B. INSTRUCTIONS TO STUDENTS

Eligibility

The board serves only the persons who are properly enrolled. Enrollment is open only to local ministers, local lay ministers (*Manual* 402.1 HMS 438), and ministers of music who qualify according to *Manual* 410.

Courses

There are two ministerial study tracks administered by the Ministerial Studies Board: elder and deacon. In cases where ordination is not being sought, the track is identified as "Licensed Minister."

Ministers will not be ordained without having completed their respective courses.

The recommended mode of preparation for full-time Christian service is by attending a Nazarene liberal arts college or university and, if possible, Nazarene Theological Seminary. Other modes include Nazarene Bible College (NBC On-line), and the Modular Course of Studies (the Spanish Language Modules are identified as CEP). The Modular Course of Studies is under the immediate supervision of the District Ministerial Studies Board.

The courses required of the college students are in *Manual* 426.1.

Spanish Language Pastoral Training

In an effort to meet the needs of our Spanish-speaking congregations, pastoral training is available through the district's Centro de Estudios Pastorales (CEP), which meets primarily at Chicago First Spanish Church and uses the Modular Course of Study. The program is administered by Rev. Wilfredo Canales.

Conversion From Directed Studies to Modular Courses

The District has discontinued the Directed Studies program and has adopted the Modular Course of Study. For details on the transition contact the Secretary of the Board of Ministerial Studies.

College Students

College students are responsible to submit to the board documentary evidence of academic standing in harmony with *Manual* 427.1, and *Sourcebook for Ministerial Development* 438.19.

College students are reminded to plan their curriculum in harmony with *Manual* paragraph 426.1. The final transcript at graduation will be evaluated by the District Ministerial Studies Board, and no requirements stated in the *Manual* will be waived.

IV. DAILY PROCEEDINGS

A. SUNDAY EVENING

April 15, 2012 -- 6:00 P.M.

At 6 p.m. on Sunday, April 15, musicians from the host church, Danville First Church of the Nazarene, provided prelude music that opened the District Assembly of the Chicago Central District. District Secretary, Dr. Edward Heck, welcomed the congregation, thanking host pastor, Rev. Dave Anderson, and all the volunteers from the church for hosting the 108th Assembly. Dr. Heck gave instructions regarding registration for the Monday morning assembly session.

Rev. David Anderson greeted the district family to the "South," emphasizing that much prayer has gone into this event. He then led in prayer. A video showing Danville First Church through the last 100 years was shown inviting all to their centennial celebration that will take place in October 2012.

Rev. Jeff Alexander, pastor of Hoopston Community Church of the Nazarene, read Acts 1:8 and called for the offering. "How Great Thou Art" was sung as the offertory.

District Superintendent, Dr. Brian E. Wilson, came to the platform and introduced Dr. J.K. Warrick as the jurisdictional general for the district and for the entire Central USA Educational (Olivet) region, for the next two years. Dr. Warrick warmly greeted the congregation and then presented Rev. Anderson with a letter from the Board of General Superintendents to be read at their centennial celebration, as well a plaque recognizing a century of faithfulness in their community.

Acts 13:2 was read by Rev. Randy Holden, pastor of the Potomac Church of the Nazarene, who then prayed for Dr. Wilson, in preparation for the report of the District Superintendent. Rev. Ron Allen and First Lady Allen sang "God is in Control."

Rev. Wilson presented his report, the theme of which was "Occupy: Possessing That Which God is Giving Us."

Dr. Warrick and the congregation received the report of the District Superintendent. After a few closing remarks, Dr. Warrick asked the pastors and their spouses to surround Dr. Brian and Joan Wilson and then prayed a closing prayer. The meeting was adjourned until the Monday morning session.

B. MONDAY MORNING

April 16, 2012 -- 9:00 a.m.

The Olivetians provided very inspirational music to open the morning session of the 108th Chicago Central District Assembly. Host pastor, Rev. David Anderson, welcomed the delegation and gave some logistical instructions. He then led in prayer. Rev. Charles Hess read from Scripture. The Olivetians led in worship. Dr. Brian Wilson introduced Dr. J. K. Warrick and Mrs. Patty Warrick, the jurisdictional General Superintendent and his wife. Dr. Wilson prayed for the anointing of Dr. Warrick who would be preaching. The Olivetians presented one more inspiring musical package.

Dr. Warrick came to the podium and called for a Child Sponsorship DVD to be shown. Dr. Warrick encouraged the congregants to participate in the Child Sponsorship program. He then shared how the church is in three new countries in the world; one being in a creative access area where a lay mechanic has started twelve new congregations. Dr. Warrick then preached on the passage of Joshua that was shared by Dr. Wilson in the Sunday evening service and encouraged the congregation to learn a lesson from the story of Jericho. He prayed and the Olivetians sang at the conclusion of his sermon.

Dr. Warrick resumed the 108th Assembly of the Chicago Central District. He then asked the District Secretary, Dr. Edward H. Heck, to organize the assembly. Dr. Heck read the list of members of the 108th Chicago Central District Assembly according to the guidelines of Manual paragraph 201. He further stated that those pastors who have found it necessary to seat duly elected/appointed alternate delegates have done so at the time of registration and have been checked for accuracy. He recommended that all alternates be seated as part of the assembly without the reading of names.

The voting bar for the Chicago Central District Assembly shall be composed of all sections on the main floor of the sanctuary and the platform. The officers of the assembly will include the following: Page – Rev. Todd Peeler; Election Chairpersons – Rev. Mike Day and Rev. Andy Combs; Recording Secretary – Mrs. Kathy Heck; Readers – Dr. Susan Armstrong and Rev. Tim Britton.

Established times of the District Assembly shall be Monday: 8:00am – 9:00 AM – Registration, 10:15 AM – Special Order of the Day – Acceptance of the Report of the District Superintendent; 11:20 AM - Memorial Service, 12:30 PM - Work and Witness Workshop; 1:30PM - Olivet Nazarene University Report, 5:00PM – Ordination service.

Special greetings will be sent to our district assigned missionaries, to former District Superintendent and wife Dr. Keith and Joan Bottles and retiring District Superintendents from the Olivet Region –Dr. Crawford and Sylvia Howe from Northwest Illinois and Dr. Leland and Alice Woolery from Northwest Indiana.

Motion was made and seconded to accept the organization of the assembly as directed by the District Secretary. The motion carried.

Dr. Warrick asked for first-time delegates to the district assembly to stand.

Dr. Warrick called for Partial Report #1 of the Ministerial Credentials Report. The report was read by the delegation as it was shown through a projection system. Dr. Warrick called for the adoption of the report. The motion was seconded and the report was adopted.

New pastors were introduced. Dr. Warrick thanked Dr. Wilson for an excellent report that was given in the Sunday evening session of the District Assembly. Dr. John Bowling was asked to escort Mrs. Joan Wilson to the platform where she greeted the assembly. Dr. Warrick asked the DAB to revisit the issue of no salary increases for the last four years for district personnel and then he encouraged lay people to revisit that issue in the local churches for their pastors and staff members as well.

The Nominating Committee report was shown for the delegation to read. Dr. Warrick asked if there were any questions. Questions were addressed. Dr. Warrick then moved for the adoption of the report. There was a second to the motion and it was adopted.

Dr. Heck called for the Board of Tellers #1, those with red stickers, and election secretary, Rev. Andy Combs, to come to the front of the sanctuary. Instructions were given and the ballots for district officers were distributed. Delegates voted and the votes were collected. Dr. Warrick asked the tellers to remain in the sanctuary to receive Ballot #2. A Spanish-speaking delegation that was in the balcony for translation purposes was extended special privilege to remain in the balcony for voting purposes. Dr. Wilson gave further instructions in Spanish for Ballot #1.

Rev. Mike Day, election secretary, came forward with the second board of tellers, those with a blue dot on the back of their name badge. Nomination Ballots for General Assembly Delegates were distributed. The delegation voted and the ballots were then collected. The tellers for both ballots were dismissed to tally the votes.

Dr. Warrick called for the report of Ministerial Credentials. A portion of the report (those who would be ordained as elder or deacon) was read by Rev. Tim Britton and the remaining portion of the report was projected, giving time for the delegation to read the report. Dr. Warrick called for the adoption of the report. It was accepted unanimously. The ordination candidates were asked to stand.

The Report of the Board of Ministerial Studies was projected. The report was read by the delegation and then Dr. Warrick asked if there were any names missing from the list and called for questions. He then called for the adoption of the report. The motion was seconded and the report was adopted.

Dr. Wilson explained the plan for the presentation of the pastor's reports. Each one of the mission areas have been asked to present reports of up to 15 minutes per mission area, beginning with the south mission area. Rev. Jack McCormick Mission Area Assistant invited each of the pastors from the south mission area to come forward and state their name and the name of their church. Ten pastors were present from the South Mission Area. Rev. McCormick verbally shared highlights from the churches and then a video was shown of Work and Witness work done in Costa Rica by members of churches from the south zone that were in Costa Rica in February.

Dr. Warrick then asked for the collection of the Child Sponsorship Registration forms, encouraging each church to participate. He then called for a special offering to go directly to the students who make up the Olivetians. The Olivetians came forward and sang while the offering was being collected.

Dr. Heck made announcements regarding the afternoon session and other items before the start of the Memorial Service. Dr. Wilson announced that the minister's choir will practice during the lunch break, and that a Work and Witness Workshop would be conducted at 12:30 p.m. Rev. Doug Ward and Rev. Deborah Bell were asked to come forward to assist with the Memorial Service. Instructions were given as to how to honor the members of the churches who have died during the past church year. Names of ordained ministers and local church members were then scrolled on the screen. "My Savior First of All" was sung by the congregation.

Dr. Wilson dismissed the delegation for the lunch break.

C. MONDAY AFTERNOON

April 16, 2012 – 1:15 p.m.

The afternoon session opened with a musical package by the Olivetians. Dr. Warrick introduced the President of Olivet Nazarene University, Dr. John Bowling, who would give the annual report of the university. A video showed highlights of the activities of Olivet Nazarene University. Dr. Bowling introduced Dr. Brian Allen, who presented the book "Above All Else" the last 20 years of Baccalaureate sermons preached by Dr. Bowling as a gift to each pastor. Mr. Tony Fightmaster shared information about a program called "Preaching Ambassadors," an opportunity to give ministerial students an opportunity to preach at churches on the Olivet region. The Olivetians introduced themselves and then concluded the report with a song.

Dr. Warrick thanked Dr. Bowling, Dr. Allen and Mr. Fightmaster for the fine report of Olivet Nazarene University.

Board of Tellers #1 and Election Secretary Rev. Andy Combs, distributed ballot #3 for Global SDMI Convention delegates election ballot. The delegation voted and the ballots were collected. Board of Tellers #2 and Election Secretary, Rev. Michael Day distributed ballot #4 for General Assembly delegates election ballot. The delegation voted. The ballots were collected and both boards of tellers were dismissed to tally the votes.

Dr. Edward Heck, Mission Area Assistant, facilitated the pastor's reports from the central mission area by showing a video report from Pastor W. Randy Dodd, pastor of Chicago Heights Church of the Nazarene, sharing creative missional ways to do ministry through a community sports program in their church, encouraging other pastors to find the ways they can impact their own community. Rev. Dodd and his administrative pastor, Don Wilson, spoke briefly following the video report.

Dr. Brian Wilson invited Steven Sickle to share about the partnership between the Costa Rica Norte and Chicago Central Districts.

Dr. Brian Wilson led the congregation in prayer for Dr. Warrick who was taken to the emergency room during the early part of the afternoon session.

Fred Hardy came forward to read the report of the District Advisory Board. Mr. Hardy moved for the adoption of the report. Some questions were raised by the delegation and answered by Mr. Hardy and Dr. Wilson. The delegation voted and the report was adopted.

The Report of the District Finance Committee will be posted on the district web site. Dr. Wilson made some clarification of percentages, allocations, etc. Dr. Wilson moved for the adoption of the report, the delegation voted and the report was adopted.

Mrs. Heidi Taylor, District Treasurer, read her report. She moved for the adoption of the report. Dr. Wilson gave some clarification in regard to the situation regarding the district campground. There was a second and the delegation voted. The report was adopted.

Rev. W. Randy Dodd, Rev. Doug Ward and Suburban pastors were called to the front and introduced. Rev. Doug Ward led the reporting of the pastors of the north suburbs and Rev. W. Randy Dodd led the reporting of the pastors of the south suburbs.

