

A CELEBRATION OF FOLK ARTS

Traditional folk arts take on some new interpretations in
this exhibition of quilts, knitted and wovens, blacksmithing,
carving, and pysanky (Ukrainian egg decorating) by twenty-eight area artists. The contrast between traditional and
contemporary uses of a folk art can be seen in the blacksmithing by Jobie Spencer (Urbana) -- his "courting" candleholder is traditional and functional -- and Lorelei Sims
(Charleston) -- her forged wreath is strictly sculptural.

The pysanky of Mary Dilliner (Arthur) combines the traditional with the contemporary. She uses traditional pysanky designs and techniques in new ways to create a contemporary interpretation of this Ukrainian folk art. The same is true of much of the work by members of Quiltworks. While traditional designs dominate, many of the quilters use traditional forms and techniques to create highly personalized interpretations. Quiltworks members represented in the exhibition are Kathryn Stewart, Patty Allee, Pam Gutowski, Marianne Morgan, Alice Sprague, Fran Wittenberg, Dorothy Hills, Bonita Creech, Lori Douglas, Ellen Wolcott, Marge Frommel, Marie Tabbert, Joan Baker, Marianne Snowden, and former member Carol Rennels Sholden (with Norma Rennels); members are from Charleston, Mattoon, Paris, and Casey.


There are many traditional works in the exhibit too, such as

the birds, ball-in-cages, "whimsies," and other carvings by Andy Anderson (Paris). Most of the items by the Countryside Spinners and Weavers Guild members are also traditional. Their works include rugs, coverlets, shawls, and socks, made through knitting, weaving, and hooking, many of hand-spun and naturally dyed fibers. But there are some contemporary interpretations too. The members of Countryside Spinners and Weavers Guild participating in the exhibition are Nancy Donley, Edna Kniskern, Suzan Braun, Verne Kniskern, Judy Chapman, Nancy Nordtvedt, Margaret Speer, and Jamie Willis; members are from Charleston and Mattoon.

WALTER SORGE: ISRAEL -- AN ARTIST'S IMPRESSIONS

The one hundred watercolors that make up this exhibition were created while Eastern Illinois University Art Professor Walter Sorge was on sabbatical in Israel. Dr. Sorge states, "The recent painting excursion in Israel harbored no hidden political agenda -- nor should it be considered as a religious pilgrimage. I was deeply fascinated by many aspects of the Israeli way of life -- the country and its people. And, as an artist I simply responded in the only way I know how -- in visual form." Says Sorge, "It is hoped that the one hundred paintings in this exhibition will help the viewer gain some insight and feeling for the beauty, intensity, and excitement of this land." In addition to being the third solo exhibition for the artist presented at the Tarble Arts Center, Israel - An Artist's Impressions is his last as a member of the Eastern Illinois University Department of Art. After thirtythree years of teaching, the last twenty-seven at Eastern, Walter Sorge is retiring at the end of the fall semester.


from the curator

The 1997/98 Docent Education Program begins on September 8th with exhibition tours of *Israel--An Artist's Impressions* by Walter Sorge and *A Celebration of Folk Arts*. An essential part of the Tarble's arts education programming, the Docent Education Program enables us to offer quality art experiences to the public free of charge. The docents are responsible for leading guided exhibition tours to school and community groups, increasing the public's knowledge about and appreciation of the visual arts.

Through series of meetings, held approximately once a month, the docents receive training for each Tarble exhibition scheduled throughout the academic year. The meetings are held on Monday mornings from 10:00am to noon. The 1997/98 schedule of docent meetings will include exhibition tours, hands-on studio experiences, visiting speakers, and tour scheduling. In addition, I am developing a small library of resource materials that will be available to Tarble docents. The docents will also receive free catalogues from selected exhibitions.

The dedicated volunteers who make up the Tarble Arts Center docent staff support our offerings of unique educational experiences in the visual arts for the schools and other community groups.
