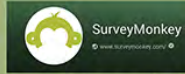

Books, iPads, and Umbrellas:

A Survey of Circulating Items in Academic Library Collections

To meet the needs of their patrons, academic libraries make available a variety of items for loan far beyond the traditional library materials of books and journals. These items can range from technological equipment such as laptops and digital cameras to other nontraditional items such as board games, DVDs, and kits. This poster session will present a summary of unique items in academic library collections and a set of best practices for loaning these items based on the results of a survey of academic libraries. Results of the survey will present standard approaches and new ideas that Access Services departments employ in loaning both traditional and nontraditional items in the library collection.

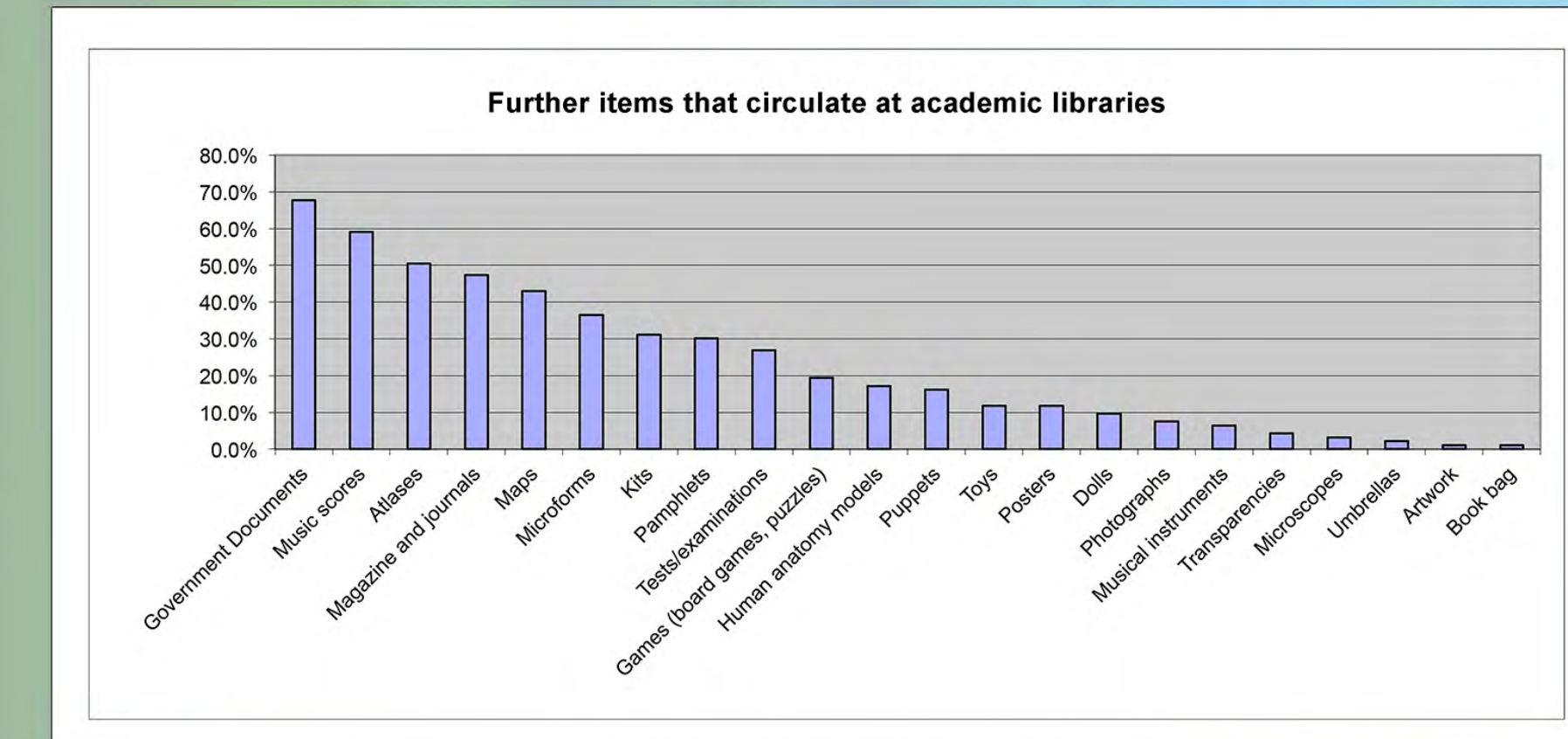
Survey comments on circulating media items

