The directions to be observed by Examiners and students are as follows:

1. The numbers 1, 2, etc., indicate the division of work among the Examiners.

2. Examiners and students should be prepared on every subject within its own period. The student, when fully ready, not before, will notify the Examiner, who should have his questions (not fewer than 10 nor more than 25) written out beforehand, with space under each question for its answer by the student.

3. The answers should be written by the student in the presence of the Examiner alone, who should afford no help himself, nor allow any to be derived from any other source whatever, whether of person or of printed or written matter.

4. When impossible for the Examiner to be with the student, he may send the questions, under seal, to a third person, *preferably a member* of the Conference, or any one whom he may approve, not of the student's family, nor an undergraduate, and never to the student himself. He should direct, by postal card, two or three days beforehand, by way of precaution, and again on the back of the envelope containing the questions, that the envelope is not to be opened, nor allowed out of the possession of the third person, till the student is ready to answer the

questions. Inclosed with the questions should be a certificate to be signed by the third person when the student has completed his work, showing that no help whatever was afforded the student. Any substantial departure from these directions should vitiate the examination.

5. As soon as the papers are received and graded by the Examiner, he will notify both the student and E. L. Shepard, Registrar of the Board, the result. The minimum grade for passing shall be 70.

In grading, not only the correctness of the answers must be considered, but also style, syntax, orthography, chirography, and neatness.

6. On the back of every written sermon or essay there should be a statement, signed by the person presenting it, that the conception, composition, and handwriting are his own work.

7. The grading on sermons or essays, and on "books to be read," will hereafter be on the same scale (from 0 to 100) as on books to be studied, with 70 as the minimum grade for passing.

8. Candidates for local orders, when it is impracticable for them to be examined previously, will be examined on the day before Conference convenes, beginning at 9 o'clock.

9. Except in extreme cases, and for highly satisfactory reasons, no examination will take place after Conference has convened.

H. C. Northcot read a paper on Conference Claimants' Association. Adopted. (See Paper).

Time extended.

G. V. Morris read a resolution concerning our church in Middlesboro. Adopted. (See Resolution).

G. N. Jolly moved that the Secretary be granted the right to edit all reports for publication in the Minutes. Adopted.

The Committee on Statistics reported. Adopted. (See Report).

On motion, it was ordered that when we adjourn, it be to meet at 1.30 o'clock this afternoon.

The Doxology was sung, and benediction pronounced by Bishop McDowell.

At 1.30 o'clock P. M., Bishop McDowell took the Chair. "Nearer My God to Thee" was sung and G. F. Oliver led in prayer. The Bishop called for reports.

Auditing Committee reported. Adopted. (See Report.)

The Committee on Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education reported. Adopted. (See Report).

J. R. Howes reported that he held in his hands three hundred dollars (\$300), the proceeds of the sale of our church in Irvin. F. S. Kelley moved that it be used for indebtedness on Middlesboro church, when all other debts have been paid. Money placed in the hands of Trustees of the Conference. Adopted.

F. W. Harrop moved that this Conference request the pastor of Trinity church, Louisville, the seat of the next session of our Conference, to arrange for daily Pentecostal services at 4 o'clock P. M. Adopted.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and to the Kentucky Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church:

conditions in said deed contained. For the purpose of further equipping the building now upon said property and erecting other necessary buildings, and providing an Endow-

ment Fund, I make to you the propositions herein mentioned : I desire to see established, and perpetually maintained, in the City of Paintsville, Kentucky, an institution for instruction as contemplated in Articles III and VI of the Articles of Incorporation of the Sandy Valley Seminary, to be under the joint management and control of the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, or of the United Church of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Episcopal Church, should there hereafter be organic union between them, or the Conferences of the said Churches, or of said United Church, which, under the discipline and laws of the said Churches, shall exercise Conference authority and territorial jurisdiction in Johnson County, Kentucky; and believe that this object can be accomplished by the Incorporation of the said Sandy Valley Seminary, with conditions as shown in its said Articles of Incorporation, and the management thereof cemented and made harmonious under the control of said two Conferences.

To accomplish this purpose, I believe a fund of eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) would be sufficient for the first needs of the Seminary and place it upon a basis second to none in the Big Sandy Valley. The institution thus established would redound to the benefit of the section it is intended to serve, and give credit to the two Conferences having in charge its management and control.

