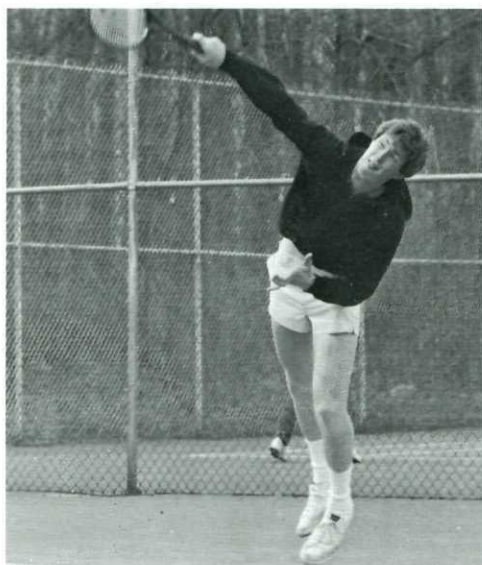

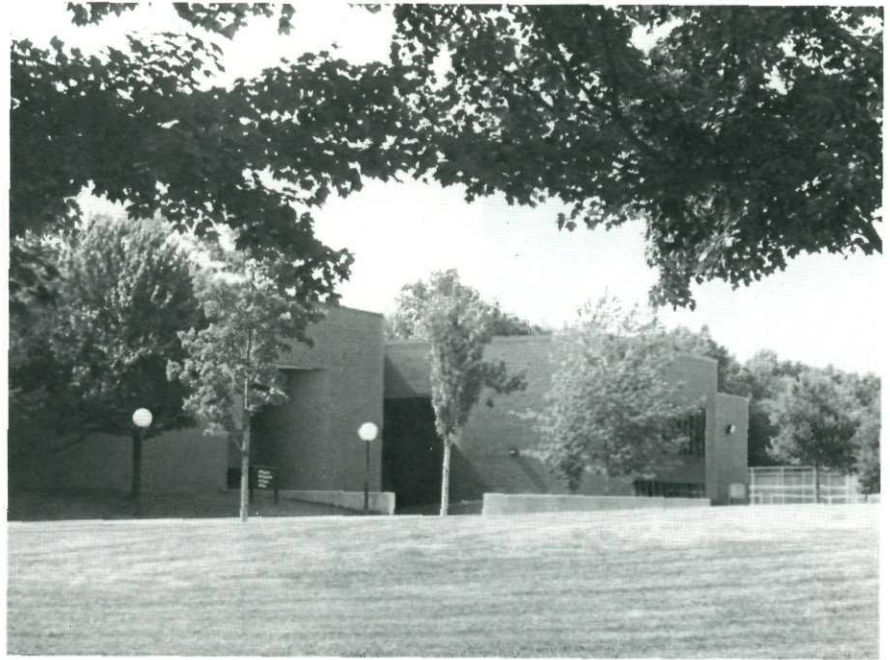

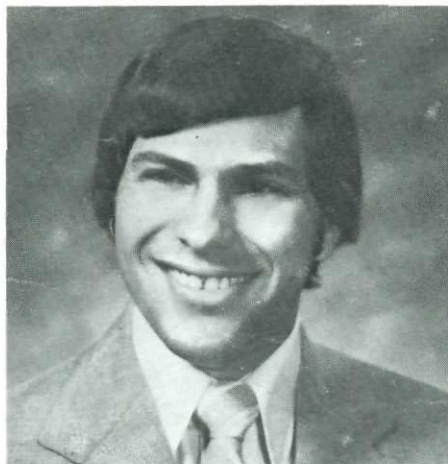
**ERNIE DeWITT**  
*Basketball*

Ernie DeWitt is the most famous basketball player in Bryant College history.

In his first year in a Bryant uniform (1978), he was named both the New England Rookie of the Year for all divisions and the ECAC Division Two Rookie of the Year.

In each of the next three years he was one of the top Division Two players in the nation, being named to Division Two All-American squads in each season. He climaxed a sensational career in 1981 when, in addition to being named first team All-American by the U.S. Basketball Coaches Association, he also was selected the ECAC Division Two Player of the Year.

In February 1981, he became the only player in Rhode Island collegiate basketball history to score 2,000 points and grab 1,000 career rebounds. His 2,266 career points put him second on the all-time Bryant scoring list.

