## Student arrested as arson suspect

### Friday fire totals one vehicle, damages another

A female Eastern student was arrested Friday as a suspect in a fire involving a 1990 Ford Thunderbird. According to a press release issued by the Charleston Police Department, officers arrested Kara M. Brown, 23, in connection with the arson. The Charleston Police Department and Charleston Fire Department responded to the fire at 10:55 p.m., Thursday, at 689 14th St. A Ford Thunderbird was in flames when officers

responded to the scene.

The press release stated that firefighters extinguished the fire, reporting it as arson.

"The car was fully engulfed upon arrival," said a firefighter who responded to the call. "It was mainly on the inside of the car."

Four firefighters from Station One responded to the fire.

The firefighter said it took less than five minutes to extinguish.

"It was kind of unusual because the car had not been driven for several months," he said.

The owner of the car told firefighters he would sometimes start the car to make sure the battery was not dead, but the car had a flat tire which prevented the owner from driving the car, the firefighter said.

The fire burnt a nearby tree and did some minor damage to a car that was approximately eight feet

away, he said.

Approximately \$25 worth of damage was done to the other car, the firefighter said.

Firefighters on the same shift responded to two car fires in the last two weeks, he said.

Arson is not common in Charleston, but a few years ago they had several fires that were suspected arsons, the firefighter said.

Brown is being held at the Coles County Safety and Detention Center while the arson is under investigation.

## Minor standards conflict with procedure

*University wants to update requirements to earn minors*

The requirements for minors at Eastern conflict with university practice.

The Council of Academic Affairs members realized this at their Sept. 1 meeting, and then at their Sept. 8 meeting organized a committee to look into revising the wording of the course catalog.

The subcommittee members are Julie Deitz of Health Services, Shelley French of foreign language and Julie Sterling of academic advising.

Through the foreign language minor, it is possible for a student to earn a minor without ever stepping foot on campus. The subcommittee discussed this possibility and how to address it at their first meeting on Sept. 8.

Under the 2005/2006 catalog wording, a student who took three or four years of language in high school could hypothetically complete a foreign language minor through study abroad programs without attending class on campus.

"We need to update the language of how requirements to complete a minor are here at the university because they just hadn't been looked at in a long time," Sterling said.

The language in the catalog

## More debt piles on students each year

CHAMPAIGN — Two decades ago, a student could work a full-time, minimum wage job during the summer and be able to pay two-thirds of a pub-

lic university's annual costs for four years.

In today's economy, the same job worked for a full year would not cover a year's expenses at a public university, according to a study by the Center of Economic and Policy Research.

Nearly two-thirds of students attending a four-year public university or college take out student loans while in school. Students who took out loans averaged \$17,600 in debt on graduation day, according to studies from 2004.

"It's wiping out an entire industry in Seattle," said Gilbert Levy, a lawyer for Rick's Gentleman's Club.

# STEPPING HIGH

*Panther Marching Band hosts 30th Annual Marching Band Festival*

Last Saturday, approximately 2,000 high school students marched into O'Brien Stadium to find out which band was the best.

Saturday the Panther Marching Band hosted its 30th annual Marching Band Festival.

Nineteen high school marching bands participated in this weekend's competition. The Collinsville High School marching band was named Grand Champion of the competition.

The competition is a good way for high school students to participate in some "good old fashion competition," with an "emphasis on education," said Director of Athletic Bands Jeffrey Steiner.

Steiner also said this festival isn't just about competition, it's primarily a recruiting opportunity for the Panther Marching Band.

The competition placed the bands into three different categories, class A, class AA and class AAA. These categories are based on the size of the school and the size of the band.

Students in the PMB are required to assist in some way at the competition and do everything from assisting the judges to making sure the bands know where they're going.

But not only do PMB students take part in assisting, there are four music fraternities and sororities who "go above and beyond the call of duty," Steiner said.

But the high school students are the ones who really take something from this competition.

"It gives us a cool place to play our show," said Evan Willmore of the Granite City Marching Band.

Willmore also said it gives their band members a chance to see other bands, including the

Panther Marching Band, perform.

The bands were judged by nine judges in three different categories: music performance, visual performance and general effect of the show.

There is also one specialty judge who evaluates the auxiliary units including the color guard, majorettes, dancers, the percussion section and drum majors.

Band director Aimee Ruthoski of Bolingbrook High School said she brought her band to the competition because "it's a good educational experience for the students."

This is Bolingbrook's first time at the competition and Ruthoski said they came because their student teacher was an Eastern student who participated in the marching band.

Ruthoski also said this competition is a good way for her band to get "valuable feedback" from other band directors.

# Senate members acknowledge diversity

By looking purely at statistics, Eastern may not be considered the most diverse school.

According to Planning and Institutional Studies, of the 12,129 students who attend Eastern this year, 14 percent of them define themselves as an ethnicity other than white. Six percent of students are black, 2 percent are Hispanic and 1 percent is Asian.

"If you go specifically by the numbers, it's not really a clear representation of the United States," said Jesse Wu, member of the Student Senate Diversity Affairs Committee.

However, despite the seemingly small numbers, diversity is an "extremely important" topic to Sherri Smith, chair of the Diversity Affairs Committee.

Senate members are required to attend one event per semester that deals with diversity and then write a statement to be submitted to Smith and the Diversity Affairs Committee explaining what they learned and how it can be applied to Eastern's campus, she said.

"Since we (the Student Senate) represent the student body, we have to set an example of understanding," Smith said. "It all begins with the Student Senate."

Student Senate Speaker Adam Howell explained what diversity really means.

"It's about putting yourself outside of your own situation so you can better understand," Howell said.

Howell also said diversity in the senate is important to gain a better grasp of the students it represents.