- Cleaning and maintenance of media items
- Theft of DVDs
- Loan period varies by patron type and format type
- DVDs are by far the most popular item to circulate.
- CD's wear and information disintegrates so need to be backed up or replaced
- Some DVDs are restricted use-library only -for students
- Recently weeded our VHS and LP, and cassette collection
- Deaccessioned most outdated technologies (VHS, cassettes, slides)
- Struggle with how long loan periods should be on these types of items
- Returning the case but not the dvd
- Users no longer have VCRs and want newer format

Survey comments on circulating technology items

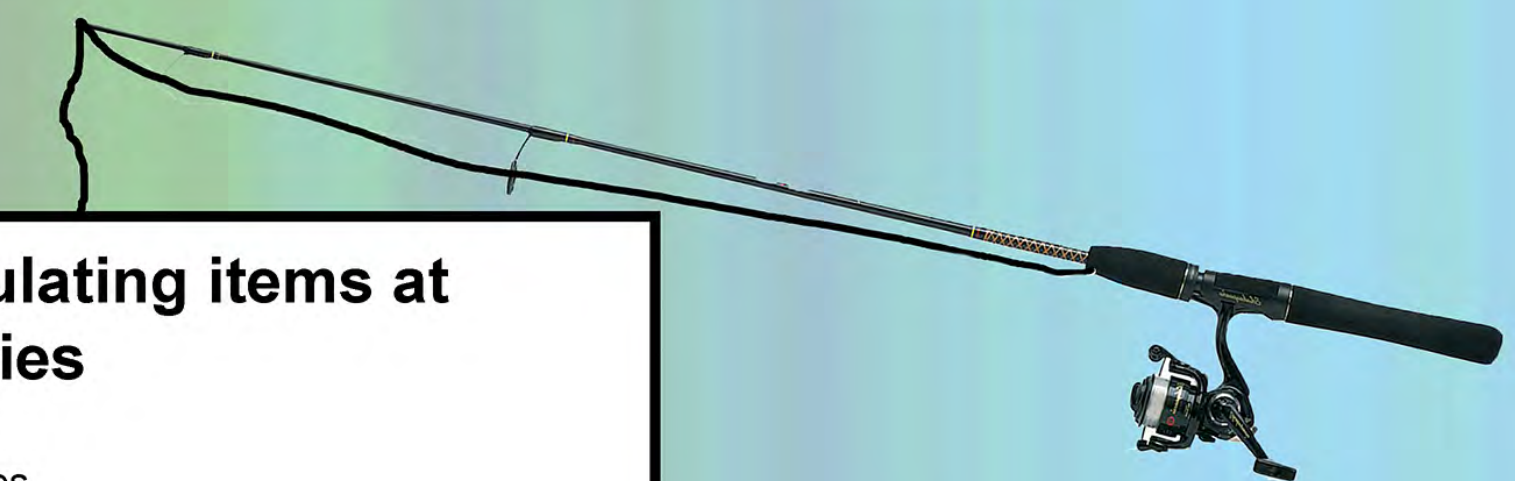
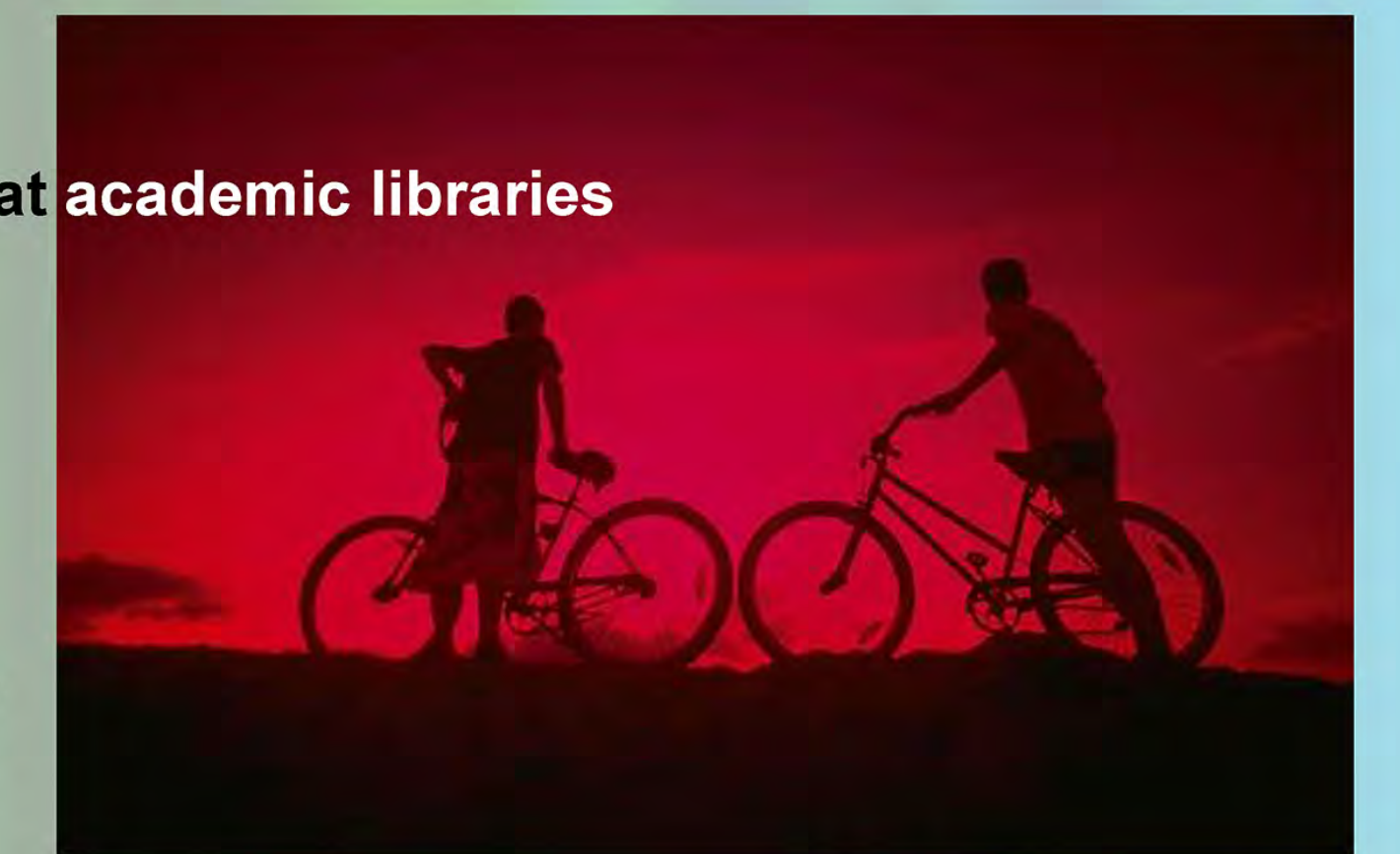
- Laptops only to library faculty
- Laptops only circulate to graduate students
- Place informational sticker on items such as calculators and markers
- Laptop agreement is part of login (student has to agree with policy before laptop will work)
- Gave up on the user agreements way back with laptops and have not added it with other items
- Takes an amount of time to do the agreement form (but we're committed to the agreement form, so we are willing to take the time to do it)
- Stopped requiring our patrons to sign a user agreement years ago (spent awful lot of time and energy to do this, and it was never an issue)
- Patrons sign an agreement every time they check out a tablet
- Use checklists for multiple pieces are checked out on a single barcode
- Variety of technology items can result in a dizzying area of loan periods (clarified into two categories: in library use and external library use)
- Employ modest overdue fines
- Students seem willing to accept the large fines to keep the iPads
- Patrons don't return all the pieces with the item
- Never enough to meet the demand (specifically referring to iPads & video cameras here)
- Laptops are the most heavily used and we sometimes have issues with them not being returned on time
- Equipment items are our highest circulating items of the entire collection
- Go through headphones like water as break or lost (would love to sell cheapie earbuds as an alternative)
- Physical upkeep of equipment/wear and tear
