To The Preachers of Kentucky Conference :

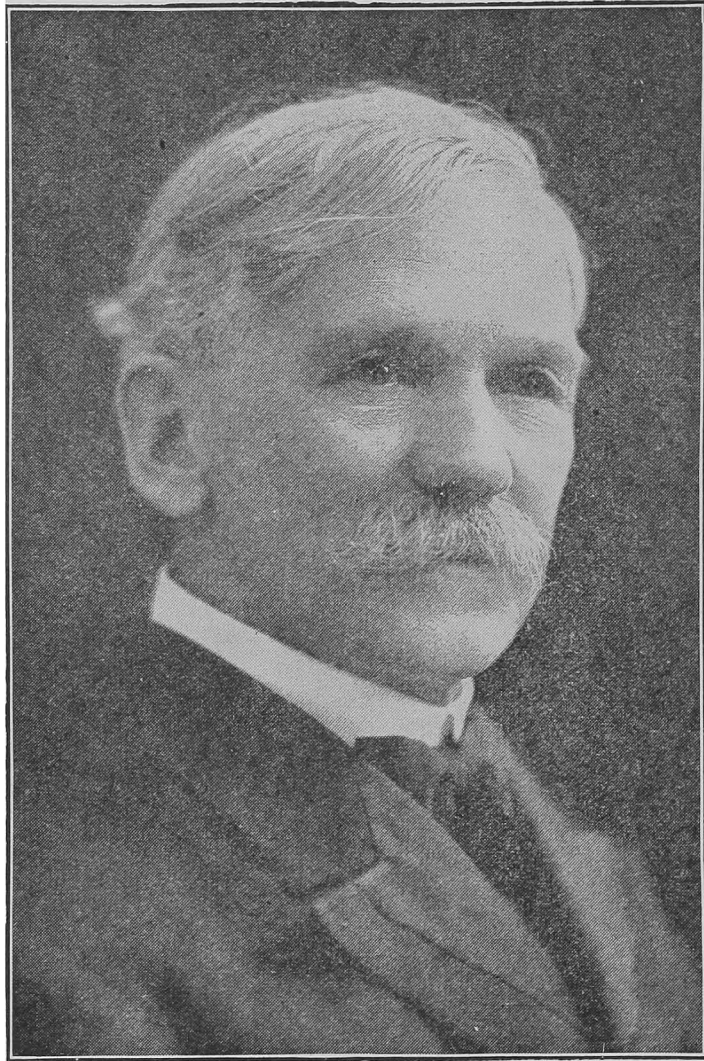
At the recent session of the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church held in Covington, Kentucky, on September 21, 1921, Rev. F. W. Harrop, secretary of the Preachers' Relief Association, presented a resolution requesting the ministers of the Conference to unite in an effort to raise \$50,000 for the further endowment of the Preachers' Relief Association, this amount to be subscribed and paid in five annual payments for five successive years, making \$10,000 annually, as follows: All charges paying their pastors a salary of one thousand dollars or less, including house rent, are required to pay one hundred dollars per year; those paying over one thousand dollars are required to pay one hundred and fifty dollars; those paying more than two thousand dollars are required to pay two hundred dollars. The resolution containing this plan was unanimously adopted by the Conference.

Our Conference is in great need of this additional endowment for the benefit of our retired ministers and the widows and orphans of our deceased preachers. It is well known that the amount as now paid is not sufficient to meet the needs of our retired brethren. We feel that the Church owes a debt to the retired ministers who have wrought well for the upbuilding of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the Kentucky Conference, and these men are worthy of the support and consideration of our people. We ask that every member of the Conference unite with us in this most laudable enterprise and that our Conference shall be one of the leading Conferences in this good and beneficent work. We request that the District Superintendents unite with us and see that the resolution adopted by the Kentucky Annual Conference shall be made effective, and that the Cause shall have the right of way in our plans this year; also that preachers who are supplies shall have this brought to their notice and shall be urged to join in the work in securing subscriptions for this endowment fund.

Because of age and infirmity, preachers are now retired at every coming together of the Annual Conference and our needs are growing. We must provide for those of our household or deny the faith,—that hitherto we have neglected in a large measure to make sufficient provision, we do not deny. Again let us as your brethren urge this claim upon you, make the effort this fall. Cordially yours,

Proceedings.

FIRST DAY

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 1921.

The ninety-fifth session of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in Union Church, Covington, Kentucky, September 21, 1921, at 9.00 A. M., Bishop William F. Anderson, D.D., LL.D., presiding. After singing Hymns 334, "My Faith Looks Up to Thee," and 560, "And Are We Yet Alive," the Conference joined in reciting the Apostles' Creed, after which Bishop Anderson led in earnest prayer. Hymn No. 415, "Faith of Our Fathers," was sung, and the Conference recited the twenty-third Psalm, the Bishop leading. The Scripture lesson, second Corinthians, the fifth chapter, was read by the Bishop, after which Hymn No. 141, "When I survey the wondrous cross," was sung. The District Superintendents and the pastor of the church, E. P. Hall, were then called forward to assist the Bishop in the administration of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, which was partaken of by about one hundred. The retired preachers were called to the chancel by the Bishop and invited to partake of the sacrament with the ministrants, and the following came forward: J. D. Walsh, J. G. Dover, L. R. Godbey, J. G. Ragan, V. T. Willis, W. G. Bradford, J. W. Zimmerman, M. M. Roundtree. The service closed by singing Hymn No. 556, "Blest Be the Tie that Binds."

Roll Call.—The Bishop spoke briefly, but feelingly, in greeting the members of the Kentucky Conference, and called upon E. R. Overley, the Secretary of the last Conference, to call the roll of members and probationers, and sixty-six members responded and ten probationers.

Organization.—E. R. Overley was placed in nomination as Secretary, and was elected by acclamation, with power to name his assistants, which he did as follows: T. B. Roberts, A. H.

Davis, G. N. Jolly, N. H. Young, and W. C. Stewart. H. E. Trent was elected Statistician, with power to name his assistants, which he did as follows: T. B. Ashley, J. D. Haggard, John O. Gross, W. G. Butler, C. E. Vogel, H. C. Sims, G. A. Parsons, and A. F. Felts. F. W. Harrop was recognized as Treasurer, having been previously elected, and announced as his assistant Worth S. Peters. W. H. Muncy, previously elected, was named as Auditor of this session, with O. H. Callis as assistant. Charles Mitchell was elected to represent the Methodist Review.

Official Program.—On motion, the printed program was adopted by the Conference as its official order.

Conference Bar.—On motion of T. B. Ashley, the bar of the Conference was fixed so as to include the first seven rows of seats.

Introduction.—The following persons were introduced to the Conference by Bishop Anderson: J. V. Fort, transferred from the Troy Conference; Edwin Swinburne, Halifax Place, Central Mission, Nottingham, England; Bert Richardson, Spalding, Lincolnshire, England; John William Carnie, Lincolnshire, England; James Herbert Lyon, Manchester, England; Miss Winifred Williard, Director of Publicity of the Board of Education; John W. Hancher, Councillor in Finance of the Board of Education; George H. Dart, Gervaise H. Roughton, Charles W. Blodgett, E. S. Wilson, and Stanley Wiant, Associate Editor of the Western Christian Advocate; P. C. Eversole, Presiding Elder of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; Dr. W. A. Robinson, Financial Secretary of Christ Hospital, Cincinnati, Ohio; Dr. G. N. Klepfer, of the Central Pennsylvania Conference, and Mrs. William F. Anderson, of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Readjustment of Districts.—On motion, the District Superintendents together with the Statistician, were authorized to report the separated charges, as organized last year, as they are now grouped.

Press Representative.—On motion of A. H. Davis, J. B. Mahaffey and John O. Gross were named as the Official Reporters to the press.