To produce the sum of eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000), to be divided equally between the two Conferences, I purpose to donate to the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, in the manner hereinafter specified, the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000); and to the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), which amount the latter shall supplement, as hereinafter provided, by the equivalent of the sum of thirtyfive thousand dollars (\$35,000), viz: by giving annually an amount equal to the income thereon, in the manner and on the conditions hereinafter set forth, thus making the equivalent of the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), to be contributed by each of said Conferences to the said Sandy Valley Seminary.

I purpose to give to the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00), to be by it given to the said Sandy Valley Seminary, the said Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, however, to supplement this sum by agreeing to furnish said Board of Trustees annually as long as it participates in the management and control of said institution, an amount equal to the income of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) upon a 5 per cent. basis; that is to say, the sum of seventeen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,750.00) per annum.

The said Sandy Valley Seminary, being thus endowed by the said two Conferences in an equal amount, shall be under their joint control and management, as authorized in its Articles of Incorporation, and the terms of the aforesaid deed from myself and wife to the said Sandy Valley Seminary, subject, however, to forfeiture upon the part of the said two Conferences and of said Seminary upon the happening of the contingencies specified in said deed, and in separate agreement thereto attached and made part hereof in respect to the said securities.

I agree to carry this proposition into effect upon the adoption of appropriate resolutions by the two respective Conferences authorizing the Board of Trustees of the Sandy Valley Seminary to accept the deed, copy of which is hereto attached, and authorizing them to enter into the agreement in respect to the securities constituting the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00), a copy of which is likewise hereto attached as part hereof, and upon their due acceptance and execution of said agreement.

First, That said Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church shall promptly pay to said Sandy Valley Seminary said sum of seventeen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1750.00) annually in equal installments of eight hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$875.00), payable on the first day of November, 1906, and on the first day of May, 1907, and on the first day of November and May annually thereafter; and that upon default in the payment of any installment for a longer period than two years after the same shall be payable, as herein provided, said Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church shall forfeit forever thereafter its right to participate in the management, operation and control of said Seminary, and forfeit the aforesaid sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) and all the amounts theretofore paid by it, and its interest in the said property and all improvements thereupon, and its interest in said Endowment Fund; and that said forfeiture shall not be prevented by the payment of any amount whatever after the expiration of said two years, nor by the payment within said two years of any amount less than the whole amount that may at the time be in arrears; and,

Second, Subject to the further provisions herein contained, the exclusive management, operation and control of said Institution and of the property hereby conveyed, and all improvements thereupon, and said Endowment Fund, and all amounts theretofore paid by said Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, shall, upon said forfeiture, and thereafter, be under the exclusive auspices of the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and of Trustees to be elected by it, and all the property hereby conveyed, and all improvements thereupon, and said Endowment Fund, and said five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00), and all of said annual payments theretofore paid by said Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, shall, subject to the further provisions hereof, thereupon pass to and vest in a Board of Trustees to be elected by the said Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church Sonth, and all right thereto and therein upon the part of the said party of the second part hereto shall thereupon cease and determine; and,

Third, Should either of said Conferences, when entitled hereunder to elect Trustees, fail to elect Trustees at their respective annual Conferences when the election therefor as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said Seminary should have been held, and such failure shall continue through the next succeeding five annual Conferences thereof, such Conference so failing to elect shall forfeit forever thereafter its right to participate in the management, operation and control of said Institution, and forfeit all interest in all property owned by said Seminary, and the same and all the same shall thereafter be under the exclusive control of the Conference not in default, and all property shall be forfeited to and vested in Trustees to be named by it.

Provided, That this cause for forfeiture shall not become operative unless and until the Conference not in default, shall, not less than three nor more than six months prior to the annual Conference at which the default would become final, notify the College of Bishops of the church in default that failure to elect Trustees at the then ensuing annual Conference would be insisted upon as cause for forfeiture hereunder; and,

