Home MADE FERTILIZERS .- Farmers are too apt to neglect the husbanding of their home resources for tertilizers. The privy, the sink spout, the muck bed, the road scrapings, the wash fron the barn yard each afford good means through which to add te the great manure receptacle of the farm, but they are too often neglected, while the farmer pays sixty dollars a ton for some highly praised concentrated manure We advise them all to follow the former practice more closely, pay less for manufactured fertilizers.-Maine Farmer.

ECONOMICAL PAINT -Skim milk 2 quarts, fresh slacked lime 8 oz., linseed oil 6 oz , white burgundy pitch 2 oz.; Spanish white 3 lbs. The lime to be slacked in water, exposed to the air, mixed in one-fourth of the milk; the oil in which the pitch is previously dissolved, to be added a little at a time; then the rest of the milk, and afterwards the Spanish white. This quanity is sufficient for 27 square yards, 2 coats.

## AN ACT To Provide for a General Registra-tion of Voters.

### Approved April 13th, 1870.1

1 Be it enacted by the General Assemily, That the judge of the county and hustings court of each county, city and town of this Common-wealth, inmediately after the first election and qualification of the said judges under the consti-ution and event second way there there constitution, and every second year thereafter, count-ing from January; eighteen hundred and seven-Ing from January, eighteen hundred and seven-te, atthe January term of their respective courte, thail appoint a registrar for each township, ward and voting place of their respective counties, ci ise and towns, who shall be a discrete citizen, and resident of the township or ward to which repointed: provided, that the commissioners to civide the counties into townships shall apprint the said registrars in cach county in the Com-monwealth immediately upon the said discrete the said registrars in each county in the Com-monwealth, immediately upon the said division of their respective counties, in case the judge of ruch county shall not then have been elected and qualified; and the registrars so appointed by raid commissioners shall continue to dischaage the duties under this act until registrars shall be appointed in their stead by the judge of the county or hustings court, provided bowever te appointed in their stead by the judge of the ioanty or busings count: provided, however, that for every ward containing over one thous and voters, the said judge or commissioners shall appoint one registrar for every thousand voters, and one for every iractional part of a thousand above five hundred; and there shall be at least as many voting places in each ward as registrars for such ward.

for such ward. 2 Each registrar so appointed and qua ified, as hereinafter provided, shall register all male citizens of his election district, who shall apply to be registered, and who shall be of the age of ty enty one years at the first election to be held offer the registricity and who shall be of the age of the registered of the second state of the sec er the registration, and who are citizens of 9 Uni ed States, and shall have resided in the after the registration, and who are citizens of the Uni ed States, and shall have resided in the State twelve months, and in the county, city or town in which they propose to register, three months next preceding any election at which they may offer to vete; provided, that no offi-cer, soldier, seaman or marine of the Urited States army or navy shall be considered a resi-dent of the State by reason of being stationed therein : and provided also, that islosts and In-natics, persons convicted of brittery in any elec-tion, enbezzlement of public funds, treason or lelony, and any person who, while a citizen of this State, has, since the adoption of the present constitution, fought a duel with a deadly wea-pon, sent or accepted a challenge to fight a duel with a deadly wearon, either within or beyond the boundaries of this State, or knowingly con-veyed the challenge, or assisted in any manner in lighting a duel, shall not be registered as vo-ters; and provided further, that in the event that any person claining to be a naturalized citizen of the United States, shall not be able to establish the date of his papers, or the court in which they were issued, by reason of his laving lost the same, or from any other cause, then his oath or affirmation, to the fact that he has been dul, naturalized shall be accepted, and rhall entitle him to register. 3. The sceretary of the Commonwealth shall cause to be prepared suitable books and blanks for the registration of veters, and shall forward them to the cle ks of the county and hustings courts of the cle ks of the county and hustings

for the registration of voters, and shall forward them to the cle ks of the county and bustings courts of the several counties, cities and towns, to be by them distributed to the registrars of their respective townships, wa ds and voting places. The books aforesaid shall be se arrang-cd as to admit o. the alphabetical classification of those registered, and shall be ruled in parai-lel column win which shall be entered the num-ber, name of voter, the fact that he is sworn, his age, occupation, the blace of residence of ber, name of voter, the fact that he is sworn, his age, occupation, the place of residence at time of registration, the length of time of his residence in the county, city or town. If in a c ty, stating the name of the street and number of house in which he resides, provide the same be numbered, the time of his residence in the State, and if nataralized, the date of his papers, and the court by which issued, in case the same can be accertained. The list of voters, white and colored, shall be kept and arranged in sep-arate books.

From the Richmond Enquirer. TERRIBLE CALAMITY AT RICHMOND.

FLOOR OF THE COURT OF APPEALS ) ALLS IN. The daily papers having announced that the court of Appeals would make

their decission at 11 o'clock, in the Ellyson. Chahoon Mayoralty case, an immense crowd packed the court-room, in the second story of the Capitol, before the hour named. The court room is just over the Ball of the House of Delegates, and was literally packed in every part, with persons eager to hear the expeeted decision.

Suddenly the packed gallery gave way and was thrown forward with a heavy

concussion, into the centre of the courtroom. This occurrence, with the rush and surging of the crowl, caused the whole floor to break through from - the walls, and sink in a cloud of dust, and, laden with its load of human beings down into the hall of the House of Dele.

g tes below. The mass which fell buried beneath i's ruins the persons who happened then to be in the hall. It is exceedingly fortunate that the catastrophe happened at the early hour of eleven ; for if it had oe curred after the House of D legates had met, scarcely any of the members could have escaped. A large meeting of Del-egates which had been held in the Hall

had just adjourned. The scene which was presented after the fall of the suspended court-room was frightful beyond description. A thick cloul of dust filled the vast space Every individual of the vast throng of human beings was begrimed with dust. Many were bleeding and groaning from the injuries they had received. Many lay dead in the promiscuous crowd. Through the incumbent floor of the failen room the legs and arms, and heads of the persons who had been caught beneath it, were protruding; some still under the spell of death ; others moving in efforts at extrieation, or in the agony of pain and suffer-

The greater number of the persons who went down with the floor readily made their escape from the ball below. Those who were struck by timbers and caught by the gallery above, and those who were in the lower hall and caught by the fail. ing mass were the sufferers from the occurrence.

It is a cause of thankfulness that so small a proportion of the great number of persons who were in the court room has been injuried. The Judges of the court itself all escaped unhurt. They were in the conference-room, just about going into the court-room, when the floor sank. They were at the door of the conference-room in time to see the sinking of the throng of men, but were fortunately tardy enough to escape being involved in the catastrophe.

Very soon after the catastrophe occurred, almost an instant as it were, those who were uninjured commenced most ac tive exertions to rescue those who were buried beneath the heavy j ists, gallery, stairways, and tons of fallen laths and plaster, and whose groans could be heard rising in mournful cadence above the noise and confusion incident to the hor-

COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA. ) EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, Richmond, April 29, 1870. To the People of the Commonwealth :

A great calamity has befallen the State, and especially its chief city, in the appalling event of Wednesday, the 27th inst. In that fearful catactrophe, which partially de-stroyed the Capitol of the State, many of our most eminent and valuable citizens, some of them in the service of the Commonwealth, were suddenly and under circumstances of the greatest agon, stricken from life, and a large number of others were fatally or shockingly in jured.
