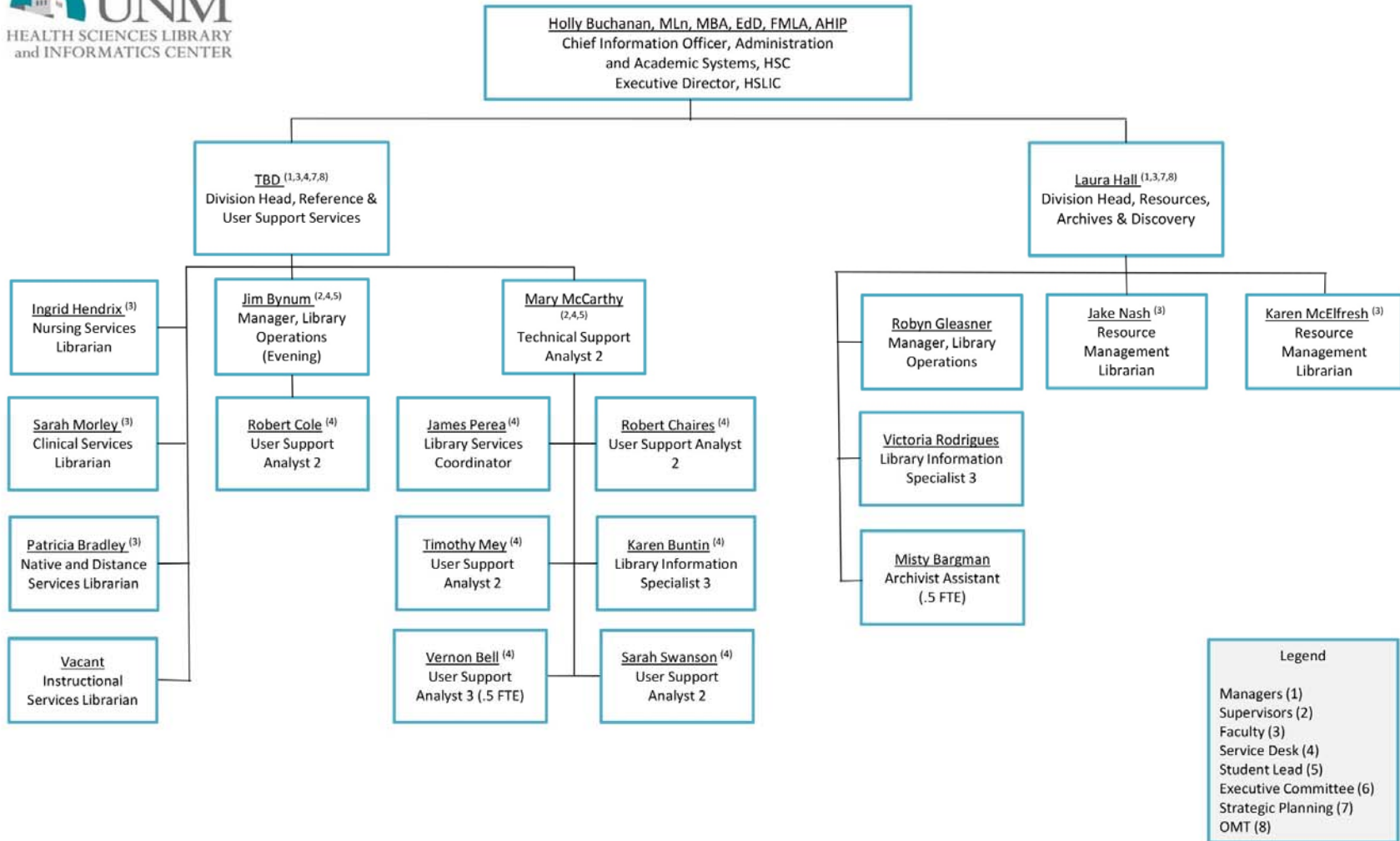
Business Services, Planning Office and Administration