Fourth, Should the said Sandy Valley Seminary, or either of said two Conferences, after forfeiture and vesting of said property in it, as herein-before provided, when, and if the same should occur, neglect, fail or refuse to conduct and maintain, in good faith, an institution for instruction as contemplated in Articles III and VI of the original Articles of Incorporation of said Sandy Valley Seminary, or as herein authorized, at Paintsville, Kentucky, for as many as seven months in two successive scholastic years, then and in that event, and thereupon, all right of the Sandy Valley Seminary, and of said two Conferences, and each of them, as the case may be, and Trustees appointed by them, or either, to operate, conduct and maintain said Institution, shall cease and determine, and they and each and all of them shall thereupon forfeit all right, title and interest in and to all property conveyed by this deed, and all property passing hereunder, together with all improvements hereafter placed upon said property, and the same shall thereupon be forfeited and pass to, and be vested in, the Graded Common School for the district in which Paintsville, Kentucky, may at the time be situated; or, if there be none, to the Common School of the district in which said City of Paintsville, Kentucky, may at the time be situated; to be held by it and its successors and assigns, forever, free from any condition whatever; and neither the Sandy Valley Seminary nor the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South nor the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church nor the Board of Trustees to be elected by the Western Virginia Con-ference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South as hereinbefore authorized, if and when the same shall be elected, shall in any manner participate in the management, operation or control of the same, or of said Institution, and said Endowment Fund shall thereupon revert, pass to, and

Mayo, his personal representatives or assigns. *Provided*, That a forfeiture occasioned by failure to conduct, maintain or operate said Institution, if the Western Virginia Conference Methodist Episcopal Church South shall not be in default as herein provided, and said Kentucky Conference Methodist Episcopal Church shall, at the time of such forfeiture be in default in the payment of said annual payments, or any part thereof, shall inure first to said Western Virginia Conference Methodist Episcopal Church South, and, upon its failure to conduct, maintain and operate said Institution at Paintsville, Kentucky, for as many as seven months in two successive scholastic years, to said Graded Common School or said Common School District, as the case may be.

Wherever in this conveyance the words "Western Virginia Conference Methodist Episcopal Church South" or "Kentucky Conference Methodist Episcopal Church" occur, they shall be construed to mean and include the Conference of the said churches or of the united church of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Episcopal Church, should there hereafter be an organic union between the said two churches, which, under the discipline and laws of the respective churches, or of said united church, shall exercise Conference authority and territorial jurisdiction in Johnson County, Kentucky.

Now, THEREFORE, in conformity with said proposition, the said Mayo has this day delivered to said Sandy Valley Seminary, and it, by and through its Board of Trustees, hereby acknowledges the receipt of the delivery to it by said Mayo, of securities approved by said Board, of the value of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) as per list thereof hereto attached, upon the following conditions:

I.

The name of the corporation shall be SANDY VALLEY SEMINARY.

II.

The principal business office and place of business shall be in Paintsville, Johnson County, Kentucky.

III.

The object for which this corporation is formed is not pecuniary profit, its purpose being to operate, conduct and maintain an institution with power to give instruction in any or all departments of learning and knowledge, at Paintsville, Kentucky, especially in the branches usually comprehended in academic and collegiate courses, and including primary instruction as furnished in common schools, a teacher's course, busin ss course, department of music, instrumental and vocal, physical culture and other branches or courses of instruction usual in schools having similar general purposes, and for these purposes and in its corporate name, have the right to sue and be sued, contract and be contracted with; have and use a common seal, and alter the same at pleasure; and to acquire, receive and hold such property, real and personal, whether obtained by purchase, gift or devise, as may be necessary to carry on or promote the aforesaid object; and to sell or dispose of such property at pleasure; provided, that no property received as a gift or devise for any special purpose and so received, shall be used and applied except for such purpose.

IV.

No private pecuniary profit is to be derived from the formation of this corporation, and it, therefore, has no capital stock or stockholders.

V.

This corporation is to commence when these Articles are filed and recorded in the County Clerk's Office of Johnson County, and a copy thereof shall be filed and recorded in the office of the Secretary of State, and shall continue nine hundred and ninety-nine (999) years thereafter.

The management and control of said Sandy Valley Seminary shall be operated under the auspices of the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and shall be vested in a Board, to be known as BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SANDY VALLEY SEMINARY.

This Board shall consist of an even number of person; one-half to be elected by the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the other half to be elected by the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Each Conference shall elect as members of the Board, an equal number of clerical and laymen; and at least four members, two from each Conference, shall be citizens and residents of Johnson County, Kentucky.

The first election of Trustees by said Conference shall be in 1906, in which year, and biennially thereafter, each Conference at its regular annual meeting preceding the expiration of the term of office of the Trustees whose terms do then expire, shall elect for terms of six years from such expirations, such members of Trustees as it is by the provisions hereof entitled to elect to fill the places of those whose terms expire in that year.

