

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EXHIBITIONS

PAINTINGS FROM THE PERMANENT COLLECTION -- through September 8, Brainard Gallery

Two Paul T. Sargent paintings, recently donated by Martha McMahon, along with works by Alice Baber, Carl Shull, Ben Watkins, Raoul Middleman, Ralph Wickiser, Harriet Rex-Smith, and Gregory Huebner make up this exhibition.

BARBARA KENDRICK: DRAWING IN TWO AND THREE DIMENSIONS -- through October 13, Main Galleries

"Barbara Kendrick's *The Parting* - 1990, is a wall construction that uses sticks or twigs coated with graphite as active jots or gestures to create an almost human form in action. Here she attaches a series of wooden pieces to the wall -- some resembling hunched, thick-waisted torsos, others appearing lithe, sinewy, energetic -- performing what becomes a graceful, arched balletic leap," wrote Spencer Sauter for the Bloomington-Normal *Pantagraph*. Martha Howard, for the *New Art Examiner*, stated that: "Barbara Kendrick's strongest pieces are those in which she lets the materials do most of the talking." According to Roger McBain, *Evansville Courier*, "She uses her very physical media much like a two-dimensional artist would use a line to sketch ... seen from a distance, the pieces ... have the look of boldly drawn figure studies." This solo exhibition presents wall constructions, made mostly of sticks and vines, and two dimensional mixed media pieces which often involve collaged organic and man-made materials.

Barbara Kendrick is currently on the faculty of the School of Art and Design at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana, where she teaches painting. She holds an MFA in painting and drawing from Ohio State University, and a BFA in printmaking from the University of Nebraska.

SHAKESPEARE IN ART: CONTEMPORARY EXPLORATIONS -- September 13 - October 13, Brainard Gallery

This open invitational exhibition brings together three artists currently working in and around Washington, DC -- sculptor Michael Katz, and painters Catherine Satterlee and Susan Campbell. Organized in conjunction with the 1991 English Education Conference *Encounters with Darkness: Shakespeare's <u>MacBeth</u> in the Classroom, the exhibit examines the continuing influence of William Shakespeare and his work beyond the bounds of his own discipline. Working in wood and paint, these artists have found inspiration for contemporary visual expression in Shakespearian literature.*

Michael Katz exhibits a life-size chess set based on *Richard III*. Katz studied at the Corcoran School of Art in Washington, DC and exhibits frequently on the east coast.

Catherine Satterlee includes *Gray Quilt*, 1990, a painting combining images, using a quilt format, with quotes from *Hamlet*. Satterlee received her Master of Fine Arts degree from Boston University, and has also studied at the Corcoran School of Art. Satterlee exhibits frequently in the Washington area.

Susan Campbell includes two acrylic paintings, *Ophelia* and *Prophecy Fulfilled*. Campbell received her Bachelor's degree from Vassar College, Poughkeepsie, New York, and has studied on scholarship at the Corcoran School of Art.

CHAMBER MUSIC SERIES: LA FOSSE AND TSACHOR - VIOLIN AND PIANO

-- September 29, 3pm

The 1991-92 Tarble Arts Center Chamber Music Series, coordinated and co-sponsored by the EIU Music Department, starts off the new season with the violin and piano duo of Leopold La Fosse and Uriel Tsachor. The duo's program includes works by Mozart, Brahms, Prokofiev, and Bartok. "He never failed to give a full measure of ravishing sound, with golden notes soaring above the stave in Bartok's sonata for solo violin...and gave (Brahm's first sonata) as warmly satisfying an interpretation as I have heard" wrote *London Times* critic Richard Maylan of La Fosse. His extensive appearances in North and South America and in Europe testify to La Fosse's popularity and endurance as a touring soloist. The violinist also performs frequently at the University of Iowa, where he is an Artist-Teacher of violin, and has served as concertmaster of five symphony

orchestras. La Fosse has served as a Fulbright Professor, writer, and has recorded for the Orion and CRI labels.

The New York Times stated that Tsachor's debut with the New York Symphony at Lincoln Center had "glittering brilliance." The pianist has been winner of the Bosendorfer-Empire Concours and the Concorso Busoni, and a laureate of the Queen Elizabeth Competition. Tsachor was invited to perform with the Israel Philharmonic Orchestra, and has been a soloist with several European orchestras. His recordings of solo and concerto repertoire for Music Heritage Society, EMI, and other companies have received enthusiastic praise in Europe.

