Housing fees to jump 4 percent

The Housing Bond Revenue Committee voted Friday in favor of a new housing budget that calls for a 4 percent increase in student housing fees.

The seven member committee unanimously passed the budget, listing rising inflation costs as their No. 1

reason for the 4 percent increase, said Luke Neumann, a member of the committee.

"The increase is in line with the cost of inflation," Neumann said. "If you don't raise the price of housing to reflect the cost of inflation on a yearly basis, then a deficit builds up."

The 4 percent fee increase will cost students \$57, \$58 or

\$59 per semester if a student chooses the 11 meal plan, 14 meal plan or 18 meal plan, respectively.

Neumann and Kevin Cannon, director of university housing and dining services, said they expect students to be understanding about the housing fee increase.

"I think at first they will be upset at the fact that prices are going up," Cannon

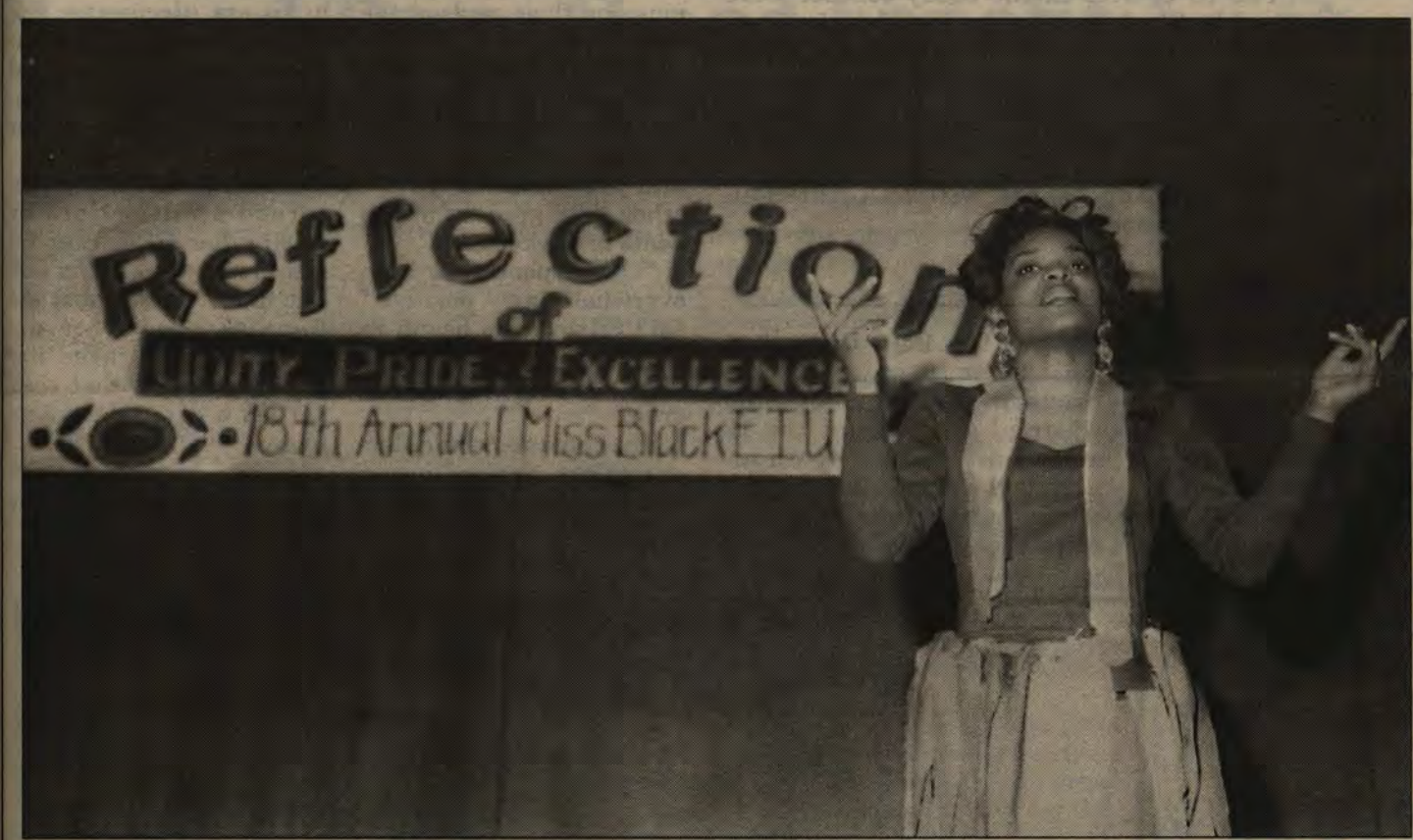
said. "But I think they will look at it as a fair increase and not an over amount of increase. If we were coming back with a 10 percent increase or something like that, then they (students) would have something to argue about. But the fact is that we're going up 4 percent, which is what inflation is running.

"Basically what we did is

cut in areas where we could and increase in areas where we had to," Neumann said. "I am very confident that the budget is more than fair."

The revenue generated from the 4 percent increase will provide various improvements such as renovations to the Thomas Hall lobby and

Final bar-entry hearing tonight

The third and final Charleston liquor task force hearing on the city's bar-entry age will be at 7 p.m. today in the Grand Ballroom of the Martin Luther King Jr. University Union.

The liquor task force is considering whether Charleston should raise its bar-entry age from 19 to 21. The City Council called for the hearings because Champaign is considering a similar proposal, which council members fear could attract University of Illinois students to Charleston to drink.

The task force has already held two hearings. The 10-member task force will consider the testimony heard and later submit a recommendation to the City Council.

The council, however, will have the final decision about whether to raise the bar-entry age.

Task force members agreed that to give members of the university community a chance to comment, one forum should be held on campus.

Speakers at the meeting will have to register between 6:30 and 7 p.m., and the order of speakers will be chosen by random drawings. Each speaker will have two minutes.

IBHE to consider program grant

The Illinois Board of Higher Education will consider awarding Eastern a \$50,000 cooperative work-study program grant at its meeting Tuesday in Chicago.

Eastern was chosen to receive the grant after the IBHE did a review of reports submitted by universities explaining how they would

use such a grant, said Deborah Smitely, IBHE spokeswoman.

The board sent out the request for the proposals in September after it received a \$1,100,000 grant from the state earmarked for work-study programs. Smitely said the money is a competitive grant program. The grant will help fund internships for undergraduate students.

Gov. Jim Edgar is also

scheduled to speak at the meeting, which begins at 9 a.m. Tuesday in the Cotillion Room of the Westin Hotel, 909 N. Michigan Ave.

IBHE Deputy Director Ross Hodel said although he does not know exactly what the governor will discuss, he expects Edgar to make comments related to his budget message.

"We've invited him a number of times," Hodel said.

"This is an opportunity for exchange between the governor and the members of the Illinois Board of Higher Education."

In other business at Tuesday's meeting, the IBHE will:

- Look at current activities on state university campuses related to international education and make a resolution to reaffirm the importance of international education on

campus.

Smitely said this issue is important to the board because state legislation passed two years ago mandates some form of international education at all public universities.

- Evaluate the status of telecommunications-based instructional delivery systems, which include distance-

Taylor Dining Service, replacing the water pipes in Lawson Hall and improving the safety and efficiency of the Thomas Hall air conditioning system, Neumann said.

On top of Thomas Hall are huge coolers with fans that blow air and "when something breaks down those fans just fly off," Neumann said.

"What you have is an unsteered helicopter flying across campus that could potentially kill somebody," Neumann

said.

Improvements are also being made to better control the thermostat for the Thomas Hall air conditioning system, making it more efficient, Neumann said.

"In the past it wasn't possible to accurately control the thermostat and it would often be too hot or too cold," Neumann said.

Other improvements proposed for the near future include renovations to Booth Library and replacing windows in Douglas and Lincoln halls, Neumann said.

"The Douglas and Lincoln window problem is something that you don't realize until it gets 40 below out and you're running the furnace full blast and it is still freezing inside," Neumann said.

Setting money aside as a savings for future expenses is one part of the budget that pleased committee members, Neumann said.

"By putting this money aside students won't see drastic jumps in housing fees if something major goes wrong," Neumann said.

• Consider the Priorities, Quality and Productivity Initiative's 1993-1994 status

report. The PQP Initiative, which began in 1991, is a program geared at cutting wasteful spending at the 12 state universities by eliminating programs that are no longer "educationally or economically justified."

Good grades earn discounts for students

BELLEVILLE (AP) - Students who make good grades or improve their marks will get discounts at local businesses under a new program that rewards hard work at Belleville Township High School.