Until changed by agreement between said two Conferences, the Board shall consist of twelve members. Each Conference shall regulate the mode of election as to the members to be elected by it. The members of the first Board of Trustees, as fixed by these Articles, shall hold office for the terms herein provided.

If any Trustee shall fail for sixty days, after the beginning of the term for which he has been elected, to accept the said office, either by a written acceptance or by appearing and acting at a meeting of the Board, or shall resign or die, the other members of the Board appointed by the Conference which elected the member whose office has become vacant, shall fill such vacancy and the appointee shall serve out the term of office of his predecessor, unless the Conference which originally elected such Trustee shall, by election at its next annual meeting thereafter, substitute another person, in which event that person shall serve out such unexpired term in lieu of the appointee aforesaid.

Either of said Conferences may, at any time, with or without cause, remove from office any Trustee theretofore elected or appointed by it, or by its representatives on the Board of Trustees, and may fill the vacancy caused by such removal by the election or appointment of another Trustee to fill out the unexpired term of the one thus removed.

The Trustees shall hold office respectively until their successors shall have been duly elected and have accepted the office, and election of members shall be so made that each Conference shall at all times have an equal number of representatives in the Board.

Should either of said Conferences at three successive meetings, when it should elect representatives in said Board of Directors in place of those whose terms expire in such years (which meetings occur every two years), fail to do so, then the right of such Conference to thereafter elect representatives in said Board, or to participate in the management of the said Seminary, and all right to any interest therein shall immediately cease and determine and shall pass to and vest in the other Conference; provided that this forfeiture shall not become operative, unless and until the Conference not in default shall, not less than three, nor more than six months prior to the annual Conference at which the default would become final, notify the College of Bishops of the Church in default that failure to elect Trustees at the then ensuing annual Conference will be insisted upon as cause for forfeiture hereunder. All provisions of these Articles for joint control over, or interest in, said Seminary, by or in said two Conferences, shall be subject to this provision as to forfeiture or loss of rights by default to elect or appoint Trustees.

The Board of Trustees shall have power to elect or appoint and remove, or to provide for the election, appointment and removal of officers and such employees and agents as in their judgment shall make the work of the school most effective, and to fix their compensation; and all persons elected or appointed by the Board, whether for fixed terms or otherwise, shall be subject to removal by the Board, for such cause as to the Board shall deem sufficient, after notice to and a hearing of, the person sought to be removed. And the judgment of the Board in making such removal shall be absolutely final and conclusive. No officer shall be thus removed except by vote of two-thirds of the members of said Board.

The Board shall have the right to adopt by-laws for the government and control of the school established, or as hereafter may be established under its charge, and from time to time alter the same; but said Board shall have no power to adopt any rule or regulation in conflict with these Articles, or with any joint resolution of the two Conferences hereinbefore mentioned, or in conflict with the special terms or conditions under which it shall receive property as gift, or devise, or by way of endowment. Nor shall said Board receive any gift or devise with conditions thereto annexed, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members representing the respective Conferences,

A quorum of the Board of Trustees for the transaction of business shall consist of six members. And upon all matters the vote of a majority of those present, provided a quorum, as herein prescribed, shall be present, shall be decisive, except that upon the written request of three members any matter pending before the Board, in the absence of a full attendance of all the Board, shall be referred to another meeting, of which notice in writing, shall be mailed to each member of the Board at least ten days in advance of the meeting, including the day of mailing and the day of the meeting, which notice shall specify the time and the place of the meeting, and the question or questions to be there considered. And at the meeting thus called for such special purpose or purposes any member of the Board, though not present in person, may vote by written proxy upon any question or questions for the consideration of which the meeting had been called, and at such meeting a vote of the majority of those present in person or by proxy shall be decisive, provided as many as six members be present in person.

The annual meetings of the Board shall be held at the College Building, in the City of Paintsville, County of Johnson and State of Kentucky, on Tuesday of each Commencement Week at 1 o'clock, P. M.

Special meetings of the Board shall be held upon call of the President,

or upon call of four members in writing, filed with the Secretary. The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, whether annual or special, and if special shall specify in the notice the purpose of the meet-ing, but no special meeting shall be held except upon at least ten days' notice, which may be given by depositing the same in the United States mail, addressed to the last known address of the respective member; said ten days to include the day of mailing and the day of the meeting.

The following named shall constitute and be the Board of Trustees for the terms respectively stated and until their successors shall be elected as herein provided:

The officers shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer; but the office of Secretary and Treasurer may be filled by one and the same person.

They shall hold their offices for the term of two years and until the election of their successors by the Board of Trustees, and the officers herein designated shall serve until the annual meeting, to be held in the year 1908, at which time their successors shall be elected.

Rev. A. H. Davis shall be President.

VII.

The corporation hereby created may incur such liability as, in the conduct of its affairs, the Board of Trustees shall deem to be advisable, the aggregate of which liabilities shall not exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) at any one time; provided, that by the previous consent of both said Conferences said aggregate of liabilities may be increased as that the total shall not exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00).

VIII.

Wherever in these Articles the words "Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South," or "Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church" occur, they shall be construed to mean and include the Conference of the said respective Churches, or of the United Church of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Episcopal Church, should there hereafter be an organic union between the said two Churches, which, under the discipline and laws of the respective Churches or of the said United Church shall exercise Conference authority and territorial jurisdiction in Johnson County, Kentucky.

IX.

Said corporation shall have the right to accept by gift, devise or conveyance, property, both real, personal, and mixed, upon any terms and conditions, including that of forfeiture, that the donor may impose, and the corporation accept. Provided, the same shall not be in conflict with the other terms of these Articles. It may accept such property and funds for *Endowment Purposes*, in which event the principal of such Endowment Fund shall forever be kept inviolate, the income thereupon alone to be used in the building, conduct, maintainance and operation of said institution.

And it being the intention of this corporation when organized to accept from J. C. Č. Mayo, of Paintsville, Kentucky, certain fund for Endowment purposes, and also conveyance of real estate in Paintsville, Johnson County, Kentucky, with conditions for forfeiture upon the happening of certain contingencies, all other funds donated, given or conveyed to this corporation as an Endowment Fund, without conditions, shall in case of forfeiture of the real estate to be conveyed to this Company by said Mayo, pass upon forfeiture thereof and go to, and be vested in, the same persons, corporations or schools to which the real estate under said clause of forfeiture in said deed from said Mayo, shall pass, and shall be subject to the same terms and conditions to which the said real estate is subject.

X.

Private property of the Trustees, or their successors in office shall not be subject or liable to the payment of the debts of the corporation.

XI.

These Articles shall not be altered except with the concurrence of both said Conferences as shown by their records. With such consent they may be altered or amended; provided, that any proposed amendment to be valid shall be authorized by a vote, in its favor, of two-thirds of the entire Board of Trustees; and shall be evidenced by a writing signed and acknowledged by a majority of the members of said Board, and recorded as original Articles of Incorporation are required to be recorded.

THEREUPON, The Board of Education of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church submitted a report concerning the Sandy Valley Seminary at Paintsville, Ky., accompanied by a report from the Trustees of that Seminary, heretofore appointed by this Conference, and accompanied by the papers and documents referred to in the report of the Trustees, all of which is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE KENTUCKY ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH: ---

At the last session of the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Lexington, Ky., the Reverends A. Boreing, J. C. Shaw and A. H. Davis, and Jeff Prater, Harold Means and H. B. Rice were appointed Trustees of the Sandy Valley Seminary. The Trustees would respectfully beg leave to report that the plan

which was at that time had in view has been superseded by one which we believe to be more advantageous to the two Conferences, which a re to have control of the Sandy Valley Seminary, to-wit: The Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Since that time Mr. J. C. C. Mayo, of Paintsville, Ky., has generously and kindly offered to assist the two Conferences in starting the school upon a basis equivalent to an endowment of eighty thousand (\$80,000.00) dollars, the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South to contribute thereto the sum of forty thousand (\$40,000,00) dollars, and the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church to contribute thereto the sum of five thousand (\$5,0:0.00) dollars in cash, and the sum of seventeen hundred and fifty (\$1750.00) dollars, the equivalent of 5% on \$35,000.00, annually as long as it participates in the management and control of the said Institution. To accomplish this Mr. Mayo has offered to contribute the entire sum of forty thousand (\$40,000.00) dollars for and on behalf of the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars for and on behalf of the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in the manner and form set forth in detail in his written proposition hereto annexed as part hereof. The substance thereof is that :-

If the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South will authorize its Trustees to reconvey to Mr. J. C. C. Mayo the property in Paintsville, Ky., he will then convey it to the Sandy Valley Seminary, a corporation under the laws of Kentucky, at a value of fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) dollars. He will then pay in cash the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars, for and on behalf of that Conference, and contribute as an Endowment Fund securities to the value of fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) dollars, guaranteed by him to produce an income of 5% for two years. This will make the sum of forty thousand (\$40,000.00) dollars contributed by that Conference, which, however, is supplied by Mr. Mayo.

Under his proposition he is also to contribute for and on behalf of the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church the aforesaid sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars in cash, it paying seventeen hundred and fifty (\$1750.00) dollars in cash annually so long as it participates in the management and control of said Institution.

A second or supplementary proposition from Mr. Mayo to the said Conferences is also submitted herewith, which is in substance to the effect that if each of the Conferences, within three years from the date of the proposition will contribute the sum of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars in cash to the Sandy Valley Seminary for an Endowment Fund, and the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church will change its annuity of seventeen hundred and fifty (\$1750.00) dollars to a payment of thirty-five thousand (\$35,000.00) dollars in cash, or agree to make said annuity perpetual, he will unite in making his conveyance of the property in Paintsville and the Endowment Fund of fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) dollars an absolute and unconditional gift, the sole condition being that the Conferences shall maintain the school at Paintsville, and that the said annuity of seventeen hundred and fifty (\$1750.00) dollars be paid annually.

It is the desire of Mr. Mayo to cement the two Conferences in building up a successful institution of learning at the City of Paintsville, Ky., and his plan is fully set forth in the papers accompanying this report. His first proposition, as herein outlined, has our unqualified approval. Upon his second, or supplementary. proposition we recommend, at present, no action.

To accomplish the purposes before mentioned, it will be necessary for the Annual Conference to adopt a resolution approving the plan mapped out, as shown in the accompanying papers, so far as it does approve the same, and to elect the Trustees named in the proposed Articles of Incorporation, and to authorize them to accept the conveyance upon the terms therein stated, and to execute the agreement hereto attached.

We append hereto as part hereof the following papers, to-wit:

1. Two separate propositions from J. C. C. Mayo.

2. Copy of form of conveyance, which the Trustees of the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South have executed, or will execute, as a part of the consummation of the present plan, reconveying the Paintsville property to Mr. Mayo. 3. Form of deed by which Mr. Mayo offers to reconvey the said

property to the Sandy Valley Seminary.

4. Form of agreement to be entered into between Mr. Mayo and the Sandy Valley Seminary relative to the securities above referred to.

5. Form of Articles of Incorporation of the Sandy Valley Seminary.

6. Form of Resolutions, which counsel recommend should be adopted by this Conference to carry into effect the proposed plan.

A report similar in substance to this has been made by the Trustees representing the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, lately in session at Huntington, W. Va., and has been approved by that Conference, and the execution of the papers by the respective parties awaits and depends upon the previous approval thereof by both of said two Conferences.

We respectfully recommend that the plan of Mr. Mayo, as set forth in his first, or original, proposition be approved, and that the resolution accompanying this report be adopted by the Conference. As to the second proposition of Mr. Mayo we, as said before, recommend that no action be taken at present.

He will pay in cash the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for and on behalf of our Conference, and contribute as an Endowment Fund securities to the value of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) guaranteed by him to produce an income for two (2) years of 5 per cent. This will make the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) contributed for our Conference, all of which, however, is supplied for us by the generosity of Mr. Mayo.

To meet this amount, his proposition is to contribute to the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) in cash, provided it will contribute the sum of thirtyfive thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) in the form of an annuity of 5 per cent. upon that amount, to-wit : seventeen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,750.00) annually in cash.

It is the very great desire of Mr. Mayo to cement the two Confer-ences in building up a successful institution of learning at the City of Paintsville, Kentucky, and his plan is fully set forth in the papers accompanying this report, all of which has our unqualified approval.

To accomplish this purpose it will be necessary for the Annual Conference to adopt a resolution authorizing reconveyance of the property to him and approving the plan mapped out as shown in the accompanying papers, and the election of Trustees therein named, and authorizing them to accept the conveyance upon the terms therein stated, and to execute the agreement which is hereto attached.