"This senate is very diverse," he said. "In fact, that's one of the things I look for when appointing them to positions."

"They (senate members) have shown themselves to be respectful, mindful and intelligent," Howell said.

Diversity spans beyond just the Student Senate to the student body, Wu said.

"We want people to be exposed to as many types of people so they can get acclimated and respect different people and cultures," Wu said. "Whether it be gays or lesbians, religion or ethnicities, any stereotypes are not good for campus relations."

## Seven-band concert benefits Katrina, Rita hurricane evacuees

"I think it's a good idea to help the victims and (a concert) brings out the people who are into music," said Becky Wilson, a sophomore English major.

The benefit concert was

organized by Lacey Ard, a senior marketing major, and her "partner in crime" Robyn Drozd, a senior communication studies major.

"All of the proceeds go to Red Cross; 90 percent goes to Hurricane Katrina and Rita victims, but 10 percent goes to the Red Cross to be used locally," Ard said.

She said she wanted to contribute to the relief effort, but didn't know how at first.

She finally decided organizing a concert was the best way to help out.

Ard and Drozd then contacted local Christian bands using MySpace.com, a popular networking Web site.

Drozd and Ard were also able to use the site to promote the concert.

Drozd is also a DJ at Hitmix 88.9 and hosts "Illinoise," a show that plays music from

local artists from 9 p.m. to midnight on Sundays.

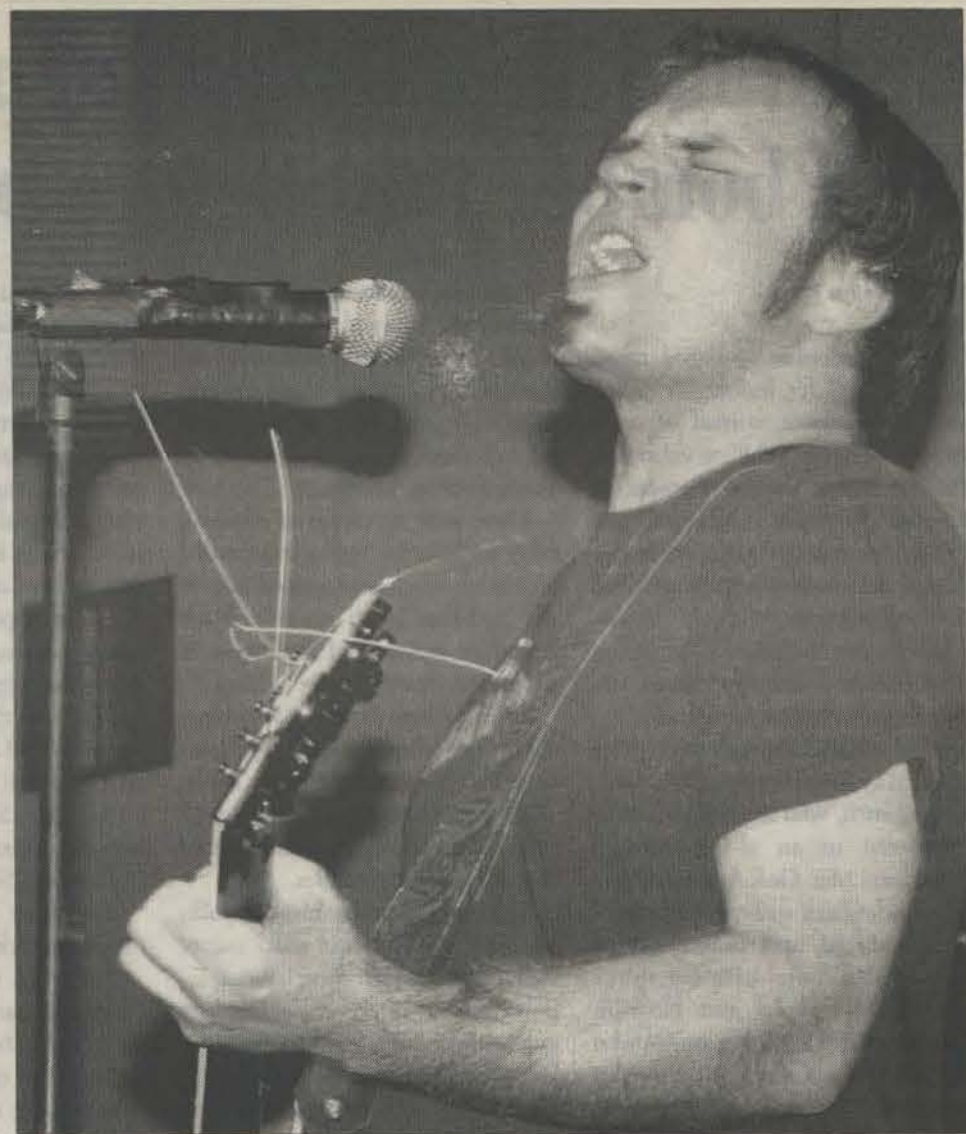
Ard is the manager for one of the featured bands, Fortyminusone. Ard explained that the members of Fortyminusone went to her church.

"We started out a high school rock and roll thing," said Tyler Larson, the saxophone player for Skuf.

# Eastern students find it difficult to graduate in four years

## Changing majors, financial reasons are main causes

Some Eastern students are finding it difficult to graduate in four years.

Changing majors and indecisiveness are two of the most common problems students face when attempting to graduate on time.

Amy Edwards, assistant director of the

Planning and Institutional Studies Department, said that according to a study of all freshmen that started in 1998, 34 percent of the students graduated in four years.

Graduating in four years is becoming more and more difficult for students; especially if they aren't sure what field they want to go into when they begin college.