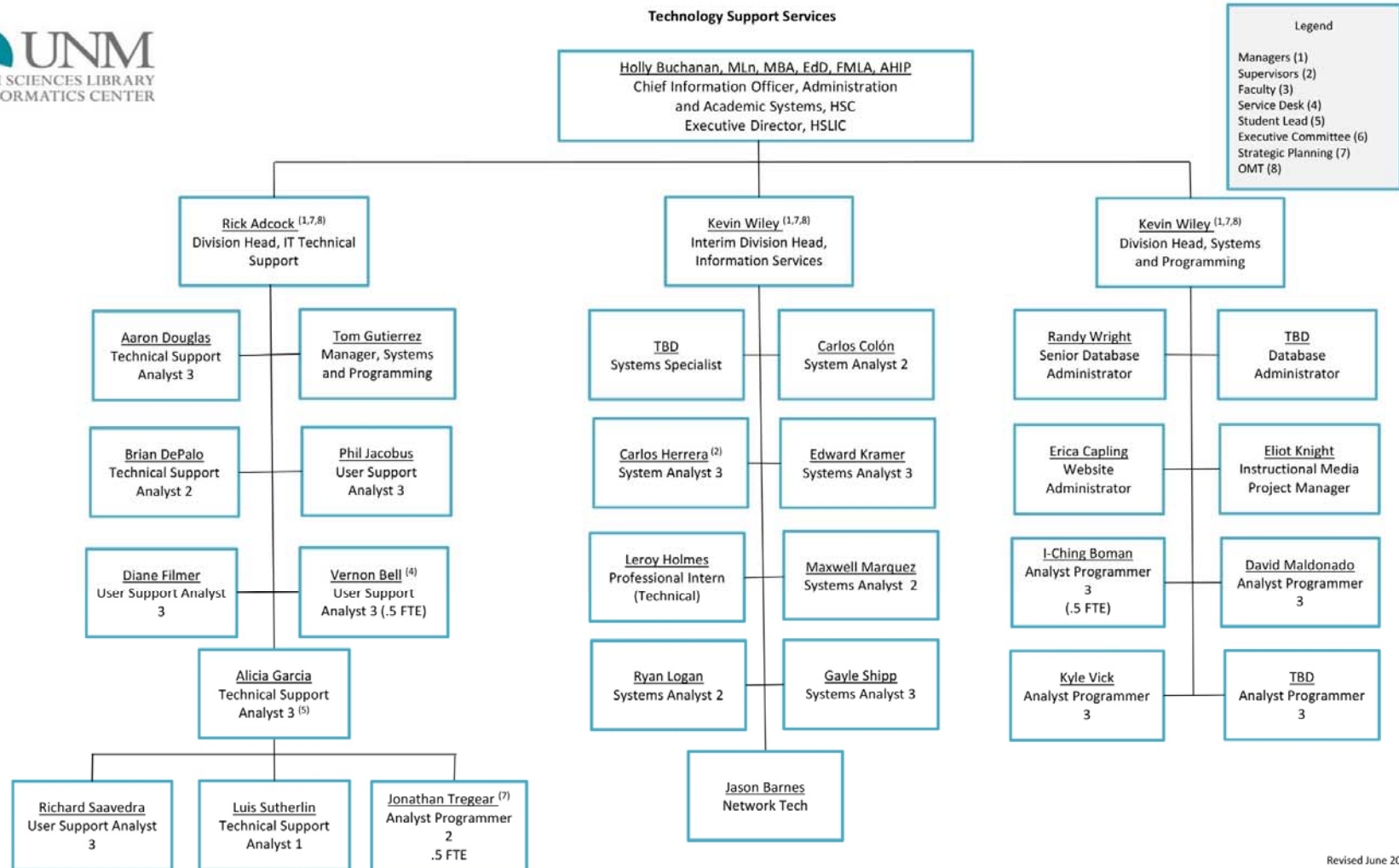

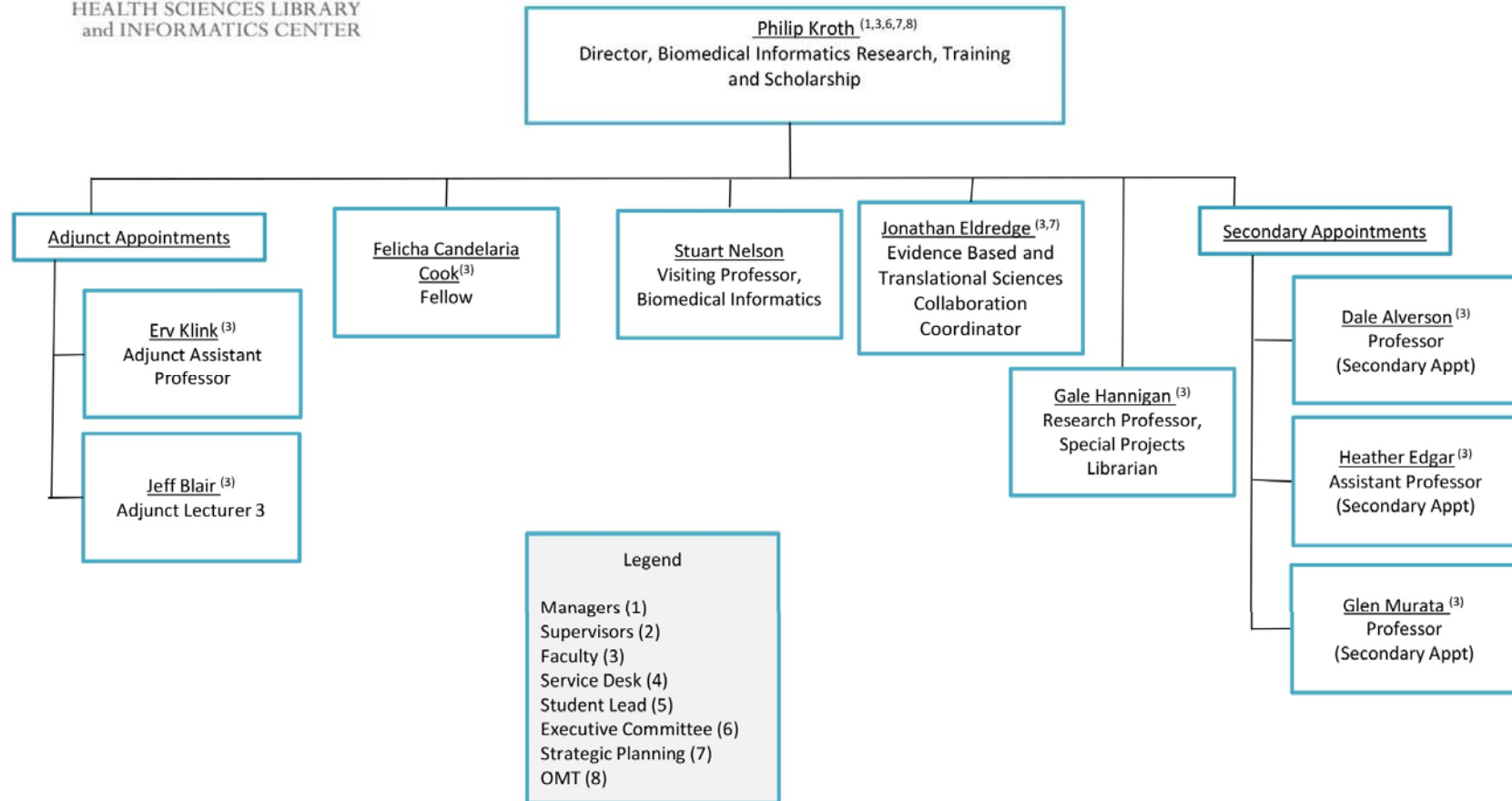

UNIT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

BUSINESS SERVICES

This year, Business Services repositioned manpower to adjust to changes and upgrade the services it provides to HSLIC. This included relocating individuals, shifting workloads and collaborating across the organization.

Accounting

Accounting reorganized tasks when the Accountant 1 officially took a new position as HSLIC's Operations Specialist. This position replaced the vacant Facility Services Manager position. The Accountant 3 chaired a committee to implement a print-management program for HSLIC. This program will replace the large copy/print devices with newer models with added functionality. This will alleviate the time the Operations Specialist spends ordering toner and keeping inventory on hand. The new devices will be installed in FY16. Also, the Accounting Data Management Plan was fully implemented this fiscal year. Accounting source documents are being scanned into PDF format and tagged with metadata to create searchable files as part of the Accounting Office procedures.

Administration

The Administrative Assistant transitioned to the newly created Biomedical Informatics office to help get it established and continues to act as archivist for the Administrative Support Alliance–HSC. The Unit Administrator took a larger role, acting as backup for the administrative office and the facilities unit. The Unit Administrator and the Program Specialist from the IHSC helped with the transition from GroupWise to Outlook by volunteering to help teach Outlook training courses to the HSC community.

This year has also seen a lot of Human Resources activity, with fourteen employees leaving HSLIC and eleven more being hired. Two HSLIC faculty members also successfully completed Promotion and Tenure.

IHSC

The IHSC Program Specialist worked with the IHSC Advisory Committee (IHSC-AC) to determine the need of and budget availability for the purchase and installation of “integrated wall-mounted diagnostic kits” that hold ophthalmoscopes/otoscopes and specula on a headboard. The purchase and installation was completed in June 2015. The Program Specialist also participated with the IHSC-AC “Software to Support the IHSC” work group, space planners and many others to continue planning for the potential IHSC remodel and building of Domenici Center for Health Sciences Education, Phase III.

Facilities

In the spring, the new Operations Specialist took on oversight for remodeling the reception area in the new Biomedical Informatics suite (216), to accommodate more employees. She was an instrumental part of putting together and guiding the mandatory annual HSLIC IT incident table-top exercise, which tested HSLIC staff on what would happen in an IT emergency.

This year, the northeast building of the Domenici Center was refurbished, and broken furniture in the west building was replaced with 40 chairs, a bench and a side table. We are currently in the process of getting 30 chairs from the third floor of the west building reupholstered because the fabric has started to wear out. This should be completed in FY16.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

This new position was staffed in January 2015 with the intent of facilitating cross-functional efficiencies within HSLIC and among other HSC organizations. During the past six months, the Deputy Director completed orientation activities, including certifications for Tactical Lean and ITIL Foundation training, while shaping the responsibilities for the position.

HSLIC Initiatives

The Deputy Director assumed responsibilities as chair of the Envoy Program. This longstanding library liaison initiative connects library faculty with HSC academic colleges and departments to provide a central point of contact for supporting the HSC academic and research missions. The committee of envoys has undertaken the task of refreshing the program to better define and communicate their services to the academic and research organizations.

services across the HSC. This group continued to incorporate ITIL best practices in its joint management of the diverse HSC IT environment.

The Deputy Director also participated in two HSC-wide initiatives related to formulating an HSC Data Governance policy and defining a strategy for integrated collaborative technologies, such as instant messaging, video conferencing and file sharing.

UNM Participation

As chair of the HSLIC Disaster Team, the Deputy Director served on the UNM Emergency Planning Committee, which oversees UNM-wide emergency planning and operations. He was also appointed as the HSC representative to the UNM Data Governance Committee, tasked to review and update UNM data governance policies.

The Data Management Planning Service was reassigned to the Deputy Director's unit in an effort to broaden the impact of the service within HSLIC and across the HSC. Unfortunately, the principal contributor to this service was out for an extended period during these six months, but on her return in early August, the Data Management Planning Service will renew its focus helping users organize and access their data.

Under the purview of the Assessment Committee, the Service Point completed a two-week pilot project to count and characterize patron transactions. The data captured during the project resulted in changes to the staffing schedule and proved beneficial enough for Service Point supervisors to consider a longer-term implementation of transaction metrics.

HSC Activities

The Deputy Director assumed a role as co-chair of the Information Technology Service Management (ITSM) Steering Committee. This committee consists of representatives from HSLIC, UNMH IT, UNM Medical Group IT, the Cancer Center and Sandoval Regional Medical Center IT, with the purpose of defining, managing and evaluating new and existing IT

PLANNING OFFICE

During FY2015, HSLIC's Planning Office engaged in projects to help the HSC turn data into actionable knowledge for the future.

