### Paul Wenger New '56-57 President Of Men's Student Body Organization

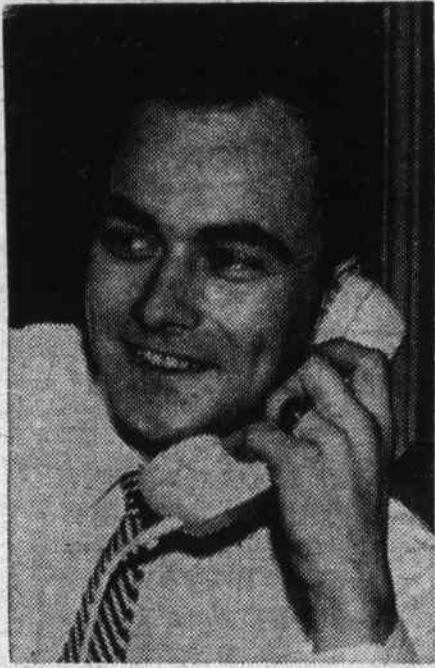
Newly elected Paul Wenger will serve as president of men's student government organization for the '56-57 session.

### Choral Group Leaves On Tour, Traveling To Iceland, Bermuda

Thirty members of the Madison College Glee Club have been selected and left Thursday morning, to fly to Bermuda, Iceland, and the Azores in an Easter Concert Tour with the Military Air Transport Service Division of the United States Air Force. Members were selected on a seniority basis from the larger sixty-voice Glee Club.

The Madison Choral group will be flown first to Iceland for personal appearances at air bases, civic centers, and for several television shows. They will return to the United States for a change of luggage and will then be flown to the warmer climates of Bermuda and the Azores.

Their music will represent a wide range of styles, and will include many religious selections appropriate to the Easter Season.

The Glee Club, under the direction of Miss Edna T. Shaeffer since its founding in 1916, is the oldest student group in continuous existence on the Madison Campus. The Glee Club represented Virginia last year at the Biennial Convention of the National Federation of Music Clubs in Miami, Florida. The group has sung with the National Symphony Orchestra and the Norfolk Symphony. On two occasions it has sung with the Harvard Glee Club, and has sung at the National Gallery of Art and Washington's National Cathedral.

#### PRAISE FROM MIAMI DAILY

Edward Ireland, commenting in the Miami Daily News last year on the Glee Club's appearance before the National Federation of Music Clubs said the group was "magnificent in tone, quality, intonation, and impressiveness of delivery."

A recording of the Miami appearance was heard by a member of Special Services for the Air Force who then invited the Glee Club, through its president, Marcia Maier, to make the Eastern Tour.

First reaction of the Glee Club members was surprise mixed with concern as to how they would pack

clothes for Iceland and for Bermuda. A brief return trip to the United States between appearances in Iceland and Bermuda was worked out to solve the wardrobe and luggage problem.

Recently the chorus made appearances in Harrisonburg with the National Symphony.