Conference Memorial Service.—The hour having arrived for the Conference Memorial Service, J. G. Dover took the chair

and announced Hymn No. 430. Mrs. Joshua S. Taylor's name being the only one reported as having died in a parsonage home during the past year, her pastor, S. M. Carrier, spoke feelingly of her character and worth. Bishop Anderson offered prayer and spoke of the generous gifts made to Union College by Rev. and Mrs. Joshua S. Taylor. The Bishop recited Whittier's poem entitled "At Last." The service closed by singing "In the Sweet By and By."

Characters Passed—The Fourteenth Disciplinary Question was called, "Was the character of each preacher examined?" The character of W. H. Davenport was passed, and he reported the Ashland District. The character of J. M. Literal was passed, and he reported the Covington-Lexington District.

Time Extended.—On motion of G. N. Jolly, the time was extended.

Introduction.—Bishop Anderson introduced Dr. Paul Vogt, of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension Society, and he addressed the Conference briefly. Dr. John H. Race, our Publishing Agent at Cincinnati, was introduced, and spoke on The Methodist Book Concern in history and prophecy.

Drafts Presented.—Dr. Race presented to Bishop Anderson, for the Conference, two drafts from the Book Concern, one of \$639, from sale of books, and one of \$35, from the Chartered Fund. These drafts were indorsed by the President and delivered to the Conference Treasurer.

Statistics.—It was moved by O. G. Ragan that the District Superintendents and the Statistician receive at the door the statistical reports of the pastors as they pass out.

Adjournment.—Announcements were made, the Doxology sung, and the Bishop pronounced the benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Mrs. William F. Anderson presided over a great women's meeting in the interests of education in Kentucky, at two o'clock on Wednesday afternoon. Splendid addresses were made by Mrs. Susie A. Winold, Miss Willard, Mrs. Madison Swadener, President E. T. Frnaklin, Bishop W. F. Anderson, and John W. Hancher. A solemn mood fell upon all of those

present, and Bishop Anderson called for all to stand who would pledge themselves to daily prayer until Union College should complete its high financial program, and more than sixty so pledged and were recorded by the secretary of the Conference. After singing, Dr. Hancher pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1921.

Devotions.—The Conference convened at 8.30 A. M., with Bishop Anderson presiding. He led in singing "Jesus Lover of My Soul." The Bishop quoted the first part of the twenty-seventh Psalm and led in prayer. The Conference quartet sang "The Old-fashioned Way." Dr. M. P. Giffin, pastor of Clifton Church, Cincinnati, Ohio, was introduced, and spoke on Luke 11. 1, "Lord, Teach Us to Pray," after which he offered prayer. "Sweet Hour of Prayer" was sung, and the Bishop closed the service with a few well-chosen words.

Journal.—The journal of yesterday's session was read, corrected, and approved.

Bequests.—On motion of F. W. Harrop, it was ordered that the report of S. M. Carrier concerning bequests from Mrs. J. S. Taylor be printed in to-day's journal. The report is as follows:

On the Elizabeth J. Taylor will:

The amount that goes to an endowment for the Middleburg Church, \$1,100.

The amount which goes to Union College, to be known as the Rev. Joshua S. and Elizabeth J. Taylor Fund, and administered as Bro. Taylor has previously directed: W. P. Wesley note, \$100; Lucian Young note, \$1,000; cash on hand, \$615.40. Less some costs to be determined later in court settlement.

Introductions.—Bishop J. C. Hartzell was introduced and addressed the Conference, after which Bishop Anderson spoke of the great work Bishop Hartzell had accomplished in this country and Africa and of their trip together around the world. Dr. D. Lee Altman and A. D. Maddox, of the West Ohio Conference; Dr. F. I. Johnson, Centenary Secretary of the Cincinnati Area; E. Dow Bancroft, of Cleveland, Ohio; Dr. William Bancroft, of the Bombay Conference, India; Dr. George H. Birney, of the North-East Ohio Conference; Dr. J. F. Olive,

Superintendent of the Defiance District, and Dr. W. J. Dunham, Superintendent of the Dayton District of the West Ohio Conference, and Rev. Archibald Ericksson, of the Indiana Conference, were called forward and introduced to the Conference.

Preachers' Relief Association.—F. W. Harrop called attention to the time fixed for the meeting of the Preachers' Relief Association, namely, 10.30 A. M., and spoke in the interest of this organization and the retired preachers.

Board of Stewards.—On motion of Dr. J. D. Walsh, the Board of Stewards was asked to make a preliminary report to-morrow morning.

Conference Committee.—J. M. Literal, for the Cabinet, read the list of Conference Committees, and, on motion, they were adopted. (See List.)

Statistics.—On motion, W. W. Shepherd was appointed chairman of a committee, he to select his assistants, to gather the statistics of the various charges and post in a conspicuous place.

Characters Passed.—The Fourteenth Disciplinary Question was resumed. The name of W. W. Shepherd was called, his character passed, and he reported the Louisville District. O. G. Ragan was called, his character passed, and he reported the Southeastern District. The names of the effective Elders of the Conference were called and their characters passed.

Union College.—Bishop Anderson called for the report of the Board of Education with regard to the financial campaign for endowment for Union College. Alvis S. Bennett, secretary of the board, gave the following report:

Recognizing the opportunity and privilege of the people called Methodists, and their friends, to maintain a fountain of life and power in the very heart of Kentucky, and

Recognizing in our own Union College a medium through which to maintain such fountain of life,

We recommend to the Kentucky Annual Conference, in session this twenty-second day of September, nineteen hundred and twenty-one, the following:

1. A Conference-wide program shall be conducted throughout the bounds of the Kentucky Conference.

2. The object of this program shall be to raise three-quarters of a million dollars for Union College. The distribution of said fund, when raised, shall be substantially as follows:

(a) Enough shall be set apart for permanent endowment to make the total invested endowment fund at least \$500,000.

(b) Necessary appropriation shall be made out of said fund to cover the expenses of its creation.

(c) The absolutely necessary maintenance of Union College in its budget from year to year and miscellany.

(d) The remainder shall be devoted and set apart for buildings, equipment, and betterments—one or more or all—as the Conference Board of Education shall order.

3. We recommend that this Conference invite the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church, through its organized Department of Finance, to furnish coöperation and leadership in this program under the system so efficiently developed and so successfully operated in many like undertakings.

4. We recommend the adoption of this report, after full and free discussion, and that in its adoption the members of the Kentucky Conference and laymen present pledge their free, full, complete, and voluntary support and coöperation to the undertaking until it shall be completed.

On motion of J. D. Walsh, the report was adopted, and on motion of W. W. Shepherd, the laymen were given the privilege to take part in the discussion. After J. D. Walsh, A. M. Decker, J. T. Martin, Bishop J. C. Hartzell, Governor James D. Black, John W. Hancher, and Bishop Anderson had spoken, the vote was taken and the campaign ordered. Bishop Anderson called upon preachers and laymen to join him in prayer for the success of this campaign and asked that a prayer list be made, and the following persons gave their names: T. B. Time Extended.—The noon hour having arrived, on motion of J. D. Walsh the time was extended.

Preachers' Relief Association.—On motion of F. W. Harrop, the Conference took a recess for the purpose of holding a meeting of the Preachers' Relief Association. The Conference order was resumed.

Order of the Day.—On motion of F. W. Harrop, the meeting of the Preachers' Relief Association was made the Order of the Day immediately after reading the Minutes to-morrow morning.

Vital Statistics.—Dr. F. I. Johnson announced that, on account of taking some time to get out the Conference Minutes, Vital Statistics, a blank for report on Membership, Life Service, and Disciplinary Benevolences, had been sent to all the pastors, so that this information would be available at once, and requested the pastors to hand in their reports.