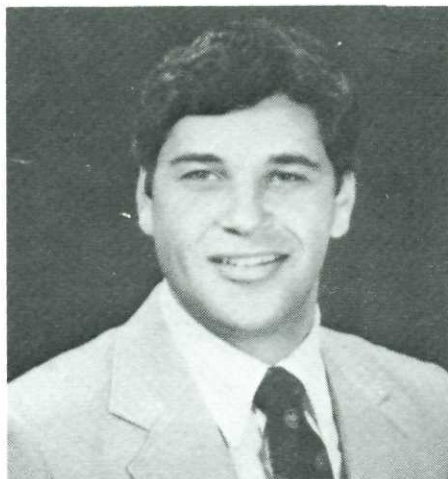


**JIM SILVA**  
*Golf*

For two consecutive years, 1975 and 1976, Jim was one of the top NCAA Division Two golfers in the country.

He earned third team All-American honors in 1975 when he finished among the top fifteen in the national tournament.

But he saved his best performance for his final collegiate appearance when he finished fifth in the 1976 NCAA Tournament, earning himself a first team All-America berth.

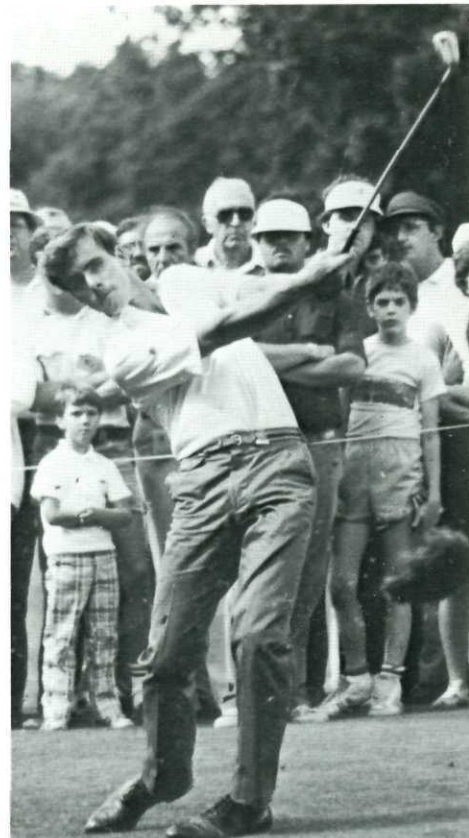


**BOB DiMATTEI**  
*Golf*

Bob received Honorable Mention recognition on the 1984 U.S. Golf Coaches Division II All-America team. The selection marked the seventh All-America honor for a Bryant golfer in the past 10 years.

Bob was a regular in the Bryant lineup for all four years of his collegiate career. He highlighted his performance with a third place finish in the 1984 New England tournament.

He also played a key role in the Indians' drive to the 1983 New England team title.



**JIMMY HALLET**  
*Golf*

Jimmy Hallett is the most nationally recognized athlete in Bryant College history.

In the summer of 1982, he became a New England golf hero when he became the first New Englander in 25 years to reach the semifinal round of the U.S. Amateur golf tournament. Earlier that summer he had become the first player in 40 years to win both the Massachusetts Amateur and the New England Amateur in the same year.

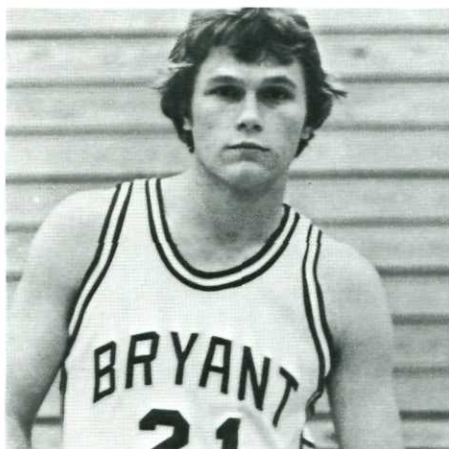
But the high point of his amateur career came at the 1983 Masters tournament in Augusta, Ga., where he captured the tournament's low amateur prize, after having led the entire field during part of his second round.

But his performance on the national amateur circuit is only part of the legend Jimmy Hallett built while he was a student at Bryant. During his four-year career he became the most successful player in the history of New England Intercollegiate golf.

He won a record-setting five consecutive New England Intercollegiate individual championships. In addition he also won individual titles in virtually every major college tournament in the Northeast, including the Yale Invitational, three Toski Invitational championships and the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference championship.

He is currently playing on the PGA Tour.



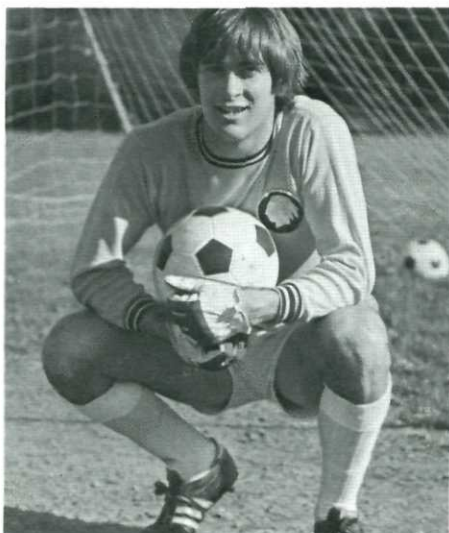


**PAUL SEYMOUR**  
*Basketball*

Paul's sensational outside shooting made him a favorite of Bryant basketball fans from 1976 to 1978.

The son of basketball Hall of Famer Paul Seymour of the Syracuse Nats, young Paul helped the Indians gain their first NCAA post-season playoff berth in 1978 when he averaged 18 points per game while hitting on 58 percent of his shots from the floor and 78 percent from the free throw line.

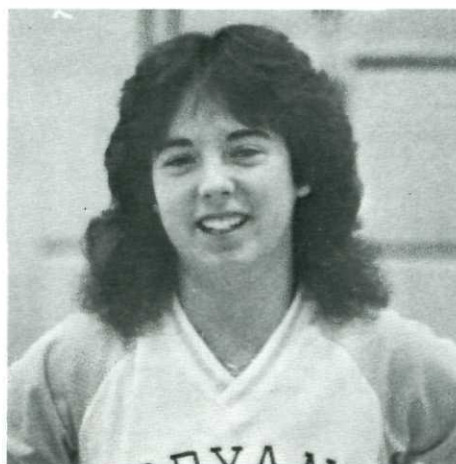
His performance earned him selection to the Associated Press's Little All-America team.



**JOHN FEELEY**  
*Soccer*

John became the first Bryant athlete to receive All-American recognition when he earned Honorable Mention Selection on the 1975 NAIA All-American soccer team.

A standout goaltender, his play during his junior year in 1975 led the Bryant soccer team to its first post-season tournament berth. He also became the first Bryant athlete to sign a professional sports contract when he joined the Rhode Island Oceaners of the American Soccer League upon his graduation in 1976.

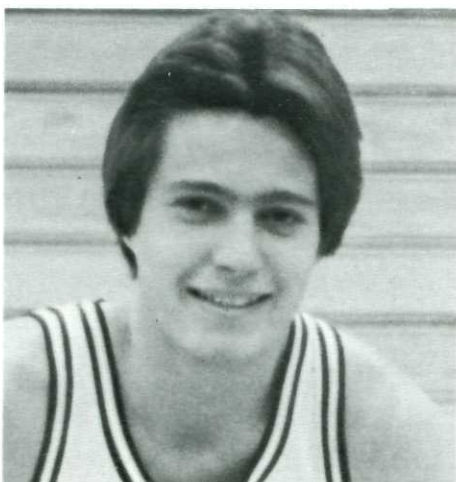


**SUE CRISAFI**  
*Basketball*

Sue became Bryant's first Academic All-American when she was named to the CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors' Association) College Division Academic All-American women's basketball team in 1982.

In 1984, the East Haven, Conn., native became the first woman basketball player in Bryant history to score 1,000 career points. She finished her collegiate career with 1,267 points.

A 1984 graduate, she compiled a 3.4 cumulative grade point average during her four years at Bryant.