Under the Renaissance Program, students who make all A's or B's or raise their grades by half a point can receive cards that entitle them to discounts at participating businesses.

"I think it's great," said Brad Geppert, as he used his card at John D's West End Grill in Belleville. "It's nice when you get rewarded for all the hard work you put in."

The program was launched last week by school officials at a pep assembly. About 300 students received T-shirts, academic achievement pins and their cards at the rally.

Principal Phil Silsby said he started the Renaissance Program to reward student achievement and provide an incentive other than grades for students to work harder.

"The response has been overwhelmingly positive," said Silsby, who began in July to recruit businesses to participate in the program.

The cards come in different colors, depending on the quality of academic performance.

Students who made straight A's or a 4.4 grade-point average receive a "Maroon Card," which gives holders free admission to on-campus athletic events, 10 percent discounts on purchases and the privilege to leave campus for lunch once a month.

The next step is the "Gold Card" for students with all B's or at least a 3.5 grade-point average. Holders are entitled to business discounts, half-price admission to campus events and 5 percent discounts on non-textbook purchases at the school bookstore.

And students who improve their grade-point averages by one-half point over the previous semester received a Silver Card, which entitles them to business discounts, one free admission to an on-campus sporting event and 5 percent discounts on non-textbook purchases at the bookstore.

Kesha Streater, a senior, earned a Silver Card by raising her GPA from 1.8 last spring to 3.2 this fall. She didn't know about the Renaissance Program before she improved her grades, but now that she's earned a card, she wants more.

"This semester, I'm working harder. I want the Maroon Card," she said.

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Jazz ensemble to swing with American legend

Performing with American jazz legends is the opportunity of a lifetime for most college bands, but for Eastern's Jazz Ensemble, it has become almost routine.

On Friday, the award-winning ensemble will perform with Mel Torme, a figure in American jazz for more than 40 years, at the Sangamon State University auditorium in Springfield. The performance will mark the fourth time in six years the 18-piece band has backed up a popular jazz artist.

This will be the second time the Jazz Ensemble has worked with Torme. In 1988, the ensemble performed with Torme as part of the EIU Jazz Concert Series.

In 1990, the ensemble performed with the late jazz legend Dizzy Gillespie, and in 1992,

backed up jazz vocalist Diane Schuur.

The concert, which will begin at 8:15 p.m., is sponsored by Consolidated Communications Inc. of Mattoon.

Allan Horney, director of the ensemble, said performing with Torme is a major step in the education of students in the music department.

"This is a big event and opportunity to showcase the ensemble's talents and work in a professional environment," Horney said.

The concerts have demanded that students play at a "higher standard," said Horney, who has directed the ensemble for 20 years. The ensemble has worked on Torme's songs for more than a month.

Torme, who made more than 15 albums, is considered a throwback to the swing era, Horney said.

"The fact that the concert is in Springfield may be a bit of an inconvenience, but big fans of Torme will think nothing of it," Horney said.

Students in the ensemble have said they are both "excited and anxious" about performing with Torme.

Brian Kern, a senior computer management major and trombonist for the ensemble, said playing in concert with Torme should be "a great thrill."

"This is both exciting as well as a great experience for all of us in the group," Kern said.

Walt Howard, a senior English major and tenor saxophonist for the band, said, "It is a great honor to be able to play with someone as well known and regarded as Torme."

Tickets for the concert range from \$15.50 to \$18.50 and are available at the Sangamon State University box office.

Peaceful opposition pickets Planned Parenthood benefit

Opposition to a local group's plan to open a Planned Parenthood clinic escalated Saturday as anti-abortion protesters picketed the group's fund-raiser.

However, representatives of the protesters and the organization holding the fund-raiser said the two groups avoided an angry confrontation.

"They were very peaceful," said Shannon Sherwood, a member of the Health Care Optional Planning Committee, a six-member group trying to bring the clinic to Charleston. They just marched in a circle in front of the door."

The committee was holding a rummage sale in the old Sarge's Surplus store on Monroe Avenue. Sherwood said the sale made about \$1,000.

Megan Prsygoda, co-founder of Charleston's Project Life, said she was among the 18 people who picketed throughout the day.

"We had a few people change their minds after we explained what Planned Parenthood is all about," Prsygoda said.

She said a few people approached them with opposing views but there were no confrontations.

The pickets are the latest escalation in a debate over whether Planned Parenthood, a nationwide family planning organization that offers abortions at many of its clinics, should locate in Charleston.

The Health Care Optional Planning Committee is trying to raise \$50,000 to open a local clinic by 1995. Once open, donations and patient fees would cover operating expenses.

The group held its first fund-raiser Thursday at Friends & Co., 509 Van Buren.

Pam Ryan, a spokeswoman for Planned Parenthood, said a clinic is needed locally.

"We received letters from people who are from the Charleston area who drive to Champaign for

our services," Ryan said.

Ryan said pelvic examinations, pap smears, education services, disease screening, birth-control devices and pregnancy tests would be available at a local Planned Parenthood clinic. In addition, it would offer abortion referrals and abortion information.

"We won't offer abortions, but there is a plan to develop the idea in the Champaign facility," Ryan said.

Several local residents are strongly opposed to the planned facility for a number of reasons, not only because Planned Parenthood is an abortion provider.

Terry Shepherd of the Right To Life organization said Planned Parenthood is the No. 1 abortion provider in the country and provides birth control without encouraging abstinence, she said.

Brenda Duzan, a pro-life Charleston resident, said Planned Parenthood's sex education backfires.

"There is a 90 percent increase in teen pregnancy and a 230 percent increase in abortions when Planned Parenthood moves into an area," Duzan said. "I don't want them here for my children and future grandchildren."

Virtually all of the services that would be provided by Planned Parenthood are already available locally or on campus.

"We thought the students and the community need another option," Sherwood said.

Students have access to a wide variety of birth-control options and to reproductive health care at University Health Service.

"I see no need as the students are concerned," said Dr. Richard Larson, director of the University Health Service. "If other community members want Planned Parenthood, I have no problem with that."

Larson said the University Health Service makes available nearly everything Planned Parenthood would provide. All examinations except pap smears are free.

Senate said what administration wanted to hear

It must be comforting for students to know they can always depend on the Student Senate to look out for their best interests, or at least what the administration deems to be in their best interests.

At last Wednesday's senate meeting, senate members demonstrated once again that they are all too willing to accept whatever the administration tells them after Lou Hencken, vice president for student affairs, appeared to discuss a subject students might not be willing to support — a proposed \$30 student fee hike.

Hencken said he will recommend the increase, which would take effect next year, at the March 23-24 Board of Governors meeting. If approved, textbook rental fees would increase from \$118 to \$130 per year, Lantz Gym and O'Brien Stadium fees would increase from \$15 to \$25 per year and pharmacy fees would increase from \$7 to \$13 per year.

Predictably, members of Student Government were quick to endorse the increase.

"Students will get a lot back for \$15 (per semester)," Matt Giordano Student Government chief of staff said. "I'm a student too, but we need to consider what's more important, \$15 or the services offered."

It might seem odd to many that senate members jumped to support a \$30 fee increase that hadn't ever been mentioned until the day of the senate meeting.

But it shouldn't come as much of a surprise that senate members endorsed the fee hike after hearing Hencken speak. Last year, Hencken was able to convince the senate to support a \$60 fee hike.

What is surprising is how little time it took for the senate to forget its own promise to be more active this semester in looking out for the best interests of the students.

Only six short weeks ago, Senate Speaker Bobby Smith called for senate members to "bring Student Government back to the students" in his state of the senate address.

But Smith should've known senate members wouldn't actually act on his message. When given the choice of taking time to investigate the proposed increase to see if it really would benefit students or once again rolling over to what the administration wants, senate members took the easy way out.

Hunting for job can be desperate business

I stabbed my internship-searching self in the heart months ago — and I didn't even realize it until recently.

There's a mistake on my resume.

My mind quickly reviewed the 30 or so rejection letters I had gotten in the past few months. How many were because of that mistake? How many employers saw my sloppiness — a missing colon — and as a result chucked my cover letter, resume and work examples in the trash can? How many employers even noticed?

And like many college students today, I had no one to blame for my mistakes but myself. Although the job market is vicious, there are bigger issues college students have to worry about than colons. We have to worry about doing the most we can in college, the competition we will find in the job market, and our ability to make the transition from the campus to the workplace.

If we don't, we may find ourselves unemployed, living at home, and no one to blame but ourselves.