Hilary Hancock, a junior biology major, said she thinks she will have to take a couple of extra semesters because she declared her major late and has to make up for lost time.

"I am not really sure what I want to do as a career," Hancock said.

There are a number of factors that contribute

to students graduating later, but one of the main reasons students aren't graduating in four years is switching majors, said Director of Admissions Brenda Major.

Laura Farmer, a senior communication studies major, said she knows she will not be able to graduate on time.

"I've changed my major from one extreme to the next my junior year, so I had to kind of start from scratch," she said.

Farmer said she plans to take one to two extra semesters to finish her requirements.

Other reasons students aren't graduating on time could be because of financial reasons, Major said.


She said some students might not be able to afford the tuition costs of taking at least 15 hours per semester.

Some students enjoy the college atmosphere and are "not geared towards completion in four years," Major said.

Eastern has a program called the EIU 4 program to help students graduate in four years.

Major said she hopes the EIU 4 program will help guide more students to graduate in four years.

The EIU 4 program says it guarantees eligible students to graduate in four years, and if they don't, Eastern will waive tuition costs for any extra semesters.

# Chilling video shows suspected Bali bomber just before blast

BALI, Indonesia —Police raised the alert level for Indonesia's capital and the president warned of more attacks Sunday as a chilling video shot the day before showed a suspected bomber clutching a backpack and strolling past diners moments before one of three suicide bombings killed 26 people on Bali.

The near-simultaneous bombings on the resort island also injured 101 people, including six Americans.

The attacks apparently were planned by Southeast Asia's two most-wanted men, who are believed to be connected to an al-Qaida-linked group, said Maj. Gen. Ansyad Mbai, a top Indonesian anti-terror official.

The alleged masterminds of the Bali attacks were believed to be Azahari bin Husin and Noordin Mohamed Top, both Malaysians who fled to Indonesia after a crackdown on militants following the Sept. 11 attacks, officials said.

The masterminds were not among the suspected bombers, whose remains were found at the scenes, officials said. All three bombers were believed to be wearing belts of explosives, police said.

"All that is left is their head and feet," Mbai said. "By the evidence we can conclude the bombers were carrying the explosives around their waists."

President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono warned that terrorists could be planning more strikes in the world's most populous Muslim nation as Jakarta's police chief put the capital on top alert, with two-thirds of its police force on standby.

There were no claims of responsibility for Saturday night's coordinated attacks on two packed seafood cafes in the Jimbaran beach resort and the Raja Cafe noodle and steakhouse in the bustling tourist center of Kuta.

Video footage shot by a vacationer at the three-story Raja Cafe captured a suspected bomber in a black T-shirt walking past foreign and local tourists eating dinner, sipping drinks and chatting at candlelit tables.

The man clutches his backpack, adjusts it slightly, then walks out of view. Moments later there is an explosion from his direction, followed by gray smoke and terrified screams. Police said the video, obtained by Associated Press Television News, was part of the investigation.

Suspicion for the blasts fell on the Southeast Asian terrorist group Jemaah Islamiyah, which wants to establish an Islamic state across Southeast Asia and has been linked to Osama bin Laden's terrorist network.

Jemaah Islamiyah has been blamed for the 2002 Bali nightclub bombings that killed 202 people, mostly foreigners, and subsequent attacks on the J.W. Marriott hotel and the Australian

Embassy that killed 22. Saturday's blasts occurred nearly three years to the day of the 2002 bombings, which also were in Kuta.

Scores of Jemaah Islamiyah suspects have been arrested in Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore, the Philippines and Thailand since 2002, leading some officials to say the group's leadership has been crippled. But analysts say the group appears to have taken on a different form, working with recruits from other organizations or groups.

"The JI is the only group with the intention and capability to mount an attack on Bali on such a coordinated level," said Singapore-based expert Rohan Gunaratna of the Institute of Defense and Strategic Studies.

"No other groups can carry out multiple attacks like that."

The head waiter at the Menega Cafe in Jimbaran said the bomb went off at his beachside restaurant between the tables of two large dinner parties sitting in the sand. Most of the 120 diners at the restaurant were Indonesian, he said.

"Everyone started screaming, 'Allah! Allahi! Help!'" said Wayan Subagia, 23, who suffered leg injuries. "One woman rushed to pick up her child but the little girl was already dead."

Another blast occurred at the nearby Nyoman seafood restaurant.

On Sunday, Yudhoyono visited Sanglah Hospital, near the island's

# Tour boat overturns on New York lake

## Twenty-one people killed on senior trip

LAKE GEORGE, N.Y. — A tour boat carrying 47 people on a senior citizens' cruise overturned Sunday on a lake in upstate New York, killing 21 people, the county sheriff said.

Authorities were investigating whether a large passing tour boat created a wake that caused the accident, Warren County Sheriff Larry Cleveland said.

The 40-foot, glass-enclosed Ethan Allen capsized shortly around 3 p.m. on Lake George about 50 miles north of Albany in the Adirondack Mountains.

By 5 p.m., all passengers had been accounted for.

The 21 bodies were laid out along the shore, and the scene was blocked off by police with tarps.

The weather was clear, calm and in the 70s Sunday afternoon.

Representatives of Shoreline Cruises, which operates the boat, could not immediately be reached for comment.

The tour boat was carrying a tour group from Canada, Cleveland said.

Several police boats were on the water, and at least half a dozen divers were in a small cove on the west side of the lake.

Cleveland said the captain of the boat survived.

# Firefighters gain on California blazes

## Wind forecast causes worry flames may re-ignite

LOS ANGELES — Firefighters gained ground Sunday against three wildfires burning across Southern California but worried about a forecast for hot winds.