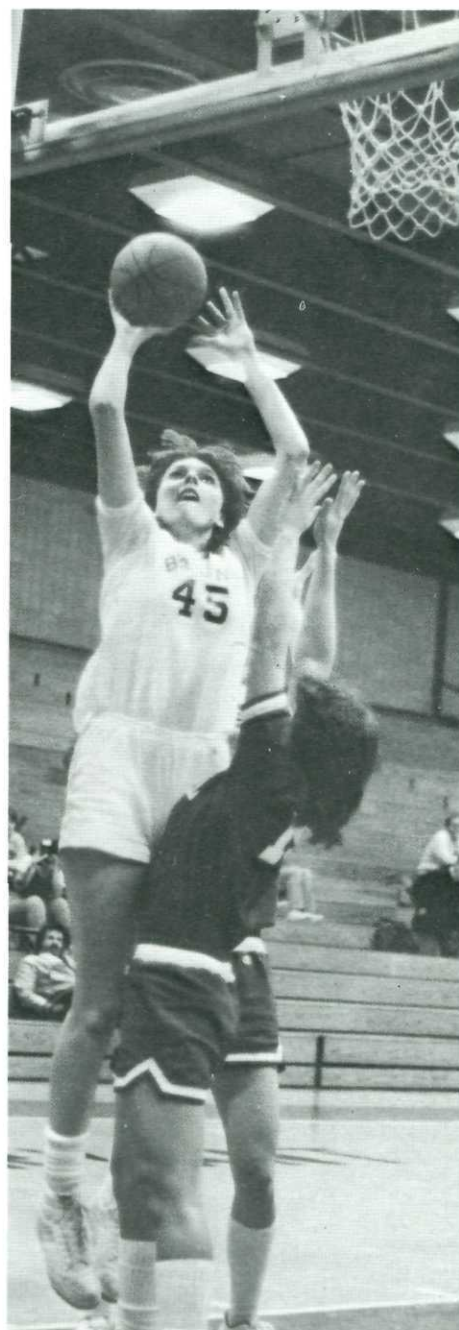


**DAVE SORAFINE**  
*Basketball*

Dave became Bryant's first basketball All-American when he was named to the NAIA All-American team in 1976. That same year, he also was selected the ECAC Division III Player of the Year.

It was in 1976 that Big Dave (6-11) set a Bryant single-game scoring record with 53 points against St. Francis College of Maine.

He currently holds the No. 3 spot on the Bryant men's all-time scoring list with 1,834 points.



**KARYN MARSHALL**  
*Basketball*

Karyn is the only Bryant female basketball player to have earned selection to the U.S. Women's Basketball Coaches Association All-American team.

Named to the All-American squad in 1985, Karyn was one of the nation's top scorers, rebounders and shooters in each of the past three years. She finished her career last season with 1,986 points, making her the all-time women's scoring leader. She also holds seven other Bryant career records, including highest average (17.8), most field goals (824), highest field goal percentage (.601), most free throws (330), highest free throw percentage (.730), most rebounds (1,175) and highest rebound average (10.6).

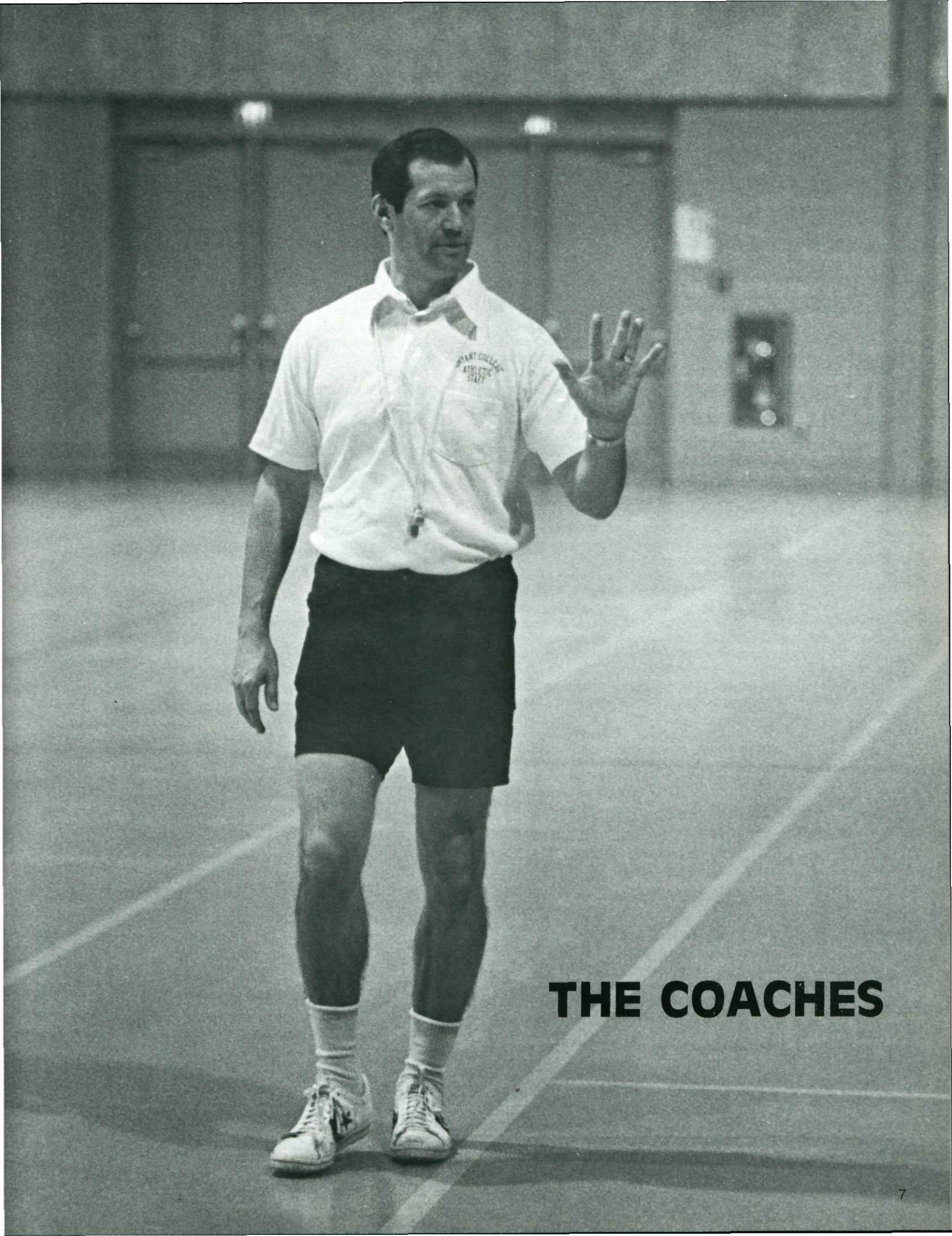

# COACHING STAFF

## LEON DRURY

**Athletic Director  
Men's Basketball Coach**

As both an administrator and coach, Leon Drury's name is synonymous with success.

In his role as Bryant athletic director, Drury has upgraded the entire Bryant athletic program, making it one of the most prestigious and successful Division II programs in the Northeast.

Under Drury's direction, the Bryant varsity sports program has increased from 11 to its present 15 teams. In addition, nearly 90 percent of the College's 3,000 fulltime students take part in the 20-sport intramural program.

Since he assumed the position of athletic director in 1978, Drury has spearheaded a drive that has seen the College's on-campus athletic facilities nearly double in the past five years.

One of the moving forces behind the creation of the Northeast-8 athletic conference, he has diligently worked to promote the conference image throughout the country.

In eight years as head men's basketball coach, the Springfield College graduate has become one of the most successful Division Two hoop coaches in the country. Last year he surpassed the 100 career victory mark, upping his eight-year record to 110-114.

In 1980 he was named Rhode Island Coach of the Year (all sports, all divisions) by Words Unlimited, the Association of Rhode Island sportswriters and sportscasters. His selection was the result of the Indians performance in 1979-80 when they were the No. 1 ranked Division II team in New England.

Before taking over as athletic director and head coach, he had served six years as the college's assistant athletic director and assistant men's basketball coach. Drury came to Bryant in 1973, following a three-year tenure as Brown University freshmen basketball coach.



## JOHN GILLOOLY

**Director of Sports Information  
Men's Tennis Coach**

John has been the Bryant sports information director and men's tennis coach for the past 17 years.

He is one of the veteran collegiate tennis coaches in New England. Since 1969 he has directed the Bryant netmen to winning campaigns in 13 of 17 seasons. His teams have posted a combined record of 88 victories and 61 losses for a .591 percentage.

In his capacity as sports information director, he is responsible for the dissemination of information on Bryant's 15 varsity athletic teams and approximately 300 athletes. In the past five years, five of his sports publications have won national awards in the CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America) publications contests.

A member of both CoSIDA and the ECAC Sports Information Directors Association, John also is secretary of Words Unlimited, the Association of Rhode Island Sportswriters and Sportscasters.



## LORRAINE HUDAK

**Women's Athletic Director  
Women's Volleyball, Softball Coach**

Lorraine has been the moving force behind the growth of the Bryant women's sports program over the past nine years.

