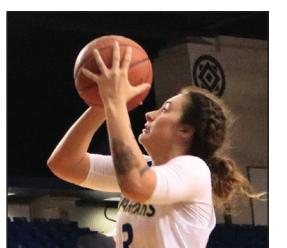

## STATE OF THE UNION

### Campus reacts to Trump's speech

President Donald Trump spoke about unifying Democrats and Republicans during Tuesday night's State of the Union address in front of a joint session of Congress, but mostly stated Republican talking points throughout his speech. The State of the Union is a yearly address that the president gives to Congress in January. The focus this year was border security, former President Barack Obama's healthcare regulation, nuclear weaponry, tax cuts and unemployment.

"This is our new American moment," Trump said. "There has never been a better time to start living in the American dream." "Presidents always say the union is strong," Melinda Jackson, San Jose State political science department chair, said. "With that statement, it was trying to create a state of unity and many believe we are more separated than before." Trump mentioned that his administration had eliminated a tax that was brutal to Americans. He emphasized, "We repealed the core of the

disastrous Obamacare — the mandate is now gone." "I think that is a horrible idea because it helps so many people," business management senior Stacy Hernandez said. "By taking it away, these people who need it are going to suffer. Obama took a long time to get it approved, so it is just sad to see it being taken away." Nuclear weaponry was another big talking point for Trump. "As part of our defense, we must modernize and rebuild our nuclear arsenal, hopefully never having to use it, but making it so

strong and powerful that it will deter any acts of aggression," Trump said. This may alarm Americans with the possibility of future conflict. "It's certainly a more mild statement," Jackson said. "That statement is not different than any other way said before. We've never had it seem so dramatic before because of his actions with name calling other leaders. We're all a little scared and anxious." On Jan. 2 the president responded to Kim Jong-un by tweeting "Will someone from his depleted and

### Fido fights the dog flu

This year's flu season is bad not only for people, but for dogs too. San Jose dog owners are taking extra precautions to ensure their dogs do not contract the canine influenza virus. Tower Lawn is a popular spot for San Jose residents and SJSU students to bring their dogs to run around and interact with other dogs that may be on campus. In the last few weeks, there has been a spike in dog flu cases around the Bay Area — especially in the South Bay. In light of hearing about the canine influenza virus, some dog owners are keeping their dogs home in an effort to keep them healthy. "It's pretty quiet right now because of the dog flu," San Jose resident Elizabeth Porte said. "A lot of the dogs have gotten sick so almost everyone has been keeping their dogs home, keeping them out of the exposure of other dogs so they don't get other people sick." For Porte and her Great Dane Harley, the dog flu has not stopped them from going on their daily walk on campus. "We still do the walks, we just limit our amount of play with all the dogs here on campus," Porte said. "I was just doing my normal walks rather than having her play with all the dogs just to keep it safe, even though she has gotten her flu shot." The dog flu is canine influenza, caused by the influenza A virus subtype H3N8. The strain has similar symptoms to what a human would have with the flu, as explained by Dr. Raj Singh, owner of Aborn Pet Clinic. "Some of the symptoms you see with the dog flu are coughing, sneezing, running fever, lethargy, not eating and some dogs may be having runny noses or nasal discharge," Dr. Singh said. Dogs can contract the dog flu by simply coming into contact with other dogs that may have already had the virus. Dr. Singh said vaccinations and prevention are the key to keeping your dog healthy. "Avoid dog parks, pet stores and groomers for some time so they don't get exposed to infected dogs and hence, contract the flu," Dr. Singh said. Despite vaccines being one of the recommended ways to help protect your dog from contracting the canine influenza

# First super blue blood moon since 1886

A lunar phenomenon that last occurred in 1866 was visible early Wednesday morning. Because of its location on the West coast, San Jose was one of the prime locations to see the super blue blood moon. "It was really cool being able to witness something that rare," Los Altos resident Anthony Redding said. A super blue blood moon is a combination of three separate lunar events all occurring simultaneously. The first thing needed was a blue moon, which is the second full moon of a calendar month. The moon is considered "super" when it's particularly close to the Earth and it appears brighter than usual.

