Welcome to one of the most exciting classes you will ever take. Not because I am teaching but because of the nature of the genre itself. In preparation for the class you will be asked to do the following:

- 1. Bring three discardable magazines with you on the first class session.
- 2. You will read 1200 pages of collateral, centering around storytelling, narrative preaching; even a novel or a play, watch some videos, movies.
- 3. Write a three-page fairy tale (to be duplicated and read in class).
- 4. Be prepared to do a children's sermon (in class).
- 5. Collect at least three of your favorite stories (to be Xeroxed and distributed to each class member).
- 6. Be prepared to tell one of your favorite stories.
- 7. You will write a 3-5 page paper on your 'theology of storytelling'.