Telegram.—Bishop Anderson read a telegram from Mrs. Anna Onstott, of Willard, Ohio, telling of the death of her husband, Rev. Daniel Onstott, who was a former member of the Kentucky Conference. The Secretary of the Conference was directed to send Mrs. Onstott a message of condolence.

Miss Winifred Willard.—Miss Winifred Willard, Director of Publicity of the Board of Education, was presented and spoke in the interest of the financial campaign for Union College.

Adjournment.—The announcements were made, the Doxology was sung, and the session adjourned, with the benediction by Bishop J. C. Hartzell.

THIRD DAY

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 23, 1921.

Devotions—The Conference was called to order at 8.30 A. M., with Bishop Anderson in the chair. "Rock of Ages" was sung and President John W. Hoffman led in prayer. Dr. M. P. Giffin delivered a very great and inspiring address on the theme "Getting Back to the Miracles." Hymn No. 301, "My God Is Reconciled," was then sung, and Dr. J. L. Fort led the Conference in prayer.

Journal.—The journal of Wednesday afternoon and Thursday was read and approved.

Preliminary Report.—F. W. Harrop made a preliminary report as Treasurer of the Board of Stewards of the financial condition, stating the board was about \$300 short of the amount needed this year.

Order of the Day.—The hour having arrived for the Order of the Day, the Conference resolved itself into a meeting of the Preachers' Relief Association. After the business of the Association had been transacted, Bishop Anderson resumed the chair and the Conference business was taken up.

Resolution Concerning Preachers' Relief.—The following resolutions concerning endowment for the Preachers' Relief Association were adopted:

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the project submitted by the Board of Managers of the Preachers' Relief Association to raise the sum of \$50,000 additional endowment during the next five years. We pledge our utmost efforts, and order that during the session of the Conference of 1922 the roll be called and every member of the Conference, probationer and supply, who has served a charge this year shall report in open Conference the extent of his effort and the amount raised for this endowment.

Completed Course.—Question Eleven was called, "What members have completed the Conference Course of Study?" Henry G. Murrell and Harry C. Sims were called, their characters passed, the Registrar reported their grades, they were elected to Elder's Orders and graduated in the course of study. Lloyd D. Rounds was called, his character passed, the Registrar reported his grades, and he was graduated in the course of study, having been ordained Elder previously.

Fourth Year.—Disciplinary Question Number Ten was called, "What members are in the studies of the fourth year?" Volney E. Fryman, Silas B. Godbey, and Orla W. Robinson were called, their characters passed, the Registrar reported their grades, and they were advanced to the studies of the fourth year.

Continued.—William H. Humphries and John L. Tilton were continued in the studies of the third year, their characters having been passed.

Continued on Trial.—Question Six was called, "Who have been continued on trial?" W. D. Archibald, William Marcum, J. Paul Mahaffey, George W. Ammerman, Ira P. Day, Raymond J. Fleming, Russell G. Miller, David Nankivel, Paul C. Scott were called, their characters passed, and they were continued in the studies of the first year. James H. Howes, Joseph H. Lewis, Carl E. Vogel, Samuel C. Rice, Walter B. Foley, Robert W. Huntsman, Alexander Kenner, Samuel A. Matthews, William P. Perkins, and Joyce Vincent Fort were called, their characters passed, and they were advanced to the studies of the second year.

Delinquents in the Course of Study.—On motion of W. W. Shepherd, the Board of Examiners were made a committee to investigate and report to the Conference concerning brethren who are delinquent in the course of study and ascertain whether or not they have sufficient reason for not doing so, and to entitle them to an effective year.

Introductions.—Dr. W. A. Robinson was introduced and spoke in the interest of Christ Hospital. Dr. J. Frank Anderson was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interest of the Board of Conference Claimants. He presented to the Conference a draft for \$600, which, having been indorsed by the President, was handed to the Conference Treasurer. Dr. Benson Baker, of the Northwest Indiana Conference, was introduced and spoke in the interest of the Board of Foreign Missions. Dr. F. I. Johnson and E. Dow Bancroft were introduced and spoke in the interest of the Centenary. President John W. Hoffman was introduced and spoke in the interest of the Ohio Wesleyan University.

Time Extended.—On motion of T. B. Roberts, the time was extended.

Resolutions Against Gambling.—The following resolutions were presented by T. B. Roberts and unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, There is now a State-wide campaign centering in Louisville, launched against racetrack pari-mutuels and all forms of gambling, and

WHEREAS, The great financial interests organized to continue the life of this great gambling octopus, which is a moral and financial curse to our State; therefore be it

Resolved, That we hereby record the historic stand of Methodism against the sin of gambling, and pledge ourselves as ministers of the Kentucky Conference to enter this fight, and to lead our people in registering their antagonism against the gaming tables.

Dr. E. G. B. Mann, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Lexington, Kentucky, was introduced and delivered a stirring address on the resolution. T. B. Roberts moved that the resolution concerning E. R. Overley's splendid campaign against gambling, passed by the Board of the Centenary Church, Lexington, be adopted by this Conference and placed in the Minutes. It was adopted as follows:

We can but admire the heroic fighting spirit of E. R. Overley, of Grace Church, Newport, in his stand against gambling in Campbell County, which has aroused the interest of the entire State, and we pledge to him our support and prayerful sympathy.

Introductions.—Dr. Starr, of the West Ohio Conference, was introduced and spoke in the interest of the Retired Ministers' Association, after which J. G. Dover introduced the following resolution, which was adopted by the Conference:

Resolved, That we cordially commend to the Retired Ministers of the Kentucky Conference to consider the advisability of forming a branch of the Retired Ministers' Association in this Conference.

D. P. Holt, E. L. Motter, and C. A. Moore, of the West Ohio Conference, and D. F. North, a layman, of Cold Spring, Kentucky, were introduced. Dr. George W. Bunton, of Grace Church, Dayton, Ohio, then asked permission to speak concerning Brother North and his hospitality and great interest in the affairs of the church. Edgar C. Tullar was also introduced.

Adjournment.—The announcements were made, the Doxology was sung, and Bishop Anderson pronounced the benediction.

FOURTH DAY

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 1921.

Devotional Exercises.—At 8.30 A. M., the Bishop called the Conference to order and announced Hymns Nos. 19 and 106, which were sung. The twenty-third Psalm was recited by the Conference, after which the Bishop led in prayer. Hymn No. 388 was sung, after which Dr. M. P. Giffin gave the address on Hebrews 12. 1, 2, closing with prayer. Hymn No. 1 was sung.

Journal Approved.—The journal of yesterday's session was read and approved.

Retired Ministers.—Question Twenty-four, "Who are the Retired Ministers?" was called. A. Boreing, W. G. Bradford, W. H. Crain, J. G. Dover, John Godbey, L. R. Godbey, E. B. Hill, W. R. Hunt, S. F. Kelly, D. F. Kerr, J. M. Oliver, J. B. Perryman, J. G. Ragan, M. M. Roundtree, C. T. Stump, J. D. Walsh, V. T. Willis, and J. W. Zimmerman were called. J. W. Zimmerman, E. B. Hill, and J. D. Walsh spoke for the Conference. A communication from S. F. Kelly was read, and the Secretary was instructed to reply. On motion of J. M. Literal, William Jones, by his own request, was placed on the retired list. F. W. Harrop spoke feelingly of the happy relations with Brother Jones, both in England and America. The men of the Conference came forward and greeted Brother Jones and the Conference sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

Board of Stewards.—F. W. Harrop, Treasurer of the Board of Stewards, made a preliminary report of the financial condition of the board, and announced that there was a deficit of \$210 to pay the retired brethren the same amount as last year. It was decided to take a collection on Sunday morning for this purpose. On motion of F. W. Harrop, this was made the final report.

Supernumerary Ministers.—Question Twenty-three, "Who are the Supernumerary Ministers, and for what number of years continuously has each held this Relation?" was called. John J. Seitz was continued, having sustained this relation for one year. On motion of O. G. Ragan, John F. Ruggles was given this relation.