These events overlapped with a total lunar eclipse. The moon passed through the Earth's shadow and made the moon look red. People woke up at around 4 a.m. to catch this rarity. Over the next couple hours, the moon became brighter and more red. "I woke up at 3:30 in the morning and the moon was bright, but it didn't look too unusual," Los Altos resident Jason Simmons said. "After watching over the course of three hours and personally seeing the changes in color, I was speechless." On the East coast, the darker part of Earth's shadow covered the Moon, making it more difficult to see.

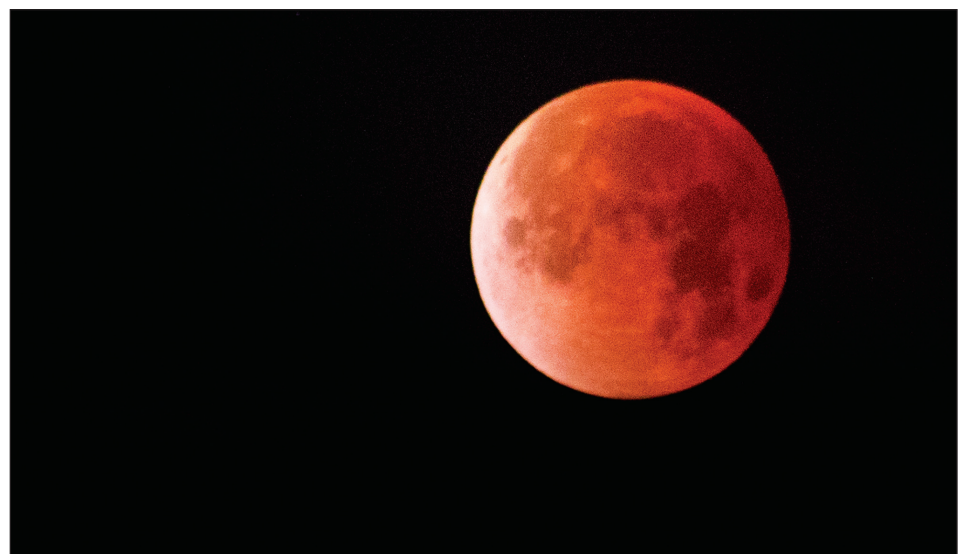

# Tech giant's proposed new home causes uproar

Google plans to build a new campus in the heart of downtown San Jose.

The fear is that it will cause a major increase in demand for housing around the area.

The company purchased land near Diridon Station, which will make commuting to work more convenient for its employees.

Job opportunities will follow with a new Google campus proposed.

This means more people will come to the Bay Area, which will contribute to the already established housing shortage.

"I think it's going to be detrimental to the entire community of San Jose because folks are already struggling to afford to live here," San Jose resident Liz Gonzalez said.

Multiple News outlets report the new campus will be an estimated 7 million square feet, making it Google's biggest tech site yet. It stretches from West San Carlos

Street and down Autumn and Montgomery streets.

Residents in the downtown area are concerned about the impact Google's new campus could have on the housing market.

On Jan. 24, members of Silicon Valley Rising and other community groups braved the elements as they protested in the rain outside of San Jose City Hall.

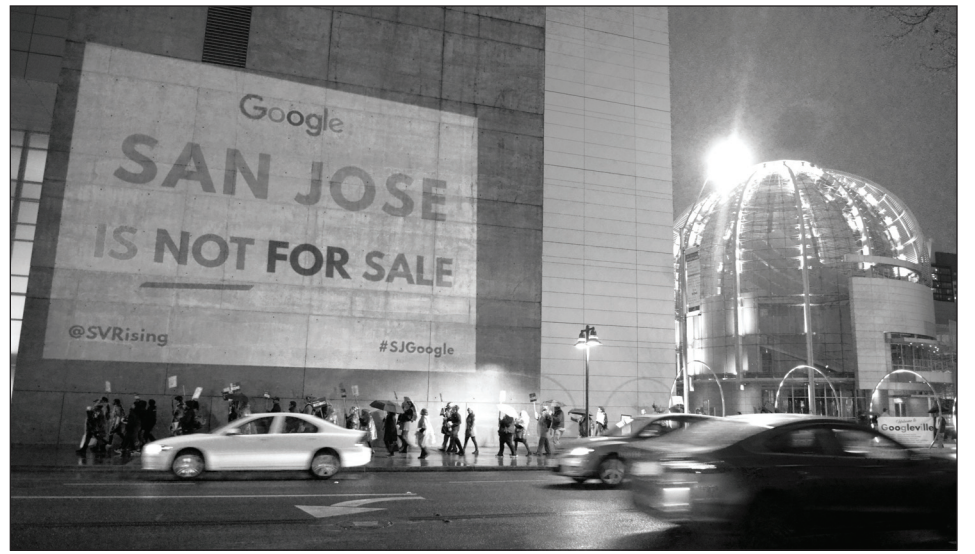
"Google needs to be a responsible member of the community," Silicon Valley Rising member Robert Aguirre said. "By coming here, they know they're going to cause a direct effect."