The March edition of U. Magazine reinforces the idea that everything counts when trying to find a job. About 1 million new job seekers are thrust into the job market every year, and this month's U. was full of horror stories ranging from graduates about not getting jobs to failed employment gimmicks to depressing statistics.

Considering the number of new job-seekers, one would think the internship field is even more vicious. Freshmen, sophomores, juniors, seniors and graduate students are all looking for internships. It's 1 million applicants multiplied by five.

And grim employment statistics can be found in many fields. In my would-be profession of journalism, only 49.1 percent of journalism graduates in 1991 got jobs in the communications field as com-

pared to 64.6 percent in 1988, according to a study from Ohio State. Only 4.8 percent of the 1991 graduates were employed at daily newspapers, 2.9 percent at weekly, biweekly or triweekly newspapers, and 16.1 percent were unemployed.

But a job hunt time-line in U. pointed out the obvious solutions to insuring a better chance at employment.

Experts and job guides suggested getting good grades, doing internships, diversifying yourself, getting involved in student activities, and rehearsing for interviews.

None of these ideas should be surprising, but some students don't seem to do these necessities.

Of course, U. also recommended that job hunters have their resumes critiqued — an idea that would seem to be another obvious detail.

I will probably peer at that space where the missing colon should have been until I get an internship — if I get an internship. What's wrong with me, I'll wonder. Why haven't I gotten an internship? I'm marketable, I work hard, I've got a sturdy grade point average.

I'm a cry baby. And, like many people searching for jobs and internships, I'm getting desperate.

The idea of enjoyment is quickly disappearing from college life, as it becomes more and more apparent that more and more time needs to be spent on improving ourselves so we can make it in this vicious job market.

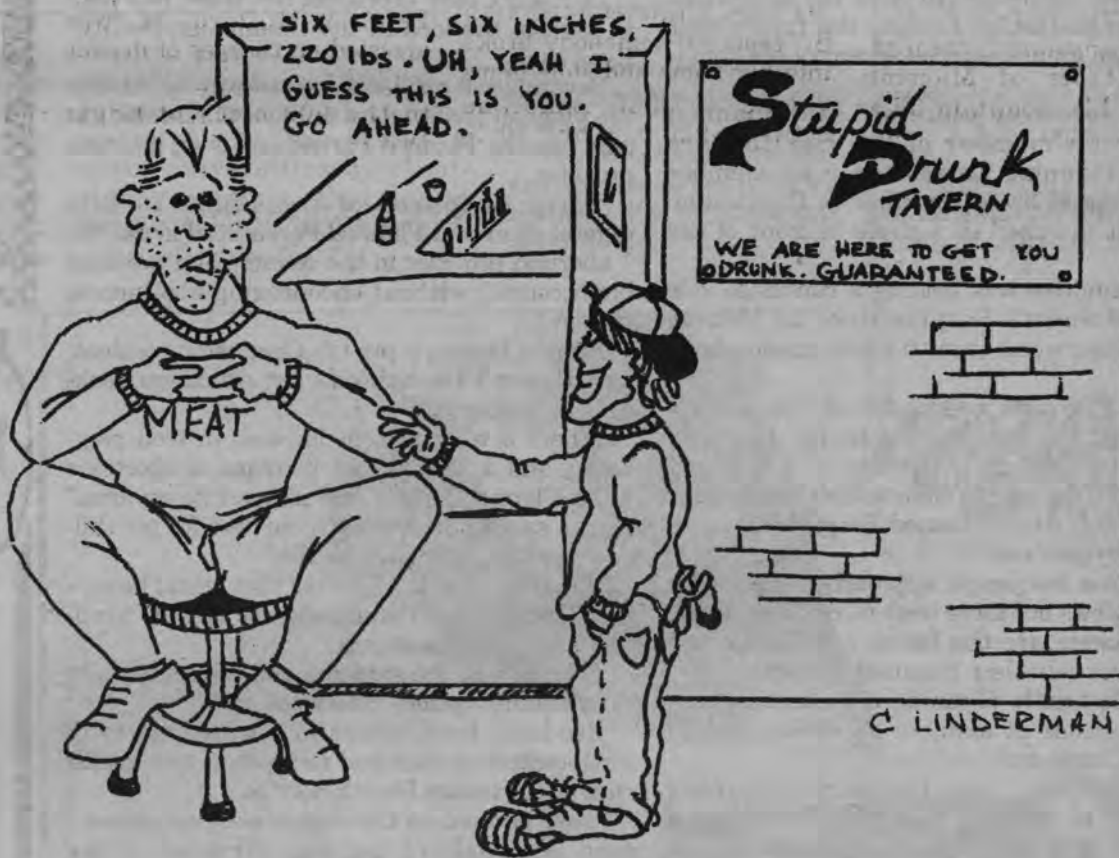
But the choice is simple: Enjoy life more now and pay for it later by not getting employed, or work as hard as you can now, and reap the benefits of being a viable candidate for employment.

Does Eastern need change?

With the recent passing of Black History Month, minority students have been forced to ask the question: What type of university they attend, and what the location of the university has to offer?

Black students are fed up with the opportunities that Charleston has to offer. It is true these students should have put more time and consideration into the university they attended, however, many of them had no other alternatives but to attend Eastern and deal with the lack of community Afro-American culture.

Eastern Illinois University has proven to be a reputable university, however, outside of the Black Student Union and a few black fraternities and sororities there is absolutely nothing for the Black Students. So why come here? Minority affairs is a useful tool to black students but one office cannot tend to the exact needs of 400-500 black students. There are only a hand full of blacks on the payroll with less than that instructing us so it is safe to say that the majority of attention is going to the white students.

Charleston, Illinois on an atlas will probably not be located, but if so the location should clearly indicate to a black student what he or she may be getting into. Although Charleston is over 75% white, the needs of blacks still need to be met. Be it physical, social, or spiritual. What is there to do? Unless we go to a campus related activity, Charleston offers us nothing. We have no form of black-related entertainment. When blacks do go out they are forced to listen to Van-Halen, Guns & Roses, and Vanilla Ice just to name a few.

Blacks need their own club.

Not to separate from races, but to provide an institution of enjoyment. One should not have to drive all the way to Chicago, Champaign, or Indianapolis to hear an abundance of black music. Blacks do have a campus radio show, however, it was briefly taken until blacks provided reason that it should stay. Why? Black students have the right to a radio show format just like any other race.

Along with music, Charleston is also lacking a black barber shops, black salon, proper mall, and a store where blacks can purchase black products. Unless blacks take the initiative to provide for themselves they are left out. Black students are forced to cut their own hair, throw their own parties, and be recognized by the campus and city one month out of the year. There is not black church and students are forced into a religious environment they are not used to if they do attend a local church. Blacks do congregate on Sunday afternoons, however, they have to accommodate with the church that worships before them. They are usually provided a minister of a different race.

This is not a racist story and is not meant to rub anyone the wrong way. The university and the town of Charleston are not to blame totally. Blacks should take the initiative to make changes for themselves and their culture. It is not the job of the university or the town to accommodate black students, however, they could do their part in making it more adjustable for black students.

Minority student teachers find new home at EIU

Minority students enrolled in the College of Education now have a great opportunity to achieve an advantage over other students in their field.

The Minority Teachers Association, or MTA, was established in October of 1993 and is now operating well with almost 40 members and a future full of interesting ideas.

Freddie Banks, adviser for MTA, issued an assessment in the spring of 1993 to recognize the needs of minority students and found a definite interest and concern for the organization he said.

"We offer many services for the students," Banks said. "We provide them with advisement, mentoring, tutoring, various social activities, and prepare them for various tests required to receive their degree."

Catina Simms, president of MTA, said "it (MTA) gives us guidance, background knowledge, experience, and support for those in the education field."

In addition to these services, MTA provides students with information on financial assistance and a head start on job placement.

Banks said that the association is exactly where it should be. It is currently researching other public school districts in order to spread

the organization and its purpose.

Results of an assessment done in October of 1993 showed that out of 33 school districts in Illinois, only one or two have an organization similar to MTA.

"We want to be used as a catalyst to affect change in public schools and recruit high school students," Banks said. The organization stresses the importance of starting the recruitment process at younger ages, he added.

Currently MTA is doing everything they can, said Simms. It has many plans for the future including a workshop on resume writing, various speakers, and a service project.

In order to be a member of MTA, one must be a student at Eastern, either graduate or undergraduate, and enrolled in the College of Education. There are no academic requirements, but members are encouraged to keep their grades up Banks said.