A 1,045-acre fire in Burbank was 67 percent contained after firefighters were aided by cooler, overnight breezes, said Capt. Ron Bell of the Burbank Fire Department.

Residents returned to about 70 evacuated homes in Sunset Canyon. But firefighters were concerned about a forecast for warmer winds that could bring

50 mph gusts and re-ignite what appeared to be a "cold mountain," Bell said.

"A little wind could blow those embers into the green and then we'd be starting from scratch," Bell said. "Things look excellent today, and we will be very aggressive. But the wind event is our biggest 'what if' right now."

Crews were kept at the scene a little longer and positioned near homes that could be threatened if the winds kicked up.

Elsewhere, more than 1,000 emergency personnel battled a blaze in steep, rugged terrain in and around San Bernardino National Forest, about 70 miles east of Los Angeles.

The 935-acre fire was 60 percent contained Sunday but had the potential to flare up in windy conditions because of dead trees and grass in the area, according to the U.S. Forest Service.

About 1,200 people were evacuated from several small communities on Friday. Some residents

were allowed to return late Saturday, but mandatory evacuations remained Sunday for Seven Oaks, Barton Flats and Angelus Oaks.

A wildfire that torched more than 24,000 acres on the border of Los Angeles and Ventura counties was 65 percent contained and cooler weather helped firefighters as they tried to extinguish hot spots, said Mike Horst, a Ventura County fire dispatcher.

All evacuation orders and road closures were lifted on the Topanga Fire, which raged much of last week.

# DeLay pledges to take active role in House leadership

WASHINGTON — A defiant Tom DeLay, removed as House majority leader because of a criminal indictment, said Sunday he can do his job even without the title.

DeLay pledged to continue his close partnership with House Speaker Dennis Hastert in pushing the GOP's agenda.

"He's lost his office. He's lost his staff. And he's now basically a rank-and-file member who has a lot of friends and will still have influence," said Connecticut Rep. Christopher Shays, a moderate Republican.

DeLay was charged Wednesday with conspiring with two political associates to use corporate donations to support Texas legislative candidates.

House rules require any member of the elected leadership to step down temporarily if indicted.

### Playwright August Wilson dies of liver cancer at 60

NEW YORK — Playwright August Wilson, whose epic 10-play cycle chronicling the black experience in 20th-century America included such landmark dramas as "Fences" and "Ma Rainey's Black Bottom," died Sunday of liver cancer, a family spokeswoman said. He was 60.

Wilson died at Swedish Medical Center in Seattle, surrounded by his family, said Dena Levitin, Wilson's personal assistant.

The playwright had disclosed in late August that his illness was inoperable and he had only a few months to live.

"We've lost a great writer," said Kenny Leon, Broadway director.

### Authorities link robbery to immigrant slayings

ELLENTON, Ga. — Authorities have linked a string of home invasions that left five Mexican immigrants dead with an armed robbery that occurred last month after reviewing descriptions of weapons used in both crimes.

Javier Guzman and Juventino Leon were assaulted in their trailer on Sept. 13 by three men wielding chrome pistols and baseball bats, similar to the weapons used in the south Georgia slayings on Friday.

Authorities suspect at least two men committed the attacks at four mobile home parks and targeted Hispanics.

### Construction quality had role in storm damage

GULFPORT, Miss. — A few more nails and extra bolts could have made a big difference for some homes that were destroyed by Hurricane Katrina.

An initial engineering review found that most of the wood-frame houses that survived the storm's 130 mph gusts held up because of little things: plenty of nails, metal straps attaching rafters to frames and bolts anchoring frames and porches to concrete.

"The lesson to be learned is attention to detail," said John van de Lindt, a Colorado State University professor who was part of the team. "If the (building) code was followed, things seemed to do really well."

### Faltering economy could add to Republican woes

WASHINGTON — Things are going so badly for President Bush and his fellow Republicans that it is hard to imagine what could come along and make it worse.

With Bush's approval ratings near a low point, he is running near empty on political capital and finds himself presiding over a restive GOP.

# Military: 28 killed near Syrian border

QAIM, Iraq - U.S. troops battled insurgents holed up in houses and driving explosive-laden vehicles in a second town near the Syrian border Sunday, killing 28 in an expansion of their two-day-old offensive chasing al-Qaida fighters along the Euphrates River valley, the military said.

Al-Qaida in Iraq claimed to have taken two Marines captive during the fighting and threatened to kill them within 24 hours unless all female Sunni detainees are released from U.S. and Iraqi prisons in the country. The U.S. military said the claim appeared false.

"There are no indications that the al-Qaida claims...are true," Multinational Force West, the command in the region said. It said it was conducting checks "to verify that all Marines are accounted for."

Even as the fighting continued, political differences among Iraqi leaders deepened ahead of the crucial Oct. 15 national vote on a new constitution. Iraq's Kurdish president, Jalal Talabani, called on the Shiite prime minister to step down over accusations he is monopolizing power in the government and ignoring his Kurdish coalition partners' demands, a spokesman for Talabani's Patriotic Union of Kurdistan said.

The U.S. military says al-Qaida in Iraq, the country's most fearsome insurgent group, has turned the area near the border into a "sanctuary" and a way-station for foreign fighters entering from Syria.