San Jose residents believe that housing prices are more likely to rise because of the thousands of new jobs Google is expecting to provide.

They are worried that they won't be able to afford to stay in their homes since they cannot provide any more of an increase.

Residents say they want the company to work with the city to provide affordable housing.

Another demand is legal representation to those who

could possibly lose their homes.

"If they bring 20,000 employees here, 20,000 people need a place to live," Aguirre said. "They should be socially responsible for building 20,000 homes, that's just simple math."

Locals are not going down without a fight. People are protesting in both San Jose and at Google headquarters in Mountain View because they believe that they will

lose their homes and have to relocate. They are hopeful that Google will listen to them, their future neighbors and meet the demands for affordable housing.

"I think prices have been going up too much and it should stay the same because it's hard to maintain paying rent now a days," San Jose resident and homeowner Julian Nunez said. "I own property, I rent property and I fix property but I won't be able to afford to keep

my own place if rent keeps going up."

Although residents are worried about the rising prices, Google released a statement saying that they are willing to work with city officials to benefit San Jose in any way that they can along with those that live there.

virus, some dog owners are more worried about the price of the flu shot.

"I don't know, it all depends on the price," Artur Urbanski, San Jose resident and dog owner, said. "I am not a big believer in the flu shot myself, so I am not sure if I would go ahead with it."

Dr. Singh said that in recent weeks, there has been an increase in dogs testing positive.

"In the past couple of weeks, we have seen four dogs that have tested positive for dog flu and carried all the same symptoms," Dr. Singh said. "I would say this number of dogs infected is higher than expected and this year it has increased."

Even with a proper healing time of two weeks with antibiotics, dog owners

should still be concerned and take caution of the dog flu for their dog's health.

"It's a pretty serious disease and one that should not be ignored," Dr. Singh said. "So if your dog has any of the symptoms, you have to see your vet right away and get it treated because if not treated it will turn fatal."

food starved regime please inform him that I too have a Nuclear Button, but it is a much bigger & more powerful one than his, and my Button works!"

Trump also mentioned new immigration laws he hopes to pass in the next couple of years.

He said that for decades the American borders have brought in many people from other countries.

Trump then said this brought more competition for jobs for American people and also allowed for more drugs and gangs.

The family of Kayla Cuevas and Nisa Mickens were present at the event. Cuevas and Mickens were both murdered in their hometown Brentwood, N.Y. by MS-13 gang members.

The MS-13 is an international gang throughout Mexico, Central Mexico, United States and Canada, according to CBS News.

In addition, the president proposed a four-pillar plan to address immigration.

It includes building the controversial Southern border wall, terminating the visa lottery and ending chain migration.

"Things are still very subtle," Jackson said. "We have heard different proposals from him and now he's proposing a radical change in immigration. There needs to be more debate because it takes time, we need to know what will happen with the [Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals] program."

The program, also known as DACA, is an

Obama-era policy that allows some individuals who entered the country illegally as minors to have a renewable two-year grace period from being deported.

"It was kind of sad because I am Syrian and I basically have my citizenship removed," computer science junior Omar Habra said. "His speech was presidential, kind of out of a textbook he practiced it for sure. He knows he's losing his supporters. Everything he is saying is just about his image, it's unfulfilling."

People across the country will be heavily impacted with new cuts and plans Trump has for the country.

According to the latest Gallup poll, Trump's average approval rating for the year is 38 percent. This is the lowest number Gallup has ever recorded for a president's first year in office.

