2001 Art Faculty Exhibition

• Oct. 6 -Nov. 11, Main Galleries

Recent art work in a wide variety of media and styles make up this annual exhibition by Eastern Illinois University's current, adjunct, and emeritus Art Department faculty. Current faculty participating in this year's exhibition as of this writing are: Katherine Bartel (mixed media/installations), Jeff Boshart (wood and stone sculpture), Loretta Bourque (oil paintings), Suzan Braun (weaving), David Griffin (metals), Daphne Griffin (graphic design), Christopher Kahler (paintings and a mixed media drawing), Dwain Naragon (ceramics), and Denise Rehm-Mott (intaglio). Participating from the Tarble Arts Center staff is David Pooley (cross media). The emeritus faculty represented are Carl Emmerich (painting and mixed media), Bill Heyduck (ceramics), Cary Knoop (welded sculpture), Walter Sorge (watercolors), and Carl Wilen (mixed media). This exhibition is co-sponsored with the EIU Art Department.

Holding Life: Native American Baskets

• October 5-November 25, Brainard Gallery

This exhibition surveys the range of materials, methods of manufacture, and styles of Native American baskets from throughout the U.S. and parts of Canada. Among the cultural groups represented are the Aleuts, Tlingit, Nuu-Chah-Nulth, Hupa, Apache, Hopi, Pima, Papago, Ute, Cherokee, Seminole, Penobscot, Chippewa, Micmac, and

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Iroquois. While the majority of objects in the exhibition are from the late 19th to contemporary late 20th century examples, baskets have been produced and used by Native Americans since archaic times. Utilitarian and ceremonial baskets alike display a concern for superior craftsmanship and quality of design.

A wide variety of materials are represented, from birchbark and porcupine quills to long leaf pine needles to grasses and other plant fibers. Methods of manufacture include coiling, plaiting, and twining. The objects in the exhibition are on loan from: The University Museum, Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, drawn from the Harrington and the Dagen Collections; Dr. Ehrlich; and from area private collections. Co-curated by Dr. Martha Ehrlich, Professor of Art History at SIUE and Kit Morice, this exhibition will serve as the basis for the fall 2001 Fifth Grade Enrichment Program.

After a guided tour of the exhibition, students will learn how to weave reeds using a plaiting technique employed by Cherokee artisans. The program will be presented by EIU Art Education students enrolled in *Art Education in Elementary Schools* under the supervision of Assistant Professor of Art Education Dr. Patricia Belleville and Tarble Arts Center Curator of Education Kit Morice.

From October 10 through November 12 the Tarble Arts Center is offering to Charleston fifth graders from Jefferson School the first of three annual Enrichment programs. This exhibition-based tour/studio program has focused on a variety of multicultural themes, especially Native American art.

Presented by EIU Art Education majors, this unique program offers a chance for area fifth graders to learn about cultures different from their own through an introduction of actual artifacts and provides valuable pre-student teaching experiences for future art teachers. It is hoped that program participants leave with a greater understanding of some of the cultures represented as well as an appreciation for the art forms exhibited.

from the director

In the aftermath of the horrific events of September 11th it struck me that much of what we do can seem trivial. What meaning can the arts have in the face of such terror and destruction? In reviewing quotes for inclusion in the 2001-2002 *Cultivating Creativity* exhibition catalogue I was reminded that art has immense healing and restorative powers: "Life beats down and crushes the soul and art reminds you that you have one" -- Stella Adler; "Art is the stored honey of the human soul, gathered on wings of misery and travail" -- Theodore Dreiser; "We have art so that we may not perish by the truth" -- Friedrich Nietzsche; "The final purpose of art is to intensify, even, if necessary, to exacerbate, the moral consciousness of people" -- Norman Mailer; "Art is a form of catharsis" -- Dorothy Parker. There is little I can add except, in this month set aside to recognize the arts and humanities, to invite everyone toattend a performance, lecture, or exhibition and celebrate the triumph of creation over destruction.

I want to thank the Illinois Arts Council members and staff for the grant award of \$12,600 given to the Tarble Arts Center in support of the 2001-2002 exhibition and education program. Although the Tarble Arts Center receives major funding as a part of Eastern Illinois University, the many programs and exhibitions presented would not be possible without funding from a variety of sources, including the Illinois Arts Council, Tarble Arts Center membership contributions, the Eastern Illinois University Foundation, Illinois Consolidated Telephone Company, and many other contributors and granting agencies. It is often Illinois Arts Council funding that makes a good program a special program, whether this is the ability to bring in a visiting artist or to produce a high quality catalogue in conjunction with an exhibition. Every program at the Tarble Arts Center is a group effort, from those who provide funding to the artists whose work is involved to staff and volunteers who organize and present to the audience members who attend.