Dr. Wilson called the Chicago Pastors to come to the front and asked each pastor to give one highlight from each congregation from the past year. A video from Chicago First Church was shared.

Dr. Heck reread the results of the lay delegates to the General Assembly for clarification purposes. Dr. Wilson asked if there were any questions before the end of the afternoon assembly session. He also called for a motion to edit the minutes and prepare the district record for publication. There was a second and the motion was adopted.

Dr. Wilson asked Rev. Mike Day, outgoing SDMI president to come forward to pray for incoming SDMI President, Dave Becker. Additionally, Bruce Wilson was asked to pray for incoming NMI President, Carla Lovett. Aaron Gregory and the other NYI presidents were asked to join him on the platform. Dave Ludwig was asked to pray for the NYI Presidents.

Pastors were reminded to pick up their gifts from Publishing House and Olivet Nazarene University.

Dr. Wilson asked for a motion to adjourn the assembly following ordination service. Motion was made, seconded and the motion was adopted.

Dr. Heck made announcements regarding the Ordination Service. The service was dismissed until the time of the ordination service, at 5 PM.

D. ORDINATION SERVICE

APRIL 15, 2012 5 P.M.

The service opened with prelude music by the musicians from the host church. Rev. Kent Pitcher, pastor from Danville Southside Church of the Nazarene prayed for the ordination service.

Dr. Brian Wilson came to the platform to recognize the newly district licensed ministers. He reminded them of their responsibilities and privileges and then prayed for them.

Dr. Wilson read from the Manual regarding the act of ordination in our denomination. He led the congregation in The Apostles' Creed.

Rev. Dave Anderson led the assembly in singing *Called Unto Holiness*. Dr. Edward H. Heck led the ordination candidates into the service during the singing.

Dr. Heck presented the ordination candidates to the assembly and to Dr. Brian E. Wilson for ordination; Hector E. Alfaro, Ryan Leif Hansen, Joseph Michael Lee.

Dr. Wilson addressed the ordination candidates and encouraged them about the ordination process and preparation that God has used to bring them to this point. He asked them several questions about their commitment to the ordination process and to the Church of the Nazarene. They all answered in the affirmative. He welcomed them on behalf of the Church of the Nazarene and congratulated the Chicago Central District in preparing them for this moment.

Paragraphs 401-401.4 from the *Manual* were read by Dr. Frank Moore and Dr. Carl Leth. Second Timothy 4:1-5 was read in English by Dr. Susan Armstrong and in Spanish by Rev. Wilfredo Canales. Rev. Steve Spangenberg read from I Peter 5:1-4.

Special music was provided by the Ministers' Choir, under the direction of Rev. Dave Anderson. Brian Allen sang "I Will Not Forget Thee."

Dr. J.K. Warrick, who was released from the emergency room, read from II Corinthians 5:14-6:2 delivering a message reminding the candidates and pastors that they are ordinary men and women who have been chosen by God to be used in the ministry of reconciliation.

Dr. Warrick asked Dr. Heck to escort the candidates for ordination and their spouses to the altar. The elders were invited to stand behind the candidates in support.

The elders laid hands on Hector E. Alfaro. Dr. Warrick ordained him an elder in the Church of the Nazarene. Rev. Jose Alfaro offered prayer on his behalf.

The elders laid hands on Ryan Leif Hansen. Dr. Warrick ordained him an elder in the Church of the Nazarene. Dr. Ron Dalton offered prayer on his behalf.

The elders laid hands on Joseph Michael Lee. Dr. Warrick ordained him a deacon in the Church of the Nazarene. Rev. Steven Spangenberg offered prayer on his behalf.

A Certificate of Ordination was then presented to each ordinand and Dr. Warrick welcomed them to the order of Elders and Deacon in the Church of the Nazarene reminding them of the confidence that the church has in them for being faithful to the call of the Lord upon their lives.

Dr. Warrick invited the entire congregation to join the ordinands for a reception. The newly ordained elders were then escorted by Dr. and Mrs. Warrick, Dr. and Mrs. Wilson and Dr. and Mrs. Heck to a reception held in their honor.

The 108th Assembly of the Chicago Central District concluded at 6:40 p.m.

A. District Superintendent's Report 2012

Introduction

Dr. Warrick and members of the 108th District Assembly of the Chicago Central District, it is my privilege this evening to present my 15th annual report as superintendent of this fine district. Joan and I are humbled and privileged at the opportunity to serve with you on this mission field. I always look forward to sharing with the district family about the work of God that I observe as we travel the district and visit our pastors and our churches. This report is the report of our pastors and churches, and an expression of the vision the Lord is laying on our hearts. I look forward with great eagerness and anticipation to the message of our general superintendent in the morning, and the reports from our pastors and churches throughout the day tomorrow. It will be a time of great celebration, and we are grateful to Rev. Dave Anderson and the Danville First Church congregation for hosting our assembly this year. This is the Centennial year of Danville First Church, and we are celebrating District Assembly in Danville, after nearly a 50 year absence, to honor them and help them celebrate. The last time District Assembly was held in Danville was 1963, 49 years ago. The District Superintendent was Mark R. Moore, the District Secretary was Fred W. Gibson, and the General Superintendent presiding was Hardy C. Powers. So, good evening Danville! It's good to be back.

I also want to express my appreciation to the members of our District Advisory Board who have invested so much of their time and talent in assisting this district superintendent this year.

Your District Advisory Board includes Pastor Randy Dodd, Pastor Ed Heck, Pastor Jack McCormick, Pastor Kendall Franklin and Pastor Dave Anderson. Dr. Doug Perry, Mrs. Cheryl Seymour, Mr. Karl Tabor, Mr. Fred Hardy and Mr. John Alexander.

I have relied heavily on the help of my Mission Area Assistants, Pastor Jack McCormick for the Southern Mission Area, and Dr. Ed Heck for the Central and South Suburban Mission Area. Prior to his transfer to Nashville First Church, Rev. Kevin Ulmet also served as Mission Area Assistant for the southwest, west and northern suburbs of Chicago. Rev. Tim Mercer helps us with our Asian churches, and Rev. Wilfredo Canales is a significant help with our Hispanic congregations and our Spanish language ministerial training program. The Mission Area system has been a vital and critical part of our district's service to our churches.

Our District Secretary is Dr. Ed Heck, who does very competent work in tracking ministerial transfers during the year, preparing for District Assembly and then compiling the District Journal for electronic publication. This time of year is a very busy one for him. He also holds down a full-time job as

pastor of Kankakee First Church, does some adjunct teaching at Olivet, and serves on the general church's Commission on the Future of the Church as well. We appreciate our District Secretary.

Our District Treasurer is Mrs Heidi Taylor. She is assisted by Mrs. Michelle Thomas, our Financial Secretary, who serves us part-time to help us with our department finances, apportionments, monthly bills, payroll and so much more.

And then, there is my assistant in the DMC, Rev. Edward Peñate, whom you have all come to know and love. He serves our churches with grace and joy. He has a servant's heart, and is extremely talented. When you refer to permanent district ministry center staff, it is essentially Edward and yours truly. This has been another special year for our brother Edward. A year ago I announced that he celebrated 7 years of marriage to his wife Liz, welcomed a new member to the family in their daughter Violeta, and he also completed his M. Div. degree at Nazarene Theological Seminary, graduating in May. He was also ordained as an elder at our 2011 District Assembly. How can you top a year like that? Well, we found a way, as this year we installed him as senior pastor of our North Chicago Church of the Nazarene, where he is doing an outstanding job. We appreciate Edward Peñate so much.

We have had the blessing of occasional volunteer and part-time help on specific projects from Mrs. Sandra Pineda, a district licensed minister herself, and wife of our Summit Spanish senior pastor, Gilmar Pineda. Mrs. Kathy Caldwell, pastor's wife at Gilman, has served as a temporary office assistant to Edward in preparation for our Board of Ministry interviews and District Assembly.

Many others have served on district councils and committees throughout the year. The church is a volunteer organization, and the Chicago Central District boasts some of the best volunteers. We are grateful for the giftedness and passion that each one brings to their role of service on the district. Through their service, and through the ministry of each pastor, associate and layperson in our congregations, we have seen God move in marvelous ways during the past fiscal year. We are deeply appreciative of the leadership of our NYI, NMI and SDMI in the persons of Carla Lovett for NMI, Pastor Michael Day with SDMI, and the multiple presidents of NYI, Aaron Gregory, Bill Koch, Joe Lee, David Ludwig and Enrique Mayen.

A special thank you to my wife, Joan, and our son and daughter, David and Jennifer, and our daughter-in-law Kaylee for their strong support in this ministry.

In January of this year we welcomed Dr. J. K. Warrick as our jurisdictional general superintendent for the next two years, and it has been a joy to become better acquainted with him and his lovely wife, Patty. You will enjoy their ministry among us.

January also marked a turning point for the jurisdictional system in the USA/Canada. Now, all 11 districts of the Olivet/Central USA Educational Region, will share the same general superintendent, rather than having five or six different general superintendents sharing leadership of the educational region. Already this new "single jurisdictional GS" system has provided an opportunity for the 11 district superintendents to be called together for prayer, fellowship and missionally strategic dialogue. I look forward to the difference this change of system will make for our Kingdom work.

I've chosen as the theme of the Assembly this year -- Occupy – Possessing that Which God is Giving Us

You've all heard of the "Occupy" Movement, comprised of people who have decided to create a visible presence in public spaces, to communicate their particular views on the economy and politics. They talk about representing the 99%, and wanting to send a message to the 1%. The world has taken notice of them. So much so that Time magazine identified them among "The Protestors" which Time named as their Person(s) of the Year, and the word "occupy" was given the honor of 2011 Word of the Year by the American Dialectic Society.

Let me make a bit of a disclaimer and clarify that there are a couple of parallels perhaps that we will incorporate into the message tonight, but that my goal is not to advocate any particular political or economic view.

One parallel could be made of the 99 and 1. Christians are certainly not 99% of the world today, but we do have the biblical picture of the shepherd leaving the 99 in the sheepfold and going looking for the 1 that is lost. We certainly want to have that kind of passion and commitment for the lost of our world. They are our responsibility.

And there is a parallel in the creating of a presence in many places, particularly in response to the Great Commission.

My desire tonight is to draw on two passages of Scripture, one from the New Testament and one from the Old, as a framework for our accountability to you in reporting, and as a challenge to the church and district as we begin a new year of ministry together.

My two Scriptures are:

From the New Testament, Acts 1:8 – “But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and to the ends of the earth.” These words of Jesus are closely linked to Matthew 28:19-20, which we know as the Great Commission: **“Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.”**

From the Old Testament, Joshua 1:1-11 -- “Three days from now you will cross the Jordan here to go in and take possession of the land the Lord your God is giving you for your own.”

Both passages, Acts 1:8 and Joshua 1:1-11 are affirming passages. They both use the phrase “you will”. As we read them, we also often read them with a sense of “oughtness”, that this is what we ought to do, because this is what God has in mind for His people. We read these passages as promises, believing that God has plans for us and that He desires to see those plans come to fulfillment. I read these verses today with excitement as well, with the kind of anticipation that the people of God in the wilderness must have felt. Do you remember the context of Joshua chapter 1? Moses is now dead, and the Lord has just spoken to Joshua, the successor to Moses, with these words:

[Read Joshua 1:1-11]

So Joshua, who must have had a bit of an inferiority complex, because the Lord keeps telling him “Be strong and of good courage.”..., Joshua in turn tells his officers, “Go tell the people. Get ready, in three days we will cross over Jordan and take possession of the land the Lord is giving us”. Can you imagine the anticipation!!!

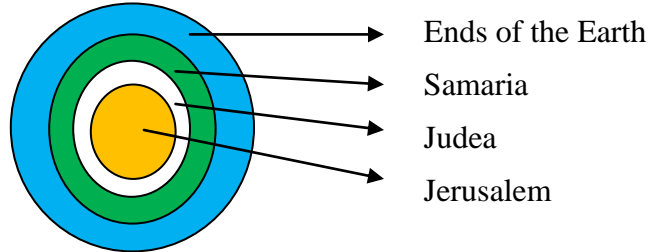
I think it’s important to note here that there is a difference between merely “occupying” and “possessing”. One may occupy space that he/she doesn’t possess. You may be passing through. The location may be on loan to you for a time. But what God has in mind is the kind of occupation that takes possession, that stakes the flag of ownership in the ground, and declares, “This belongs to God and to God’s people.” The mission we are on is a mission of occupying and possessing not only territory but also the hearts of men, women, youth and children in the name of Jesus.