"I think we're not living in a dream," Hernandez said. "He's ruining peoples lives for his own interest. He's leaving so many people at a loss, so who is he really helping?"

# 'FighterZ' is nostalgically similar to original show

This is how you balance making a fighting game and fan service.

I played a lot of the "Dragon Ball Z: Budokai" when it released in 2002, but the combat mechanics didn't fit with the characters from the show. It wasn't a faithful representation of the "Dragon Ball" universe, a complete opposite direction of "FighterZ."

"Dragon Ball FighterZ" plays within the fast-paced three versus three (3v3) tag-team fighting system similar to Capcom's "Marvel vs. Capcom 3." It's a great

template to use because it allows the characters to showcase how they're portrayed in the series. The fighters jet through the air throwing energy blasts while setting up combos in a flurry against opponents. You can tap a member of your team at any time to combine special attacks, which are easy to pull off thanks to the universal button scheme.

Every character moves just a bit differently on the stage. Vegeta is one of the fastest characters in the game, making him a fun character to setup long combos. Android 16 is more of a sluggish

character to use and he takes more damage, which allows him to last longer in matches.

"FighterZ" is a beyond beautiful game. By focusing on fighting from a 2-D perspective, Arc System allows the game to shine with flashy special moves and cinematic camera angles to capture the nostalgia from the show.

"FighterZ's" single-player campaign acts as an easy tutorial that allows newcomers to jump into the action. The setup is that Goku and his crew have been assembled to fight Android 21, a villainous foe who turns fighters

into clones. The campaign lasts three chapters with the first chapter fighting lower powered enemies, making the experience too repetitive. Often I was fighting the same squad multiple times, just with a scenery change.

Progression in the story mode is presented in a small map where you have to navigate to face the chapter boss.

If you don't have a high level, you can take on smaller enemies to gain experience. There are optional cut scenes that you can unlock if you use a certain tag team in a battle. I've seen multiple variations

of Goku and Vegeta exchanging quirky dialogue that directly references what happened on the show.

"Dragon Ball FighterZ" hits the ground running and is loaded with fan service to make the storyline worth playing through to the end. It just feels like a love letter to fans of the series that manages to balance the iconic imagery and design from the series into a complex 3v3 fighter. This is easily the best "Dragon Ball" game there's ever been.

# NBA should not approve of sports gambling

When the NBA came out publicly on Jan. 24 saying it would support the legalization of sports gambling in all 50 states, I was strongly against the idea. This idea of the NBA supporting legalized sports gambling is one they should not be endorsing at any time.

There are reasons why other professional sports leagues like MLB and NFL have not come out publicly and discussed legalization of sports gambling. There are too many risks and unnecessary problems that may come with legal sports betting and the NBA needs to become more educated about them.

"If sports betting becomes legal in New York and other states, sports leagues will need to invest more in compliance and enforcement, including bet monitoring, investigations and education," NBA Attorney Dan Spillane said.

This admission alone by a league official should give the NBA a good idea as to the challenges they would be up against if sports gambling becomes legal.

Currently in the United States, there are only four states that have legal betting schemes: Nevada, Oregon, Delaware and Montana. Nevada is still the only state that allows single game betting as well.

Sports betting is a form of gambling where the action of betting is involved with the prediction of a sporting event and placing a wager on the outcome of that event in order to earn a profit.

Since the NBA made the announcement, NBA fans might be starting to feel the league is losing focus on its fans and all the great things the game has to offer, and instead worrying about how much of a profit it can make.

"I think that it gets very centered on money, and you know whatever it is to turn a profit in the NBA and loses a lot of sight on playing the game and enjoying the sport," kinesiology senior Paolo Paelmo said.

Spillane explained to the New York Senate Committee on Racing, Gaming, and Wagering that one of the ideas the NBA has already proposed will benefit the league and bring in a hefty profit. Bets made on NBA games would pay for the risks that may be involved in allowing gambling.

"To compensate leagues for the risk and expense created by betting and the commercial value our product creates for betting operators, we believe it is reasonable for operators to pay each league one percent of the total amount bet on its

games," Spillane said.