When Lorraine came to Bryant in 1977, the women's program consisted of only three teams and she was the only coach for all three teams. Today, the program has seven varsity teams and a women's coaching staff of eight people.

Lorraine joined the Bryant staff following a four-year teaching and coaching career at Warren (RI) High School. While at Warren, she coached tennis, basketball and volleyball.



## MIKE MCGUINN

**Assistant Athletic Director  
Assistant Men's Basketball Coach**

Mike has been the principal "behind the scenes" man in the Bryant athletic department for the past eight years.

As assistant athletic director, he has been responsible for upgrading the schedules of all 15 varsity athletic teams. In addition, he also oversees the operation of the College's physical athletic facilities and coordinates the purchasing for the entire athletic department.

In his position as assistant men's basketball coach, he is responsible for recruiting and scouting. During his tenure as chief recruiter, six of his discoveries have gone on to earn regional or all-conference honors.

Mike joined the Bryant staff on a full-time basis in 1978, following a year as a part-time assistant basketball coach. Before coming to Bryant, he had been an assistant basketball coach at Rhode Island College. A graduate of Providence College, he was a member of the Friars' nationally ranked basketball team in 1974.



## DALE O'DELL

**Baseball**

Dale takes over as head baseball coach this season after serving a year as assistant to former coach Earl Mathewson.

When Mathewson stepped down at the end of last season because of family commitments, Dale was the first choice of Bryant athletic director Leon Drury.

"Dale was the first person we asked to succeed Earl," Drury said. "In one year as Earl's assistant he demonstrated his knowledge of the game and gained the respect of the players. We were very pleased he accepted the position."

Dale came to Bryant in the fall of 1985 after serving a year as assistant coach of the Cumberland R.I. High baseball team. In the spring of 85, he helped guide the Clippers to the Rhode Island state title.

A graduate of Springfield College, he was a star member of the Chiefs baseball team for three years in the early 80's before an injury ended his playing career in his senior season.





## ARCHIE BOULET

### Golf

Archie is one of the most successful collegiate golf coaches in the country. For the past 15 years either an individual member or the entire Bryant team has qualified for all but one national NCAA Division II tournament. Also over the past 10 years, eight Bryant players have earned All-American honors.



In the past 12 years Boulet's teams have compiled an amazing 250-48 record in dual match competition and have won numerous tournament championships, highlighted by the 1982 New England Intercollegiate title and the 1984 ECAC regional championship. The Indians also have won four of the past five Northeast-8 Conference tournaments.

One of the veteran collegiate golf coaches in the country, Boulet also is a member of the national NCAA tournament committee.

## KEN MCKENZIE

### Bowling

Over the past seven years under Ken's direction the bowling team has been one of the most successful collegiate bowling teams in the country.

Each year Ken has sent at least one member of his team to the national collegiate championships.

It isn't surprising, however, that Ken would be a successful coach. During his undergraduate years, he was one of the most successful bowlers in Bryant history. During his college career, he qualified for four consecutive national NAIA and ACU tournaments during the early 70's.

In addition to his coaching duties, Ken also is a member of the Bryant Admissions staff.



## PETER GLANZ

### Women's Tennis

This is Peter's second year as the women's varsity tennis coach. Last year, with only one returning singles player from the 1984 squad, he directed the Lady Indians to a .500 season (5-5).

A graduate of Bates College, Peter was the Bobcats No. 2 singles player and a member of the No. 1 doubles team for several years in the late 60's.

In addition to his coaching duties he also is a faculty member at both Bryant and Rhode Island College.



## PAUL RIBEIRO

### Women's Soccer

This will be Paul's first full year as head coach of the Lady Indians booters.

Paul took over shortly after the start of last season and led the Lady Indians to berths in the title round of both the Northeast-8 Conference and Rhode Island Intercollegiate post-season tournaments.

An outstanding amateur soccer player, Paul had been head coach of the Johnston, R.I. High boys soccer team before coming to Bryant last fall.



## CHARLIE MANDEVILLE

### Women's Cross Country

Bryant athletic director Leon Drury didn't need to look very far seven years ago when it came time to find a coach for the women's cross country team.

Over the past decade, Charlie Mandeville, Bryant's fulltime athletic trainer, has become an expert on running techniques and treatment of running injuries.