HSC Email Project

October 6, 2014, marked the HSC's transition to a new email system. HSCLink uses Microsoft's Exchange and Outlook for email and calendaring. This new system, located in data centers at UNMH, is integrated with main campus. Planning Office staff coordinated and led meetings, sent out communications and conducted training to get the HSC ready for the move. Staff also helped steer the project through a last-minute scope change, delaying the HSC's transition to @unm.edu email addresses. After the "go-live," Planning Office staff continued to lead the project team through post-implementation cleanup. Staff also led planning meetings to develop a new vision for identity management between the HSC and main campus. This vision will facilitate the HSC eventually moving to one email address.

Data Center Audit

During FY2015, the Planning Office managed a project for the HSC CIO for Administration and Academic Systems to respond to an audit of HSC data centers and servers conducted by the Internal Audit department, which conducts periodic audits of the University's information technology (IT) assets. For this audit, the Planning Office worked with departments across the HSC to compile information about their data centers and servers, including off-site backups. As an outcome of this project, HSLIC implemented a new off-site backup system for the academic and research components of the HSC.

Strategic Communications

This fiscal year, Planning Office staff began a project to update HSLIC's promotional brochures. HSLIC personnel use the organization's nine brochures, last redesigned in 2007, to provide faculty, students and community members with targeted information about a variety of services and resources. In the fall, the Planning Office conducted an evaluation of how often these brochures are used and developed a new brochure template. By fiscal year's end, two newly updated brochures are near completion. The rest will be updated in the next fiscal year.

FY2015 also marked the School of Medicine's 50th anniversary. Planning Office staff worked with the School's alumni office and HSLIC's Special Collections staff to develop a "Photo of the Week" campaign for the HSLIC website, along with a companion slide show for the HSC's digital signs. Staff also participated in SOM's two homecoming events, serving cake to alumni touring the campus.

Finally, Planning Office staff continued to collaborate with HSC Marketing and Communications to grow the new HSC Content Creators' Group. Staff participated in the creation and publication of HSC-wide editorial style guidelines for departments who write promotional content, to promote stylistic consistency using industry best practices.

Moving into FY2016, the Planning Office will continue to focus on updating and refreshing HSLIC's primary communication mechanisms. The Office will also participate in planning the construction of the final phase of the Domenici Center, which has become one of HSLIC's key services.

New BioMIRTS Faculty: Dr. Stuart Nelson joined the BioMIRTS Unit in June 2015 at the rank of visiting professor in the UNM SOM. He also has a secondary appointment in the Translational Informatics Division in the Department of Internal Medicine. Dr. Nelson is a former staff member at the National Library of Medicine, where he supervised the Medical Subject Heading's group for PubMed. He also led the development of RxNorm, a terminology standard for drugs. Dr. Nelson will help develop the clinical informatics fellowship, lecture and help prepare extramural grant applications, both for HSLIC and the Department of Internal Medicine.

Biomedical Informatics (Research) Fellowship: Dr. Felicha Candelaria-Cook continued into her second year of fellowship and successfully submitted her application for the MS in Clinical Research Program. She began to work with a mentor at the MIND Institute to define a research project in medical imaging. Dr. Shamsi Daneshvari completed here fellowship in 2014 and is currently interviewing for faculty positions around the country.

Clinical Informatics (Applied) Fellowship: The BioMIRTS director continues to lead the development of a clinical informatics fellowship at UNM in partnership with the Department of Internal Medicine. The fellowship received approval from the UNMH Rightsizing Committee in the fall of 2014, and work soon began assembling the accreditation application to the Accreditation Counsel for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME). Recruitment activities for the first class of fellows will begin in the summer of 2015.

Research

The BioMIRTS Director completed the first year as principal investigator of a three-year study in partnership with the Centura Health System in Colorado, Hennepin County Medical Center, Stanford University and the University of Minnesota. The group's work is funded by a \$600,000 grant from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality. Their research focused on determining the specific design aspects of electronic health records most associated with user stress, fatigue and frustration. During year one, the group developed and tested focus-group questions targeted to physicians who practice in the ambulatory setting. During year two, six focus groups will be held at UNM and two other institutions.

Service Partnerships

Clinical and Translational Science Center (CTSC): This year marked the completion of the ninth class of students in the BMI courses that HSLIC provides in support of the UNM CTSC's Masters of Science in Clinical Research (MSCR) Program. The BioMIRTS Director and the Coordinator for Evidence Based and Translational Science co-direct the BMI courses for this program.

UNM Cancer Center: The BioMIRTS director continued in his role as Co-Director, Clinical Protocol and Data Management/Medical Informatics Shared Resource under the National Cancer Institute's Cancer Center Support Grant for the UNM Cancer Center.

UNM SOM Medical Student Research Committee: The BioMIRTS Director stepped down from service on the SOM's Medical Student Research Committee in June 2015 after 10 years of service, the last four of which were as co-chair. The committee oversees all aspects of managing the required student research projects program. In the past 10 years, the SOM class size has increased, and the committee's administrative processes were completely overhauled.

LIBRARY AND EDUCATION SERVICES

REFERENCE & USER SUPPORT SERVICES

The Reference and User Support Services (RUSS) unit is composed of staff members and student employees who operate a combined library/technology service desk and library faculty members primarily responsible for education and community outreach. The faculty and staff units are both managed by the RUSS Division Head.