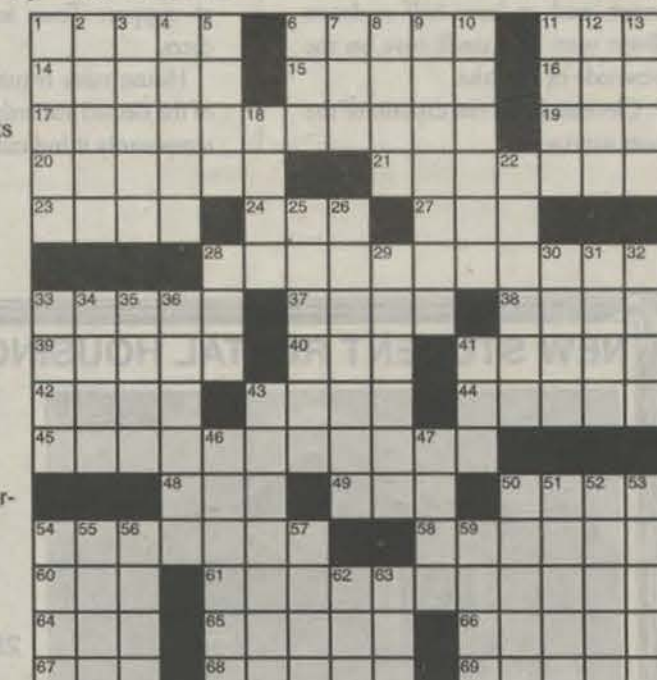
In Karabilah, Marines clashed with insurgents who opened fire from a building on Sunday in a firefight that killed eight militants, the military said.

The move into Karabilah widened the sweep launched a day earlier by 1,000 Marines, soldiers and sailors, starting with nearby Sadah, a tiny village about eight miles from the Syrian border.

There was "virtually no opposition" in Sadah, the Marine commander in western Anbar province, Col. Stephen W. Davis, told The Associated Press.

At least 28 militants were killed in fighting Sunday, Davis said, bringing the two-day toll among insurgents to 36. There have been no serious U.S. casualties in the operation, he said.

U.S. forces are aiming to clamp down on insurgents ahead of the Oct. 15 vote. Al-Qaida in Iraq and other groups in the Sunni-led insurgency have launched a wave of violence to wreck the vote, killing more than 200 people in the past week.

# Man sentenced to 60 years in prison for toddler's death

EDWARDSVILLE — An Alton man has been sentenced to the maximum 60 years in prison for last year's beating death of his girlfriend's young daughter.

Michael Green, 23, was sentenced Thursday in Madison County Circuit Court in the death of 2-year-old Zariah Harrison. Green is ineligible for parole, although Judge Ann Callis gave him credit for the roughly 500 days he already has served in jail.

Green, who was convicted by jurors in July of first-degree murder, told police he punched the girl a couple of times in the abdomen on March 6, 2004. Officials said the toddler sustained damage to her brain, liver and abdominal cavity. She died two days later at a hospital.

Prosecutors asked for the maximum sentence but Green's court-appointed attorney, Tim Berkley, said his client deserved a 20-year sentence, the minimum allowed by law.

Berkley told the judge that Green studies the Bible and can be rehabilitated.

The girl's mother, Sharina Smallwood, 25, pleaded guilty in January to aggravated battery of a child and is serving a 10-year prison sentence for her role in Zariah's death. Prosecutors alleged she was present during the beating.

## Former Governor says he understands 'traumatic experience' facing Ryan

CHICAGO — As the last former Illinois governor to face criminal charges, Dan Walker said he has an idea of what George Ryan is going through, although he is quick to point out their cases are different.

Walker, who served as governor from 1973-1977, pleaded guilty in 1987 to charges related to financial dealings after he left office.

Ryan, the fourth Illinois governor indicted in the past 40 years, is charged in a 22-count indictment with racketeering conspiracy, mail fraud, tax fraud and lying to FBI agents.

## Plan to fly rebel flag at ceremony draws criticism, will happen anyway

SPRINGFIELD — An organizer of a memorial to honor Confederate soldiers who died at Camp Butler National Cemetery during the Civil War said despite opposition, the group plans to fly the rebel flag when the memorial is dedicated.

The league said many Americans consider the Confederate flag "a symbol of hatred and oppression."

But Ron Casteel, national chief of staff for the Sons of Confederate Veterans, said it is appropriate to use the rebel flag because it is the flag the soldiers fought under.

"We consider this an honorable flag. This is a soldier's flag," Casteel said. "There will be no substitute."

## Tentative agreement reached in lawsuit between IHSA, private schools

CHICAGO — A judge overseeing a lawsuit brought by 32 private schools against the Illinois High School Association said the two sides have tentatively agreed to resolve the dispute about how to level the playing field between the state's public and private schools.

Cook County Circuit Court Judge Julia Nowicki on Friday said the sides reached "an outline of a brilliant agreement" during her one-hour, closed-door meeting with attorneys, although she declined to discuss details of the pact.

The plaintiffs contend an enrollment multiplier imposed this academic year on the private schools puts them at a disadvantage when they compete against public schools in state athletic tournaments.

# Man arrested, held for question in suburban deaths

AURORA — A man arrested on an outstanding warrant was being questioned Friday in Wisconsin in the deaths of four family members whose bodies were found in an upscale suburban Chicago home.

Wisconsin State Patrol and FBI officials stopped the 28-year-old man near Portage, Wis., Friday, said Columbia County, Wis., Sheriff Steven Rowe.

"There was no resistance," Rowe said.

Rowe later issued a statement saying the man was arrested on an outstanding warrant from Illinois, but he did not provide further details. He said the man is from Naperville, Ill., a suburb near the house where the bodies were found. Columbia County Sheriff's Department officials would not comment further.

Police in Aurora, about 30 miles west of Chicago, found the bodies Thursday in a two-story brick house surrounded by well-manicured flower beds and a trim, sloping lawn. Authorities had gone to the quiet, immaculate neighborhood that boasts 24-hour security patrols to check on the home's residents after they didn't show up for work.

No weapons were found in the home, Aurora police Lt. Rusty Sullivan said.

