Learning Goal: To stretch each student's understanding of the nature and ministry of the church, and increase their comfort and skill level in ministering to persons significantly different from themselves.

Getting Started in SM602:

- 1. If you do not have a Mentor, line up one immediately and contact the SMin office. If she/he has not already done so, they should make arrangements for the mentor training session with the SMin office.
- 2. Work with your Mentor to select a cross-cultural missions ministry placement. Carefully read the section *The Cross-cultural Ministry Placement* in this document before you choose a ministry sight. You, your mentor, and your local church will be stretched during this semester. Submit your proposed placement site for approval by James Loftin by August 10—Loftin@asburyseminary.edu. This proposal should contain: Name and mailing address of ministry, director's name and phone number, one paragraph description of how you will be a part of the ministry in keeping with the guidelines set forth in this document.
- **3.** Create your Learning Goals in light of your cross-cultural ministry placement and the tasks listed on the *Activity Checklist*.

The Cross-cultural Ministry Placement

- 1. A "cross-cultural" ministry is a Christian ministry that focuses on persons that are <u>significantly</u> different from you. This generally will involve differences in several of the following areas: language, socio-economic level, nationality, education level, ethnic background, religion/faith, physical ability, and freedom (prisoners).
- 2. Cross-cultural ministries that you might consider would include organizations involved in the following activities: programs for the incarcerated and their families, housing, mentoring, healthcare, job training, church planting, drug rehab, the provision of food and clothing, or counseling. Some ministries offering these type programs will NOT 'qualify' for this assignment if they do not primarily reach out to the type people described in paragraph #1 above.
- 3. Since one of the goals for SM602 involves the missional impact on the local church, consult with your mentor and the missions leaders of your congregation as you make your cross-cultural ministry site selection. We pray that the congregation will expand its missional vision and participation because of your experience with them in SM602.
- 4. Approach your selected ministry site as a servant. Explain the SMin program and assure the leader(s) that you will participate in their ministry each week during the semester as a servant and a learner. Make sure that they realize that you will be serving as a volunteer, expecting no remuneration. Work with the ministry director to project a weekly schedule for your involvement.

Ministry Placement Options

Class Information

- 1. Each student will be required to prepare one case study during the semester (see Handbook for format). The student will provide the professor and all classmates with copies of his/her case study one week prior to the session in which the discussion is scheduled.
- 2. A written response to each case study will be due at the beginning of the class session in which there is a case study to be discussed.
- 3. The 8 hours per week that are required for SM602 are divided this way: 6 hours at the cross-cultural ministry site, 1 hour with your mentor, and 1 hour in the Reflection Group/class meeting facilitated by the professor (in addition to the regular meeting requirement). This means that the Reflection Group/class meeting will last approximately 2 ½ hours each week. Time spent traveling to and from the ministry site does not count toward the 6-hour requirement.
- 4. The attached class calendar is for planning purposes. It will be updated in the weekly class sessions. All changes become part of the official schedule for which each student is responsible. Notify the professor ahead of time if you will not be able to complete an assignment by the designated date.
- 5. Required Reading: <u>Churches that Make a Difference</u> (Sider, Olson and Unruh. Grand Rapids: Baker Books, 2002), the Book of Acts as scheduled, and various photocopies supplied by the professor(s).

Hot Topics

A portion of the weekly Reflection Group meetings will be devoted to the discussion of various "hot topics" related to the mobilization of the local church in cross-cultural ministry. Some of the topics to be included are:

- 1. Ecclesiology and church structure
- 2. The Missions Team (Committee): meetings, membership, finances and resources.
- 3. Cross cultural preaching: interpreters, humor, length, always ready
- 4. Short-term trips: Purpose and training
- 5. Partnerships: denominationalism, humility, witness, finances
- 6. Reconciliation ministry
- 7. Relief, development and community development
- 8. Mission as an inside-out process (mission education)
- 9. God's calling on your life

Field Trips

The field trips will be during our regular class time (as much as possible). If time is spent on these trips that exceeds the time allotted for class, the hours will be deducted from the time the student is required to work at her/his placement that week.