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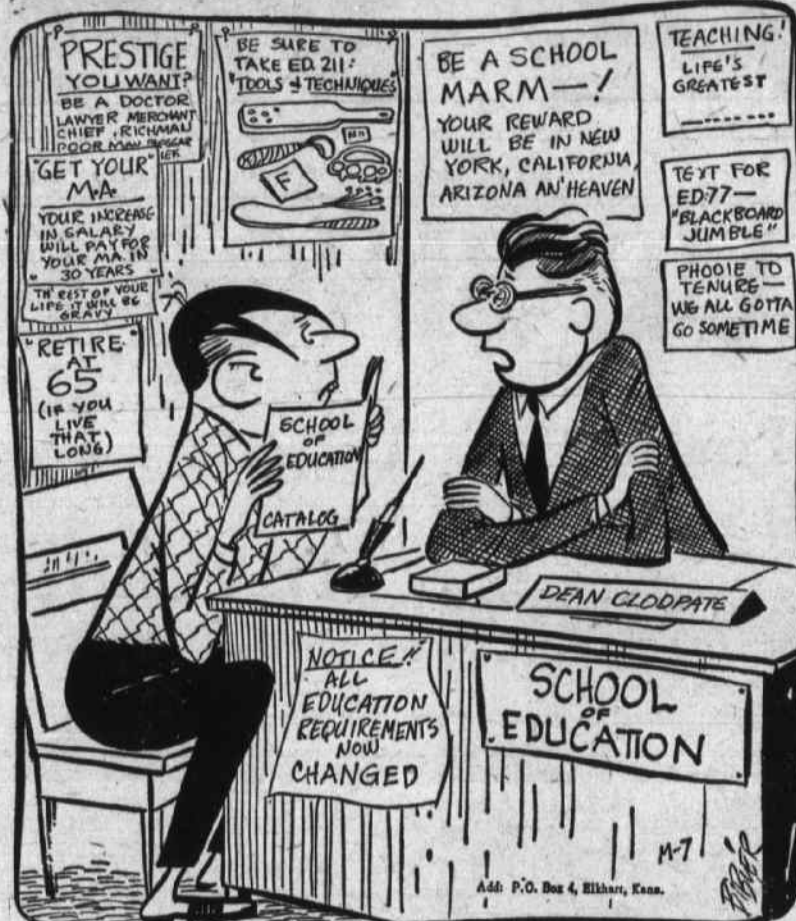

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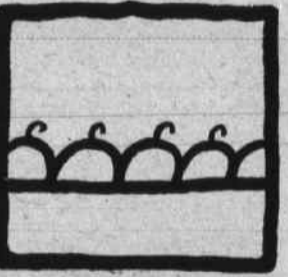

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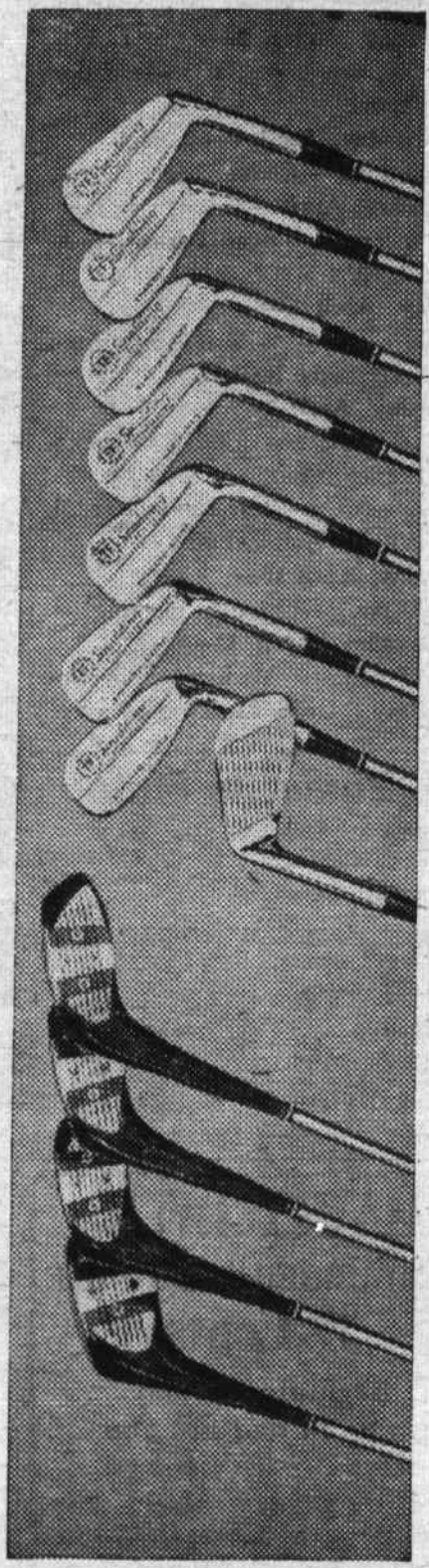
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