Let me jump back to Acts 1:8 and this idea of Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and the ends of the earth. We obviously need to translate this into our own context. We aren’t physically in Jerusalem. Someone is, be we aren’t. So what does it mean for us to respond to the Great Commission? I want to suggest to you, as biblical scholars and missiologists have pointed out for years, that the picture painted by this biblical expression is one of an ever expanding set of concentric circles. That at the center is Jerusalem, or whatever our local context happens to be, in our case Danville, or wherever your local church is located. Then, our influence expands to a larger area, and then a larger area, until finally we reach all around the world. Keep in mind that the disciples had no concept of the world being round necessarily. It was just a matter of, “go as far as it is possible to go.” To the ends of the earth. Some missiologists have suggested, and rightly so I believe, that Samaria refers to the cultural barriers that the Gospel will overcome, for in Jesus’ day, Jews and Samaritans did not get along. When we go to Samaria, we intentionally cross the cultural barriers, leaving our comfort zone, and declaring, “Christ died for all!” There is certainly something for us to learn about that even today, isn’t there?

I’m fascinated by this concept of Jerusalem and the ends of the earth. Do you realize that what for you is the ends of the earth, is someone else’s Jerusalem? And that they share in the responsibility of sharing the Gospel and that we may be for them “the ends of the earth”. We may see Danville as Jerusalem, and Somalia as the ends of the earth. In Somalia, there may be a believer who sees the population of Somali refugees in Chicago as “the ends of the earth”. I’m so glad we understand that the USA is also a mission field. That realization brings us more in line with the Great Commission than we have ever been before.

But for purposes of tonight, I want to suggest the following:

- Let's understand Jerusalem as our local context.
- Let's allow Judea to represent the Mission Areas on our district and our district as a whole
- Let's allow Samaria to represent our USA/Canada Region
- And let's allow the Ends of the Earth to represent global missions.



Let's take a minute to visit each of these areas, both to report on our progress in our ministry, and to understand the challenge that lies yet ahead for us. In each area, the words of Joshua encourage us "you will take possession of the Land your God is giving you for your own."

Jerusalem – the local church context.

By way of report, we are reporting 62 active churches and missions. The statistical sheet includes inactive churches that are in transition, giving us a total of 73 organized churches.

As those churches proclaimed a Gospel of grace and redemption this year, at least 539 people testified to a conversion experience, as they invited Christ to be Lord of their lives.

256 persons were baptized in our churches this year! That is more than 25 a month, or 6 every week. I love getting texts from pastors, like the one I received today from Pastor Steve Spangenberg of our Naperville Trinity Church: "We just baptized 31 people this morning!" Praise God for these public testimonies to the life-transforming power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Our district membership last year surpassed the 10,000 mark, and continued to climb this year to 10,246, up from 10,137 last year.

Our average weekly worship attendance was 7,519, down from last year's 7,620. A good part of that drop is due, I believe, to the fact that our 10-month year did not include an Easter Sunday, when we normally experience our attendance high for the year. However, we need to work on moving our worship attendance average upward past the 8,000 mark again soon. I believe the Lord will help us incorporate into our worshipping communities those who are being saved.

Along with those who transferred their membership from another Nazarene church, we are reporting that 459 New Nazarenes joined the church. That is outstanding, especially for a 10-month year. That number is up from the 385 of last year.

Our SDMI weekly attendance climbed from 4,519 last year to 4,974 this year. Our gratitude to Pastor Mike Day for his leadership in SDMI these past two years.

Some of our churches are undertaking building projects as they grow – Kankakee Westbrook is building a gymnasium/fellowship hall and upgrading their existing facility. First Korean has been approved to build a new sanctuary to accommodate their growing congregation in Schaumburg. House of Prayer has been in their new facility in Park Forest a year now, and I was privileged to participate in the dedication of that fine facility, which is helping them grow.

Besides our traditional ministry programs, our churches are ministering in creative and helpful ways through programs like Celebrate Recovery, Biker Sundays, Outdoor Recreation Events, Marriage Date Nights and more.

Our Jerusalem is seeing good ministry by our local churches, and we celebrate that. We also recognize there is much yet to do here. Can we get as excited about our local mission field as we do about the global mission field? I believe we can and must.

Before we leave Jerusalem, I want to mention four churches that I call “turn-around” churches. These are churches that were facing a pretty serious crisis, either financially or attendance-wise or morale-wise, and whose health was compromised. They have made a significant turn-around this year and are well on their way back to health and strength. They include: Kankakee Wildwood (Carl Leth), Naperville Trinity (Steven Spangenberg), Danville Cedar Grove (William Wiggins) and Joliet Crystal Lawns (Dave Becker).

May I take a minute just to brag on our pastors? I'd like to ask them to stand. These men and women give themselves daily to prayer, to the study of the word, to the pastoral care of their flock, to the missional challenging of God's people, to the preparation for preaching. They put their God-given gifts at the disposal of the church and the Head of the Church, and often do so with little or no remuneration. They deserve so much more recognition and appreciation than we give them and we don't them justice even tonight. I know you love and appreciate our pastors, but would you just like to express that to them tonight? Thank you, pastors!!! There is no church without the local church, and our pastors are God's chosen servants that challenge us to consider our Jerusalems. They also take us to the broader mission fields.

Judea – our mission areas and district

The Chicago Central District is comprised of 11 and a half counties in northeast Illinois. We have established four geographic Mission Areas as well as cultural areas. The geographic mission areas include the South Mission area, the Central/South Suburban Mission Area, the Suburban Mission Area, and the City of Chicago Mission Area.

We are delighted to be on the South Mission Area this year as we celebrate District Assembly. If you think it's been a long time since we've celebrated District Assembly in Danville, you are right! It's been almost 50 years! And we are here in part to honor and celebrate with Danville First Church as they celebrate their 100th Anniversary of ministry as a local church! Way to go Danville First! The churches of this area work well together, enjoy great fellowship, and organize an annual Holiness Summit that keeps our distinctive message consistently before us.

While our district got her start on the south side of Chicago, this southern area of our district became a second hub of church development for us early on in our history as a district. Not far from here is the town of Olivet, Illinois. Olivet Holiness College, then an independent holiness school, was given to the Chicago Central District because of our identification with, and consistent proclamation of, the holiness message of the Church of the Nazarene. As the District evolved and new districts were created, Olivet became a school governed by a board of trustees with representatives from each of the 11 districts of our current educational region. What is interesting is that the presence of the school seemed to create an ideal environment for the establishment of new churches, and several Nazarene churches were planted in the area, including Olivet, Danville, and other towns nearby. Route 1 was the trade route for taking goods to the markets and ports of the city of Chicago. As that trade grew, towns were established alongside Route 1. Nazarenes moved to those towns and ministered in those towns and established churches in places like Potomac, Hoopston, Milford, Rossville, Watseka, Gilman, Sheldon.

Our Central Mission Area includes Kankakee Country, where we have 14 churches, and 40% of our district membership worships. Here, Olivet on her newer campus continues to be a partner in ministry. I've tried to get Dr. Bowling, Olivet's president to establish a campus in the city of Chicago, so that we might experience the same phenomenon of church planting there, but it's a hard sell.

Our Suburban churches are a diverse lot. From House of Prayer, to Chicago Heights, to Chicago First, to Joliet First, to Elgin, to Mundelein, to North Chicago and West Chicago, the suburbs each have their own story and culture and personality, and every church does as well. No two look alike, but they are all finding ways of impacting their communities for Christ. They speak English, Spanish, Korean, Lao, Mongolian, Arabic and more. Cultural diversity is no longer limited to the big cities, it is found in our suburbs and in the rural parts of our district as well.

In the City of Chicago Mission Area, we celebrated another first this last year. A little over a year ago we organized the Gage Park Church, a daughter church of Chicago Summit Spanish. This year, as

circumstances would play out with the foreclosure of their leased building, the district was able to purchase the building from the bank, and avoided the scenario of the church scrambling for a new place to worship. If you look at the churches on the south side of Chicago that are in permanent building, there is Gage Park, and then the next newest church is 61 years old!!! We haven't done this in 61 years! Take note of the fact that, in our 108-year history as a district, we have never had more than 13 churches in the city of Chicago at any given time. I am hoping and trusting we are turning a corner in church planting in the city.

Our Judea (our mission areas and the district) is our most immediate mission field for church planting. Not just in the city, but in the suburbs, and in the rural counties of our district. When we ask the question, "Where is our work not yet done? The answer must include this area of church planting.

A year ago we organized two new churches. In this abbreviated 10 month fiscal year, we did not formally organize a new church, but we have laid some important groundwork for new works in this new year, and have helped some churches experience a turn-around. Please pray that the Lord would continue to open doors and give us boldness and courage to walk into new territories to occupy and possess them in His name!

Samaria – USA/Canada Region

Our Samaria is the USA/Canada Region. The work at this level is perhaps the least coordinated of the four areas of the Great Commission. This is understandable, for it wasn't until just recently that a regional director role was established for the USA/Canada. We love and pray for our regional director, Dr. Bob Broadbooks, and have pledged our full cooperation in fulfillment of the vision and initiatives he has for our region.

The District Superintendents of our educational region have begun our work together this year with an emphasis on prayer. I believe we are seeing a new day of collaboration and cooperation. We are also seeing some transition in the superintendencies this year on two neighboring districts. Dr. Crawford and Sylvia Howe, are retiring next month from the superintendency of the Northwestern Illinois District. Yesterday, that District Assembly elected Rev. Scott Sherwood as the new superintendent. We express our deep appreciation to the Howes for their leadership and open arms of welcome to the Sherwoods, and look forward to collaborating with them in the mission field which is the State of Illinois. On the Northwest Indiana District, Dr. Leland and Alice Woolery are also retiring next month. Their assembly is yet to be held and we express our deep appreciation to the Wooleries for their leadership of the church.

Ends of the Earth

Let's move on to the ends of the Earth

Our churches have been involved in the Jesus Film, Child Sponsorship, Clean Water Wells, etc.

We have traveled this year to the Philippines, Zambia and other places on Work and Witness.

We are Partnering with the Costa Rica North District in a five-year multi-faceted partnership (more on that in a minute).

The General Board in February authorized entering 3 new fields, bringing to 159 the total world areas in which the Church of the Nazarene is ministering.

We are committed to taking the holiness message to the ends of the earth.

I praise God for the good work done for the Kingdom this year in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and the ends of the earth.

Funding the Occupation

Every occupation effort requires funding of some sort. So let me report on that to you.

The Lord has been good to us this year. Even in a 10-month year, and in this economy, our local congregations were blessed to receive in tithes and offerings \$10,005,920. Praise God! Of that amount, \$486,000 was given to the World Evangelism Fund. An additional \$640,000 was given in 10% Missions Specials, bringing to \$1.1 million the total given to the cause of global missions! That is 11% of our income as a district given to missions!

Just a couple of days ago, we were \$6,000 short of our goal of 100% payment for WEF. I approached 16 churches that had not paid their 100% and asked them to give just a little bit more. Two responded by coming up to their 100% goal, a couple of others added \$1,000 each to get us to our goal. That fact that so many of our churches overpaid their WEF made this possible. Thank you, thank you for your faithfulness.

We gave \$163,780 to the Pensions and Benefits Fund. That is 92% of our goal. We are about \$14,000 short of our goal. I have shared with our pastors already, but let me share with the entire assembly some action taken by the USA National Board.....For 2012-13 the percentage for P&B will be 2.25 % instead of 2%. And EDU will be 2.25% instead of 2.5%

We gave \$201,431 to the EDU Fund. That is 91% of our goal. We are \$24,000 short of our goal.

\$418,422 was given to the DEF. This is 94% of our goal. That is significantly higher than last year's 86% and we are deeply grateful.

The New Year's District Budget -- \$37,000/mo. Income. \$480,000 for the year. This is just slightly higher than our budget 15 years ago.

Last year, the District Assembly Finance Committee included in its report a new paragraph that essentially said that if a church doesn't pay all of its assigned apportionments in full, it is for all intents and purposes being subsidized by those four agencies. So that, if your church did not pay it's P&B apportionment, in effect our retired ministers are subsidizing the local operations of your church. Those dollars are going to your church rather than to men and women who sacrificially gave and ministered for decades, and to whom we have made promises to be a small part of their sustenance in their golden years. I don't know about you, but I can't wrap my head around that picture in any way that justifies it with integrity.