In a statement released late Friday, police identified those killed as Jimmy Chio Tsao, 34, and Katherine Anne Hanson-Tsao, 31, who lived in the Aurora home where the bodies were found, as well as Terrance Michael Hanson, 57, and Mary Lynn Hanson, 55, both of Naperville.

Gary Griese, a friend of Jimmy Tsao, said the Hansons are Katherine Hanson-Tsao's

parents. Police have not confirmed the relationship between the Hansons and the Tsaos. When Sullivan was asked at a news conference earlier Friday if Terrance Hanson is Jimmy Tsao's father-in-law, Sullivan said "there's information that may indicate that, yes."

Sullivan said his department had not made any arrests.

"There's new names coming up and new developments taking place that we're applying resources to," he said.

Frank Bochte, an FBI spokesman in Chicago, said earlier Friday that agents in Los Angeles were among those helping with the investigation.

"A person of interest is believed to have purchased a ticket and flown to California and we're very interested in talking to that person," he said.

for minors has not been changed since 1985, said Bill Weber, associate vice president for academic affairs.

"The committee's purpose is to better get the wording up to date and make sure we're looking the definition of a minor that meets the criteria that university wants it to be," Sterling said.

Criteria for a minor includes GPA regulations, residency requirements and Credit/No Credit option.

The catalog wording also creates a con-

flict between itself and university practice. requirement.

Currently, in section A under the requirements for majors on page 65 of the catalog, students interested in earning a departmental minor must receive approval from the appropriate department chairperson or dean by way of their signature.

Students declare and or change their minors at the Registrar's Office located in the basement of McAfee Gym.

At the CAA Sept. 8 meeting, Blair Lord, provost and vice president for academic affairs, reported it has not been the practice of the Registrar's Office to get department chairs' or college deans' signatures.

This practice conflicts with the catalog

"It's up to the departments and it's up to the advisers to stay on top of that," said John Stimac, acting chair of the geology and geography department, about students who change their minors, but don't declare them at the registrar's office.

"As a chairperson, if I know a student wants to be a minor, I will make sure that student tells the registrar."

Stimac said he has no control over making students register their minor with the registrar's office.

"It really comes down to the students to notify the registrar of any changes in their majors or minors," he said.

Eastern Kentucky went on the road to play preseason conference favorite Jacksonville State (1-4, 1-1 OVC) this weekend and left with a 31-14 win.

# Panthers' shutout loss snaps win streak at 4

## NIU's only goal holds up in final MVC tune-up

Eastern had its four-game winning streak against Northern Illinois come to an end Sunday in a sloppy, defensive battle.

The Panthers (3-5-1) lost to the Huskies (7-2-1) 1-0 at Lakeside Field after taking a 0-0 tie into halftime. The second half was delayed 30 minutes after a thunderstorm soaked the field and threatened to end the game at half. Northern scored the lone goal 50 seconds into the second half when junior midfielder Chris VanDuerm netted his fourth goal of the season.

Eastern head coach Adam Howarth knows that Sunday's loss was disappointing but must prepare for conference play starting Saturday.

"Frustrating is definitely a key word, we were ok, but finishing was again our Achilles heel," Howarth said. "We had a mental lapse for the first five minutes after the delay.

"It was a sloppy goal, we did the best we could under the conditions, and the guys played 100 percent," he said. "We have to keep our heads up and move forward when we start conference because everybody is 0-0 starting next week and we are going to come

ready to play soccer."

The Panthers led in shots 13-7, though all seven of Northern's shots were shots on goal compared to the six shots on goal for Eastern.

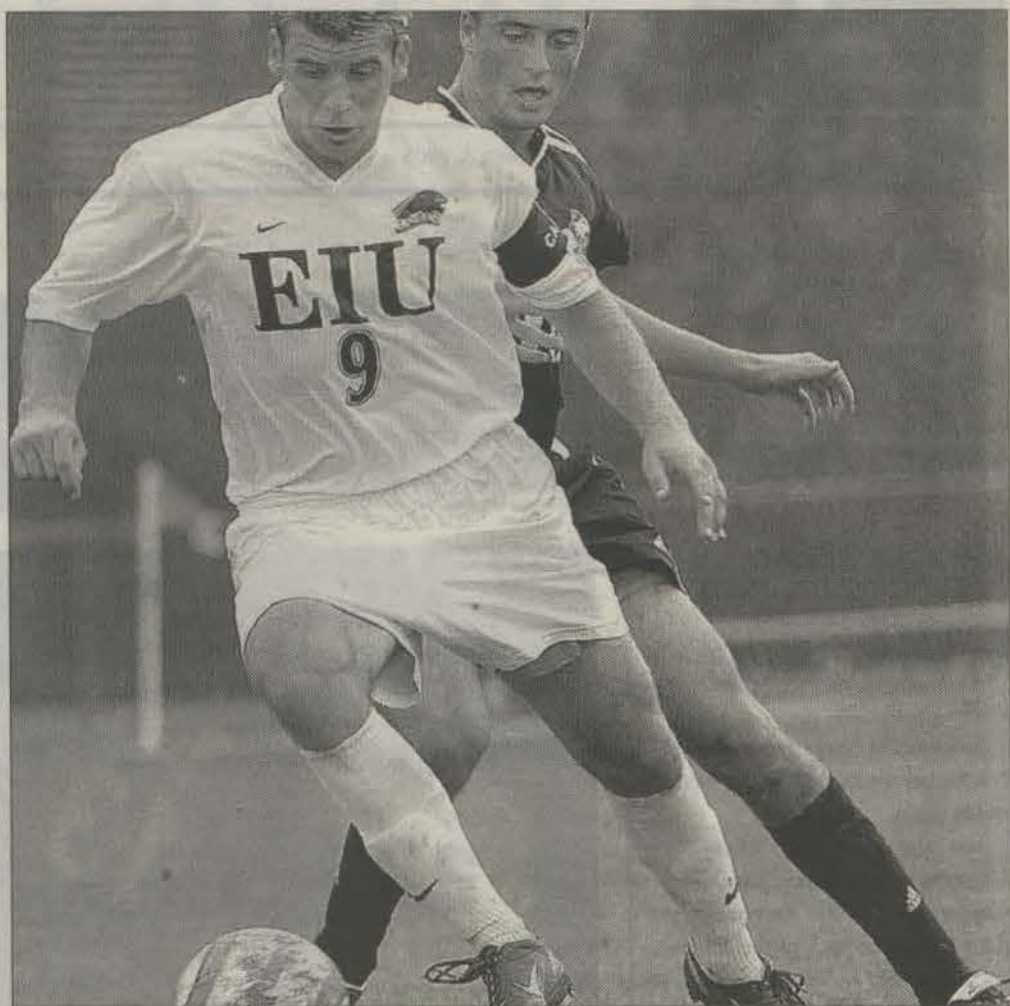
The best opportunity for Eastern to score came two minutes before half when freshman midfielder Adam Gartner fired a shot off the left post and freshman forward Brad Peters was in position for the rebound kick, which was stopped by Northern goalkeeper Steve Golerz.