Triers of Appeals.—Disciplinary Question No. 25 was called, “Who are the Triers of Appeals?” The Cabinet nominated the following, and they were elected: E. P. Hall, W. H. Davenport, T. B. Stratton, F. W. Harrop, and A. H. Davis. Reserves: L. O. Carder and J. F. Hopkins.

Conference Entertainment.—Disciplinary Question No. 36, “Where shall the Next Conference be held?” was asked. W. C. Stewart placed in nomination Augusta; John O. Gross, Barbourville, and O. W. Robinson, Russell. After these invitations had been supported with brief addresses, the vote was taken, and it was announced that Barbourville had been selected. On motion of F. W. Harrop, it was made unanimous.

Excused.—On motion of W. W. Shepherd, C. A. Bromley, W. A. Humphries, and J. W. Cantrell were excused from further attendance upon the sessions of the Conference.

Leave of Absence.—On motion of W. W. Shepherd, R. T. Harper was granted one year’s leave of absence.

Lloyd D. Rounds.—A communication from Lloyd D. Rounds, of Mexico, was read by John O. Gross, and, on motion, the Secretary was instructed to send him the greetings of the Conference.

On Trial.—Question Five, “Who have been Received on Trial?” was called. Newton King, C. Wesley Hatch, Ernest L. Sells, General W. Wright, Granvil Jaggars, Hardin P. Young, John P. Embry, Lloyd O. Logsdon, Kenneth P. Wesche, Everett W. Albaugh, and William B. Archer were called. The Registrar reported their grades, the Committee on Ministerial Fitness reported favorably, and, on motion of their District Superintendents, they were received on trial and placed in the studies of the first year. Robert A. Young was called, the Registrar reported his grades, the Committee on Ministerial Fitness reported favorably, and, on motion of his District Superintendent, he was received on trial, elected to Local Deacon’s Orders, and placed in the studies of the third year.

Excused.—Dr. John L. Fort and Joyce Vincent Fort were excused from further attendance upon the Conference after to-day’s session.

Continued on Trial.—Question Six, “Who have been Continued on Trial?” was called. Clyde B. Conn, John A. Thorpe,

Edward S. Johnson, Robert H. Ling, and Henry C. Wesche were called, their characters passed, and they were continued on trial in the studies of the third year. Boyd Browning and Edward O. Rice were called, their characters passed, and they were continued on trial in the studies of the second year. Jesse C. Landrum and John J. Seitz were continued in the studies of the fourth year, their characters having been passed.

Question Fifteen.—"Who have been Transferred, and to what Conferences?" was asked. Henry C. Miller, to the Kansas Conference; T. Howard Jones, to the North-East Ohio Conference; R. H. Ling, to the Pittsburgh Conference.

Fourth Year.—Question Ten, "What Members are in Studies of Fourth Year?" was taken up. Bishop M. Wesley was called, his grades reported by the Registrar, his character passed, and he was advanced to the studies of the fourth year.

Full Membership.—The Eighth Disciplinary Question, "Who have been Admitted into Full Membership?" was called. Aubrey H. Guyn, Joseph H. Lewis, Ora Sparks, Arthur G. Stump, Carl E. Vogel, and Martin G. Shelly were called, their characters passed, the Registrar reported their grades, the Committee on Ministerial Fitness reported, they were elected to Deacon's Orders, recommended for full membership in the Conference, and placed in the studies of the third year.

Completed Course.—Question Eleven, "What Members have Completed the Conference Course of Study?" was asked. Walter G. Butler, Samuel P. Franklin, and Edward J. Rees were called, their characters passed, the Registrar reported their grades, they were elected to Elder's Orders, and graduated from the Course of Study.

Question Twenty-two.—"What other personal Notations should be made?" was called. The Orders of Jacob Fagley, from the Disciples Church, were presented, and he was recognized as a Local Deacon.

Ruggles Camp Meeting.—The following resolutions were presented by L. O. Carder:

Resolved, That the Kentucky Annual Conference indorse the movement for an Epworth League Institute at Ruggles Campground in the summer of 1922.

That we appoint a commission, consisting of the District Superintendents, S. K. Hunt, J. M. Literal, and one pastor from each district and five at large.

That this commission have full authority to develop the details of the institute.

T. B. Ashley, John L. Fort, and E. P. Hall addressed the Conference upon the resolutions, and, on motion, they were adopted and Dr. Fort was elected dean of the proposed institute.

Concerning Church Membership.—The following resolutions were presented by John O. Gross and, on motion, adopted:

WHEREAS, During the last decade there has been a noticeable loss in membership and an increasing list of non-resident members in the Kentucky Conference, therefore be it

Resolved, first, That, whenever a member or members remove from one pastoral charge to another, the pastor of the church where membership is held shall immediately notify the pastor of the church in the community where said member or members are residing.

Resolved, second, That, after a period of three months, if the removed member or members show a disposition to continue to reside in the community where located, the pastor of the church where membership is held shall send the same to the pastor of the church in the community where the removed member or members reside, with the consent of the member.

Resolved, third, That it shall be the duty of a pastor to locate every member outside of his community, as far as possible, and then comply with Articles 1 and 2 of this resolution. In the event that the name of the church nearest which removed members reside is unknown, the letter or letters shall be sent to the District Superintendent of the district in which the church is located. Where district is not known, the same shall be sent to the Board of Home Missions, Department of Evangelism.

Resolved, fourth, That we request of the District Superintendent to go over the church records annually, see that baptisms, marriages, deaths, probationary, and full membership records are properly made, and to see that Articles 1 and 2 are properly complied with.

Resolved, fifth, That baptized children, probationers, and persons commonly known as constituents shall be treated as is required of members in the Articles 1, 2, and 3.

Trustees' Report.—J. D. Walsh, Treasurer, presented the report of the Trustees of the Conference. It was received and placed in the hands of the Secretary. (See report.)

Retired Ministers' Home.—The following resolutions concerning the Retired Ministers' Home at Eustis, Florida, was presented by J. G. Dover, and adopted:

WHEREAS, The Kentucky Annual Conference has learned with gratification of the establishment in Eustis, Florida, by the Retired Ministers' Association of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and under the supervision of the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Methodist Episcopal Church, of a Home for the Retired Ministers and Returned Missionaries and their families, where they may enjoy freedom from the ills and sufferings incident to the cold winters of the north; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we congratulate our church on establishing this first institution of this kind in the United States, and that we commend this great and growing philanthropy to the members of our church, and to other generous citizens as worthy of their financial support; and that in accordance with the wishes of the trustees of the Home, we appoint E. P. Hall and E. R. Overley to represent the Kentucky Conference as members of the Annual Conference Advisory Board to coöperate in the management of this Home.

Western Christian Advocate.—The following resolution was presented by J. D. Walsh concerning the Western Christian Advocate and adopted:

WHEREAS, Practically all the many interests of official Methodism are reported in the Annual Conference Minutes; and,

WHEREAS, The Advocates are a mighty factor in promoting every aspect of Christian work, such as that of the local churches, the benevolences, and various institutions; and,

WHEREAS, The reduction in the amount of space due to Centenary grouping of Benevolences opens the way for additional matters of importance; and,

WHEREAS, The District Superintendents of Ohio, Indiana, and Kentucky, in a meeting held in Cincinnati, October 5, 1920, formally pledged to bring this suggestion to the attention of the Conferences; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Kentucky Conference ask the Secretary to include Advocate circulation in the Annual Minutes wherever in his judgment he can most advantageously run the column. (See Report.)