"The best part of the organization is being around your own kind," said Simms. "We're all going through the same things."

"When you're around your friends, you all have different goals. The organization is striving and focusing on the same goals and it gives us an advantage," she added.

The Minority Teachers Association meets the first and third Thursdays of each month in Buzzard Building's faculty lounge.

LGBAU looks back at groups' progress

The executive director of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Allies union said the union has gradually progressed since its controversial formation more than a year ago, but he said the union still has problems to tackle.

"There are still people who don't know we exist," LGBAU executive director Shannon Henne said.

On Oct. 9, 1992 pro-gay messages were chalked on several campus sidewalks days before a petition was to be filed to organize the LGBAU. This prompted a large amount of reaction from students and many letters to The Daily Eastern News regarding gay students. The LGBAU was recognized as a student organization on Oct. 26, 1992. A few days later, anti-gay messages were discovered on sidewalks around the Martin Luther King Jr. University Union.

Recently, the LGBAU has sponsored forums on a variety of issues that involve gay and heterosexual students. Henne said the earliest forums that were held by the LGBAU were regarding the union's purpose. He said recent forums have involved specific issues such as gays in the military.

He said many students have attended the forums, but he hopes the forums will attract students who have little knowledge of the union.

"The sad thing about (the forums) is that we see the same faces," he said. "The people that really need it don't attend."

In addition to forums, members of the LGBAU have been planning upcoming events for Gay and Lesbian Awareness Week as well as sponsoring other events such as bake sales and AIDS awareness ribbon sales. Gay and Lesbian Awareness Week will be held April 11-16.

Israel disarms extremists, frees Palestinian prisoners

JERUSALEM (AP) - Israel's Cabinet ordered some Jewish extremists disarmed and up to 1,000 Palestinian prisoners freed in an effort Sunday to smother Arab fury over the Hebron mosque massacre.

The violence did not abate. At least three Palestinians died as clashes between Arabs and Israeli troops spread across the occupied lands and the Jewish state itself, leaving the Middle East peace process still in jeopardy.

PLO chairman Yasser Arafat dismissed the Israeli government crackdown on Jewish extremists opposed to peace talks as "hollow and superficial."

"These are empty decisions which have no relation with the seriousness of the crime or with the basis of resolving it," Arafat



told The Associated Press at his headquarters in Tunis, Tunisia.

He charged Israeli troops were involved in the bloodbath at the mosque Friday, a claim Israel has denied. The government says a lone Jewish settler attacked the victims with an assault rifle while they prayed.

The Arab League voted Sunday night to ask the U.N. Security Council to investigate the massacre. Its 22 members urged the United States and Russia to provide protection for Palestinians in the Gaza Strip and the West Bank.

Arabs also played down the Cabinet's order for the release of Palestinian prisoners this week. Many of the inmates affected have served the bulk of their sentences and had been expected to be released next month as part of Israeli-PLO efforts to begin limited self-rule for Palestinians.

Despite criticisms of Israel's moves, Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin said he hoped talks with the Palestine Liberation Organization would resume.

"We expect that regardless of the tragic event that took place in Hebron on Friday, the Palestinians, the PLO, will ... realize that the only way to solve the problem is to accelerate the process, to find a solution," Rabin said at an international Jewish media conference.

Documents show Clinton's law firm had S&L conflicts

WASHINGTON (AP) - Two federal regulators raised concerns in 1989 that Hillary Rodham Clinton's law firm had conflicts of interest in representing the government in an Arkansas savings and loan failure, documents show.

Their worries, however, were overruled by Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. lawyer April Breslaw who wrote: "On these facts, I am not inclined to take a \$10 million case away from counsel that has obtained fine results for me on other matters."

Sen. Alfonse D'Amato of New York, ranking Republican on the Senate Banking Committee, released the documents, saying they raise new questions about the FDIC's recent finding that cleared the Rose Law Firm, where Mrs. Clinton worked, of any conflicts.

Rose's work in the case of Madison Guaranty Savings and Loan has now become part of the special prosecutor's investigation of the

Whitewater affair and the first family's business dealings. The Clintons were partners in the Whitewater real estate venture with James McDougal, who headed the failed S&L.

D'Amato demanded the FDIC's inspector general investigate the agency's earlier findings.

Andrew C. Hove Jr., acting chairman of the FDIC, responded Friday by instructing the IG to examine whether the Rose firm had "any conflicts of interest or other improprieties..." when it helped the government sue S&L wrongdoers.

The FDIC's decision to reconsider the conflicts issue was a victory for Republicans who incessantly attacked the issue during a Senate Banking Committee hearing Thursday.

One of the potential conflicts cited by Hove involved Mrs. Clinton's representation of federal regulators in a savings and loan case against a family friend and political supporter.

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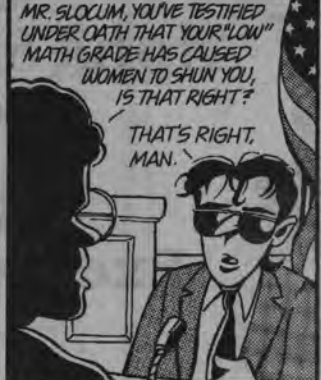

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Women's track team falls

Saturday's Panther Classic provided the women's track team with a taste of what its conference competition might be like.

The Lady Panthers lost a tough battle to Western Illinois, 69-57.

The Panthers' Kala Scott, Kiya Thomas, and Tiffany Jansen continued to be successful in their respected events.

Scott dominated in the long and triple jumps, grabbing two first places. She jumped 18-4 3/4 in the long jump and 38-9 in the triple jump.

In the 55-meter hurdles, Scott took another first place with a time of 8.61.

Two first-place finishes for Kiya Thomas gave the Lady Panthers a boost with victories in the mile run and the 3000-meter run. Thomas completed the mile in a time of 5:13.25 and the 3000-meter run in 10:43.44.

Jansen also placed first in her event, the high jump, with a leap of 5-6. Kim Double added a

second place for Eastern with a jump of 5-2 1/4.

Amy Bersig and Carey Dunker finished second and third respectively in the mile run. Bersig ran a time of 5:18.91 and Dunker a time of 5:29.78.

Shelly Baron placed second in the 3000-meter run with a time of 11:30.09.

Brooke Roberts placed first in the 5000-meter run with a time of 18:44.9 while Irma Perez added a third-place finish with a time of 19:03.3

In the shot put, Candace Blanton placed second with a throw of 41-0 1/4. Her teammate, Denise Hubbard, added a third place in the event with a toss of 40-2 3/4.

The distance medley relay team for Eastern defeated Western's relay team with a time of 13:43.40.

The meet was supposed to include the University Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Valparaiso, and the University Illinois-Chicago, but none of the schools could reach Eastern on Saturday because of the heavy snowfall.

Hockey gold goes to Swedes

LILLEHAMMER, Norway (AP) - Canada's Paul Kariya shot, Sweden's Tommy Salo saved and the longest - and one of the most dramatic - hockey games in Olympic history was over.

The Swedes are Olympic hockey champions for the first time.

After 74 years of trying, after 70 minutes of team play and 14 shots in a one-on-one shootout Sunday, they finally did it.

"I think I just have seen one of the most exciting ice hockey games ever," Swedish coach Curt Lundmark said after Sunday's 3-2 win over Canada.

Sweden won the game in a sudden-death shootout - the tension building the longer it

went. Finally, Peter Forsberg got the winning goal on his team's seventh shot.

"It's very big for me, the same for Sweden. We never won it before," said Forsberg, who pulled off his helmet and punted it on the ice in celebration.

The score had been tied 2-2 after three periods and a 10-minute overtime. The stakes were raised. Now the game would be decided with all eyes fixed on a classic man-to-man confrontation - shooter against goalie.

Each team was allowed five shots. Petr Nedved and Kariya scored on Canada's first two. Magnus Svensson scored on Sweden's second and Forsberg connected on its fourth.

Still no winner.

The tension level was raised another notch. Now each team gets just one shot. If the score remains tied, the process is repeated until there is a winner.

"It's part of the rules," Canada coach Tom Renney said.

"We're all prepared to handle the shootout," Svensson missed his first shot. So did Nedved. The second sudden-death round matched two of the world's greatest young players - Forsberg and Kariya.

Forsberg scored even though he nearly skated too far to the left before one-handing a soft shot under Corey Hirsch's left glove.

Kariya failed even though Salo fell for a fake and flopped to the ice.

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Men's track team ends indoor season with win

The Panther trackmen ended the indoor season Friday night the same way they started it in December — with a pure blowout victory at home.