Northern head coach Steve Simmons was ready for Sunday's game to be a knock down drag out game.

"Anytime Eastern or Northern play it is just a battle and it does not matter what your record is or who is playing well, everybody gets up for each other and we saw that today," Simmons said. "Hats off to Eastern, they have some good players and it is a hard place to play so obviously we are very pleased with the win, but anytime these state schools get together it is a war."

Sunday's game was the last before the Panthers will begin play in the Missouri Valley Conference Saturday against Creighton. Freshman forward Brad Peters knows that the Panthers cannot get too down and must now focus on beginning MVC play.

"It is disappointing because we played hard and now we just have to bounce back," Peters said. "We played well, we just have to practice hard all next week and come out Saturday and play well."

A Panthers' rally gave them their first tie of the match at 17, and they took their first lead at 23-22.

Mistakes by the Colonels and a service ace helped the Panthers take a 27-25 lead.

A service error by Colonels' senior defensive specialist Libby Schleisman gave the Panthers a 30-28 game two victory.

"(In game two) we stepped up our communication and everyone did their part," said Ackerman, who finished the match with 16 kills. "People started talking and our passing was great. That helped (sophomore setter) Maren (Crabtree) with her sets."

Crabtree, who holds the school record for

assists in a match, established a season high with 58. She recorded more than 50 assists and 20 digs for the second time in her career. That feat has only been accomplished 11 times in school history.

"She is doing a great job of moving the ball around and keeping us from being predictable," said Bennett.

The third game was a game of two halves. In the first half, neither team could pull away as there were five lead changes and nine ties in the match.

But the second half was all Panthers. The Colonels could only record two kills and the Panthers had seven to pull off the 30-23 win in game three.

Eastern Kentucky was in good shape in game four by jumping out to a 12-7 lead but the Panthers continued their season-long trend of starting slow and finishing

strong.

"We're really good at just being patient," said Sorenson. "We started getting our things run and then we put it all together."

Eastern Illinois rebounded with a 13-3 run that gave them a 20-15 lead that they wouldn't relinquish.

Junior outside hitter Mary Welch joined Crabtree in recording a double-double. Welch finished with 10 digs and 12 kills as she was one of four players with double digits in kills.

"This is the best we've played," said Crabtree. "Everybody contributed."

Senior libero Heather Redenbo led the defense with 26 digs and senior defensive specialist Aja Kohlbecker recorded 24. Senior outside hitter Megan Kennedy finished with 12 kills and was second on the team with a .357 hitting percentage.

## Illinois falls to get first Big Ten win

The Illini failed to rebound from a blowout loss to Michigan State in their Big Ten opener, struggling throughout the first half in their 35-7 loss to the Hawkeyes (3-2, 1-1 Big Ten) in Iowa City.

Illinois (2-3, 0-2) had two field goal tries blocked, missed a third attempt and threw an interception deep in Hawkeye territory all in the game's opening half. Illinois quarterback Tim Brasie found running back E.B. Halsey on a one-yard pass for the Illini's only score.

Iowa quarterback Drew Tate threw for two touchdowns in the win.

### No. 2 Southern Illinois 30, Missouri State 23

Quarterback Joel Sambrusky completed the most important of his three touchdown passes in overtime, connecting with fullback J.T. Wise for a 13-yard score on the second play of overtime, as Southern Illinois hung on for a 30-23 win. Sambrusky finished 18-of-25 for 234 yards in addition to his three scoring passes.

The Bears had a chance for the upset late in the fourth quarter, but Missouri State couldn't punch the ball in from the Southern three-yard line with 15 seconds left in regulation. Missouri State ran one play, a running play for one yard, before settling for a field goal, putting the game into overtime.

On Missouri State's lone overtime possession, the Saluki defense stuffed the Bears (2-2, 0-1) on fourth-and-goal from the one-yard line.

### No. 8 Northern Iowa 41, Western Illinois 24

Despite racking up more than 500 yards of total offense, Western Illinois couldn't topple Northern Iowa, losing 41-24 in the Leathernecks' homecoming game.

Western quarterback Steve LaPlace threw for a career-high 355 yards on 28-of-44 passing, including three touchdowns.

Western tied the score at 7 early in the second quarter before Northern Iowa scored 20 unanswered points in the quarter. The Leatherneck offense out-gained the Panthers 521 yards to 492 yards, but lost the turnover battle with three fumbles.