Union College.—The following resolutions on Union College were presented by E. T. Franklin:

Resolved, That we, the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, authorize and instruct, and we do hereby authorize and instruct: First, That E. R. Overley,

A. S. Bennett, E. P. Hall, James D. Black, J. M. Literal, A. M. Decker, W. W. Shepherd, C. B. Nordeman, A. B. Cornet, F. W. Harrop, Harry Bullock, and E. T. Franklin, with the assistance of one or more experts, to be designated by our general Board of Education, at 15 Fifth Avenue, New York, incorporate Union College, at Barbourville, Kentucky. Such incorporation to include the following fundamental as to trustees: Two-thirds of the trustees of Union College shall be members of the Board of Education of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Second, That the Board of Education of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church deed to the trustees of Union College all its property, lands, buildings, and equipment now at Barbourville, Kentucky, holding Union College responsible for any indebtedness against the college property that may exist at the time of transfer.

John L. Fort, F. W. Harrop, and J. D. Walsh spoke on the resolutions, but the vote was postponed for the afternoon session.

Time Extended.—On motion of E. R. Overley, the time was extended.

Committee on Nomination.—On motion, the District Superintendents were named as a committee to name nominees to fill vacancies on the Board of Education.

Introductions.—Dr. N. A. Palmer, Superintendent of the Kentucky Anti-Saloon League, was introduced and spoke in the interest of this organization; Stanley Wiant, Associate Editor of the Western Christian Advocate, was introduced and spoke in the interest of the paper; Dr. C. E. Schenk was introduced and spoke in the interest of the Elizabeth Gamble Deaconess Training School; John Venn was introduced and represented the interest of The Methodist Book Concern; Dr. George Joplin, Secretary of the Kentucky State Sunday School Association, was introduced, and spoke concerning the State Sunday School Convention, which is to be held in Newport.

Conference Invitations.—T. B. Roberts reported that, following the vote of this morning, word had been received from Lexington that a most cordial invitation had been extended to hold the next Conference at Centenary Church. Action

having been taken already, the Centenary Church was voted thanks for this invitation.

Adjournment.—The announcements were made, the Doxology was sung, and the benediction was pronounced.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions.—A. H. Davis led the Conference in singing "Nearer, My God, to Thee," and Stanley Wiant offered prayer.

Union College.—The resolutions on Union College offered by President Franklin at the morning session were adopted.

Resolutions Concerning Bishop Anderson.—Dean George M. Ryder presented the following resolutions concerning Bishop Anderson, and they were adopted by a rising vote:

We desire to record our profound and grateful appreciation of the wise, courteous, and efficient administration of Bishop William F. Anderson, our beloved resident Bishop.

His genial and brotherly spirit, his intelligent and enthusiastic interest in all our Conference problems, and his careful counsels and strong leadership have much endeared him to Kentucky Methodism and have greatly strengthened our church and her interests throughout our Conference.

We will follow him in all his administrations over the church at home and abroad with our sympathy and prayers.

The Bishop followed with a gracious response.

Resolutions Concerning President Harding.—T. B. Roberts presented the following resolutions concerning the World Conference on the reduction of armaments, which were adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to send a copy to President Harding at the White House:

WHEREAS, Warren G. Harding, President of the United States, has issued a call, inviting the great powers of the world to a conference in the interest of the reduction of armaments, to be held in Washington City, beginning on Armistice Day, November 11, 1921; and

WHEREAS, The great powers have accepted the President's invitation and signified their acceptance of the same by adequate preparation for the conference; and

WHEREAS, We, the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, assembled in Covington, Ken-

tucky, this September 21, 1921, believing the call for this conference to be of Almighty God, and that the physical, moral, and spiritual interests of mankind and of the kingdom of God shall be greatly advanced by this conference; therefore be it

Resolved, first, That with profound gratitude to Almighty God we hail with deepest satisfaction this call and the spirit of high Christian statesmanship that has prompted the President of the United States to take active leadership in this great endeavor;

Resolved, second, We are fully convinced that lasting peace among the nations of the earth can only come by some such procedure as is contemplated in the call for this conference;

Resolved, third, That such is our confidence in the guidance of Almighty God in all the deliberations of this conference and in the peculiar position of the United States in relation to all the great powers; that such is the high integrity and ability of those appointed to represent the United States in this great work of constructive statesmanship; that her leadership is recognized by the great powers and must be maintained among them, and that such is the hope and expectation of the world concerning America, "the most disinterested people on the earth," that now as never before America must not and will not fail.

Resolved, fourth, That we unqualifiedly pledge our active support and our most sincere and constant prayers, and will call upon our people everywhere to join with us in effort and prayer, and to set aside Armistice Day, November 11, 1921, as a day of fasting and special prayer for the divine support of President Harding and the representatives of all the powers, that such progress may be had that ere long the sound of war shall cease, its rude alarm forever hushed, and peace, the divine bequest for mankind, be the blessed possession of all men everywhere.

Robert M. Harrison.—Robert M. Harrison was received on trial and placed in the studies of the first year.

Board of Stewards.—The following members were elected on the Board of Stewards for the third class: F. W. Harrop, John A. Johnson, and J. D. Haggard.

Bishop Retires.—Bishop Anderson announced that he would retire with the Cabinet, and named F. W. Harrop to preside in his stead.

Report of Committees.—The following committees reported: State of the Church, E. B. Hill; Board of Education for Negroes, J. D. Walsh; Sunday Schools, A. W. Insko; District Records, L. F. Payne; Books and Periodicals, J. T. Martin; Epworth

League, L. O. Carder; Sabbath Observance, T. H. Conrey; Auditing Committee, J. F. Hopkins; Home Missions and Church Extension, H. W. Landreth; Education, T. Howard Jones; American Bible Society, G. N. Jolly; Foreign Missions, T. B. Ashley; Book Concern Accounts, W. H. Morris; Resolutions, W. G. Butler; Temperance, W. G. Bradford; Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies, E. R. Overley; Report of the Book Committee, E. R. Overley.

Excused.—O. H. Callis was excused from further attendance.

Adjournment.—On motion of J. R. Howes, the Conference adjourned, with the benediction by G. N. Jolly.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 1921.

Love Feast.—The Annual Love Feast was begun at 10 A. M., with John R. Howes presiding.

Bishop's Sermon.—The Annual Conference Sermon was preached by Bishop Anderson, D.D., LL.D., at 10.45 A. M.

Missionary Sermon.—The Annual Missionary Sermon was preached by T. B. Roberts, at 3 P. M.

Business Preceding Ordination Service.—At 3.45 P. M., the Bishop took the chair and called for the report of the Committee on Conference Relations. John R. Howes reported in the case of James H. Lyon, of Manchester, England, and on motion his credentials were received from the Wesleyan Church, and he was elected to Deacon's and Elder's Orders. Bishop Anderson presented Brother Lyon and spoke of his work at Manchester which had come under his observation. F. W. Harrop also spoke concerning the training and experience of Brother Lyon. On motion, Walter B. Foley was elected to Deacon's Orders under Missionary Rule. The class for reception on trial was then called, and the following brethren came forward: Newton King, C. Wesley Hatch, Earnest L. Sells, General W. Wright, Robert M. Harrison, Robert A. Young, Granvil Jaggars, Hardin P. Young, John P. Embrey, Lloyd G. L. Devotional Exercises.—At 8.30 A. M., the Bishop called the Conference to order and led the brethren in singing “Nearer, My God, to Thee.” The Bishop offered prayer, concluding with the Lord’s Prayer.

Mrs. O. J. Wilson.—On motion of F. W. Harrop, the Secretary was instructed to write a letter to Mrs. O. J. Wilson, Cincinnati, Ohio, expressing our most sincere appreciation for her generous gift, supplementing our offering for the retired ministers.

Board of Education.—J. M. Literal reported for the nominating committee the following names of persons to be elected to fill vacancies on the Board of Education of the Conference: F. W. Harrop, Governor James D. Black, and Harry Bullock. The Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot, which he did, and they were declared elected.

Mrs. William F. Anderson.—Mrs. William F. Anderson was called forward by the Bishop, and she addressed the Conference, telling of the fine work Esther Home, Seventh Street, Cincinnati, is doing in the interest of girls.

Mrs. Jesse R. Clark.—On motion of F. W. Harrop, the Secretary was instructed to write a letter of condolence to Mrs. Jesse R. Clark and family, Cincinnati, Ohio, and her brother, Davis W. Clark, a former member of the Kentucky Conference, in the loss of her husband.

Treasurer’s Report.—The report of the Conference Treasurer was read and ordered printed. (See Report.)

Excused.—On motion, T. B. Roberts was excused from further attendance.

Bishop and Cabinet Retire.—The Bishop and Cabinet retired, and J. D. Walsh was called to the chair.

Board of Stewards’ Report.—The joint report of the Board of Stewards and Preachers’ Relief Association was read by F. W. Harrop and adopted by the Conference. (See Report.)

Conference Deaconess Board.—A. H. Davis, Secretary of the Conference Deaconess Board, made the following report:

The Conference Deaconess Board recommends the renewal of the license of Miss Florence Slusher, of Lexington, Kentucky, and nominates J. R. Howes, Mrs. L. H. Wilson, and R. D. Clen for the third-year class. Officers: J. R. Howes, Chairman; John R. Coppin, Treasurer; A. H. Davis, Secretary. On motion, the report was adopted and the persons nominated were declared elected.

Anti-Saloon League.—On motion of E. R. Overley, A. H. Davis, E. P. Hall, W. W. Shepherd, T. B. Roberts, John L. Fort, and Fred Howes were elected trustees of the Anti-Saloon League of the State of Kentucky.

Conference Minutes.—On motion of A. H. Davis, the Conference ordered that each charge be assessed one-half of one per cent of the pastor's cash salary to pay for the publication of the Minutes, and that each pastor collect this amount and forward to the Secretary within ninety days from the date of adjournment of the Annual Conference, and that all delinquent charges must be reported to the District Superintendent at the expiration of this time by the Secretary.

Delinquent List.—On motion, the Delinquent List on Conference Minute accounts was read in open Conference.

Report of Treasurer of Board of Education.—F. W. Harrop, Treasurer of the Board of Education of the Kentucky Conference, read his report. It was received and placed in the hands of the Secretary. (See Report.)

Statistician's Report.—The Statistician, Howard E. Trent, presented his report, and it was adopted. (See Report.)

Question Two.—"Who have been Received by Transfer and from what Conference?" was called. V. O. Ward, from the Ohio; J. H. Butler, from the North-East Ohio, and George M. Ryder, from the Oklahoma.

Epworth League Institute Commission.—J. M. Literal, Secretary of the Cabinet, nominated the following brethren for election on the Epworth League Institute Commission, to represent their respective Districts, as per the resolution already adopted: Worth S. Peters, W. G. Butler, John L. Fort, and T. B. Roberts. On motion, they were elected.

Constitutional Questions.—Constitutional Question No. 1, "Admission of laymen to Annual Conference"; No. 2, "To change name of Quarterly Conference"; No. 3, "To change the ratio of representation in the General Conference," were taken up and discussed. The vote was taken with the following results: No. 1 defeated, 56 to 18; No. 2 unanimously defeated; No. 3 unanimously defeated.

Official Record.—On motion, the Minutes as printed was made the official journal.

Conference Evangelists.—On motion of J. M. Literal, the Conference requested that Bishop Anderson appoint T. M. Anderson, O. H. Callis, and William Kelly, as Conference Evangelists for another year. They were appointed.

W. H. Davenport.—T. Howard Jones, representing the brethren of the Ashland District, addressed the Conference and spoke of the splendid work of W. H. Davenport as Superintendent of the District for the last six years, and presented Brother Davenport with a purse as an expression of their love and appreciation. W. W. Shepherd, representing the Cabinet, presented the following:

We, the members of the Cabinet of the Kentucky Conference, desire to express our appreciation of the kingly coöperation, splendid fellowship, and stern Christian character of your retiring District Superintendent, W. H. Davenport. We heartily commend him to the pastorate of the church to which he is appointed, and wish for him the greatest possible happiness and success.

Brother Davenport responded and spoke very feelingly of his association with the brethren and thanked them for their remembrance.

T. Howard Jones.—J. B. Mahaffey presented the following resolution, which was adopted unanimously:

WHEREAS, Reverend T. Howard Jones, D.D., is serving his fifth year as pastor of our First Church, Ashland; and,

WHEREAS, During his pastorate a great church has been erected at a cost of \$300,000, thus giving to the Kentucky Conference the most commodious Methodist Church south of the Mason and Dixon line; and,

WHEREAS, Dr. Jones has been a real brother to every member of the Kentucky Conference; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we record our appreciation of the ability and service and spirit of Brother Jones, and pray God's blessings upon him as he goes from us.

Ministers' Wives' Association.—Bishop Anderson stated that, under the leadership of Mrs. Anderson, an organization had been effected, known as the Ministers' Wives' Association of the Kentucky Conference. Mrs. John O. Gross was elected President and Mrs. H. E. Trent, Secretary. The Bishop called upon the brethren to urge their wives to join and send in their names at once to Mrs. Gross or Mrs. Trent.

Missionary Appropriations.—The Missionary Appropriations were approved by the Conference and ordered published in the Minutes. (See Report.)

Election of Treasurer and Auditor.—On motion of E. R. Overley, the Conference proceeded to elect a Treasurer and Auditor. F. W. Harrop was nominated and elected Treasurer. W. H. Muncy was nominated and elected Auditor.

Appointments Read.—Bishop Anderson offered prayer and, after a few words of special thanks, read the appointments. (See list.)

Official Record.—On motion, the Minutes as printed was made the official journal.

Journal Approved.—The Minutes of the morning session were approved as written.

Final Adjournment.—Prayer was offered, and the Conference adjourned without date.

REPORT OF THE BOOK COMMITTEE TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCES OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH

For the Year Ending December 31, 1920

Methodism has developed many forms of bearing witness to the truth as it is in Jesus Christ. Our living and fearless ministry; our Christian universities, colleges, and secondary schools; our hospitals and homes; our reform agencies, and our world-wide missionary activities are so constructive as to bring gratification to all our hearts, but in none of our multiform activities can our people take more pleasure than in the published products of the denomination.

The Methodist Book Concern has a surplus or net assets of \$5,608,519.01, an increase over the year of 1919 of \$253,313.59.

The net produce for the year was \$420,438.71, a decrease of \$96,846.79, owing to the greatly increased cost of paper and presswork.

In spite of the decrease in produce, we are able to announce a dividend of \$275,000 for the relief of the necessities of our retired ministers or their dependents.

While we rejoice in our ability to thus bring relief to the retired ministers, through whose sacrifice and devotion our great organization has been built up, we remind ourselves that profits are not the aim of The Methodist Book Concern, but the prime purpose to which these heroic fathers have committed us is to produce and distribute Christian literature.

This supreme end has been nobly served by our Publishing Agents, our Editors, and our loyal and faithful force of employees.

These ranks have suffered a loss during the past year by the death of our Publishing Agent resident at New York, Dr. Edwin R. Graham, whose counsel and business ability during the sixteen years of devotion contributed no small amount to the marked prosperity of the Book Concern.

We urge all of our Sunday schools to use our own publications, not through any narrow sectarian motive, but because of the superior quality and skillful adaptation of these publications for the work of religious education.

Our Editors are prophetic and penetrating interpreters of Christianity in relation to present-day problems. Their message is indispensable to the successful prosecution of the church-wide programs, such as the Centenary and other forward movements, and their leadership and instruction as they receive the first shock of events are invaluable in creating Christian public sentiment in this time of confusing and conflicting tongues which hold not God in awe. Our world is now moulten and can be shaped by skilled Christian hands into fairer and more Christian forms. Let us cultivate an intelligent membership by urging the people to read our product of books and periodicals. Salt cannot save unless it is applied. Christian literature is powerless unless it is read. Our presses are turning out enough instruction in righteousness to save every man, woman, and child in America, if it should be read and once taken to heart.

