# **Course Description and Objectives**

English 1001 (Composition and Language) is a writing centered course that focuses on reading and writing expressive, expository, and persuasive texts. Attention is given to effective expression, clear structure, adequate development, and documentation of sources. Prerequisite: English 1000 or proficiency in basic skills as determined by the English Department. Students who have ACT scores of 14 or below, or who have no test scores on file with the University, must pass English 1000 before enrolling in English 1001.

# **Course Policy**

#### Attendance:
