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PH 501 PHILOSOPHY OF CHRISTIAN RELIGION JUNE 1998

I. Objectives:

To learn to love God more fully and to become more thoughtful and articulate witnesses to the truth of the Christian gospel by:

- 1. gaining a deeper understanding of how philosophical convictions impact theological beliefs and vice-versa;
- 2. examining the problem of evil and some Christian responses to it in some detail;
- 3. thinking through the relationship between faith and reason;
- 4. and gaining some competence in analyzing and criticizing philosophical arguments.

II. REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Most of the class time will be given to lecture, the remaining part will be spent in discussion. It is required that students read all assignments in order to facilitate understanding the lectures and to encourage participation in discussion. A reading report will be due at the end of the term. If less than 100% of the reading is complete, it may adversely affect the grade assigned for the course.
- 2. Four essays will be assigned. Each will be 4-5 pages in length, and they are to be typed, double-spaced. Please staple the sheets and include a cover sheet. Aim for clarity and organization in your presentation of your argument. Interact with the readings, but, of course, be sure to appropriately cite all quotes, etc. Due dates for these papers will be discussed on the first day of class.
- 3. Class attendance is required and will be checked at the beginning of each session. Note that, given the intensive nature of this course, even missing one class will significantly impact your exposure to the material covered.