Ferocious weather throughout the state kept away many of the expected teams. But the ones that showed up were most likely sorry they did as the Panthers dished out nothing but dominance at the Pepsi Invitational in Lantz Fieldhouse.

Eastern claimed the win with 259 points outdistancing the second-place team by 180 points. Western Illinois was second at 79, followed by Vincennes (73), Florissant Valley (30), Rose Hullman (30), Southern Indiana (10) and Greenville (4).

"I thought it was a real success," said head coach Neil Moore. "There were a lot of (Eastern) people who did outstanding things. I was very happy with the performances we had."

The high jump illustrated Eastern's might to the greatest degree, as Panthers took the first five places. Senior Neal Trentman won with a jump of 6 feet 10 1/4 inches, the highest of his career. The height ranks him fifth on Eastern's all-time list. Jim Voyles and Cory Utterback tied for second at 6-8, while Tim Thompson, having more misses, was fourth at 6-8 as well. Garrin Kay, in fifth, cleared 6-4.

The running events showed much of the same. From the 55-meter dash to the 5,000, there was virtually nothing but blue in the top six scoring

places.

In the mile, only one of the first seven finishers was a non-Panther. Nate Shaffer won the event easily in 4:20.85, and later came back to win the 3000 at 8:42.58.

Senior Obadiah Cooper, in hot pursuit of NCAA qualification in the sprints, was unchallenged in the 55 and 200. Cooper handily won by two meters in the 55 at 6.30 and by nearly three meters in the 200 at 21.93. Teammate Don Rice was second in the 55 and third in the 200.

Freshman Kert McAfee kept his undefeated streak alive in the 400 by barely beating teammates Neal Garrison and Vinram Wade Bey in a time of 49.99.

"They were all within six inches of each other," he said. "The human eye

is not capable of picking a race like that."

Other standout performances by Eastern athletes included wins by both the mile and distance medley relay teams, by Jeff Trask and Justin Weiss, who went 1-2 in the 5,000; Joe Dougherty, Brent Rankin and Seth Bond, who took first through third in the 800; Dave Lewis, second in the 3000; Todd Benton and Bryan Rebham, second and third in the pole vault; Rich Arsenault, second in the mile and Joe Rigaud, who was second in the triple jump.

Cooper, already a provisional NCAA qualifier this season in the 55 at 6.28, along with McAfee will be traveling to a last chance meet at Indiana on Friday. Moore said he is still considering others for the trip as well.

Campus visits start Wednesday

Four finalists have been chosen for the vacant position of Eastern athletic director, the first of whom will visit campus for interviews beginning Wednesday.

The four finalists are W. Dean Billick, former associate athletic director and sports information director at the University of Pittsburgh; Robert D. McBee, athletic director at Robert Morris College; Bobby Thompson, athletic director at Texas-San Antonio; and William Weidner, assistant athletic director at Southern Methodist.

The four were chosen from a field of about 80

applicants for the position, which became open when former athletic director Mike Ryan resigned in November.

John Craft, an Eastern coach and the acting athletic director, Dave Kidwell, Eastern's sports information director, and Paul Lueken, Eastern's assistant athletic director, had applied for the job.

Billick will be the first of the four finalists to visit campus for interviews and will do so beginning Wednesday. McBee will be at Eastern March 7-9, Weidner from March 9-11 and Thompson from March 13-15.

Each interview will begin with a 6:45 p.m. dinner with Eastern President David Jorns during the first day of a candidate's visit.

Days two and three of each visit will consist of a series of meetings with various campus constituencies. Each candidate will meet with the athletic director search committee, coaches and staff and

Lady Panthers lose chance for tourney slot

The kind of basketball that lifted the Eastern women's basketball team to three straight victories and a possible spot in the Mid-Continent Conference tournament was nowhere to be found in its most important contest of the season Saturday against Wright State.

The Lady Panthers fell behind early due in part to 13 first-half turnovers, with Wright State getting eight steals

in the half, and Eastern never recovered in a 68-54 defeat to the Lady Raiders at Lantz Gym.

The loss eliminated the Lady Panthers (5-19, 3-13) from a spot in the Mid-Con tournament, and put them three games behind eighth-place Wright State (11-13, 6-10) with two games remaining.

"We really didn't play that well today," coach John Klein said. "Just about every aspect of our game struggled. We got down early and we couldn't catch up.

"We had a lot of costly turnovers and really got hurt bad on the boards. And defensively we didn't do what was needed to win. All in all it wasn't a very good performance."

Eastern, which never led in the game, pulled within 52-40 with 9:18 to play in the game on a pair of free throws by center Missy Beck. But Wright State, behind the play of Joy Westendorf (18 points) and Lori Collins (15 points), went on a 8-0 run for a 59-40 lead with 5:30 to play.

Wright State took control with an

early 12-0 run that gave it an early 20-6 advantage with 12:31 to play in the first half. The Lady Raiders went into halftime with a 36-21 lead.

Junior point guard Nicky Polka led Eastern with 13 points and seven assists. Senior guard Shannon Baugh, averaging 25 points per game over the last three games and playing in her final game at Lantz, was held to just nine points on 4-for-13 shooting.

"They did a nice job defending Shannon and cutting off the middle," Klein said.

HINTS ABOUT CALLING IN: Be sure you have the dial tone before dialing. If the line continues to ring, the system is NOT available. If you don't wish to wait, call again later in the day. LATE REGISTRANTS WILL BE BILLED TUITION/FEES AND THE \$25 LATE FEE IN MID-SEPTEMBER.

OVERLOAD FEES

You will be assessed for EACH HOUR OVER 18 SEMESTER HOURS on your schedule at the time of initial billing. If you drop back to 18 or fewer semester hours BY 4 P.M. ON FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 2, you will not be charged for overload hours.

ADVANCE DEPOSIT

Each student must pay an advance deposit before being allowed to register by touch-tone telephone. The amount of the advance deposit is \$100 for Fall. The advance deposit is applied to what the student owes for Fall tuition and fees. Students who are on FULL-PAY scholarship (a full-pay scholarship pays ALL tuition and fees) or waiver must contact the Registration Office (581-3831) regarding the advance deposit. A graduate student using cooperating teacher waivers must contact the Student Teaching Office (581-2620).

An advance deposit is required so that "frivolous registration" will not tie up needed seats. The advance deposit also guarantees that you have space in the class when you schedule by phone. The advance deposit is applied toward your total tuition and fees for the term—it is not an additional cost.

A student who is interested in one particular course only is encouraged to use option 2# on touch-tone to determine seat availability BEFORE PAYING THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT.

The advance deposit is refundable if you notify the Registration Office in writing by the cutoff date. See calendar.

STUDENT INSURANCE REFUND

Students who can provide evidence of having health insurance equal to or better than the EIU Student Sickness and Accident Insurance may request "Petition for Insurance Refund" forms from Student Health Insurance, Student Services Building, East Wing. A copy of your insurance company's outline of coverage or a copy of your medical I.D. card must be attached to the completed "Petition for Insurance Refund" forms.

SEPTEMBER 2, 1994, is the last date these petitions will be accepted for Fall 1994.

CLEAR YOUR RECORD OR LOSE YOUR CLASSES

If you register and do not have a CLEAR RECORD with ALL UNIVERSITY OFFICES BY AUGUST 12, your FALL CLASSES WILL BE CANCELLED.

PREREQUISITES

Check the catalog for information about prerequisites. Also be aware of these general conditions:

1. Before registering for UPPER-LEVEL (3000- and 4000-level) courses in the COLLEGE OF BUSINESS (COB), a student must be admitted to the College of Business. Shortly before classes begin, a student with 60+ s.h. NOT admitted to the COB may request these courses. See calendar.
2. ONLY HONORS STUDENTS may request honors sections of courses.
3. UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS may not register in GRADUATE-LEVEL COURSES, except that seniors may, under certain conditions—see catalog for details.

All courses which have prerequisites have been identified in the schedule bulletin with an asterisk (*). Please check the course listings in the general catalog, or consult with your adviser, to be sure you meet all prerequisites for any course in which you enroll.

FA94 PAYMENT OF TUITION AND FEES

A bill and an unofficial schedule will be mailed to your home address about mid-July, and payment must be received no later than Aug. 12. A student who registers late in July will be billed at the home address about Aug. 1 with payment due by Aug. 12. A student who does not RETURN THE BILL and any REQUIRED PAYMENT by the Aug. deadline risks cancellation of classes and WILL BE CHARGED THE \$25 LATE FEE.