For years, I asked our DAB to complete what was lacking in the WEF, P&B and in the Educational Fund payment, by paying it out of the district operating funds. Instead of investing in new churches, we would pay out whatever it took to get us to 100% for WEF, P&B and EDU, and sometimes we needed to do it for WEF as well. Well, the new formula and the economy have changed things for us. We haven't found ourselves in a position to be able to do that recently. The new formula has meant fewer dollars coming from local churches into the District Evangelism Fund and into the World Evangelism Fund, and both the Global church and the District church have had to make some pretty radical adjustments. Personnel at the GMC has been radically reduced, and we have asked the staff that support the global ministries of our denomination to do more with less. Salaries were frozen, our GSs voluntarily reverted to the salary levels of several years prior, and a year ago, we sent out no new missionaries. Praise God, the adjustments, and some pretty miraculous stories of God's provisions (like the way God helped us get to 100% for WEF last year at assembly) this year allowed the church to send out a wonderful group of new missionaries, including two from our very own district – Todd and Brittany Leslie.

The DAB has worked diligently with me over the last few years to be as responsible as we can be with our finances. The new formula, and the impact of the economy have created challenges for us. We were astute enough to see the changes coming and got an early start on making adjustments, for which I am very thankful. Through attrition, we eliminated one staff position in the district office. Salaries have been frozen for the past four years [Note, the DAB has graciously insisted each year that the DS take an increase, but he has refused each year. The GS has instructed the DS that he is to accept the next increase offered.]. Our SDMI, NYI and NMI Ministries are receiving less from the District Operating Budget for their annual ministry budgets. We have reduced our office lease expense to one third of what it was before, by reducing our space and sharing the remaining space with another Christian not-for-profit organization. We have realized we cannot afford to hang on to vacant church buildings, insuring and maintaining them, waiting for something to happen there. We are promoting church planting and pastoral ministry, more often than not as a bi-vocational endeavor, and are looking for entrepreneurs who can catch a vision for starting churches without requiring significant district financial investment.

Along with the adjustments the general and district church have made and are making, we need to remember that the new formula is requesting fewer dollars from the local church, which makes it imperative that every church really do its very best to pay its full fair share. Thank you for doing that.

Putting it all together:

Well let me bring us in for landing. The challenge is Occupy—Possessing the Which God is Giving Us. So, what would that look like for a local church?

My vision for our local churches is that we would have a clear sense of our identity as a gathered people and as a sent people. That we would understand we exist not just for our own benefit, but that we are mission outposts, and full partners with God and with each other, in the mission of Jesus the Nazarene; that this partnership with God would find us embracing both the commission and the promise. The commission to go into our Jerusalem, our Judea, Samaria and to the ends of the earth (to all nations), occupying and possessing that which God is giving His church.

In our Jerusalems I see us intentionally seeking a more accurate understanding of our local context and the needs of our communities, and being the presence of transforming grace. We will be involved in Gospel proclamation certainly, and discipleship of believers, but we will also be in the food pantries and clinics, in our schools and government agencies, supporting crisis pregnancy centers and counseling services, providing job training, and GED and ESL/EFL classes, and the list goes on and on. We are the ambassadors of Jesus in our neighborhoods. Let's make our church buildings immaculate and pristine, because they represent Jesus. But let's also make our lives a testimony to Perfect Love lived out in our local context. Let's occupy our Jerusalems. Let's win Danville for Jesus. Let's win Potomac for Jesus. Let's win Mundelein for Jesus. Let's win Kankakee for Jesus. Let's win Chicago for Jesus. Let's Occupy Jerusalem.

In our Judeas I see our local churches partnering with one another to strategically plan to advance against the enemy in a larger geographical area, both in our district mission areas and across the district. I applaud the consistency of our Southern Mission Area and our Joliet churches to annually host a Holiness Summit. The suburban churches, the Chicago churches, the Hispanic churches, the Korean churches, the Arabic churches need to do the same, and need to begin soon. Our mission area pastors need to take the lead in identifying communities nearby where a missional outpost needs to be started.

Don't wait for someone else to plant the new work. You do it. Pastor, if you prepare a sermon a week, why not preach it twice or three times in different places? Sunday School teacher, if you prepared a Bible lesson this week, why not teach it twice? The concept of the church circuit may sound old fashioned, but it is a very practical way of leveraging existing resources to extend the work of the church. We call it the "multi-site" model these days. In our Judea, I see every church, at some point in the next five years, being a part of a church planting effort. It may be as a mother church where your church has sole responsibility for the effort, or it may be as a sponsor church, where you share the responsibility with other churches.

I want to introduce you to a resource called DCPI, Dynamic Church Planting International. Similar to NewStart or New Church Specialties, with some of you are familiar with, the Church of the Nazarene has entered a strategic partnership with DCPI, in a similar way that we partner with the Jesus Film. DCPI provides free church planting curriculum, and the Church of the Nazarene provides the personnel. There are currently three tracks for training in DCPI. Church Planting Essentials (CPE), Churches Planting Churches (CPC), and Becoming a Mentor (BAM). During this fiscal year we will be offering training on our district, both in English and Spanish. Over the next three years, my expectation is that every pastor will have taken at least one of these curriculum training tracks. A three day commitment is required. I would expect our Mission Area Assistants to become Certified Trainers. And every pastor and board will be asked the question, "What is your plan for being involved in church planting." We will recruit bi-vocational church planters and leverage the resources of existing congregation to multiply the mission outposts on our district.

In the month of May, Lauren and Kourtney Seaman will be arriving in Chicago as bi-vocational church planters, with a sense of being called of God to occupy and possess the Lincoln Park neighborhood for Christ. We will be setting up an "urban missionary" deputation tour for them and we encourage you to invite them to your church and support and encourage them in this endeavor.

The methods for church planting will vary, but the call and the need remain constant. We are committed to occupying and possessing our Judea.

In our Samaria, I envision us becoming aware of the ways in which we can influence the common mission of the Church of the Nazarene in the USA/Canada region. We have to get past a sense that district boundary lines are somehow an obstacle to our participation in what God is doing across North America. I love the fact that our NMI and NYI are partnering in the Refresh project in Toronto, Canada, painting homes and apartments of government housing dwellers. I love the fact that from our district we have the Krestels serving with the First Nation peoples of New Mexico and Arizona. Joliet First Church this year took a team out west to serve. I love the fact that several of our congregations have sent teams to Indianapolis, Indiana to serve at Shepherd Community Church's urban ministry center. We are occupying and possessing our Samaria, and greater understanding of the need will open opportunities for greater influence for the Kingdom in this context as well. Your church needs to be involved in these efforts. Pastor, you lead the way and make sure there is a plan to do so.

And then, there's the ends of the earth. Yesterday, our NMI, NYI and SDMI Conventions were held simultaneously at College Church. It was a great day!! It was so neat to see all three ministries sharing a sense of common mission, and realizing we are a team, with a common goal. During our plenary sessions we were blessed to hear our own missionaries, the Leslies, share about the work they are doing in the Africa Region. We celebrated the other active missionaries who call Chicago Central their home district. We celebrated the fact that the Church of the Nazarene is now in 159 world areas. Every year we make advances in occupying our world with the Gospel. Our District NMI has been very active. Yesterday we heard reports of Work and Witness trips to the Philippines and Zambia conducted this past year.

Our Costa Rica Partnership continues to gain strength. In November, the first Work and Witness team, from Chicago First Church, travelled to Liberia, Costa Rica, to begin pouring the footers and laying the first rows of blocks on the new parsonage, classrooms and multi-use facility at the Liberia Central Church. They were followed by teams from Kankakee First, Manteno and the South Mission Area. One more team is needed to put the finishing touches on this project this coming October or November. This Saturday a team from our Mundelein church will be traveling to Poas. In June and July, teams from Chicago First and Kankakee First will be traveling to Los Chiles to build a new parsonage and classrooms. I understand Potomac is planning a team, and College Church will be participating. I believe every church can be involved in some way. At our last Assembly, DS Johnny Calvo was with us and brought greetings and shared his vision for his district. I had the privilege of returning the favor in February and being present at the Costa Rica Norte District Assembly, celebrated on the side of the Poas volcano. In anticipation of our assembly this year, we received a nice letter of greeting from DS Johnny Calvo, indicating that they are praying for us and expressing appreciation for the partnership we have with them. God is up to something special in Costa Rica. What a privilege to join Him there and be a part of it.

Of course, our global involvement is not limited to Costa Rica. We have committed to a second Work and Witness trip to the Philippines as part our educational region's project to complete the new chapel on the campus of Asia Pacific Nazarene Theological Seminary. Churches that have missionaries serving in other areas will have a very special interest in those fields as well. Every church should have a missionary visit their local church at least once or twice a year to encourage and inspire your people to engage in occupying the ends of the earth. The Great Commission, given by our Lord in Jerusalem 2000 years ago, has influenced and motivated the Church of Jesus Christ to pioneer new work in new lands, to go into places often inhospitable and into life-threatening situations. The Great Commission has influenced missionaries to come to this land with the Gospel. We too are commissioned to make our missional effort local, district-wide, regional and global by going from Jerusalem to Judea to Samaria and to the ends of the earth.

We are also told that we will be going into the land and possessing it, because God is giving it to us!!! That takes a load off. It is after all, His church!! He has the plan, He desires to Partner with Us. He gives us His promises as His assurance that what He envisions, will come to pass. How exciting is that?

So, what are we waiting for? Let's cross our Jordan, and let's go occupy and possess that which God is giving us.

1. The Stewardship of Christ-like Disciples

We, your Finance Committee, believe stewardship is a vital ingredient of Christ-like discipleship. We further believe obedience is necessary to Christ’s command – to go, to be, and to do. This report reflects:

- Faith – in God and in the members of the Chicago Central District.
- Missional Planning – while some funds will go to maintenance ministries, the majority of our funding is designated for evangelism, discipleship and church planting efforts.
- Responsibility -- to God and to you who consistently support the local church.
- Fairness – budget apportionments are assigned in equitable fashion (equal sacrifice, not equal amounts) and matching funds are made available in a manner consistent with the financial strength of the local church.
- Appreciation – the record of faithful and generous giving by Chicago Central District Nazarenes is a cause for rejoicing.

We acknowledge that managing, disbursing, and accounting of funds given to the building of God’s kingdom is a matter deserving our most prayerful planning. After careful consideration, we submit the following recommendations:

2. Funding the Mission through the “Tithe and Offering” Concept

Throughout the year, in response to the Great Commission and the Great Commandment, the local churches of the Chicago Central District contribute corporately to ministries and to the life of the church outside of the local context. Contributions are made to four separate funds with specific purposes reflected in the names of the funds:

- The World Evangelism Fund – This fund helps make possible the global evangelistic work of the church in 159 world areas, supporting missionaries, schools, hospitals, clinics, compassionate ministries, as well as regional and Global Ministry Center (GMC) operations.

- The Pensions and Benefits Fund – This fund helps fulfill the promises made to our retired ministers, evangelists, and other clergy, of a basic retirement benefit.
- The Educational Fund – This fund provides scholarships for Nazarene students at Olivet Nazarene University.
- The District Evangelism Fund – This fund helps make possible the evangelistic work of the church in 11 ½ counties of northeast Illinois, supporting the planting of new congregations, ministerial training, missional partnerships with local churches, District Ministry Center operations and our district support personnel.

In addition, “Ten Percent Approved Missions Special” offerings are often taken for special purposes such as LINKS, Alabaster, Missionary Deputation, Jesus Film/Harvest Partners, Work and Witness, and more. Annual offerings are also received for the support of Nazarene Bible College and Nazarene Theological Seminary

Monies sent for the WEF and P&B Fund are sent to the Global Treasurer’s Office. Monies for the DEF and Educational Funds are sent to the District Treasurer. Monies for NBC and NTS are sent directly to those institutions.

In order for churches to equally share the responsibility for funding the mission of the church and for planning and communication purposes, the concept of “a tithe and offering” is used to determine the amount assigned to each church. Just as the member of the local church would give a tithe and offerings to his local church, the local church in turn gives a tithe and offering for the broader ministries of the church. Within this “tithe and offering” concept, the “tithe” provides funds for three of the four funds listed above (WEF, P&B and Educational). The “offering” provides funds for the District Evangelism Fund [Note that the designation “offering” does not imply “optional”, it simply differentiates this percentage from the “tithe”].