## JSU loss sparks OVC race

For the first time since the Gamecocks joined the Ohio Valley Conference in 2003 they aren't at the front of the pack in the conference title race.

For a team as highly respected as JSU, a 14-point win over a cellar dwelling SEMO team is hardly impressive.

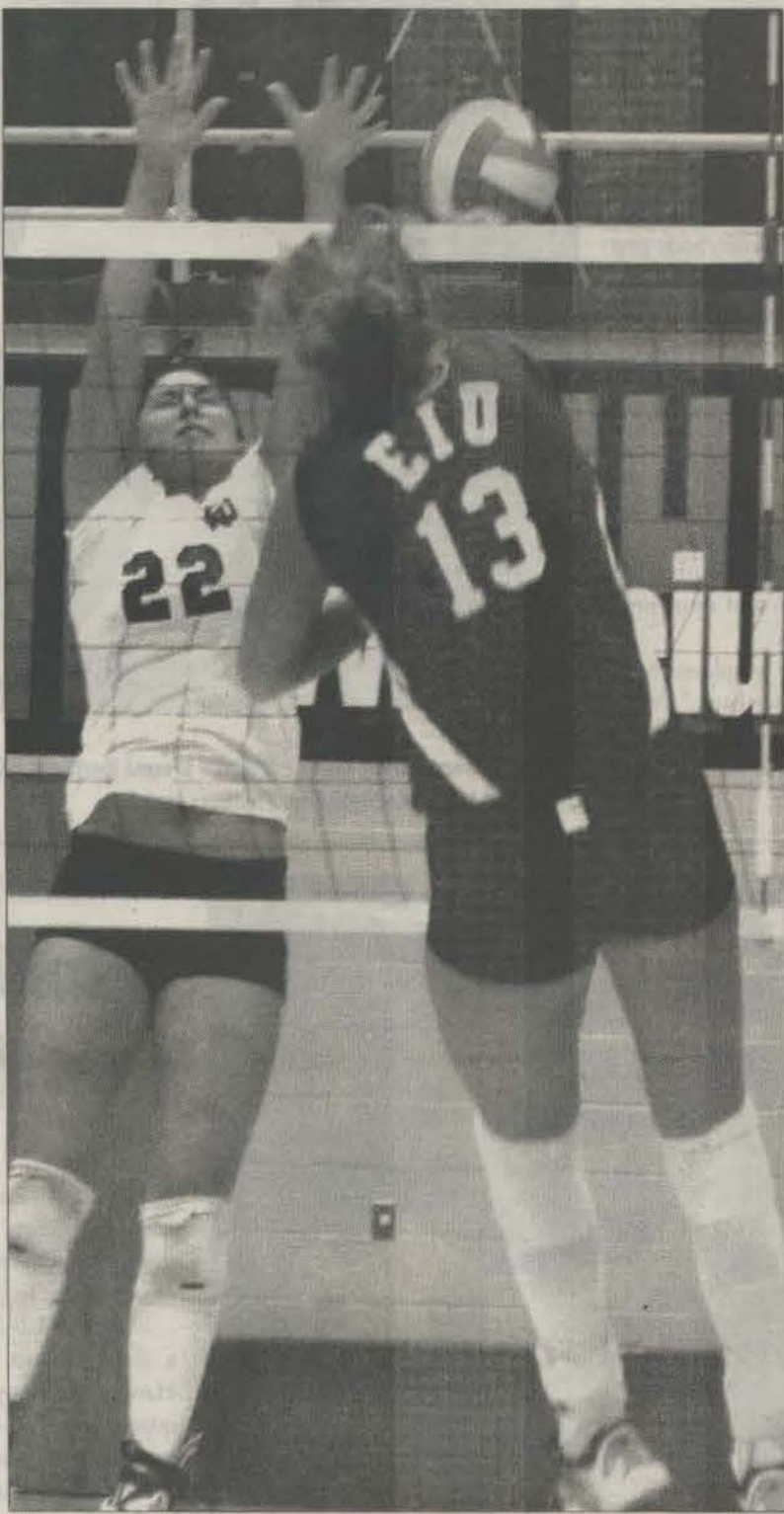

## Sorenson, defense push Panthers past rival EKU

Junior outside hitter Kara Sorenson had a career-high 17 kills and three Panthers recorded at least 20 digs to help them complete a perfect weekend by defeating Eastern Kentucky 3-1 on Saturday.

The Panthers defeated Morehead State 3-0 on Friday.

The Panthers (8-4, 4-0) are one of two teams who remain unbeaten in the Ohio Valley Conference. Eastern's largest home crowd of the season (664) was on hand to witness the match.

"Everybody's really excited," said Sorenson. "Last year, EKU's crowd tore us apart. The crowd was awesome (Saturday). They got us more excited."

The excitement is understandable. Eastern Kentucky (11-5, 3-1) was the only team to beat the Panthers in OVC play in 2004. The two teams met in the finals of the OVC Tournament, and the EKU victory cost the Panthers a NCAA Tournament berth.

"It is falling into place," said head coach Lori Bennett. "The thing that we've been focused on from the beginning is getting better every day

The Panthers played tentatively and committed several unforced mistakes that spotted the Colonels a 10-3 early lead.

Bennett called a timeout as the Panthers tried to regroup.

Sorenson was the key to a 7-1 run that pulled Eastern to within one. She had her first three kills of the match in the run.

The two teams played close the rest of the way, but the Panthers fell short and dropped game one 30-28.

Eastern Kentucky began the second game strong leading 10-5, and it looked like the Panthers would head into game three needing a win to keep the match going.
