Course Description, Design, and Goals: English 2009G is a writing intensive course centered on literary representations of race, age, and gender – three important modern concepts of self-definition. We will read novels, memoirs, and graphic or wordless novels and analyze the place these issues have in each text. To improve our analytical skills – one of the important goals of the course – we will spend class time discussing the assigned readings and the issues they raise. The goal is to improve, with practice, our reading and thinking skills as we learn from memoirists, novelists, and graphic novelists how issues of race, age, and gender can influence the development of the individual.

 - A. For each day, please write a **List of Ten**. This can include any list of ten things you found interesting about the reading. If more than one chapter or section of a book is assigned for a class, divide your list evenly among the readings.
 - B. Class discussion will be structured around students' Lists of Ten, which each student will read out loud during class. Each response is worth around 25 points. To receive full credit, you must 1) be present in class, 2) read some or all of your list out loud, 2) provide page/paragraph numbers for each item on your list, and 4) be able to explain why the items on your list are relevant to your understanding of the text.

Attendance and Timely Arrival

If you miss class, please provide a signed note from an appropriate authority (doctor, athletic director, etc) on letterhead. If you have a signed note, you may submit a copy of your List of Ten along with your note during the next class period. Otherwise, you will not receive credit. The Mid-Term and Final Exam cannot be made up if missed. Any student missing four (4) classes without a signed note will fail the course for lack of attendance. Please arrive to class on time. Arriving up to five minutes after class begins twice will count as an absence. Arriving later than five minutes after class begins is an absence.