The “tithe” is further specifically allocated. At the 2009 meeting of the General Board, the global church adopted a uniform percentage for giving to the WEF by all local churches of the Nazarene – 5.5%. In conjunction with that decision, the USA national board has adopted 2.25% for Pensions and Benefits and 2.25% for the Educational Fund. These three percentages total 10%, the commonly accepted standard percentage for the practice of tithing in the church.

Since every district is unique, with unique financial needs, the percentage to be given to the District Evangelism Fund is established by each individual district. This “offering” percentage on the district is to be established by the District Finance Committee, upon recommendation by the District Superintendent and District Advisory Board, for approval by the District Assembly. On the Chicago Central District, this percentage is hereby established at 5% for the 2012-13 fiscal year, to be reviewed on an annual basis by the District Superintendent, the District Advisory Board and the District Finance Committee.

3. Estimating Allocations under the “Tithe and Offering” Concept

The “tithe and offering” is given on the basis of the current month’s income in the local church. Therefore, the actual dollar figure for allocations cannot be precisely established at the outset of the fiscal year. However, an estimate can be made in the following way.

Project the total income of your local church. Income is defined as anything for which your church could issue a charitable contribution receipt, including designated giving to special projects. It does not include rental income (as from a church school), or pass-through monies (such as registration monies for summer camps).

Deduct from the total income the amount you project the church will give to the WEF and Ten Percent Approved Missions Specials during the current year. This yields a “Net Base”. Then, multiply that Net Base by the percentages for each fund, indicated below. This will yield the annual amounts you may use as estimates:

- The World Evangelism Fund: Net Base x 5.5% = _____
- The Pensions and Benefits Fund: Net Base x 2.25% = _____

- The Educational Fund: Net Base x 2.25% = _____
- The District Evangelism Fund: Net Base x 5.0% = _____

An online calculator is available at www.fundingthemission.org to help you with your calculations. The same website also includes much more detail on the “tithe and offering” concept, other resources and Frequently Asked Questions. The district has also developed an online worksheet and instructions at www.ccdnaz.org to help calculate local apportionments.

It should be noted here, that new works that are not yet organized are expected to begin tithing on their income monthly even as the work begins. District and other subsidy monies are not subject to the tithe. New works that are not yet organized and which have been in existence for less than three years are not expected to participate in the DEF “offering”, but are certainly encouraged to do so as soon as they can.

4. Where and When to Send Monies

Monies should be sent by the local church either weekly, bi-weekly or monthly. This helps fund the various ministries in a timely fashion, and avoids putting the local church in a position where it finds it difficult to “catch up” later in the year.

Monies sent for the WEF and P&B Fund are sent to the Global Treasurer’s Office, PO Box 843116, Kansas City, MO 64184.

Monies for the DEF and Educational Funds are sent to the District Treasurer, PO Box 218, Bourbonnais, IL 60914.

Monies for NBC are received in October and sent directly to Nazarene Bible College, 1111 Academy Park Loop, Colorado Springs, CO 80910.

Monies for NTS are received in January and sent directly to Nazarene Theological Seminary, 1700 East Meyer Boulevard, Kansas City, MO 64131.

Remittance Forms and other resources are available on the global church website www.nazarene.org (access the Global Treasurer’s site) and on the district website www.ccdnaz.org under the Links and Downloads tab.

5. Financial and Operational Recommendations to the Local Church and District

5.1. Regarding the Global Church

- 5.1.1. That the World Evangelism Fund for our district be set at 5.5% of the “Net Base” of the local church.
 - a. Because full payment of the World Evangelism Fund is the lifeline of our World Mission efforts, we urge each local church to give priority to the 100 percent payment of the World Evangelism Fund over other mission specials. A “World Evangelism Church” recognition will be made of local churches that give 5.5% of their income to WEF.
 - b. In support of the General NMI strategy to use overpayment of the WEF to enter new world areas, we encourage our local churches to overpay their WEF. All funds generated from overpayment of WEF by local churches will be directed to efforts at entering new world areas, whether the district reaches 100 percent payment or not. A “World Evangelism Church of Excellence” recognition will be made of local churches that pay 5.7% of their

income for WEF, or who overpay their 5.5% WEF allocation by \$1,500, whichever amount is less.

- c. That each church give at least 10 percent of its income to the World Evangelism Fund and Approved Mission Specials (including District-approved NewStart and Missional Projects). A “Mission 10 Church” recognition will be made of local churches that give 10 percent or more of local church income to WEF and Approved Mission Specials and that also reach giving goals for Pensions and Benefits, educational institutions, and district support.

- 5.1.2. That the Pensions and Benefits Fund be set at 2.25% of the Net Base of the local church.

5.2. Regarding our Educational Institutions

- 5.2.1. That our Olivet Nazarene University Fund be set at 2.25% percent of the Net Base of the local church. The Districts of the Central USA (Olivet) Educational Region strongly recommend that our churches continue to give to the Educational Fund at the 2.5% level originally established by the USA Church in 2010.
- 5.2.2. That each local church participate in matching funds and other development, scholarship and capital campaign programs for Olivet.
- 5.2.3. That each local church receive a special offering for Nazarene Bible College on NBC Sunday in October of each year and for Nazarene Theological Seminary on Seminary Sunday in January of each year. The goal for each of these offerings is \$1 per member on the church membership list.

5.3. Regarding the Chicago Central District

- 5.3.1. That the District Evangelism Fund (the “Offering”) be set at 5% of the Net Base of the local church and that the District Superintendent, District Advisory Board and District Finance Committee annually review this percentage used for funding the district mission.
- 5.3.2. That health insurance for full-time district employees be paid in full from their respective operational budgets.
- 5.3.3. That the Social Security for the full-time district employees be paid and/or reimbursed from their respective operational budgets.
- 5.3.4. That the district superintendent:
 - a. Be granted vacation with pay in accordance with the vacation schedule for full-time ministers, which appears in Section 5.4.2.d.
 - b. Be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the fulfillment of his ministry responsibilities (i.e. superintendents’ conferences, overnight lodging, meals away from home, entertainment of guests on behalf of the district, and occasions representing the district).
 - c. Be granted a sabbatical leave following each seven consecutive years of service on the Chicago Central District, in harmony with D.2.j. below.
- 5.3.5. That any church receiving funds from the District Evangelism Fund shall submit a monthly financial report to the district office.
- 5.3.6. That district boards’ travel reimbursement be the IRS established rate per mile.

- 5.3.7. That annually, at least two weeks prior to the District Assembly, an independent public accountant compile and/or review the books of all treasurers handling district funds, with a full audit conducted at least every four years (2008-9 was the most recent full audit).
- 5.3.8. That the District Advisory Board shall be responsible for reviewing, approving and monitoring all district operational budgets and adjusting funds as necessary. This shall include budgets submitted by the NYI, NMI, and SDMI chairpersons, and the District Superintendent. Budgets shall be approved no later than 30 days before the beginning of the assembly year.
- 5.3.9. That a copy of this report be posted on the district website and e-mailed to all local church treasurers or, if an email address is not readily available for the church treasurer, to the senior pastor of the church, for forwarding to the local treasurer.

5.4. Regarding the Local Church

5.4.1. Relative to accounting for funds:

- a. That each local church include in their income, tithes, offerings, and all other sources of income to the extent it pays local church expenses, including the payment of assigned apportionments and mission specials. For "Funding the Mission" allocation purposes, "income" is defined by the general church as funds for which the church could issue a charitable contribution receipt.
- b. That all pastors be reminded of the *Manual* provisions for the counting and handling of money received (see 2009-2013 *Manual* page 90, par. 136-136.6) and, where possible, use an independent public accountant for auditing financial reports.
- c. That each local church prepare an annual operating budget and send a copy of this budget to the district superintendent no later than March 1, of each year. We encourage churches to refer to the district-prepared sample budgets based on church income (see Appendix B and the district website).

5.4.2. Relative to the senior pastor:

- a. That all pastor's health insurance premiums, deductible, and coinsurance (where possible) be paid by the local church.
- b. That each church provide disability insurance for their pastor through the general church. (Consult the Office of Pensions and Benefits at 1-913-577-0500, ext. 2670)
- c. That each church reimburse the pastor's quarterly social security tax, or an amount equal to the tax as the pastor may elect. Church boards should note that the pastor must pay social security taxes on housing allowance (or fair rental value of the parsonage) and reimbursement of social security taxes, as well as on salaries.
- d. That the following vacation time with full salary be granted for accumulative full-time ministry.

1 through 5 years two weeks of vacation
6 through 10 years..... three weeks of vacation
11 through 20 years..... four weeks of vacation
21 years and over five weeks of vacation

We encourage all pastors to take an annual vacation. Vacation time and compensation shall not accrue from year to year, except through prior, written arrangements made between the pastor and the local church board.

- e. That the local church board give careful consideration to the pastor's financial needs and provide an annual salary review, giving consideration both to cost of living increases and merit increases. The annual cost of living increase is currently estimated at just below 2%.

- f. That the churches participate in the Nazarene Retirement Program (tax-sheltered annuity) for ministers who earn their full livelihood from the ministry. For details write: Board of Pensions, Global Ministry Center, 17001 Prairie Star Parkway, Lenexa, KS 66220.
- g. That each local church pay their pastor's expenses to District Assembly and Conventions, Pastors and Spouses' Retreats, district preachers' meetings and events and General Assembly.
- h. That each church encourage their pastor in continuing education and provide allowance for the purchase of books, journals, and professional materials.
- i. That each church periodically remember the parsonage family with gifts of love and appreciation, and each pastor be given a minimum cash Christmas gift of one week's salary.
- j. That, in accordance with *Manual* 129.10, the church board provide a sabbatical leave for the pastor following each seven consecutive years of service in one congregation. See Appendix A for additional information.

5.4.3. Relative to the associate pastor:

- a. That each church provide an annual salary and benefits review, and appropriate paid vacation, for each associate minister and full-time staff member. Inasmuch as possible, the recommendations relative to the senior pastor should be applied to associate staff as well.
- b. That pastors and church boards are reminded of *Manual* (2009-2013) par. 160, where caution is requested so that the employment of the associate will not "tax the church's financial resources including the payment of all financial apportionments."
- c. That the church board provide a sabbatical leave for the associate pastor, in harmony with 5.4.2.j. above.

5.5.4. Relative to the non-payment of apportionments by the local church

Since the global church, the district church, the regional educational institution, and the ministers' pension program are dependent on the payment of local church apportionments, the local church that does not pay its apportionments in full is, in fact, receiving financial assistance from these entities in the church, by virtue of withholding the funds designated for them at the adoption of this Report of the District Assembly Finance Committee. Said churches will be considered as having met the criteria of Manual paragraph 117 (2009-13 Manual of the Church of the Nazarene), as a church whose pastor "may be appointed or reappointed by the district superintendent, with the consent of the District Advisory Board."

APPENDIX A

Pastoral Sabbaticals

Definition

Sabbatical is an extended period of time intentionally set aside by ministry personnel in pastoral relationships as an occasion for reflection, recreation, and revitalization, unencumbered by their usual and customary responsibilities, and yet still receiving their usual remuneration and benefits. Sabbatical finds expression in study, rest, spiritual retreat, and prayer. Sabbatical is not vacation time, not a sick leave, nor a “special studies” leave.

Motivational Bases for the Local Sabbatical Program

The Sabbatical program is motivated primarily by three factors;

1. We believe the Bible identifies a God-designed cycle of work and rest, as exemplified by the account of creation, the institution of the law of the Sabbath, and the accounts of the life of Christ, in which he took time be alone and to be ministered to by God the Father.
2. Research and the reports of those participating in sabbatical programs give evidence to the multiple benefits of such a program to pastors, their families and their congregations.
3. The *Manual* of the Church of the Nazarene (paragraph 129.10) urges: “In order to encourage a healthy pastoral ministry and the lifelong learning of the pastor, the church board, in consultation with the district superintendent, should provide a sabbatical leave for the pastor following each seven consecutive years of service in one congregation.”

Implementation

1. All senior and associate pastors on the Chicago Central District , who have completed at least seven consecutive years of ministry in their current church assignment, are eligible to participate in the Sabbatical program.
2. The length of time dedicated to sabbaticals, and their design and content, will vary with every church and pastor’s particular situation, and is to be coordinated with the district superintendent.
3. Applications for sabbaticals should be submitted by the local pastor and church board, to the district superintendent, at least 6 months prior to the desired time of sabbatical. The district superintendent will consult with the District Advisory Board and provide an initial response within 4 weeks of the date of submission.
4. There is an expectation of continued service of at least one year following resumption of duties subsequent to the sabbatical.