Admission is \$4.50, \$2.50 for students and senior citizens, or by season subscription to the 1991-92 series of \$16.00, \$8.00 for students and senior citizens, for all four concerts. Tickets are available at the Music Department office, Doudna Fine Arts Center, weekdays, 8am-noon/1-4:30pm, or at the door the day of performance. For ticket information call 581-3010.



FROM THE CURATOR

Beginning October 5 for children and September 26 for adults, art classes will be offered in a variety of mediums, with membership receiving a 20% discount on fees. Most children's courses meet on Saturday mornings between 9:00am and 12:30pm. In addition to promoting individual creativity, all children's courses stress skills development and aesthetic awareness, with instruction emphasizing the basic elements of art, and compositional principles. Art courses for adults will meet Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday evenings.

Several new classes highlight the roster this fall including a perspective course and, for the first time, an afternoon course designed especially for retired persons. *Afternoon Art Sampler for Seniors*, meeting Wednesday afternoons, provides a series of enjoyable opportunities to work with linear design, clay, watercolor, and papier mache. Two new classes for ages 14 and up will be offered on Saturday afternoons. *Views in Perspective* provides instruction in the use of parallel, two-point, and three-point perspective. *Whittling* includes lessons in the old-time whittling techniques, as well as practice with knife-sharpening techniques. These courses, as do most Tarble art classes, include all supplies.

As some courses filled early last session, I encourage interested persons to register early. The registration deadline is September 24, 5:00pm.

The **Docent Education Program** begins with the first of a series of monthly meetings on September 16. See the listing under **Events** for a complete description of the meeting.

Tarble Docents provide an invaluable service to both the Center and the community by volunteering their time to guide school and community groups through the many changing exhibitions at the Tarble Arts Center. School children benefit the most from this service, with 297 children touring the Tarble during the 1991 Spring Semester alone. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the dedicated, and very active, members of the Tarble Docent team, including Corrine Joyner and Margaret Hollowell, co-coordinators, Edith Hedges, Lora Summerville, Ruth White, Edith Malehorn, Jean Zabka, Vanlou Trank, Joan Williams, and Elizabeth Hamerski. I also want to encourage anyone interested in joining the Docents to attend the September 16th meeting.

FROM THE DIRECTOR



In both the children's and adults' courses, the structured lessons emphasize basic art principles and techniques, while encouraging students to exercise their own creativity. Finally, small class size provides each student with ample individualized attention, which remains the hallmark of Tarble art classes and workshops.

Introduction to Art for Pre-Schoolers (Ages: 4 - 5) Instructor: Staff

Wednesdays, 1:00 - 2:00pm, 10/16 - 11/20 Fee: \$15.00 for members, \$18.00 for non-members This class is designed to provide fun, hands-on art experiences in a variety of mediums, working in a creatively stimulating environment. Enrichment activities will be used to stimulate young minds before hands-on experiences begin.

Circus Ceramics (Ages: 6 - 8) Instructor: Iris Sandkuhler Tuesdays, 3:45 - 5:00, 10/15 - 11/19 Fee: \$24.00 for members, \$28.00 for non-members

Clay, like the tightrope, is an elastic medium. And students in this class will enjoy stretching their imaginations as well as learning new skills while creating circus animals and performers. A variety of ceramic finishes will be used to finish their creations in full color which will be combined to create a fantasyworld or diorama. Each piece will be hollowed out to double as a finger puppet for performance fun at home.

Drawing In Various Media (Ages 6 - 8) Instructor: Doris J. Through directed projects, students will develop drawings depicting a variety of subjects

In this short course, students will learn the quick piecing method using the rotary cutter and mat board. During the class, students will learn to cut blocks for both the School House and Log Cabin designs, will assemble the quilt top, and learn quilting techniques.

Approaches to Drawing

Instructor: Noel Cummins Thursdays, 7:00 - 9:00, 9/26 - 11/21 (No meeting 10/31) Fee: \$40.00 for members, \$48.00 for non-members This class provides a basic approach to drawing various subjects (figures, still life, interior spaces) by advancing drawing skills using proportion, perspective, value, and other graphic principals. Students will work with various drawing media as they develop their subjects from life. This course is designed to address a variety of skill levels.