Service Point

The Service Point is the main contact point for all HSC students, faculty, staff and visitors to HSLIC for computer technology and library resources. Locating and providing library materials not owned by the HSLIC is an important service to the HSC community. The number of interlibrary loan (ILL) requests filled jumped 44 percent in FY2015, from 1,491 to 2,149. In large part, this is the result of an increased awareness that ILL is now free for HSC students, faculty and staff. To enhance customer service, the unit provides free document delivery for items copied from the HSLIC collection, leading to a 656 percent increase.

Two major migration projects took place this fiscal year. Both required close collaboration with other units within HSLIC and the HSC. The transition to the OCLC WorldShare integrated library system involved HSLIC staff and faculty from the Service Point, Resource Access & Development and Technology Support units. For her work editing more than 60,000 patron records, one Library Information Specialist earned the FY2014 HSLIC Outstanding Performance Award. In the fall, as part of the HSC Email Project, a training team, directed by one of the REDS faculty librarians, offered 34 classes on HSClink Microsoft Outlook 2103 beginning August 12 and ending October 24, 2014. During the 12-week training period, a total of 353 staff, faculty and students attended. Several special training sessions were offered to the UNM Cancer Center, the Office of Community Health and the Office of the Medical Investigator. The team worked in tandem with trainers from UNMH to ensure that all HSC employees were provided with the opportunity for training. Faculty librarians, acting in their departmental Envoy role, contacted departments to help troubleshoot during the implementation phase.

Research, Education and Distance Services (REDS) Faculty Activities

The REDS faculty unit shares responsibility for reference assistance and consultations, education sessions, curricular involvement, community outreach and literature searches. The complement of REDS faculty was in flux this fiscal year. Despite this fluctuation, REDS faculty participated in community outreach activities, delivered 62 percent of curricular instruction, ran 81 percent of all literature searches and provided 94 percent of all professional consultations.

Native and Distance Services

Throughout FY2014, Native and Distance Services connected with consumers, health professionals and students in New Mexico to promote National Library of Medicine resources, as well as HSLIC’s Distance Services and Native American Health Information Services. Faculty and staff throughout HSLIC helped the Native and Distance Services Librarian conduct classes, presentations, exhibits and health fairs. Twenty-six public events were offered, a 13 percent increase over last fiscal year.

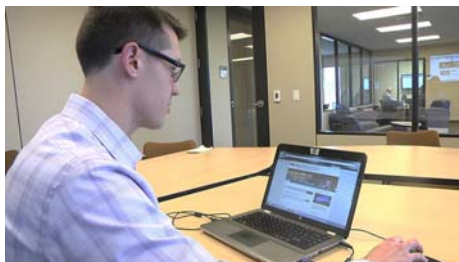
The Native and Distance Services Librarian visited sites in Albuquerque and across the state, including Shiprock, Laguna Pueblo and Santa Fe. She wrote proposals for and received two NLM contracts: “Collaborating to Improve Health Information Access Throughout New Mexico” and “Maintaining the Health Information Network for New Mexico.”

RESOURCES, ACCESS & DELIVERY AND SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

As the designated stewards of HSLIC library resources and collections, RAD continued its work this year to promote the use of HSLIC resources. Early in the year, the unit changed its name to Resources, Archives and Discovery to better reflect its role at HSLIC and the HSC.

For much of the fiscal year, RAD, with representation from the RUSS unit for circulation and reference, moved HSLIC's library catalog from Millennium to OCLC's WorldCat. The project involved the migration of bibliographic records, holdings and patron data; circulation transactional data, such as loans, holds, fines and fees; and item statistical data, such as total checkouts, YTD checkouts and date of last use. This project also included customizing the system and validating data for accuracy.

Once the move was complete, the team published a subject guide, developed training materials and provided training sessions for HSLIC faculty/staff and users. RAD is continuing to refine HSLIC's instance of WorldCat to better serve the HSC.

During FY2015, RAD made a number of cancellations to the library collection to stay within our budget. These cancellations were necessitated by the rising costs of licensing library resources and a relatively flat budget from the state. On average, HSLIC's resources experience an 8 percent increase each year, with some publishers inflating their prices by as much as 17 percent annually. Cancellations were made, taking into consideration use, criticality and availability of other suitable resources. RAD surveyed HSC faculty to help make decisions on canceling electronic journals with low to medium use.

Exhibits

In celebration of the School of Medicine's (SOM) 50th anniversary, HSLIC displayed a commemorative exhibit in the lobby of the Domenici Center for Health Sciences Education. The exhibit opened in July 2014 and closed in June 2015. The process of establishing a new medical school at UNM started in the late 1950s. This effort was driven, in part, by a national shortage of medical doctors, which put the health of New Mexico's citizens at risk. UNM SOM opened its doors in September 1964, with its first class of 24 eager and adventurous students.

Sculpture Garden

During the fiscal year, the first phase of the Helix Memorial Anatomy Garden was completed. The garden honors the many New Mexicans who donate their bodies to educate the next generation of medical doctors, physician assistants and physical therapists. Located between Novitski Hall and the Innovation Discovery and Training Complex, the garden is a permanent site for students and donors' families. The committee will continue its efforts to complete the second phase over the coming year.

Personnel

Early in the fiscal year, Laura Hall's position transitioned from staff to faculty. Her title was changed to Division Head for the unit. In February, Misty Bargman joined the unit as the new archivist assistant. She will help the unit process special collections, develop finding aids and assist users.