Guidelines and Ideas

The District Ministry Resource Center has reference material available for pastors and churches to use in designing appropriate sabbatical programs. Application forms, district guidelines and samples of sabbatical proposals will also be available online at the District website: www.ccdnaz.org.

APPENDIX B

Sample Budget

The following sample budget depicts a local congregation that raises \$100,000 in tithes and offerings in 12 months, and which desires to be recognized as a **World Evangelism Church of Excellence**. It meets 100% of its goals for the four Assigned Apportionments, and gives generously to Missions Specials, and participates in our Costa Rica Partnership through Work and Witness. It most likely is a church with a worship attendance of around 90-100. Total giving for others is 16% of the total raised by the church in the year. The difference between a Church like this that pays all its apportionments and a church that pays an additional .2% toward WEF is only \$150.00.

In the sample budget below, the pastor's compensation package represents about 28% of the total budget. As the church reduces its building indebtedness and capital expenditures (while still properly maintaining the church facilities), additional monies are freed up to enhance the pastor's compensation package and/or to begin adding some paid staff and/or additional local ministries.

3. Nominating Committee

Report

We, your Nominating Committee, recommend the following nominations to the District Assembly for election by plurality. To provide clarity for the electing Assembly, we recommend that incumbent members with unexpired terms be listed on the ballot along with the years their terms expire.

District Advisory Board (to be elected by plurality): two laypersons and two clergy: Laypersons (vote for no more than two, who will be elected to a three-year term)-John Alexander, Dan Ferris, Sr., Fred Hardy and Barry Huebner. Lay incumbents who continue to serve are Doug Perry (2014), Cheryl Seymour (2014), and Karl Tabor (2013). Clergy (vote for no more than two, who will serve a three-year term)- W. Randy Dodd, Carl Leth, John T. (Jack) McCormick and Kent Pitcher. Clergy incumbents who continue to serve are David Anderson (2015), Edward H. Heck (2014), and Kendall Franklin (2013).

Olivet Nazarene University Trustees (to be elected by majority): Layperson: (vote for one for a two year term) Fred Hardy and Terry Kochersperger. The incumbent continuing to serve is John Alexander (2013). Clergy: (vote for one) Kendall Franklin and John T. (Jack) McCormick. The incumbent continuing to serve is Edward H. Heck (2013).

SDMI Chairperson (Vote for one, to be elected by majority for a two-year term): Jeff Alexander and David Becker.

SDMI Council Member (to be elected by plurality for a two-year term): One layperson: (vote for no more than one)- Nancy Peeler and LaTreese Bragg. Incumbent lay member of the SDMI Board that continues to serve is Heather Tucker (2013). Incumbent ministerial members of the SDMI Council that continue to serve are Jeff Alexander (2013) and Steven Cook (2013). (In the event that Jeff Alexander is elected SDMI Chair, one ministerial council member would need to be elected, between two names that would be presented at that time.)

The 2010 Nominating Committee recommended all standing committee appointments with terms to expire in 2013, therefore no election action is required by the district assembly this year.

In the election of delegates to the 2013 General Assembly, the Nominating Committee recommends the following procedures:

1. Nomination Ballot- A nomination ballot shall be presented to the district assembly containing six times the number of delegates to be elected- Ministerial (3 to be elected and 18 to be nominated), Lay (4 to be elected and 24 to be nominated).
2. Election Ballot- An election ballot will follow the nomination ballot and contain three times the number of delegates to be elected- Ministerial (3 to be elected from the top 9 of the nomination ballot), Lay (4 to be elected from the top 12 of the nomination ballot).
3. Plurality- Election of delegates on the election ballot will be by plurality vote.
4. Alternates- Alternates will be declared from those not elected on the election ballot in the order of votes received.

In the election of delegates to the 2013 General SDMI Convention, the Nominating Committee recommends the following procedures:

1. Election Ballot- The election ballot will contain three times the number of delegates to be elected- Ministerial (2 to be elected from 6 on ballot), Lay (2 to be elected from the 6 on the ballot).
2. Plurality- Election of delegates on the election ballot will be by plurality vote.
3. Alternates- Alternates will be declared from those not elected on the election ballot in the order of votes received.

VI. DISTRICT DEPARTMENTS

A. NMI CONVENTION

1. Daily Proceedings

Saturday, April 14, 2012

“Occupy – Taking Possession of What God Has Given Us!”

The Plenary session of the combined Conventions – NMI, NYI, and SDMI – opened with worship music led by Fred Meadows. Kendall Franklin, senior pastor of College Church – University Campus, welcomed the convention delegates and guests and led in prayer. Dr. Wilson gave a history of the conventions and how this came to be the first time the conventions were held together.

Dr. Brian Wilson welcomed the President/Director of each of the conventions and gave the order in which they would give their report: Carla Lovett, NMI; Aaron Gregory, NYI; Mike Day, SDMI. Prayer for each President/Director was said by the next person to give their report.

Carla Lovett introduced our missionaries to the pulpit. He shared that his ministry is more like a job than a ministry at times. He then took Acts 1:8 – “You will be my witnesses” as his text. We are given a responsibility, we are called, and we are sent were the points of his devotional talk. He shared the use of the Papyrus, and MP3 player with one gigabyte of memory. It contains the Old and New Testaments in their entirety and is available in 600 languages. SD cards with 140 hours of teaching can also be purchased for use with the Papyrus. The Papyrus including 2 SD cards costs \$72.00. The missionaries need many of these in the area of the world they are working in.

Special music was presented by Tyson Dodd, a student at Olivet, who is a worship leader at College Church – University campus.

A short transition time allowed the three conventions to convene separately.

Carla Lovett welcomed the NMI the delegates and guests to the 88th District NMI Convention of the Chicago Central District. Rev. Tom Nothstine opened the convention with prayer. She introduced Kathy Caldwell, the NMI District Secretary, and Loris Laci, the recording secretary for the convention.

Kathy Caldwell described the contents of the Convention packet (an information sheet of CCD events, an NCM brochure, the report of the district NMI treasurer, LINKS assignment sheet, Standards and Goals sheet, Board of Tellers pool sheet, Nominating Committee report, CCD NMI Award Winning Churches sheet plus a CD containing the NMI Resource book in the local president’s packet) and explained the Convention Evaluation Form.

Carla Lovett made some necessary announcements: missions displays, Crisis Care Kits, NPH orders, and lunch instructions.

Kathy Caldwell organized the convention, explaining who is a member of the NMI Convention, and declared the voting area for the convention to be the center section of the sanctuary. The convention times were set. A motion was made that alternates be seated without the reading of the names to the convention but that the names be checked for accuracy. Motion seconded and carried.

The officers for this convention were introduced as: pages – Jacob Caldwell and Emma Wright; election secretary – Pam Tabor; recording secretary – Loris Laci; photographer – John Story; head usher – John Story; Fred Meadows – music.

Greetings from Dr. Daniel Ketchum, General NMI Director, were given via video. A letter was read from Jennifer Brown, General NMI President and Martha Bean our Central USA Region NMI Representative. Greetings were read from our district missionaries. Greetings will be sent to all of these missionaries and directors.

The second part of Carla Lovett's NMI President's report was given. She began by introducing her district NMI council to the delegates of the convention. Carla honored those churches who had achieved Mission Priority One status. She thanked the local NMI Presidents for their hard work to gain the awards and honor of Mission Priority One. The NMI of the Chicago Central District is a team and we work as a team – we are here to help you!

Dr. Brian Wilson offered a prayer for Carla Lovett and a rising vote to accept the report of the President was received.

A gift was presented by Debbie Hendrick to Carla Lovett from the District NMI Council.

Dr. Brian Wilson called for the reading of the nominating committee report for the election of the NMI President, Vice-President, and Treasurer and the delegates to the General Assembly in Indianapolis. A motion was made and seconded to accept the report. Motion carried.

The names of the Board of Tellers #1 were called. The ballots were distributed to the tellers by Pam Tabor, the election secretary, and instructions were given by Dr. Wilson regarding the ballot. The ballot instructions were translated into Spanish by Dr. Brian Wilson. Dr. Wilson prayed before the voting began.

Sandra Story presented the District NMI Treasurer's report. A self-audit of the report was done by the Executive Council. A regular audit of the books will be done in June. Sandra Story made the motion to accept the report, there was a second, and the motion carried.

Board of Tellers #2 was called for the ballot to elect the delegates to General Assembly in Indianapolis. An explanation was given as to why there were two groups on the ballot – column one are the first time delegates or under 50 and column two are those who have served as delegates before or over 50. Election secretary, Sandy Godwin, passed the ballots to the tellers who then served the delegates. Voting was declared closed and the tellers were dismissed to count the ballots.

Rev. Kent Pitcher explained that instead of a gift to the pastors and presidents, a gift in the amount that would have been spent was given to the Costa Rica North District in the form of books.

Carla Lovett made some announcements and reminders before the delegates were dismissed for lunch.

Paul Caldwell prayed for lunch.

Kathy Caldwell read the results of the ballot for the election of the NMI President, Vice-President, and Treasurer. The election of Carla Lovett as President, of Debbie Hendrick as Vice-President, and Sandra Story as Treasurer, was declared.

The election of the following as delegates to the General Assembly was declared: in the first-time under 50 category – Kathy Caldwell, Janice Carlson, Ralph Goodwin, Rev. Ho Kyung Kwak, and Edward Penate; in the been a delegate before and over 50 category – Deborah Hendrick, Andy Holmgren, Ken Silvers, Sandra Story, and Joan Wilson.

Reports were given: Prayer Report - Tammy Chenoweth; Education Report - Debbie Hendrick - coordinator, Lauralee Nothstine – deputation, Christy Johnson – webmaster (report given by Carla Lovett), LINKS – Janice Carlson, Work and Witness – Kathy Yanchik, Ken Silvers, Brian Wilson; Giving Report - Kathy Yanchick, coordinator, WEF – Paul Caldwell, Memorial Roll and Missionary Health Care – William Bell. Rev. Bell presented the Memorial Roll via a PowerPoint then had prayer. A CCKS skit was presented by Karen Ruthenbeck and Kent Pitcher. Buddy Plan Offering – Kathy Yanchik. An offering was received for the Buddy Plan. Daron and Joy Nance sang *It Is Well with My Soul* as the offering was being taken. Discipleship Report - Ralph Goodwin – coordinator, Children's Jamboree – Elizabeth Hespell. Sandra Pineda is the Spanish liaison to the district and spoke to the Hispanic delegates to say she is there for them.

Kathy Caldwell explained the Standards and Goals report and moved for approval. There was a second. The motion carried.

Carla Lovett extended an invitation to anyone who wanted to get involved in the NMI Council. She gave some final instructions.

Rev. Edward Penate closed the session in prayer.

The closing plenary session convened all three conventions. The session opened with two special music numbers by Olivet's Proclamation Gospel Choir led by Jasper Taylor.

Each Ministry President/Chair gave their final thoughts and challenges to the combined convention. Carla Lovett, NMI President, announced that \$2029 was received in the Buddy Plan offering. She encouraged us to become FAT disciples – Faithful, Available, and Teachable. Aaron Gregory, NYI President, shared election results for NYI CCD representatives and General NYI Convention delegates. He challenged us to live every day of our lives for Jesus. Mike Day, SDMI Chair, gave some announcements of importance to Sunday School and challenged us to renew our Sunday Schools through many avenues. Mike Day resigned as the SDMI Chair, stating that after many tours of duty with the military, Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome was causing him to make his decision.

Our Missionary gave her testimony to conclude our convention. She told of the people in her life – Sunday School teachers, NYI leaders, missionaries, and faithful members of her congregation – that helped her become the person she is. She told of being a Language Arts teacher and having to sit through IEP (Individualized Education Program) meetings for her students. She said that God has an IEP for every one of us. God has your plan in His hand. The question we will have to answer – Did you do it well?

Daron and Joy Nance sang *I've Just Seen Jesus* as a deputation offering for the missionaries was taken.

Dr. Wilson dismissed the convention.

2. NMI President's Report

Dr. Brian Wilson, District Superintendent, Council members, visiting missionaries, delegates and friends

Good morning! Greetings!

My name is Carla Lovett and I want to join Dr. Wilson in welcoming you to the 1st Joint NMI/NYI/SDMI District Convention – and to the 88th NMI Convention of the Chicago Central District!

We are so glad you are here!