The NBA already makes so much money off its 30 teams and its multi-billion dollar television contracts with ESPN and Turner Sports. After striking a nine-year television deal with ESPN and Turner Sports for \$24 billion in 2014. Since the 2016-2017 season, the NBA has made about \$2.6 billion annually from the contracts.

The NBA really does not need to make more money by supporting an idea that may cause unnecessary problems for itself. The league may even lose some of its fan base.

The integrity of the game could become compromised and the possibility of players betting on themselves and rigging a game on purpose could happen if sports gambling is legalized. One NBA fan already thinks this may be a possibility.

"If it was in their favor. If they feel like they are going to do what their gambling for, I'm pretty sure they'll go for it," sociology junior Giovanni Arteaga said.

The NBA planning to make a profit off of sports gambling, the possibilities of the integrity of the game being compromised and the players having an opportunity to throw a game are enough reasons for me to say it should not support legalizing sports gambling.

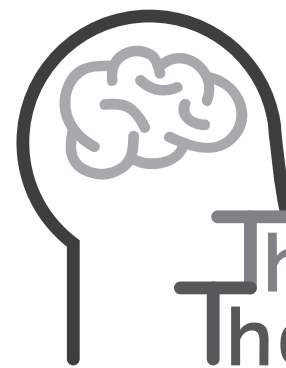

# Spartans break record . . . and hearts

A slow start before the second half doomed the women's basketball team as it

run. Sophomore center Alexis Harris broke the scoreless streak with a layup to get the Spartans on the board, but the Rebels started pounding the paint early and often. The Spartans had no answer. By the end of the first quarter, Rebels' center Katie Powell had scored 12 points and the Spartans had given up 16

points in the paint. "We weren't doing our double downs and when we would, they would knock down and hit a few threes," sophomore guard Analyss Benally said.

Senior guard Myzhanique Ladd had a similar take on how the Spartans could have cut down the points in the paint.

"Got in front of the post, stop drives; it's just the simple things we could have did that we didn't do," Ladd said. The Spartans put together a 10-2 run at the end of the second quarter to cut the deficit to six heading into halftime. The Spartans hit a three to start the third quarter, but it was all downhill from there as the Rebels went on a 26-2 run right after.

"Obviously that third quarter did us in, 26-2 run. They scored on 11 consecutive possessions and in that stretch would 0-10 with six turnovers," Spartans head coach Jamie Craighead said. "We gave up some really

untimely baskets where they got one of their layups, pick six, just not a good quarter. It did us in."

By the end of the game, the Spartans had given up 50 points in the paint and had a total of 20 turnovers. Craighead chimed in on the basic fundamentals of basketball that the team were not performing.

"Hang onto the ball...don't throw cross court passes if your teammate's not filling up hard," Craighead said. "Some of those pass-

es I have never seen before; they never throw them in practice so hopefully we'll just learn from this when we watch film and see what they did and take something away from that."

On the bright side, Analyss Benally broke the sophomore record for most 3-point field goals made in a season for the SJSU women's basketball program and the Spartans' bench outscored the Rebels' bench 24-2. Benally's 3-point record was previously held by Kari Steele in the 1994-1995 season.

"It's cool, I didn't think I was going to do that, but under these circumstances it kind of feels a bit meaningless," Benally said.

The San Jose State women's basketball team will try to end their four-game losing streak when they head to New Mexico on Saturday.

There are also four racquetball rooms, two dance rooms, a multipurpose room, basketball court, aerobics room and weight room.

"The program that is provided to the students is plentiful," Ackerman said. "It just comes down to the space." Ackerman said.

Although space is limited, students are faithfully attending the gym. During the fall semester, over 10,000 students attended the Sport Club. With the campus population of approximately 32,000 students, the Sport Club serves 31 percent of the university's population. Students are still eager to use the current facilities.

The university is currently building a new recreation center and aquatics center. It is expected to open in 2019.

It is supposed to house both a competitive lap pool and community pool, indoor track space, new equipment and additional rooms

for students to take classes in.

"The goal for the new rec center, hopefully, is to provide open-space activity for everybody," Ackerman said. "You have housing, you have the dining commons and then you have a dedicated space that's now for students. The goal is making that section of campus a place where students want to hang out."
