Course Description

The course will focus upon the distinctive theological contributions of John Wesley for the larger Christian community and for the Wesleyan family. Attention will be given to the roots of Wesley's theology, but the emphasis will be upon the value of the Wesleyan theological perspective for today.

Course Objectives

The course will seek to....

- 1. identify the roots of the Wesleyan tradition
- 2. discuss and evaluate the "Wesleyan quadrilateral"
- 3. articulate and interpret a Wesleyan theology of grace
- 4. show how theology and piety are synthesized in Wesley's thought
- 5. connect Wesleyan theology to the life of the church today

- 1. Reflection Reports (20%). You will prepare two reports on any of Wesley's sermons. Guidelines for this report will be given out the first day of class.
- 2. Book Report (20%). You will prepare one report on a selected book (other than textbook) that further informs you regarding Wesley's theology. Guidelines for this report will be given out the first day of class.
- 3. Class Meeting (20%). You will experience the Wesleyan class-meeting at stated times in the semester (see class schedule). You will write a two-page report of your experience.
- 4. Final Examination (40%). A comprehensive final examination will be administered the final week of the semester (see class schedule). A study guide will be handed out in advance of the exam.