To our Korean brothers & sisters (Korean brothers and sisters, Hello! We are glad to see you.):

**Hangoohk hyongjay yorubun,
anyoung ha shim nee ka!
Pangap soom nee da.**

Y a nuestros hermanos hispanos en Cristo – Buenos días! Bienvenidos a nuestra Convención Distrital Unida! Dios los bendiga – es un gusto para nosotros tenerle aquí!

I want to begin by telling you a story, a story about Zhana Georgieva. Zhana happens to be the current NYI President for the Bulgaria District. She's also a school teacher and church planter. Before that, Zhana was an NCM Coordinator (for Bulgaria) and before that, she was a college student majoring in Chemistry and serving as an NYI representative for Southeast Europe. But even before all that, Zhana was the leader of the Young Atheists Club at her high school.

So, how did Zhana go from being the leader of the Young Atheists Club at her high school to being the District NYI President for Bulgaria?

Well, you see, Zhana had a grandmother – not any grandmother, but a leader in an underground church who twice went to prison under the Soviet regime for her religious activities. This grandmother prayed and fasted for Zhana unceasingly and when Zhana was 17 years old she accepted Christ as her Savior.

But this persistent grandmother is not the only reason why Zhana became the NYI President of Bulgaria. It's also because Zhana said "never" to God. We all know what happens when we say "never" to God, and although Zhana did not know it then, that pivotal decision put her on a life-changing trajectory.

So, what did Zhana say she would "never" do?

- A. Never live in a big city.
- B. Never work with gypsies.
- C. Never learn English.
- D. Never have tea with a stranger.

Text in answer (# omitted here) – have 30 seconds. ☺

Everyone all set? Great! Ready for the answer? Ready to hear what it was that Zhana said she would "never" do? Wonderful! But, you'll have to wait. I'll tell you the results of your voting and you'll get to hear the rest of Zhana's story, but not until this afternoon. Come back for the plenary session at 3pm and I'll tell you everything then. ☺

In the meantime, I want to tell you another story, one with which I'm sure you are mostly familiar. On September 17, 2011, 1000 protesters marched through the streets of New York waving signs proclaiming "We are the 99%". They landed at Zuccotti Park which they subsequently occupied for the next several months, setting up camp, organizing their demands, and carrying out demonstrations.

Their concerns were legitimate – “unemployment rate, household debt, student loans, lack of prospects for people graduating from college, and foreclosures” and their cause appealed to many. (Shannon Bond, *Financial Times*) By the middle of October the Occupy Movement had spread to some 600 communities in the United States, to over 95 cities in 82 other countries, and to every continent on the globe. (Wikipedia.com)

Princeton University philosopher Cornel West described the movement as a “democratic awakening”. And as an ultimate example of the success of the movement, the American Dialect Society proclaimed “occupy” as the Word of the Year for 2011. (ADS website)

Well, guess what? The Chicago Central District NMI has done a little “occupying” of its own this past year! I think we all know the Mission Statement of the Church of the Nazarene:

“Make Christlike Disciples in the Nations”

As we know, this comes straight from Acts 1:8 which states, “...be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.”

Think about it – this is an “occupation” verse!
= “Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, the ends of the earth” = geographical locations
= and “be my witnesses!” = a task that to be completed requires our presence

So, as it turns out, we have our own biblical and denominational mandate to “occupy”, and on the Chicago Central District, we did! We really took this verse to heart this past year, and were quite busy “occupying” our Jerusalems, Judeas, and Samarias, and even the “ends of the earth” for missions!

I’ll share many more details during our separate NMI Convention, but let me just give you a small glimpse here of all that we accomplished this past year:

1. First, see all of the individuals wearing lanyards and various white, gold, and blue ribbons? These are the missionary presidents of local churches who led award-winning NMI programs this past year. So, when you come across someone all beribboned, congratulate them – they definitely deserve it!
2. Second, let’s talk about WEF – the World Evangelism Fund. The entire, global Church of the Nazarene raised a little over \$38 million for the World Evangelism Fund.
 - 1.25% (\$481,000) of that came from us. (I know, being a part of the 1% normally has bad connotations, but in this case, it’s wonderful!)Now, 70% of all Nazarene districts in the USA & Canada paid their WEF in full – so, the question I know you are all dying to ask is, are we among that 70%? Did we also manage to pay our WEF in full? What do you think?
 - Praise the Lord, we did! We are among that 70%! – which is an even better number than the 1%!
3. In total – including 10% Giving, Approved Mission Specials (2.5% (\$640,000) of the almost \$25 million raised globally came from us), other Global Interests, etc. – our district raised over \$1.1 million for missions. Over \$1 million given to “occupy” the world for Christ and the gospel – absolutely amazing!! Praise the Lord!
4. Besides giving, the denomination deployed 758 Work & Witness teams, at an average of 15 teams per week and 1.7 teams per district. Guess how many we sent? 8! 4x the denominational average!
 - And when we say we “occupied” the “ends of the earth”, we really mean it when it comes to some of the places our teams went! If you went on one of these W&W teams, and you

are here today, I want you to give a “shout out” when I call out the name of your team (for those of you over 40, that means give a “cheer”):

- Philippines (APNTS District trip)
- Zambia (Chicago Heights et al)
- Prairie Lakes (Joliet 1st, White River Comp. Center, teen trip)
- Southwest Native America District (Lighthouse Community)
- And of course, Costa Rica North!
- I also want to make mention of Chicago First and their team leaving today for Haiti – let’s make sure we keep them in our prayers.

5. I can’t end before saying a word about Crisis Care Kits. Seen the trailer? Pretty neat, don’t you think?! Last year, Nazarene churches in the US & Canada sent 47,500 CCKs to disaster areas around the world, including the United States. I’m not sure how many we sent last year, but I can say we’re sending a boatload (well, trailer load) this year! We’re hoping for 1200 – will be great to see what happens today.

This highlights just a little of what the Chicago Central District did this past year. And although we mentioned Approved Mission Specials, it doesn’t really do justice to all of the Alabaster, World Mission Broadcast, Deputation, Jesus Film, Easter, and Thanksgiving offerings you held.

Alabaster:	41 churches
World Mission Broadcast:	27 churches
Deputation:	35 churches
Jesus Film:	11 churches
Compassionate Ministries:	37 churches
Missionary Health Care:	27 churches
LINKS:	37 churches

Or to the countless Crisis Care Kits and School Pal-Paks you packed. Or to the names of beloved saints you placed on the Memorial Roll, or to whom you gave Distinguished Service Awards, or Gifts from the Heart. Or to the children you brought to the missions jamboree and children’s camp or to the teens you are sending to Toronto in July.

We also haven’t mentioned our LINKS missionaries – adopted members of our district for 2 years each and with whom we celebrate Christmases, birthdays, and anniversaries regardless of distance.

And we never give enough attention to the myriad ways in which we are involved in missions in our own local communities – in our “occupation”, if you will, of our Jerusalems and Judeas – the Danvilles and Waukegans, the Paxtons and Bradleys, the Mantenos and Mundeleins, the Lombards and Living Waters of the Chicago Central District.

Through homeless shelters and food banks, soup kitchens and clothing drives, free coffee and free yard work, and in schools and nursing homes, parks and playgrounds – in all of these and many more, you have been witnesses. Many of these are not officially recognized by Kansas City as explicitly Nazarene projects, but we all know they are just as important.

Regardless of any kind of denominational recognition, you “occupied” for the sake of Christ and His Kingdom, and for that I say, “Praise the Lord!”

Okay, I could go on all day about missions and NMI, but I’ll stop here for now. And don’t forget – if you want to hear the results of the voting and what it was Zhana said she would “never” do, come back at 3pm this afternoon to find out!

So, what did Zhana say she would “never” do?

Here are the answers you gave:

- A. Never live in a big city.
- B. Never work with gypsies.
- C. Never learn English.
- D. Never have tea with a stranger.

And here is the rest of the story:

After Zhana became a Christian, she met Nazarene missionaries Jay and Teanna and began to help them with various compassionate ministry projects. Well, we all know God works in mysterious ways, and one project they asked her to take on was a government school... for gypsies.... that was to be shut down because it needed a new stove and because it did not have enough money to buy wood during the winter. Although Zhana had always said she would “never” work with gypsies, this great need tugged at her heart.

Zhana persuaded Nazarene churches throughout all of Europe to send money for a new stove and firewood, and the school was able to remain open.

God was not through with Zhana and the gypsies, however. Zhana began building a relationship with the school staff. She soon discovered that 80% of the children lived in extremely difficult family situations with parents in prison, rampant infidelity, domestic violence, and poor sanitary conditions. As a result, they rarely came to school.

So, Zhana began a weekly Bible class for the students and the response was tremendous. Because the children were interested in the Bible stories, they didn’t want to miss school. Because they wanted to be able to read the stories on their own, literacy rates increased. Because the parents saw the great improvement in their children, they asked Zhana to do something for the adults as well. And that is how Zhana became a school teacher and a church planter.

From the leader of a Young Atheists Club to the leader of a Bible Class. From a new convert to a Nazarene leader. From saying “never” to God to saying “never regret obedience to God”. What an amazing transformation in Zhana’s life! (loosely adapted from *Engage Magazine*)

Why did I share this story? For everyone, and especially for our NYIers. I have met Zhana and she’s an awesome person doing an incredible work for the Church of the Nazarene and for the kingdom of God. So, here is what I ask of you – that you become FAT – FAT? FAT?! Yes, FAT. And why not? We Americans are good at it! ☺ However, what I mean here is “Faithful, Available, and Teachable”. If you do, who knows to what or to where God will call you? If you become FAT – “Faithful, Available, and Teachable” – you quite possibly could become the next Zhana.

Now, remember all the things I mentioned this morning about the Occupy Movement and the 2011 Word of the Year and the Church of the Nazarene mission statement and Acts 1:8, etc.? Well, there were a couple of reasons why I did.

First, it's because "occupy" is not just our biblical and denominational mandate (you know, Acts 1:8 and "Make Christlike Disciples in all the Nations"). It's also our district assembly theme for this year. We have been given a mandate from the Chicago Central District to "Occupy – Take Possession of that which God is giving us!" So all by itself, that's a good reason.

But the second reason why I brought up the Occupy Movement is because of something the chairman (Ben Zimmer, language columnist for the *Boston Globe*) of the American Dialect Society committee said when giving the 2011 award to the word "occupy". He said, and think of the poignancy,

"It's a very old word, but over the course of just a few months it took on another life and moved in new and unexpected directions, thanks to a national and global movement. The movement itself was powered by the word."

Think about that – "The movement...was powered by the word." You know, as Christians, we know something about being powered by the Word. We also know about Jesus Christ, the Son of God who took on another life and moved in new and unexpected directions, creating a national and global movement of which we are the blessed beneficiaries.

So, what would happen if we were to become just as powered as the Occupy Movement but by the Word of God? What might happen to Nazarene Missions if the Chicago Central District were to have a "spiritual awakening" just like their "democratic awakening"?

I know, this sounds like a lot of rhetoric and you're beginning to think I'm about ready to announce some grandiose and entirely unrealistic plan that in a year's time we will find was a complete failure. Nope, I'm not.

What I am asking is for each of us to remember a time when we had the same vigor and conviction and passion for Christ and the gospel as the members of the Occupy Movement have for their cause. Maybe we have it right now, and maybe we haven't had it for years. Whenever it was, remember the unspeakable, unquenchable, unstoppable joy we felt and the overabundance of love we had for everyone and everything. Nothing could stifle it!

So, no, I'm not announcing any grandiose plans – I'm just asking each of us to find that place and "occupy" it once again. Whatever it takes, get back that unquenchable joy and that abundance of love. We need it more than anything, as does our broken and hurt and lost and dying world. They are desperately waiting for us to take the first step.

Can I ask our district NMI council to please stand?

I present to you your 2012-2013 District NMI Council. We covet your prayers as we lead you, and know that we will be praying constantly for you. Join us, will you? Become powered by the Word! Together, let's move our district into new and unexpected and, dare I say, glorious directions!!

Also in July, Indian Lake Nazarene Camp Ground hosted 180 kids Campers led by Rev. Jessica Karuchit. Many of our children left camp tired but closer to God because of the dedicated efforts of so many volunteers.

Throughout the fall and winter, Mr. Karl Tabor led our Children's Bible Quizzing to new heights. Can we do anything more important than planting God's word into the hearts of our children? Thanks to Karl and the many volunteers that has made Bible Quizzing a smashing success.