We append hereto as part hereof, the following papers, to-wit:

1. Two separate propositions from J. C. C. Mayo. 2. Form of conveyance from Rev. C. W. Craig and others, Trustees, to J. C. C. Mayo, reconveying the property to him. 3. Form of deed by which Mr. Mayo offers to reconvey the property

to the Sandy Valley Seminary.

4. Form of agreement to be entered into between Mr. Mayo and the Sandy Valley Seminary relative to the securities above referred to.

5. Form of Articles of Incorporation of the Sandy Valley Seminary

6. Form of Resolutions which counsel recommend should be adopted by this Conference to carry into effect the proposed plan.

A report similiar to this is to be made by the Trustees representing the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which convenes at Greenup, Kentucky, on the 19th day of September, 1906, for their approval, and the execution of the papers by the respective parties thereto will await and depend upon the previous approval thereof by the said two Conferences.

We attach hereto as No. 6, a separate proposition of Mr. Mayo in which he offers, in substance, to unite with the two Conferences at any time within three years, to make the gifts and conveyances to the Sandy Valley Seminary absolute and unconditional, provided the two Conferences shall each raise the sum of twenty-five thousand dollrrs (\$25,000.00), an additional Endowment Fund. This proposition is separate rnd distinct and in nowise dependent upon the other, and is submitted for such action as the Conference may deem wise to take.

We respectfully recommend that the plan of Mr. Mayo be approved and the resolutions hereto accompanying this report be adopted by the Conference, and that the second proposition of Mr. Mayo be likewise accepted as per copy of resolution hereto attached as part hereof.

In this connection mention, by way of well-deserved praise, must be made of our new church edifice in Barbourville, made possible by the aroused church and the efficient efforts of the pastor, T. B. Stratton. The new church is really an integral part of our enterprise in this place.

Sandy Valley Seminary has had an excellent year. There has been a good attendance and a substantial increase in numbers this year. Mr. J. C. C. Mayo is making possible, through his co-operation with our Board and that of the West Virginia Conference, a great work in this important center. Our brother, Robert T. Holland, has proven a capable educator, and his work is heartily approved.

We heartily commend the work of our general Board of Education, so faithfully administered formerly by our beloved Bishop, Wm. F. McDowell, and urge upon every pastor the observance of Children's Day and the securing of a collection from each church for the noble purpose of aiding worthy students. We commend that useful publication, *The Christian Student*, to all our people, and urge the perusal of its excellent contents: We urge upon our people the support of our institutions of learning.

THE ELIZABETH GAMBLE DEACONESS HOME ASSOCIATION.

WE heartily commend the work of this great enterprise of applied Christianity. Christ Hospital has ministered to 2,226 patients during the year. There have been over fifty conversions among the patients. The Deaconess Training School is finely equipped with a great faculty of teachers and lecturers. First-class instructors in Elocution and Music are among them. Young women called of God to be deaconesses, who are unable to pay the \$3.00 a week for room, board and laundry, which is the charge to those taking the two years' course of training in the deaconess' Biblical training department prescribed by the Bishops, on stipulated conditions are taken free of charge. The current expense of the Association for the past year aggregates \$60,000, of this \$20,000 has been for free work. The Association is building a Nurses' Home which will cost \$50,000. The building is provided for, but the furnishing of the 75 rooms at a cost of \$50 each, has to be provided for. Memorial rooms can be furnished.

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Memoirs.

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MRS. MARY PEYTON HARRISON.

Mrs. Mary Peyton Harrison, daughter of Fielding Winlock and Nancy Peyton, was born in Shelby County, Kentucky, ten miles south-east from Shelbyville, on September 10, 1823; was married on September 7, 1854, by Rev. John S. Bayless, a Methodist Minister, to Rev. John Christian Harrison, a prominent Minister in the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The first ten years of her life were spent on the farmwhere she was born and her education began in the little log school-house in the neighborhood. She afterwards attended Science Hill Academy under Mrs. Julia A. Tevis, and graduated from that institution in 1841. She was gifted in music and taught both vocal and instrumental for some years at the Shelbyville Female Academy with good success At the age of fourteen she was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church at Shelbyville during a revival under the direction of Rev. John Newland Maffit, and all through life was a most earnest and consistent. Christian.