It is a special pleasure to commend to the attention of all interested in the supremely important work of week-day religious instruction the Abingdon Religious Education Texts, a series of pioneer textbooks, under the able editorship of Dr. David G. Downey, Book Editor of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Your Book Committee urges upon every Official Board the adoption of the budget system or some other effective plan by which one or more official Advocates or other official publication shall be placed in the home of every member of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

To the young people we commend the Epworth Herald, and to those seeking the profound bases of the Christian belief, both laymen and ministers, we commend the Methodist Review. The saddest of words are these: "The people perish for lack of knowledge." Let us rally to promote our Advocates and other publications and launch an aggressive offensive to beat back and banish the foes of ignorance and crime.

STATE OF THE CHURCH

We, your Committee on State of the Church, beg leave to submit the following report:

1st. There is great need of missionary and evangelistic work in Kentucky. There are no church denominations which are meeting the needs of our people in this great Commonwealth. This is known by the fact that, as to illiteracy, Kentucky stands quite at the bottom. It is the mission of the church to evangelize and educate, to incite and encourage, in reaching the highest and the best enlightenment.

2d. This is a transition period in the life of the Commonwealth, and the old things are passing away. In material things great changes are taking place; much foreign capital has been invested, and much will be. Our State is rich in soil, in coal, and oil, and granite, and is now destined to become one of the wealthiest States in the Union. Kentucky occupies a unique position geographically also.

3d. Her products go to all points of the country. Our church is here by right, but we should not forget the Methodist Episcopal Church is a debtor and owes much to this whole Southland. The whole church should be more active in the work assigned. If we do not put forth greater efforts to evangelize and educate the people, then we have no right here. Our right of possession lies in doing service. We should not ask for better salaries without doing better service. We should not give up the territory we now have; we should strengthen our well-begun work in every way possible. We should not sell property, but hold on and wait developments. If we had held on to property, especially in two of our leading towns, to-day we would have two good stations. This is an incontrovertible fact, so we urge that our pastors and District Superintendents use much discretion and wisdom here.

4th. It is the intention of the Methodist Episcopal Church to have one Methodist Episcopal Church in America, and we should keep this in view. It will come, as the immortal Lincoln prophesied, "There should be a nation born anew, a new birth come, and sectionalism must pass out." And this new nation meant a new Methodism and nationwide, knowing no sectional divisions. The night is passing and day is breaking.

5th. We believe, to meet the problems in Kentucky, we must have a better educated ministry, and that ministry fully consecrated to Jesus Christ. With that fact accomplished we shall here in this State become a mighty force in making Kentucky what it ought to be. We have no blatant infidelity among our people. We believe in God and in his Son Jesus Christ. Let our people be true to the doctrine of Methodism and its practical teaching and we shall succeed. We fully endorse the movement to endow Union

College, and we could not be true to the memory of Mrs. Fannie Speed if we should fail her. She gave to us means whereby to begin the work; it should be carried forward to full success.

6th. We urge that the young men shall not forget those who labored to plant the Methodist Episcopal Church, men heroic and full of the spirit of sacrifice, worthy to be remembered.

7th. In closing we also urge that those who enter the Kentucky Conference shall consider themselves as here not temporarily, but here for service, to build up the cause of God in this State and Conference. NEGRO EDUCATION

The work of this Board has been carried on for over fifty years. The General Conference authorized and directed that each pastor observe the Lincoln Day anniversary in February.

As a result of the work of the Board, we have 350,000 colored members, 3,500 churches, and over 2,000 ministers. Our schools supply these with pastors and intelligent Christian leaders. For this purpose the 18 schools of the Board of Education for Negroes, with their 320 teachers and 6,597 students, must be maintained.

Any program of world conquest for the kingdom of Christ must include one hundred millions of black people in Africa and twelve millions more in the United States of America. If we cannot uplift and evangelize these black millions in the homeland, how shall we ever reach those across the seas? The schoolhouse and the church go hand in hand in bringing the Negro in the United States to a knowledge of the Christian faith, and fitting him that he may do his part in bringing the dark continent into a league of Christian nations dominated by the Christ spirit.

We recommend, therefore, that each pastor preach at least once a year on the outlook for the black man in the United States and in Africa, and the relation of the schools of the Board of Education for Negroes to his evangelization.

We further recommend that each pastor observe Lincoln Memorial Sunday, and use the program and literature furnished by the Board for that occasion.

We further recommend that this subject be also brought before our Sunday schools, Epworth Leagues, and social gatherings, for study and prayerful consideration. Literature and other material necessary for the presentation of the work of the Board to any of our congregations can be obtained without cost by sending a postal card request to the Secretaries of the Board of Education for Negroes, 420 Plum Street, Cincinnati, Ohio.

TEMPERANCE

The American people are confronted with organized opposition to the national will. It is largely the product of our own past policy: "Whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." Nations, too.

Since the founders of our Government thought its supreme purpose was the public welfare, we harbored and were co-partners with a traffic which intoxicated our people. When the Greeks said a man was intoxicated they meant that he was poisoned, and the word recalled their custom of dipping arrows into poison, that they might mortally wound their enemies. We inherited the drinking of intoxicants and the traffic therein from our fathers. "The sins of the fathers shall be visited upon the children," and "The way of transgressors is hard." Our inheritance was aggravated by the introduction of German beer after the Civil War, the building of mammoth breweries, and the inundation of the people with their brew. Millions of our population have been trained to love strong drink in saloon schools, open night and day, summer and winter, and often Sundays, too, and vastly greater in their numbers than the common schools of the land. They made drinking inviting, tempting, easy, customary, and because they had the countenance of the law of the land, formally respectable.

The extraordinary profits offered to drink vendors increased their numbers, and this multiplied the patrons. The greed of the drink profiteers was intensified by their easily gotten gains and the lust of the drinkers was stimulated by the frequency of drinking. Thus was developed in both the vendor of drink and in the drinkers a dominant tendency to evade or violate all limitations which public policy imposed upon them to mitigate the evils which they showered upon the land. The liquor traffic breeds lawlessness like carrion breeds maggots. Herein lies the secret of the failure of all attempts to regulate the traffic by restriction, segregation, high license, or even local option. None of these measures was a match for the already developed lawlessness of the greedy vendors and the drinkers.

Local option was more effective than regulation, for it afforded local prohibition, but even that was no adequate protection from a lawless en-

vironment. So by the demoralizing schooling of nation-wide license, the liquor traffic officers and their veteran patrons became our most notorious class of law breakers. It was so under all regulatory safeguards, and since these very men are proclaiming that Constitutional Prohibition cannot be enforced, and they are the ones who are violating it, they, by actual self-confession, are the most lawless class of men in America to-day.

Some of these perverts are so incorrigible that they will continue to violate the law until they die, and some of them are dying as drink suicides, because, hounded by the demonism of appetite, they risk death to find intoxication. Yet they tell us that these adversities and fatalities were all exhaled by the vicious plant of prohibition instead of the Upas tree of License. Verily strong drink tangles the faculties of men more than it does their feet. Prohibition may never have a fair field among us until the generation of perverts which we have bred by license shall have deceased. If we could have commenced the policy of prohibition with an uninebriated citizenry, we would have had little difficulty, for the policy finds its foes in the folk who have been warped in thought and character by the liquor traffic. Our native harvest of perverts has been perennially recruited by the products of European dissipation, which vitiate our civic atmosphere and seek to degrade our institutions to the level of their own lives. We were chastened by the retributions of our waywardness, and the goodness of God led us to repentance when abstinence became an imperative condition of our success in the World War. Uncle Sam could not win with a drunken army and navy, and field and factory demanded sober men at home. We could not finance the war and the profligate liquor men, too. We had to conquer at home to conquer abroad, and the eyes of all save the willfully blind saw that strong drink was as great a peril to our country as the war itself. Wartime prohibition was our national repentance toward God, and the heroic sobrieties engendered by the time enabled us to perpetuate our war wisdom in peace time. National prohibition, as far as achieved, with its Godly sorrow that we were ever so sensual, mercenary, and cowardly as to grant legality to the systematic intoxication of our people, is the victory of righteousness over wickedness in public opinion and in our organic and statutory law.