October 28th – 30th brought three days of intense workshops for local church SDMI leaders and teachers. Six workshops were provided including, "Young Adult Ministries" led by Heather Tucker, "Resources for Children's Ministries" led by Sandra Pineda, "First Impressions for Guest" led by Rev. Cindi Schimmelpfennig and Rev. Debbie Reiniche, "The Master's Plan of Discipleship" led by Rev. Steve Cook, a panel discussion on "Kid's Ministries Options" and "Recruiting & Keeping Volunteers" led by Rev. Debbie Reiniche and Rev. Cindi Schimmelpfennig.

This was an effort to provide workshops at three location at three different times to make it easier for our leaders and teachers to receive the training they requested. A special thanks to Rev. Jose Alfaro and Rev. David Anderson for opening up their churches to this vital ministry. To my knowledge this is the first time District workshops were provided at a Spanish Church specifically for our Spanish leaders and teachers.

November, as always, saw a wonderful gathering of our “Seasoned Saints” to enjoy a time of fellowship, food and worship. Once again Rev. John and Sandy Story did an excellent job and a good time was had by all. Thank you Rev. Jack McCormick and the Manteno Church for your kindness in hosting this important event.

We also saw another successful “Marriage Encounter” date night promoted by Nancy Peeler in cooperation with ONU. Olivet is a wonderful asset for our District offering more support than will ever be realized.

Our Men’s Ministries hosted its Fall and Spring “Day at the Range” and in conjunction with Kankakee First Church participated in a very successful “Bikers Weekend.” Thank you David Diveley for building our Men’s Ministry and Dr. Ed Heck for sharing your resources.

VII. Financial and Statistical

A. DISTRICT TREASURER'S REPORT

Dr. Warrick, Dr. Wilson, and members of the assembly:

The fiscal year for the Chicago Central District was from May 1, 2011 to February 29, 2012. The report I am presenting today represents a 10 month fiscal year. The shorter fiscal year was necessary to allow a February year end from this point forward. Today, I will report of God's faithfulness in providing the necessary resources to further His mission through the Chicago Central District.

1. Audit

The district financial statements were analyzed by external auditors as a compilation in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. We continue with the cycle of having a full audit every four years, with compilations in intermediate years. Our next audit is scheduled for the end of the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

The property additions and improvements listed in the asset section of the report are not depreciated due to practicality purposes, and a note of explanation appears in that report.

The district has six segregated funds reserved for specific purposes. Descriptions of each fund are listed on page 7 of your copy of the financial statements.

2. Revenues

During this past year the district recorded \$1,120,000 in revenues which were funded as follows: \$365,000 from the churches toward their district allocations; \$207,000 toward the Olivet education fund and the Centennial Chapel donations; \$87,000 in medical premiums; \$70,000 in Alabaster Funds; \$59,000 from camps; \$18,000 in shared space reimbursements; \$260,000 from the sale of the Richton Park property and \$54,000 from gifts and various other sources.

3. Expenditures

Expenses totaled \$1,548,000 which included \$219,000 in Olivet education fund and Centennial Chapel payments; \$121,000 for mission projects; \$161,000 for wages and employee benefits; \$166,000 in property expenses; \$233,000 in property purchases and church support; \$270,000 in bad debt write off; \$96,000 in medical premiums; \$86,000 for camping ministries; utility, insurance, and administrative expenses of \$120,000; \$13,000 provided to the NMI, NYI, & SDMI departments for their ministry budgets; \$13,000 to support work in Costa Rica; \$50,000 in miscellaneous other expenses.

4. Change in Net Assets

The change in net assets for 2012 was a negative \$428,000. The main factors for this change are; 1) writing off assumed bad debt related to uncollectable receivables; 2) the need for the district to assume unbudgeted expenses for churches that have closed or are in default on property insurance and 3) other property transactions. The Richton Park location was sold to another congregation in June 2011. The sale of this property removed an asset from the books, but not all of the offsetting proceeds were retained by the district. A portion of the proceeds went toward a down payment of a new property for House of Prayer. They had been worshipping at the Richton Park location. The past two years have experienced a negative change in net assets. To address this trend the District Advisory Board continues to evaluate the need to sell vacant properties that may no longer support the district's mission plans.

5. Receivables

A note receivable is listed at \$480,942 in Note 4 on Page 8 for the sale of the District Campground. The repayment schedule started in May 2010 on a twenty year note. No payment has been made on the campground since December 2010. At that time the owner of the campground requested a delayed payment schedule based on current financial circumstances. At the time of this report, the property has been foreclosed on by the bank and has been listed for

sale. To reflect this new information, the district has added a \$240,471 receivable allowance to offset fifty percent of the note. Leaving half of the receivable illustrates that the repayment agreement between the district and the former owner could be upheld sometime in the future.

6. Long-Term Liabilities

The Austin Parsonage mortgage has a variable rate of 3% and is the district's liability. The Pastoral Transition Loan was established in 2008 by an anonymous donor to make cash available for the district to loan to churches or pastors who need housing assistance during times of transition, with no cost to the district. Property on West 59th Street in Chicago was purchased by the District in September. Our Chicago Gage Park Church worships at this location. The mortgage was issued to the Chicago Central District at an interest rate of 6.5%.

7. Short-Term Liabilities and Cash

The District had an ending cash balance for all funds of \$84,000. This year, \$365,000 was received in district apportionments, which was consistent with ten months of 2010-2011. The District has a \$100,000 Line of Credit in place and is utilizing a portion of it to support cash flow. The line will come due for renewal in October 2012.

8. Funding the Mission through the 2011-2012 Budget

The 2011-12 fiscal year completes the second fiscal year using our new apportionment system. The district's apportionment figure recommended by the District Superintendent, District Advisory Board and District Finance Committee is 5% of total local church charitable income, less WEF and 10% missions giving. This is the same percentage as 2011-2012. The income budget for 2012-2013 has been planned flat to actual average monthly apportionments received in the prior fiscal year. I have been encouraged that our District Superintendent and District Advisory Board have continued to prayerfully seek out new avenues to facilitate ministry to God's people – all the while utilizing 24% less income than just two years ago.

I have served one full year as treasurer and this is my second report to the assembly. It is a blessing to serve the Chicago Central District as your treasurer. Thank you to all of the pastors and lay leaders who faithfully support the district through giving to others. I am looking forward to what God has in store to further his Kingdom during the 2012-13 fiscal year.

The objective of a compilation is to assist management in presenting financial information in the form of financial statements without undertaking to obtain or provide any assurance that there are no material modifications that should be made to the financial statements. During our compilation, we did become aware of a departure from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America that is described in the following paragraph.

As disclosed in Note 2 to the financial statements, property is stated at appraisal value in the accompanying balance sheet. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that such assets be recorded at acquisition cost, if purchased, or at fair value if donated or contributed, and those amounts be depreciated over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The effects on the financial statements of the preceding practices are not reasonably determinable.

The supplemental information contained in the Schedules is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The supplemental information has been compiled from information that is the representation of management. We have not audited or reviewed the supplemental information and, accordingly, do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on such supplemental information.

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Chicago Central District, Church of the Nazarene, is a not-for-profit organization located in Chicago, Illinois. The object and purpose of the Organization is to promote the organization of churches and other religious institutions under the sponsorship of the Church of the Nazarene and to generally promote the welfare of the Church of the Nazarene throughout the Chicago Central District of said church.

Chicago Central District covers northeastern Illinois consisting of the counties of McHenry, Lake, Kane, DuPage, Cook, Kendall, Will, Grundy, Kankakee, Iroquois, Ford and a portion of Vermillion.

Its membership consists of all the members of the Chicago Central District Assembly of the Church of the Nazarene.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Chicago Central District, Church of the Nazarene, have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Basis of presentation

The Organization follows FASB Account Standards Codification 958 (Not-for-Profit Entities) which establishes standards for external financial reporting by not-for-profit organizations and requires that resources be classified for accounting and reporting purposes into three net asset categories according to externally (donor) imposed restrictions and requires the Foundation to distinguish between contributions received for each net asset category in accordance with donor imposed restrictions. A description of the three net asset categories follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met either by the actions of the District and/or passage of time.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may be maintained permanently by the District. Generally, the donors of these assets permit the District to use all or part of the income earned on related investments for general or specific purposes.

Revenue recognition

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Income tax status

The Organization qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Code Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, has no provision for federal income taxes.

Cash

The Organization maintains its cash balances at various banks. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insures accounts at each institution up to \$250,000 for interest bearing accounts and unlimited coverage for non-interest bearing accounts.

Property

The property is valued at its cost, estimated cost, or appraisal value if cost figures were not available. It is the Organization's policy not to depreciate the property.

Expenditures for maintenance and repairs of property and equipment are charged to expense as incurred, and major improvements are capitalized. Upon retirement, sale or other disposition of property, the cost is removed from the accounts and the related gain or loss, if any, is reflected in the year of disposal.

Donated services

No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services. The Organization pays for services requiring specific expertise. However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization with its various programs.

Reclassifications

Certain 2011 amounts have been reclassified to conform to the 2012 presentation.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Board designated District funds

The District uses Funds to account for its various sources of revenues and expenditures. Financial schedules for each fund are presented as supplementary information.

Board designated District funds (continued)

A description of the Funds in use at February 29, 2012 and April 30, 2011 follows:

District Centennial Projects Fund

This fund represents monies, given by individuals and/or churches, which are not included in the District Evangelism Fund, but which are designated for use in one of the District projects approved by Stewardship Ministries.

Camps Fund

This fund includes monies brought in through camping ministries' fees and paid out for camping ministries' expenses.

Foundation Fund

This fund may include monies received from sale of property, undesignated gifts, monies transferred from various District sources and other monies not designated for any of the other listed funds. Unless specifically designated by the District Advisory Board, Foundation Fund monies may be used for property purchases anywhere in the District, regardless of where the monies originated. These monies may be used for other capital expenses and for expenses not otherwise covered by the other listed funds.

General Assembly Fund

This fund represents an amount annually designated from the District Operating Budget and set aside for use every four years for paying the expenses of General Assembly Delegates from the District.

Medical Insurance Fund

This fund is used to collect the Church's and the employee's portion of the medical insurance premiums. The fund remits the total premiums to the insurance company.

District Evangelism Fund

This fund (formerly the Unified District Budget Fund) includes the District Evangelism monies received from local churches in the District, which are used for the District Operating Budget, District Center Budget and District Mission Projects Budget. This fund also handles the in-out monies for various events such as Pastors and Spouses' Retreats, Christmas Banquets, etc.

Fiscal Year End

The Organization has changed their fiscal year end to the last day of February beginning with fiscal year 2012.

NOTE 3 - LOANS TO CHURCHES

The loans receivable represent advances to various Nazarene churches in the Chicago Central District plus billings to various churches for insurance. The advances bear a rate determined by the District Advisory Board. However, if the Church has paid its District Evangelism budget, the interest rate is reduced to zero. Loans receivable are written off when they are determined to be uncollectible. The allowance for doubtful accounts is estimated based on the District's historical losses, the existing economic conditions and the financial stability of its churches. Included in accounts receivable is an allowance for doubtful accounts in the amount of \$629,168 and \$599,822 as of February 29, 2012 and April 30, 2011, respectively

NOTE 4 - NOTE RECEIVABLE

On April 29, 2005, the District sold one of its properties for the amount of \$500,000. Terms of the sale are cash plus a note receivable for \$490,000. This note was interest-free until May 2010. As of that date, the note earns interest at a variable rate adjusted annually in May and is payable based on a twenty year amortization. The balance on the note receivable was \$480,942 at February 29, 2012 and April 30, 2011. There were no payments received during the past ten months. The District has included an allowance against the note receivable in the amount of \$240,471 at February 29, 2012.

NOTE 6 – LINE OF CREDIT

The District has an unsecured \$100,000 line of credit with a bank, with interest at the bank's prime rate plus 1%, with a floor of 5%, expiring October 31, 2012. The line of credit had a balance of \$75,000 at February 29, 2012 at an interest rate of 5%.

NOTE 7 – OPERATING LEASE

The District occupies office space under an operating lease agreement that expires at December 31, 2013. In addition to monthly rental payments, the District is responsible for all normal maintenance of the office space. Currently, the District is sharing the office space and expense with another non-profit agency on a monthly basis. The District also leases a condominium for the District Superintendent that expires July 31, 2013. Also, the District rents office equipment under an operating lease agreement that expires April 30, 2015. Rent expense for the ten months ended February 29, 2012 and for the year ended April 30, 2011 was \$82,760 and \$53,027, respectively.