A student who registers LATE (after July 29) will be billed tuition/fees and the \$25 late fee in mid-September.

If you do not pay your bill by the due date on the bill, your CLASSES WILL BE SUBJECT TO CANCELLATION.

You must register by JULY 29 and return your bill with any required payment by the Aug. deadline to avoid being charged the \$25 late fee.

ALL STUDENTS: Make sure the Housing Office has your correct home and local addresses in the computer so you will receive your bill in time to pay before the deadline. YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR MAKING SURE THE UNIVERSITY HAS A CORRECT ADDRESS FOR BILLING.

**NEW BILLING SYSTEM
EFFECTIVE FOR FA94 SEMESTER**

Billings for the FA94 semester will be processed through the Business Office, Collections by a new Billing Receivable System. This new system has been designed to provide students with a clearer and more simplified process for the billing and payment of their University financial obligations. Charges for tuition and fees, University housing, Booth Library, Textbook Rental, Judicial fines and some special course fees will all be billed to the student through the new system. A sample bill is shown on this page.

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR MAKING SURE THE UNIVERSITY HAS A CORRECT ADDRESS FOR BILLING. Please be sure the **Housing Office** has your correct home and local addresses so you will receive your bill in time to pay before the deadline. Due to the new Billing Receivable System, the University has instituted some new billing and payment policies and procedures. Following is important information you should know regarding billing and payment.

PAYMENT OF PRIOR SEMESTER BILLS - Students must pay off all their financial obligations from prior semesters before the start of the FA94 semester. Some or all of your prior semester financial obligations may appear on your FA94 bill. They will be included in your minimum payment total, which is shown on the front of the billing statement as "CURRENT DUE." Your SU94 charges and prior semester charges not on your bill must be paid before you will be allowed to complete enrollment for the FA94 semester.

GENERAL INFORMATION - Students who will be residing in University housing for the FA94 semester will have a bill mailed to them about May 24, and payment **must be received** by June 12. A bill for tuition/fees and an unofficial schedule will be mailed to your home address about July 19, and payment **must be received** by August 12. A student who registers after July 14 but no later than July 29, will be billed on August 1, with payment due August 12. **Your payment must be received in the Cashier Office by the due date.** Having the payment postmarked on or before the due date will not suffice. **IF PAYMENT IS NOT RECEIVED BY THE SPECIFIED DATE AND/OR THERE IS A HOLD ON YOUR RECORDS, YOUR HOUSING ASSIGNMENT MAY BE CANCELED, YOUR CLASS SCHEDULE MAY BE CANCELED AND A \$25 LATE FEE WILL BE REQUIRED TO GO THROUGH LATE REGISTRATION.**

NOTE: If you have not received a bill for FA94 housing/meals by June 1, or if you have questions about your bill, call the Business Office, Collections, at 581-3715. Specific questions about housing and meals should be directed to the Housing Office at 581-5111. If you do not receive your FA94 tuition/fee bill by August 8, or if you have questions about your bill, call the Business Office, Collections, at 581-3715. Questions about your schedule should be directed to the Registration Office at 581-3831.

WHERE TO PAY - Payment may be made by personal check, money order, or cashier check made payable to "Eastern Illinois University", and mailed to the Cashier Office, Eastern Illinois University, 600 Lincoln Avenue, Charleston, IL 61920. Please send the upper portion of the bill with your payment and put your SS# on your check. Personal checks may not be accepted for payment if a returned check was received on the account in the past. **DO NOT MAIL CASH.** Payments made in person will be accepted at the Cashier Office in Old Main. No other offices will accept payments.

MINIMUM PAYMENT - Although there will no longer be an installment billing, students will not be required to pay the total amount due for a semester before the beginning of the semester. However, a 1% finance charge will be applied on a monthly basis to the outstanding balance of a student's personal financial obligation. Following are the minimum payment requirements in effect for the FA94 semester.

- All students who do not have a full pay scholarship or waiver are required to pay a registration advance deposit of \$100.
- Students who reside in University housing will receive a bill in late May. At that time the minimum payment due will be 60% of the total amount owed for semester housing and room and board. Your minimum payment is calculated for you and will be shown on the face of your bill as "CURRENT DUE." If you have applied for financial aid through the Financial Aid Office and there is no credit on the bill for aid, see #4 below. Tuition and fees will be billed in July or August (depending upon when you register). At that time another minimum payment of 60% of deferrable tuition and fees will be due. Again, this amount will be calculated for you and shown on the face of your bill.
- Students who do not reside in University housing will receive their first bill for the FA94 semester in July or August. At that time students must make a minimum payment of 60% of deferrable tuition and fees owed by the student; this amount is calculated for you and will be shown on the face of your bill as "CURRENT DUE." If you are eligible for financial aid, you should see a credit for your aid on your bill. Your aid is taken into account when the minimum payment is calculated. If you have applied for financial aid and it was not reflected on your bill, refer to #4 for your minimum payment requirements.
- If financial aid has been applied for **through the Financial Aid Office** and there is no credit on the bill for aid, a student may request a special minimum payment option by checking the box labeled "FINANCIAL AID DEFERMENT" and returning the upper portion of the bill to the Cashier Office **ALONG WITH A PAYMENT OF \$200.** Until estimated or actual financial aid appears on your bill, you will be assessed a finance charge of 1% per month on the balance due.

Please remember that all minimum payments are subject to the deadlines listed in the "GENERAL INFORMATION" section above.

CANCELLATION - If you wish to cancel your enrollment for the FA94 semester, check the box marked "CANCEL MY ENROLLMENT" on the front of the bill and mail in the upper portion of the bill to the Cashier Office. It must be received by August 18. **This will not cancel your housing contract.** A written letter of cancellation of housing contract **MUST** be received by the Housing Office by June 15. Cancellations received after this date will incur late cancellation penalties as specified in your housing contract.

OVERLOADS - Tuition for overload class hours will be billed along with tuition and fees for regular class hours. The additional tuition for overloads will be considered due and payable prior to the beginning of the semester.

FINANCE CHARGE - A finance charge of 1% per month will be added to all accounts with unpaid charges from the previous billing statement. Estimated or actual financial aid will be considered in computing finance charges to ensure that charges are assessed only on the amount due from the student.

FINANCIAL AID - The financial aid shown on the bill reflects the best information available at the time of the billing. Up until the time Eastern receives payment from a funding agency, aid will be shown as estimated on the student bill. This estimated aid will prevent assessment of finance charges to the student on amounts due from a funding agency. An actual financial aid payment will be applied when funds are received. If actual aid is less than

estimated aid, you will be required to pay the difference. If actual aid is more than estimated, the overpayment will be refunded automatically.

Estimated Federal Stafford and Federal Plus loans are temporarily applied to student accounts in order to prevent an over assessment of finance charges. Students are still required to pick up Federal Stafford Loan checks at the Cashier Office beginning with the first day of class for continuing students, or 30 days after the first class day for first time students. At that time, students are expected to pay the amount originally billed on their account before the estimated loan was applied. Estimated credit will be removed before the October billing and finance charges will be added on amounts not paid. Charges billed on the October statement must be paid by November 1 or a hold will be placed on your record.

REFUNDS - Automatic refunds will be processed for credits due to financial aid, registration refunds, housing refunds, and other refunds authorized by University departments. Refunds for credits due to advance payments or overpayment will be processed upon written request at the Cashier Office or automatically during the first semester that a student is not enrolled. Refunds will not be processed unless there is no balance due on the student's account; and they will not be processed for students who have unconfirmed credits (such as estimated financial aid) on their accounts greater than the amount of the refund.

DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS AND HOLDS - Accounts are considered delinquent if billed charges are not paid by November 1, and a **HOLD** will be placed on a student's record. The hold will result in a loss of access to University services including receipt of grades, transcripts, and use of the Touchtone registration system. A hold may also result in a loss of classes for the next semester and the cancellation of your housing assignment. (You will still be responsible for your housing contract. Upon full payment and lifting of holds, and if you are a student for the SP95 semester, you will be reassigned to University housing.) A returned check will result in the immediate placement of a hold on the account.

ACADEMIC LOAD

When registering, please observe the credit-hour limits as specified in the University catalog under the heading "Academic Load." Exceptions to the specified limits must be in the form of an approved waiver from the dean of the appropriate college and should be presented to the Dean, Student Academic Services, 116 Old Main, PRIOR to the beginning of the term for which the exception is to be granted. Waiver requests to exceed the 15-semester-hour limit for students on Academic Warning or Academic Probation will NOT be approved.

