A BRIEF HISTORY

Since its inception in the early nineteenth century, the current Jefferson Medical College has been the home base for many of the great physicians of the modern age of medicine. Starting as part of the Jefferson College of Canonsburg, Pennsylvania, which was chartered in 1802, the medical school was established in 1824, principally by the work of Dr. George B. McClellan, who held lectures in his office in Philadelphia. Dr. McClellan also founded a clinic for the indigent at this time (an organization that later became the Jefferson Hospital).

As the second medical school in a previously monopolized town, the founding fathers of Jefferson were faced with enormous political battles as well as medical challenges. However, in 1838, the Pennsylvania legislature awarded the medical school full university privileges, and the original tie to the college in Canonsburg was broken. During the Mexican-American War in 1846, Jefferson acquired its first permanent building, and during the Reconstruction in 1877, the current Main Building opened as a 125-bed hospital, the first to be fully owned and operated by a medical college. In 1891, the School of Nursing, now an integral component of the College of Allied Health, was established.







In the twentieth century, Jefferson continued to expand its affiliations and physical plant. In 1963, the oldest continuing accelerated premedical-medical program was begun with the expanding Pennsylvania State University. This association would later begin a tradition of academic distinction. In 1965, Jefferson accepted the inevitable and graduated its first female physicians. In 1968, the Jefferson Alumni Hall was completed as a centralized basic science center. In 1969, the Orlowitz Residence Hall was completed, followed in 1970, by the Scott Memorial Library. These two buildings are currently separated by a space featuring the statue of the Winged Ox, symbol of Jefferson. Also in 1970, Jefferson became the official medical college of Delaware and began its affiliation with the current Medical Center of Delaware. In 1976, the stepwise-designed Barringer Residence Hall was completed across from Orlowitz and next to the now defunct Stein Research Center. About this time, the term "Barringer Beach" came into widespread use as a name for the formerly large open green space between Walnut and Locust Streets.









In 1978, the New Hospital on Eleventh and Chestnut was completed, and in 1985, the Main Office Building and its Surgicenter (with distinctive navy scrubs) were completed. In 1990, the Clinical Office Building, featuring two MRI units, was completed. In January of 1991, the New Hospital became the Gibbon Building, in honor of the former Jefferson surgeon. Currently under construction is the Bluemle Life Sciences Building on the grounds of the former melanoma-breeding Barringer Beach.






Thanks to the efforts of the Commons Board and its satellite committees, one can see scores of portraits of past and present Jefferson faculty simply by passing through the rooms and corridors of the various campus buildings. Samuel Gross, for instance, has his well-known portrait by artist Thomas Eakins hanging in the gallery bearing his name on the first floor of alumni Hall. This particular painting is well known to all who attended or interviewed at Jefferson, as well as art enthusiasts of the late nineteenth century.

John H. Gibbon, Jr., '27: Inventor of the cardiopulmonary bypass




John Gibbon, inventor of the heart-lung machine or coronary bypass unit, has been featured with an exhibit on the first floor of the building which now bears his name. Dr. Gibbon is universally recognized for his invention which he developed while at Jefferson in the 1950's, and has also been honored with an exhibit in the Visitors' Gallery of the prestigious National Institutes of Health Clinical Center.



John Chalmers DaCosta, 1885: Greatest surgical clinician of his time

John Chalmers DaCosta, among the preeminent surgeons at the turn of the century, is also honored with a portrait in the Scott Library. Dr. DaCosta is perhaps best known for his textbook, A Manual of Modern Surgery, first published in 1894. This encyclopedic guide to various procedures was the most-used surgical text for almost forty years. Dr. DaCosta also edited the English edition of Emil Zuckerkandl's Operative Surgery, and the American edition of Henry Gray's Anatomy, Descriptive and Surgical. While his publications were in the forefront of surgery during his time, for whatever reason, modern historians have overshadowed DaCosta by his friend and contemporary William Stewart Halsted.



known by medical historians as the physician who popularized bronchoscopy in the United States, but is also recognized as the inventor of the rigid esophagoscope. Dr. Jackson first reported the use of his esophagoscope to remove foreign bodies swallowed by children, but later applied it to other purposes. Interestingly, this esophagoscope was initially shunned by the medical community because of a high incidence of complications in inexperienced hands. However, Dr. Jackson persevered with his invention, survived a bout of pulmonary tuberculosis, and later held chair positions at all four allopathic medical schools in Philadelphia in both of these medical specialties.

