How?/Addressing Motivation



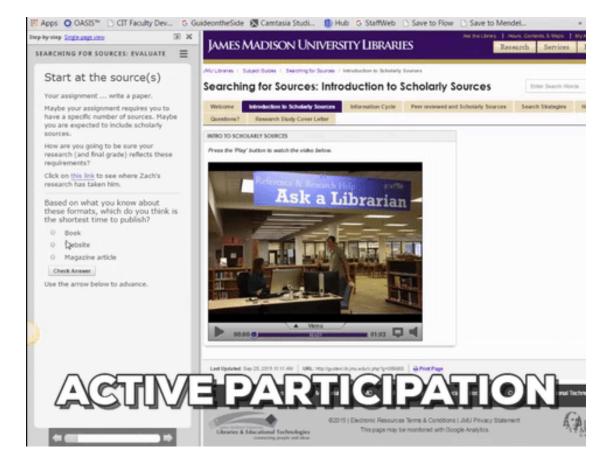
Keller's Cognitive Learning Model of Motivational Design, 1987

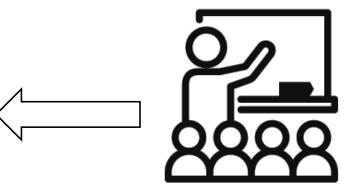

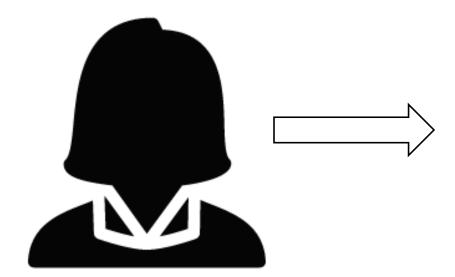
Instructor Evaluation

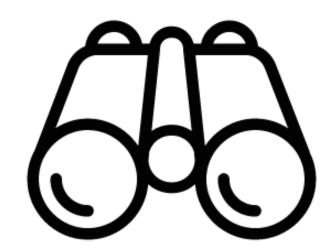