In the event of concurrent enrollment, students are cautioned that they must include all work at Eastern plus all work in which they are enrolled at other colleges or universities in determining class load. The total semester hours must not exceed the limits allowed at Eastern. Failure to abide by this regulation will result in the denial of credit for the transfer course or courses which, when added to the Eastern academic load, violate the prescribed load limits.

LOAD LIMIT

No student may register for more than 18 semester hours unless he is eligible for an overload.

A student eligible for an overload may register for no more than 21 semester hours.

An undergraduate student with a minimum of sophomore standing may register for up to and including 21 semester hours during the fall and spring semester providing he/she has earned the following cumulative grade-point average at E.I.U.:

A senior with less than 2.50 WITH PERMISSION of the dean of the appropriate college.

Be aware that there is a charge for each overload hour.

A graduate student may carry no more than 16 semester hours of graduate credit.

AUDIT GRADING STATUS

A student wanting to audit a course (in which the student is already enrolled) must obtain an audit card in the Registration Office, complete it AND have it signed by the instructor of the class. The completed audit card must be returned to the Registration Office by the deadline. See the calendar.

SENIORS IN EIU GRADUATE COURSES

Seniors at EIU wishing to enroll in courses numbered 5000 through 5499 for undergraduate credit must apply for permission at the Graduate School Office prior to enrollment. To be eligible, the student must have a cumulative EIU GPA of at least 2.75. During the final semester of residence in undergraduate work, or the penultimate semester of residence in undergraduate work if the final semester is to be spent in student teaching or internship, a senior with a cumulative EIU GPA of at least 2.75 may apply for permission to take graduate level courses numbered 4750 through 5499 for reserve graduate credit. Students wishing to elect this option must apply for permission at the Graduate School Office prior to enrollment. No undergraduate may enroll in courses numbered 5500 or above. Complete regulations governing reserve graduate credit may be found in the Graduate Catalog.

INDEPENDENT STUDY AND OTHER ARRANGED COURSES

A student registering for independent study, internship, field experience, problems courses, or thesis must contact the chairperson of the department offering the course in order to obtain approval from the appropriate Dean. IN ADDITION, the student must register for the course by touch-tone telephone, making sure to request the correct section for the number of credit hours to be earned. If it is closed, the student should wait-list the class.

ARRANGED COURSES

Students registering for courses with "Arranged" meeting times should contact the appropriate Department Chair during the first week of classes regarding class meeting times.

CREDIT/NO CREDIT GRADING STATUS

See catalog for full description of Credit/No Credit option regulations.

ABBREVIATED CONDITIONS FOR CREDIT/NO CREDIT

ELIGIBILITY: Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors.

COURSES EXCLUDED: General Education courses, required professional education courses (including teaching methods), senior seminars, and any courses which may count toward fulfillment of the major or minor, whether required or optional, may not be taken Credit/No Credit.

LIMIT OF COURSES: A maximum of 12 semester hours with no more than one course in any single subject title and no more than one course in any single semester or term. For purposes of these regulations, Summer Intersession and regular Summer Term are considered a single term. Courses offered on Credit/No Credit option only and one one-hour PE service course per semester or term are not counted against the 12-semester-hour limit.

REGISTRATION = ADDS

Under touch-tone, registering = adding; to register, just add the classes.

REGULAR CLASSES may be added through the fifth class day; drops may be made for these classes as indicated on the calendar.

WORKSHOPS may be added until they begin; if you drop a workshop before it begins, the class will not appear on your permanent record; if you drop a workshop after it begins but before it ends, the course will show on your record with a "W" AND you will be responsible for paying for the workshop.

SECOND-HALF-TERM courses may be added until they begin; if you drop one of these classes before it begins, the class will not appear on your permanent record; if you drop after it begins but by the deadline, the course will show on your record with a "W" AND you will be responsible for paying for the course.

SCHEDULE CHANGES (ADDS/DROPS)

Try to make all changes to your schedule before classes begin. You may call back any time after you initially register to make any change to your schedule, except during the published dormant periods. (See calendar.) If your record is unclear, you will not be able to add classes; you will, however, be able to drop classes.

PERSONAL ACCESS CODE (PAC)

When you register by touch-tone phone, you will need to create your own special 4-digit code (PERSONAL ACCESS CODE). Make this a number you will easily remember, and tell no one what it is. If the need arises to CHANGE your PAC, go to the Registration Office to do so. Your PAC is your security code. You establish your PAC on the first call you make for each term. You may use the same PAC every term, or you may use a different PAC every term—just be sure you can remember what PAC you use for a given term.

REQUIREMENTS FOR REGISTERING BY TOUCH-TONE TELEPHONE

1. Must be a continuing student OR admitted or re-admitted to the University.
2. Must have paid at the Cashier Office, Old Main, OR mailed in the advance deposit of \$100 for Fall, accompanied by an advance deposit coupon; OR have submitted proof to the Registration Office of a FULL-PAY scholarship (a full-pay scholarship pays ALL tuition and fees); OR, if using co-op teacher waivers (graduate students only), have contacted the Student Teaching Office; OR, if faculty or staff at E.I.U., have contacted the Registration Office.
3. Must have seen adviser (if undergraduate student), and adviser must have set indicator in computer that student has been advised.
4. Must have a clear record with the University.
5. Must complete schedule worksheet, and have acceptable alternates readily available.
6. Must use a touch-tone telephone and E.I.U. instructions to register.
7. Must terminate registration call in prescribed manner.

ORAL ENGLISH PROFICIENCY

Eastern Illinois University has adopted a program of Oral English Proficiency Assessment for all instructional staff. Students who have difficulty understanding an instructor should, if possible, first consult with the instructor. In the event that the difficulties are not resolved, the student should address his/her concerns to the Chair of the department in which the instructor is teaching. Subsequent appeals may also be possible through the Dean and then to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs.

CANCELLATION OF SMALL CLASSES

Classes with small enrollments are subject to cancellation.

ALL STUDENTS

Be sure your name appears on the official tenth-day class roster for any class you attend. If your name does not appear on the tenth-day class roster, contact the Registration Office IMMEDIATELY.

REGISTRATION OFFICE

The Registration Office is located in the south basement of McAfee. Office hours are 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday. The telephone number is (217) 581-3831.

TO CALL IN YOUR REGISTRATION

Only a touch-tone telephone can be used to make entries. A touch-tone telephone makes a different sound after each button is pressed.

A voice prompt will guide you after each entry. EACH ENTRY IS COMPLETED BY PUSHING THE # BUTTON. YOU MUST PAY THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT BEFORE CALLING. If you are an UNDERGRADUATE, your ADVISER must SET the INDICATOR in the COMPUTER.

1. Call the system number: (217) 581-6640. If you are calling on campus, dial only the last four digits. This is NOT a toll-free number. The system will be available from Monday through Thursday from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. - 10:00 p.m.; Friday from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. - 8:00 p.m.; and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.

2. After the prompt, enter the appropriate term number followed by the appropriate year and the # sign:

1 = Fall 2 = Spring 3 = Summer

Use three digits to enter this information: Fall 1994 = 194.
For Fall 1994, enter 194#.

3. Select EITHER the option to make changes to your schedule (register) OR the option to inquire about course information only.

1 # = To make changes to your schedule—add, drop, request credit/no credit, etc., or to inquire about course information.

2 # = To inquire about course information only. ANY PERSON MAY USE THIS OPTION—EVEN IF NOT ADMITTED AS A STUDENT. If you choose this option, you may use these request codes only: N ddd#; I nnnn#; L nnnn#; and T#.

A STUDENT WHO IS INTERESTED IN ONE PARTICULAR COURSE ONLY IS ENCOURAGED TO USE OPTION 2# TO DETERMINE SEAT AVAILABILITY BEFORE PAYING THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT.

IF YOU SELECT OPTION 1# ABOVE:

4. After the prompt, enter your social security number followed by the # sign:
xxx xx xxxx #
5. On the first call for a term, enter your birth date as MMDDYY#—six digits, using two digits each for month, date, and year—followed by the # sign.
6. After the prompt, enter your secret Personal Access Code (PAC) followed by the # sign:
xxxx #
You establish your PAC when you call in for the first time for a given term; so you may use the same PAC each term, or a different PAC each term. Once you establish a PAC for a term, you must use that PAC each time you call in for that term. Make your PAC a special number so you will remember it; and remember to keep your PAC SECRET.
7. After the prompt, enter the proper request code and call number for each entry, followed by the # sign. Have alternate course information readily available.