Mrs. Harrison was a most estimable woman,-strikingly handsome, of a genial, bright, cheery disposition, possessing a keen sense of the ludicrous, and with a fund of general information rarely possessed by one whose time was so encroached upon; kind, sympathetic and generous -she comforted, cheered and blessed the lives of all with whom she came in contact. The itinerate system of the Ministry necessitating Mr. Harrison's moving from place to place every few years, brought them to live at Covington in 1854, in Frankfort in 1856, Nicholasville in 1858, Lexington in 1860, Covington in 1863, Ludlow in 1869 and back to Covington in 1872, at which latter place she resided for more than thirty five years. During the last four years of her life, which she spent with her sister, Mrs. John T. Ballard, at Shelbyville, her mind gradually gave way from the weight of increasing years and its infirmities, until in the early morning of Monday, February 5, 1906, she calmly breathed her last, having only a short time before repeated her favorite text from the sacred book—Job 13—15-"Though He slay me,—yet will I trust in Him."

At 10.30 o'clock on Tuesday morning, the Rev. O. J. Chandler, Pastor of Centenary M. E. Church, South, conducted the funeral services, basing his remarks upon the text above quoted, and emphasizing the fact of her implicit trust and faith—even unto death—in Him who had been her guide and portion through four-score years and more of earth's pilgrimage.

She sleeps beside her husband in beautiful Grove Hill Cemetery— "Beneath the clover and the wind-swept grass,"

loved, honored and revered by all.

MRS. CAROLINE FOSTER.

Mrs. Caroline Foster, whose maiden name was Phillips, was born June 10, 1826, near Orangeburg, Mason County. Kentucky. Her mother died when she was four years old, leaving her five sisters, and one brother. At the age of twenty-five she was married to Rev. Jedediah Foster, of the

Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Washington, Mason County, Kentucky. She became a member of that Church after her marriage, having previously been a member of the Christian Church. In March, 1866, Rev. Jedediah Foster withdrew from the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and became a member of the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Mrs. Foster also transferred her membership shortly after. Brother Foster died in 1896, not quite ten years ago. She was therefore, the wife of a Methodist preacher about forty-four years. Mrs. Foster died very suddenly from a stroke of paralysis August 3, 1906, at 4.00 o'clock A. M., at the fam-ily residence, three miles south of Maysville, Kentucky. She was in her eighty-first year. She was a good mother to her children, faithful, true and tender, and no less so to her step-children. They all loved and respected her, and never gave her any but kind words. As a wife she was devoted, dutiful, patient, loving, and faithful through all the changes and privations of her husband's itinerant life. He owned a farm, was very industrious, and exposed himself often, though she as often protested against it. At one time when I was at their house, she earnestly requested me to admonish him of his danger in toiling in the hot sunshine in his feebleness. I believe, from all I saw of her, and from the testimony of others, she was a true Christian. She had no fears of death. "She hath done what she could," and that secures the approval and the rewards of the Master. Her funeral service was conducted by Rev. F. W. Harrop, presiding elder of the Covington District, August 4, 1906, at the family residence. A large company from Maysville and other parts of Mason County, and many friends from Fleming County, were present at the service and witnessed her burial by the side of her husband in the family lot in the Maysville Cemetery. She rests in the blessed hope.-H. C. Northcott.

MRS. A. B. COLLEDGE.

Eliza A. Thompson, daughter of John and Eliza Thompson was born of Methodist parents May 13, 1835. Her father's house was the home of the Methodist preachers. Being surrounded by Christian influence, she was converted and united with the Church at the age of ten, and in early life she became a worker in the Sunday School and Church for the Master whom she loved and served to the end of life.

Dec. 2, 1857, she was united in marriage to Rev. A. B. Colledge of the Kentucky Conference, cheerfully sharing the trials and privations of an itinerate life and a faithful co-worker with her husband until his superannuation.

She was the mother of four children, two having died in infancy, the other two surviving. She became paralyzed Feb. 10, 1897, and was a constant sufferer until the day of her death. She bore her affliction with Christian fortitude. She was a firm believer in the final triumph of Christ's Cause, and died in the faith, and went to meet her husband who had preceded her nine years to the home of the faithful.

The funeral services were held at the home of her son Rev. John Colledge, in Bellevue, Ky., Sept. 11, 1906, and the interment took place at Maysville. The service at the house was conducted by Dr. A. Boreing, and the sermon delivered by Rev. Thos. Hanford, D. D.