TECHNOLOGY SUPPORT

INFORMATION SYSTEMS

The Information Services unit made a number of improvements to the HSLIC data centers during FY2015. All of these improvements are intended to enhance the reliability of the services HSLIC provides in our data centers, in terms of both hardware reliability and the reliability of our customers' data.

Disk-to-Disk Backups

HSLIC implemented a new disk-to-disk backup system using two NetApp storage devices. The first device is used as the primary backup target. The second will be used as an off-site mirror of the first, providing more protection for HSC data.

Server Virtualization

The team continued with the transition from numerous hardware servers to a virtualized server environment, whereby multiple virtual servers can run on one piece of hardware. This simplifies server management and requires less power and cooling, while providing the same computing power and resources to our customers. This initiative will continue in FY2016.

Environmental Monitoring

During FY2015, the Information Services unit enhanced environmental monitoring for both of our server rooms. The improvements included automatic email alerts when temperature or humidity exceed preset ranges and security alerts, with photos, whenever someone enters the rooms.

System Updates and Patching

HSLIC purchased a Dell appliance to use for third-party patching and is currently patching all HSLIC-managed servers using this device. This is a major step forward in our patching and security efforts. The appliance could also be used for workstation patching, which we are currently considering.

Server Monitoring

Information Services purchased and began using new server-monitoring software. This improves our ability to anticipate and respond to server problems.

File-Share Migration

The unit completed the migration of data from Novell to Microsoft file shares. The old Novell storage devices have been removed from the server room, freeing up space, power and cooling.

Network Upgrade

During FY2015, the Information Services group began working with UNMH to plan for an upgrade to the section of the network that connects the BRF data center to the rest of the HSC network. This upgrade will improve the network connection to BRF from 1 GB to 10 GB. This network upgrade is also a necessary step in our plan to implement the off-site backup site mentioned above.

Huron Click Commerce Grants SAML Authentication

Finally, the Systems Analyst 3 worked extensively with the HSC Click Commerce Grants project team, Huron and F5 to configure SAML authentication for the new Grants system.

TECHNOLOGY SUPPORT

Richard Adcock, Manager, IT Technical Support

This fiscal year, the Technology Support group worked on several initiatives to promote problem-solving and collaboration initiatives at the HSC. These initiatives included converting support services into a tiered support model, providing leadership in the support for technology in shared spaces and collaborating with all HSC IT departments when reporting and communicating about major incidents.

The Technology Support group has provided a number of support services for many years, including workstation image management and workstation repair and support, to name a few. To provide better problem-solving and efficiency of HSLIC's support services, the Technology Support group, in collaboration with the HSLIC Service Point and the Systems group, converted to a tiered support model. This model includes three tiers of support, beginning with the Service Point, which addresses all incoming service requests and incidents. The Service Point quickly assesses and resolves requests and, if needed, escalates requests to the Technology Support group. The Technology Support group, in turn, provides a second layer of support services and, if needed, can escalate to the Systems Group. This tiered model allows for a more efficient and timely resolution to requests and incidents. Based on the preliminary data collected, this model is significantly reducing HSLIC's average time to resolve requests and incidents.

The support of technology in shared spaces such as classrooms has increased dramatically over the past year. The Technology Support group's Classroom Technology Unit was established to support these spaces and now has taken the leadership role in supporting the technology in the shared spaces of the IHSC and the new HSC Business and Communications Center. By consolidating support for these spaces to the group with the expertise to quickly resolve problems and work with stakeholders to implement new technologies, we have established a better support structure for HSC workforce members. In addition to managing technology in these spaces, the classroom technology unit installed remote room management in most of these shared spaces to provide proactive monitoring of the technology and the ability to fix certain issues remotely.

In this past year, the Technology Support group has also worked closely with other HSC IT departments and has implemented a new methodology for reporting and communicating major incidents. This methodology includes shifting the reporting of incidents into problem records within the Help.HSC system. The group also created a standardized communication procedure used by internal IT staff to communicate during an incident, as well as a standard procedure for external communications.

WEB AND APPLICATIONS DEVELOPMENT

Kevin Wiley, MS, Manager, Systems and Programming

HSC Websites

The HSLIC Web Administrator completed a number of new websites during FY2015. Sites completed include Occupational Therapy Program, Biomedical Research Education Program, HSC Office of Diversity, School of Medicine Department of Ob/Gyn and the HSC Policy Office. In addition to the creation of new sites, the Web Administrator also conducted training and labs for HSC web authors.

The Web Administrator also participated in a web pilot effort that came from the Executive Chancellor's office. This effort involves key web authors from the HSC collaborating on development of key websites.

Click Commerce Grants Project

The HSLIC Senior DBA was very involved in the effort to migrate data from the InfoEd system to the new Huron Click Commerce Grants system. It requires extensive SQL knowledge, plus many trial runs and testing to ensure that the data migration runs correctly.

Database Administration

The Applications team continues to administer Oracle and SQL Server database systems. The group installed patches and upgraded to new versions as necessary.

Moodle

The group installed the latest version of Moodle and began migrating courses to the new platform. The old version continues to run in parallel with the new installation and will do so until all courses have been migrated.

SharePoint

The Applications team continues to administer SharePoint and create sites for HSC customers. The Analyst/Programmer 3 who administers SharePoint began migration of the remaining sites from SharePoint 2007 to SharePoint 2010. This will simplify the support effort and bring SharePoint into compliance with HSC compliance practices.