Another honored Jeffersonian, Chevalier Jackson both graduated from Jefferson Medical College and served as the first Chairman of Bronchoscopy and Esophagoscopy. Dr. Jackson is perhaps best



Almost 300 copies of MCAT stolen in Texas

The Texas theft of 290 copies of the Medical College Admissions Test won't affect the thousands of medical school hopefuls who took the examination, says the Assn. of American Medical Colleges.

A spokesman for the University of Texas in Austin said the exams were stolen in a break-in at a campus building the night after the test was given April 27. No suspects had been identified at press time.

The AAMC, which owns the test, has not decided whether the theft will affect future administrations of it, a spokesman said. He added that only exams were taken; it would have been more serious had answer keys also been

The exam given this year contains the first major change in the MCAT since 1977. The new exam introduced an essay question and problem-solving questions that reflect medical educators' shift away from rote memorization and toward more humanistic skills.

The AAMC said 25,000 were registered to the take the exam, at a fee of \$125, but not all registrants actually take the exam.


A Geisinger snapshot—a glance at a health care system

- Geisinger Clinic—a 479-physician group practice on 47 sites and in 38 communities. The Clinic administers a basic and clinical research program that includes more than 365 active projects and conducts nearly 200 programs in continuing medical education. The Clinic has a teaching affiliation with Jefferson Medical College.
- Geisinger Medical Center—a 577-bed regional tertiary referral center with a Level I Regional Resource Trauma Center, two Life Flight® helicopters, ESW lithotripsy, hyperbaric therapy, and two MRI imagers. The medical center conducts 16 residency and 5 fellowship programs and operates eight schools of allied health education.
- Geisinger Wyoming Valley Medical Center—a 230-bed secondary referral center serving as the eastern hub of the Geisinger system. In addition to the surgical affiliation, student rotations in Family Medicine were started in 1974 as part of the Family Practice Residency Program. Currently, the Family Practice Program at Chestnut Hill Hospital provides rotation for thirty-two junior and thirty senior medical students from Jefferson Medical College each year.


Chestnut Hill Hospital has an approved three-year residency in Family Medicine. There are a total of twelve residents with four first year residents appointed each year. The program provides the educational experience for residents to learn the concepts, skills, and attitudes required to give continuous comprehensive care to families. This includes preventive measures, health screening, patient education, and guidance for the management of urgent, episodic and chronic illnesses of family members and their effect on the family unit.

Six appointments are made each year in the Transitional First Graduate Year Program which is jointly sponsored by the Chestnut Hill Hospital Family Practice Residency Program and the Ophthalmology Departments of Thomas Jefferson University Hospital and Wills Eye Hospital. The Transitional Residency provides broad experience in general hospital medicine with emphasis on active patient care responsibility and outpatient experience, six months in Medicine, and a selection of elective services that the residents choose themselves.





Ithough Chestnut Hill Hospital is within city limits, it serves both northwest Philadelphia and adjacent Montgomery County suburbs. The Best Medicine

My role as the pathologist is to make the final diagnosis. It is a job full of marvels. I sit behind the microscope and look down into a small portion of the patient's cells that have been stained with red and blue dyes. The patterns tell a story: cancer, hemorrhage, infection, trauma, toxins-the cellular history of one's life. The configurations of these colors can be complex. To a certain extent, being a pathologist is like being an art critic. Is this a Monet or a Manet? If a Monet, is it from an early period or a late one, when his eyes began to fail? Or is this a fake, a benign process masquerading as malignant, or the reverse? Pathology can be a complicated and confusing art form, but to me it remains compelling, for nowhere else in medicine can so many answers be found.