NOTE: If the section you request is closed or causes a time conflict with your schedule, the computer will suggest another section that fits your schedule. Simply enter A# to select this section.

8. Terminate your call: T#

ACCURACY IN CALL NUMBERS

Be very careful to register for correct call numbers because the call number determines exactly which course/section you are in and whether the course is a course which continues all term, or is a half-term course.

If you enter nothing after being prompted, the voice message will again request entry after about 20 seconds. If you exceed your time limit and the system hangs up on you, no entries will be lost; simply re-dial and continue. 1. Final examinations are scheduled on the basis of the first class hour meeting of the week irrespective of whether the first hour is classroom or laboratory activity.
2. Final examinations for multiple-hour classes are scheduled on the basis of the first hour of the multiple-hour block.
3. An M-, T-, W-, or R- prefix indicates whether the first class day of the week is Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday. For example, M 800 indicates the scheduled time for the final examination in a class having its first class hour meeting of the week at 800 on Monday, R-1900 is a class having its first class hour meeting of the week at 1900 on Thursday, etc.
4. Final examination periods indicated in the above schedule as "makeup/arranged" are to be used only in cases where:
 - a. The first class hour meeting of the week does not conform to one of these schedule patterns;
 - b. The meeting time of the class appears in the Semester Class Schedule as "ARR";
 - c. A student obtains an approved examination change.
5. Final examinations in one semester hour courses may be given at the discretion of the instructor and, if given, should be scheduled for the last regular class meeting of the term.
6. Final examinations in courses numbered 4750 or above may be given at the discretion of the instructor and, if given, are to conform to the schedule patterns established herein.
7. Final examinations are to be given in all courses unless specifically exempted under the provisions of #5 and/or #6 above, or by departmental recommendation.
8. Students may not deviate from the published final examination schedule without prior approval of the instructor in accordance with guidelines monitored by the Vice President for Academic Affairs.
9. Instructors may not deviate from the published final examination schedule without written approval of the Department Chair and the Dean of the College in accordance with guidelines monitored by the Vice President for Academic Affairs.

HELPFUL HINTS

CORRECT YOUR ADDRESS AT HOUSING OFFICE

Be sure that the University has correct address/telephone information—for LOCAL, PERMANENT, and PARENT/GUARDIAN/SPOUSE address. The Housing Office is responsible for this information for ALL STUDENTS; so ALL STUDENTS must correct this information AT THE HOUSING OFFICE (basement of University Union) either in person or in writing. If the University has incorrect information, you may not receive your bills or your grades, as well as other information sent out by the University.

CLOSED COURSES

When seats are unavailable due to course closures, the student should use the "I nnnn#" code to locate open sections of the class before trying to build a schedule over Touch-Tone. This will save much frustration when scheduling classes.

WAIT-LISTING

SOPHOMORES and above who need 3000-level (or higher) courses that are closed should use the wait-list function. This provides a means of telling the department chairperson exactly who and how many students need the course.

Be sure to follow the schedule listed at the front of this bulletin for calling to confirm your wait-listed course. If by the last date for confirming a wait-listed class you are not actually scheduled into the class, you then have two alternatives: (1) contact the department chairperson, or (2) choose another course.

CALL NUMBERS FOR COURSE/SECTION

Check carefully that you are entering the CALL NUMBER and NOT the COURSE NUMBER when entering information on Touch-Tone. These are two different numbers.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT NUMBERS

When using the "N ddd#" function to find courses added after schedule was printed, use the 3-digit NUMBER—not the department alphabetical abbreviation.

INQUIRY WITHOUT REGISTERING

A student who is interested in one particular course only is encouraged to use option 2# on touch-tone to determine seat availability BEFORE PAYING THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT.

PAYMENT OF FEES

YOU MUST RETURN YOUR TUITION/FEE BILL WITH REQUIRED PAYMENT BY THE DUE DATE OR YOUR CLASSES WILL BE SUBJECT TO CANCELLATION.

TOUCH-TONE PROBLEMS

If you have problems with a specific request code, see the detailed explanation of that function.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST CODES

- A nnnn# — ADD a course (register).**
This function adds a course to your schedule, provided that there are seats available; that it does not conflict with another course; and that you meet ANY specified course requirements (such as being admitted to the College of Business, being admitted to the Honors program, being admitted to the Graduate School, being admitted to Teacher Education).
If the requested class is closed, the computer will search for an open section that will fit your schedule, and then suggest this section to you. To add the suggested section, enter A#.
- D nnnn# — DROP a course.**
This function allows you to drop a course from your schedule. Be sure you are aware of the different deadlines for different kinds of drops. (See calendar.)
- W nnnn# — WAIT-LIST a course.**
This function is available ONLY to students with classification of SOPHOMORE or HIGHER who are requesting 3000-level courses or higher. A student may wait-list ONLY ONE SECTION OF A PARTICULAR COURSE.

Wait-listing a class will cause that time-frame to be reserved in your schedule AND will add the credit hours into the total number of hours scheduled.

Each department will have the option of re-arranging priority of students on a wait-list. A department can also remove a name from the wait-list if the department determines that the student's need is not critical.

Periodically the computer will match the wait-list against available seats, and schedule students where possible, based on FI/FO (first in, first out—in other words, first-come, first-served)—unless the department re-arranges priority based on need.

The department MAY designate other sections to satisfy a given wait-list. A student waiting for a particular section may be placed in the newly-designated section, provided there is no time conflict with other scheduled classes.

It is suggested that a student waiting for a particular class call back using the "W#" transaction of TTR System to determine the result of the wait-list processing. There is a schedule of wait-list processing dates included in this schedule bulletin. Enter L# to verify that the course is now scheduled.

A student who does not obtain a wait-listed class on one processing date will automatically be forwarded to the next processing date.

All WAIT LISTS will be discontinued after the Wait-List Purge Date. After the Purge Date, the student must obtain special permission from the departmental chairperson in order to add a CLOSED class.

Be aware that departments may choose not to make certain classes available for wait-listing.

- *W nnnn# — REMOVE COURSE from wait-list.**
This function allows you to remove your name from a wait-list. Doing this will free up the reserved time-frame and credit hours on your schedule.
- W# — INQUIRE into status of WAIT-LISTED courses.**
This function allows you to inquire into the status of any wait-listed course(s) you had previously requested.
- R nnnn# — REQUEST CREDIT/NO CREDIT grading status.**
This function will allow you to select Credit/No Credit grading status for a course that is already scheduled.
The computer will check a dates table to ensure that the request is within the appropriate time period.
Freshmen may not request Credit/No Credit grading status.
Undergraduates may not request Credit/No Credit for any courses 5000-level and above.
Graduate students may not request Credit/No Credit for any courses 4750+.

- *R nnnn# — REMOVE CREDIT/NO CREDIT grading status.**
This function allows you to remove Credit/No Credit grading status from a course, leaving the course under regular grading status.
The computer will check the appropriate dates table to be sure the request is within the proper time period.

- L# — LIST ALL COURSES on your schedule.**
This function allows you to list your complete schedule over the phone, including all wait-listed courses.

The computer will give the following for each scheduled course:

Dept/Course/Section
Meeting time and day
Bldg/Room
Credits
Total credits

This function will also indicate Credit/No Credit or Audit.

- L nnnn# — LIST DETAILS of a SPECIFIC COURSE.**
This function will allow you to find out specific information about a specific course.
The computer will give the following:

Starting date (primarily used for second-half-term and Summer courses)
Meeting time and day
Bldg/Room
Credits
Open or closed

- A# — ADD A PREVIOUSLY SUGGESTED CLASS.**
This function allows you to add the previously suggested course to your schedule.
This entry must be used immediately after a course has been suggested by the computer—any other entry will negate this option.

- I nnnn# — INQUIRE to find an OPEN SECTION.**
This function allows you to find an open section of the specified course that meets at the same time. If there are no other sections at this time, then the computer will so indicate and will look for any openings at all.
If all sections are closed, the computer will so indicate.
The computer will give the following for the selected course(s):

Call #
Dept/Course/Section
Meeting time and day and length
Seats remaining

A subsequent entry of "I#" will continue the search for a different section—if one exists. Use the "I" function to find sections added after the schedule was printed. If you have problems with closed classes, use the "I" to find out what sections are open before you schedule any classes.

- N ddd# — List NEW COURSES ADDED for DEPARTMENT NUMBER.**
Use this function to find any new courses—not sections—added since the publication of the class schedule bulletin. ddd = 3-digit academic department NUMBER.