Maintenance Programming

The group continues with maintenance programming, which includes working with systems that run against Microsoft SQL Server, Oracle and Microsoft Access database management systems. Some of the offices and programs we support in this effort include SOM CME, SOM Academic Affairs, HSC Faculty Contracts, HSC Faculty Activity Database, HSC Registrar's Office and UNM Medical Group Locum Tenens.

(2) Develop lesson plans for middle and high school students using disaster-related information resources to familiarize students with those resources and emphasize critical thinking skills in the context of the curriculum. 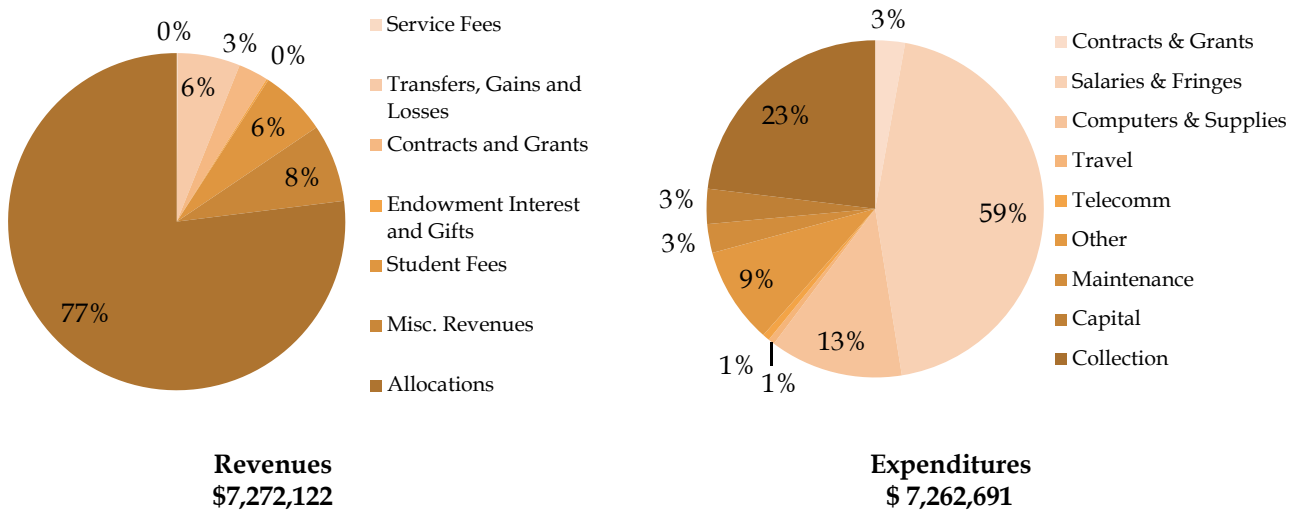

Figure 2: Use of the Domenici Center

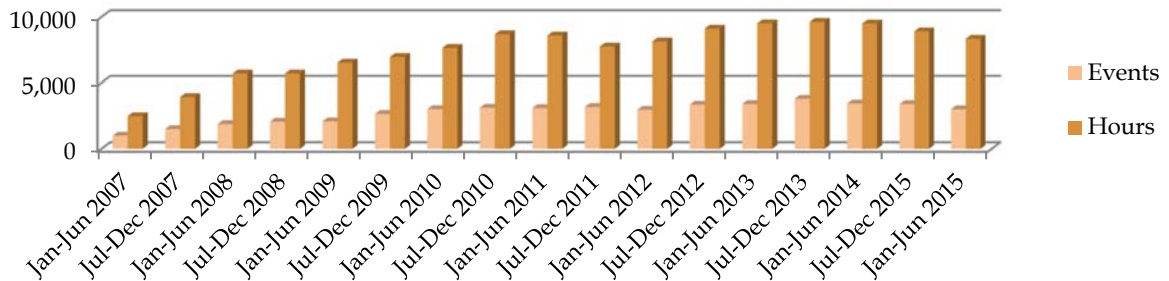
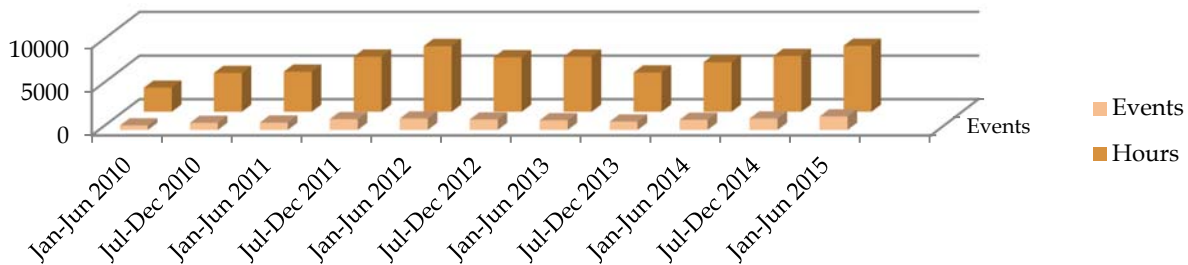


Figure 3: Use of the Interprofessional Healthcare Simulation Center

Figure 4: Collection Development (General Expenditures – Percent)

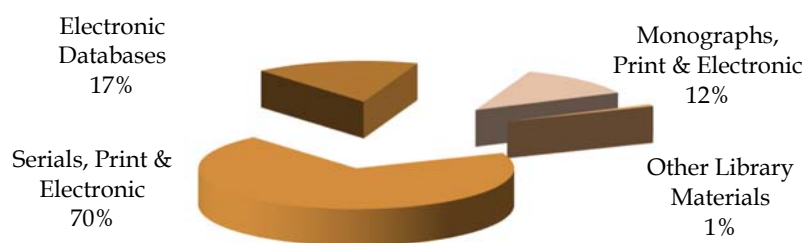

Figure 5: Patrons in the Library Building (Average)

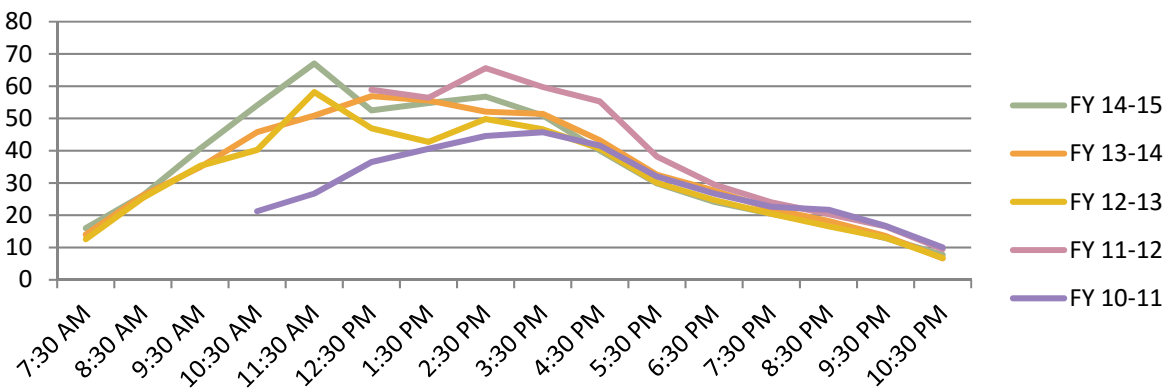


Figure 6: Patrons in the Library Building (Maximums)

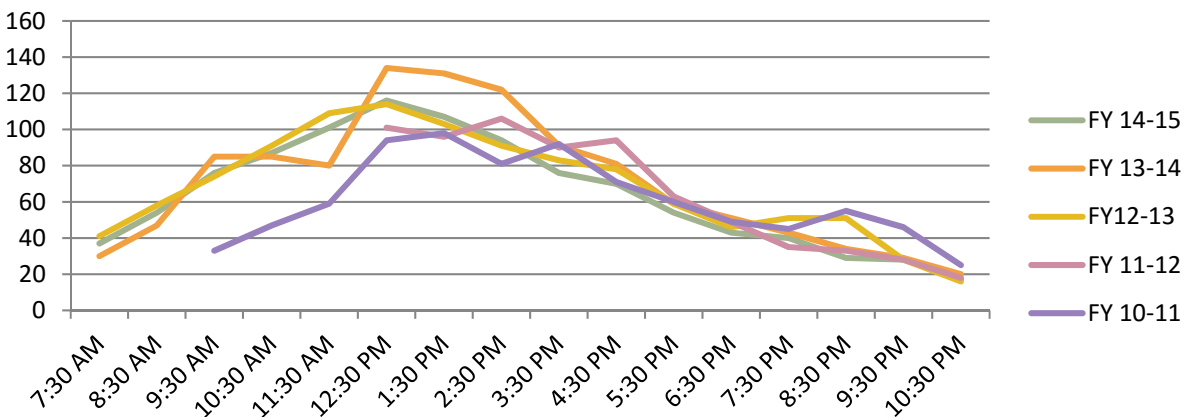

Figure 7: Top 10 Incidents

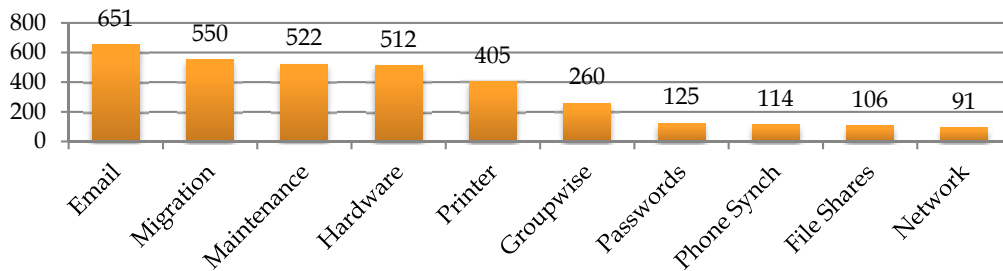
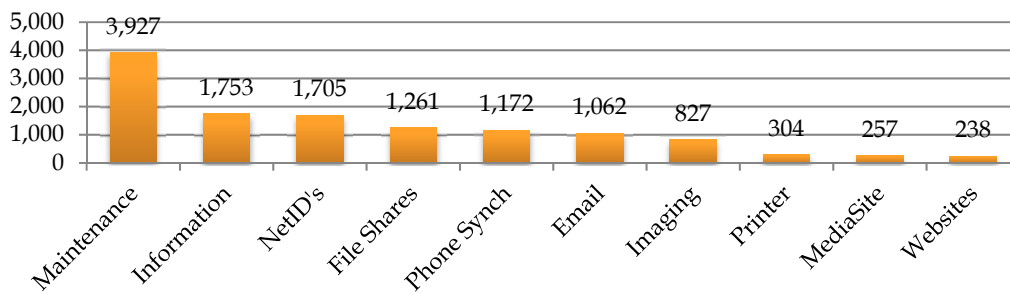


Figure 8: Top 10 Service Requests