Statutes, Federal and State, have been enacted to fulfill the will of the people, but they have met with an antagonism rebellious in spirit and only as much short of it in deed as it is short of it in power. It was pertinently said in Congress that more lives have already been sacrificed in the enforcement of prohibition, in proportion to the number of agents so occupied, than were lost in the World War in proportion to the numbers engaged. There is only one sensible and safe procedure for our country, and that is to teach the lawbreakers by executive agencies "that laws were not made for good men, but for the lawless and disorderly." Attorney General H. M. Daugherty did his country a great service in behalf of law and order by his recent memorable address to the American Bar Association. If the spirit of that address prevails throughout America, it will simply asphyxiate the illicit traffic in strong drink. The General said, "Respect for law is the one essential fact of our civilization." The history of civilization has been a continuous struggle for law and order.

"Another subject that undermines respect for law, especially prominent at the present time, is an erroneous theory of personal liberty under our constitutional system. This controversy is as old as government itself. It has been asserted with especial vigor recently, owing to the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. However, when public sentiment has crystallized into law there can be no question as to the duty of good citizens with reference thereto. They may still debate as to the wisdom of the law, but there is only one course of conduct, and that is obedience to the law while it exists. The argument of undue abridgment of personal liberty advanced to-day has in the past been advanced by every champion of lawlessness who has sought to find excuse for unlawful conduct. If it (our civilization) yields to these false doctrines of personal liberty, it will

go the way of the nations of the past. But, gentlemen, whatever be our individual views as to the wisdom of these constitutional provisions and laws made thereunder in our Federal and State Governments, restricting personal liberty, the fact remains that they are on the statute books. They have been regularly enacted and are a part of the constitutional and statutory law of the land. From the standpoint of the Government the only sound view is that of law enforcement. Our safety and happiness lies in obedience to law by every man, woman, and child within the domain of our republic, and no one can undermine respect for law without being to that extent an enemy to law and orderly government. It is the duty of the minority as well as the majority to obey the law. The government will endure on the rock of law enforcement or it will perish in the quicksand of lawlessness. As long as I am the responsible head of the Department of Justice the law will be enforced with all the power possessed by the government which I am at liberty to call to my command."

The moonshiners and their confederates threatened to run our preacher out of Vanceburg. He rejoined that they might drag him out, but that he had charge of the running gear. Their grievance was that he had organized three Civic Leagues in Lewis County, numbering a membership of several hundreds, who had furnished information to the sheriff whereby sixteen moonshiners were put into the Vanceburg jail on last Monday. The secret of this success was consecrated and courageous leadership, applying wholesome public sentiment to the enforcement of the law—Methodistic Daughertyism. Such sentiment abounds from ocean to ocean and from the Mexican to the Canadian border. Leaders can be and must be aroused everywhere to project this all-powerful sentiment against the enemies of law and order. Webster said public opinion is the mightiest power on earth. That is true, simply because the voice of the people, when it is both intelligent and conscientious, is the voice of God. Would that Brother Foley could be commissioned by the Conference or Anti-Saloon League or both to organize Civic Leagues all over Kentucky. An Australian traveling across the United States said: "I was in America eight weeks before I could find one thoroughly drunken man. I did not expect to find the demonstration of effective prohibition which I have run up against every hour since I arrived in America. Its workings have been so striking that every day I have been here I have had to say to myself over and over again, 'How did they get it? How did they ever do it?'" Tourists from abroad, contrasting the conditions wrought here by prohibition with those of their homelands, see the magnitude of our reform more strikingly and appreciatively than we do.

Seldom has a compliment been paid our country equal to that given us by Dr. C. W. Saleeby, of London: "Dry America is the greatest country in the world in which to produce and rear children. Prohibition is making America safe for motherhood and childhood. The Anglo-Saxon race on this side of the Atlantic and including dry Canada bids fair to leave the race on the other side far behind as regards sound, healthy, well-developed childhood. The economic effects of this inheritance of sound health will be seen in the near future, and if Great Britain does not follow the lead of the United States and Canada in banishing the racial poison alcohol, it will face inevitable decadence. A drugged lion cannot compete with a sober eagle."

We may rationally hope that the benefits of prohibition in the United States will compel its adoption throughout the world. Grateful and cheering tribute is due Dr. N. A. Palmer for his wise, persistent, jealous, and efficient leadership of the Kentucky Anti-Saloon forces.

The directions to be observed by Examiners and students are as follows:

1. The numbers 1, 2, etc., indicate the division of work among the Examiners.

2. Examiners and students must be prepared on every subject within its own period. The student, when fully ready, not before, will notify the Examiner, who shall have his questions (not fewer than 10 nor more than 25) written out beforehand.

3. The answers should be written by the student in the presence of the Examiner alone, who should afford no help himself, nor allow any to be derived from any other source whatever, whether of person or of printed or written matter.

4. When impossible for the Examiner to be with the student, he may send the questions, under seal, to a third person, *a member of the Conference*. He should direct, by postal card, two or three days beforehand, by way of precaution, and again on the back of the envelope containing the questions, that the envelope is not to be opened, nor allowed out of the possession of the third person, till the student is ready to answer the questions. Inclosed with the questions should be a certificate to be signed by the third person when the student has completed his work, showing that no help whatever was afforded the student. Any substantial departure from these directions should vitiate the examination.

5. As soon as the papers are received and graded by the Examiner, he will notify both the student and T. B. Roberts, Registrar of the Board, the result. The minimum grade for passing shall be 70.

6. On the back of every written sermon or essay there should be a statement, signed by the person presenting it, that the conception, composition, and handwriting are his own work.

7. The grading on sermons or essays will hereafter be on the same scale (from 0 to 100) as on books to be studied, with 70 as the minimum grade for passing; in the books to be read the student shall certify to the Examiner that he has read the books.

8. Candidates for local orders, when it is impracticable for them to be examined previously, will be examined on the day before Conference convenes, beginning at 9 o'clock.

9. All examinations must be in the candidate's own handwriting.

10. Except in extreme cases, and for highly satisfactory reasons, no examination will take place after Conference has convened.

ELIZABETH J. TAYLOR.

Elizabeth Jane Williams was born in the State of Virginia, August 9, 1844. While she was but a child her parents moved to Kentucky and settled in Pulaski County, in the Soule Chapel neighborhood, where she spent her girlhood days, surrounded by most excellent Methodist influence.

On September 24, 1879, in Danville, Kentucky, she was united in marriage to Rev. Joshua Sollander Taylor, a member of the Kentucky Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church. The marriage solemnization was performed by Rev. S. Yerkes, D.D., of the Presbyterian Church. This was a happy union because of the fine character of the contracting parties.

On December 12, 1920, at her home in Millersburg, Kentucky, she passed peacefully to her heavenly rest. Her life closed just as beautifully as she had lived it. She loved her church, and its services and interests were her highest joy. In her will she established a fine endowment for the use of the Methodist Church in Middleburg, Kentucky. She also in a liberal way remembered Union College, the amount to be added to a fund already started by her husband, and to be known as the Joshua S. and Elizabeth J. Taylor Fund, and to be administered as her husband had previously directed.

She lived right and died beautifully, and is buried beside her husband in the cemetery at Middleburg, Kentucky.