Since taking charge of the women's running program, Charlie has developed some of the top college-division runners in New England. Last season the Lady Indian harriers captured championships in the Tri-State Conference meet, St. Michael's Invitational and Shacklette Invitational at St. Anslem College. In addition they also placed 7th in the NCAA Division II eastern regional championships.

Mandeville also practices what he preaches. A former All-State hockey player at Mt. St. Charles Academy in Woonsocket, R.I., Charlie is an avid runner and annually runs in several of the top New England road races.



## LOU VERROCHI

### Men's Soccer

Over the past seven years, Lou has directed the transition of the Bryant soccer program from a Division III level to an extremely competitive Division II program.

Since the Northeast-8 Conference initiated a post-season tournament two years ago, Lou has guided the Indians into post-season play both years. Last year they highlighted the season with a berth in the Conference title game.

A native of Walpole, Massachusetts, Lou came to Bryant in 1978 after a successful schoolboy coaching career at Tri-County Regional High in Massachusetts.

In addition to his collegiate coaching, Lou also is a staff member at several soccer camps throughout the country.

A graduate of Boston State College, Lou served as captain of both the Warriors soccer and lacrosse teams in 1972-73.

In addition to his coaching duties at Bryant, Lou also is a fulltime faculty member at Tri-County.



## IRA BROWN

### Men's Track

After two years as men's track coach, Ira takes over as both head track and head cross country coach this year.

Ira joined the Bryant staff in 1985 after enjoying one of the most successful schoolboy track coaching careers in Rhode Island history.

In 13 years as head coach of the Woonsocket boys cross country, indoor and outdoor track teams, the Villa Novans won 162 dual meets while losing only 75. During that period, his teams won 18 divisional and class championships.

In 1979, Ira was named the Rhode Island cross country Coach of the Year and in 1980 he was selected the state's outdoor Coach of the Year.

Last year he proved his coaching success wasn't limited to high school athletes. In addition to directing the men's track team to the title in both the Bryant Relays and the Tri-State Championships, he also helped distance runner John Wilbur earn a berth in the NCAA national championships. Wilbur's appearance marked only the second time a Bryant athlete had competed in the national meet.





# GREAT MOMENTS IN BRYANT SPORTS



## January 25, 1967

Bryant College granted membership in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

## January 12, 1968

Tom Duffy, Bryant basketball coach, named R.I. Words Unlimited Coach of the Year.

## December 3, 1971

The first regular season game between Bryant and Rhode Island College officially opens the new Bryant Gymnasium in Smithfield, R.I.

## March 1, 1975

Bryant College wins ECAC Division Three hockey championship.

## March 4, 1975

Bryant College wins New England NAIA basketball championship.

## February 26, 1978

Bryant basketball team is selected for the NCAA national Division II Basketball Tournament, making it the first Bryant basketball team to qualify for an NCAA tournament.

## March 16, 1979

Sophomore Ernie DeWitt becomes the first Bryant player named to a National Coaches Association All-American team. It is the first of three All-America awards DeWitt earned during his collegiate career.

## May 26, 1979

Keith McWhorter pitches for the Boston Red Sox, making him the first former Bryant player to play in the major leagues.

## February 5, 1981

Bryant basketball coach Leon Drury is named 1980 R.I. Words Unlimited Coach of the Year.

## February 17, 1981

Ernie DeWitt becomes first collegiate player in Rhode Island history to score 2,000 career points and grab 1,000 rebounds.

## April 28, 1981

Jim Hallett wins his first of a record-setting five consecutive New England Intercollegiate Individual Golf championships.

## September 29, 1981

The Bryant golf team, led by individual champion Jim Hallett, wins the New England Intercollegiate team championship.

## November 7, 1981

Jenny Proud becomes the first Bryant woman to qualify for a national NCAA championship by qualifying for the national Division II Cross Country championships.

## September 3, 1982

Jim Hallett becomes the first New Englander in 25 years to reach the semifinal round of the U.S. Amateur Golf Championship.

## January 23, 1983

Jim Hallett named R.I. Words Unlimited Athlete of the Year.

## April 11, 1983

Jim Hallett wins low amateur awards in the Masters golf tournament.

## April 21, 1983

Sue Crisafi becomes Bryant's first Academic All-America when she is selected to the college division Academic All-America women's basketball team.

## May 7, 1984

Bryant wins fourth annual Rhode Island Collegiate baseball tournament with successive victories over the University of Rhode Island, Brown and Providence College.

## Feb. 28, 1986

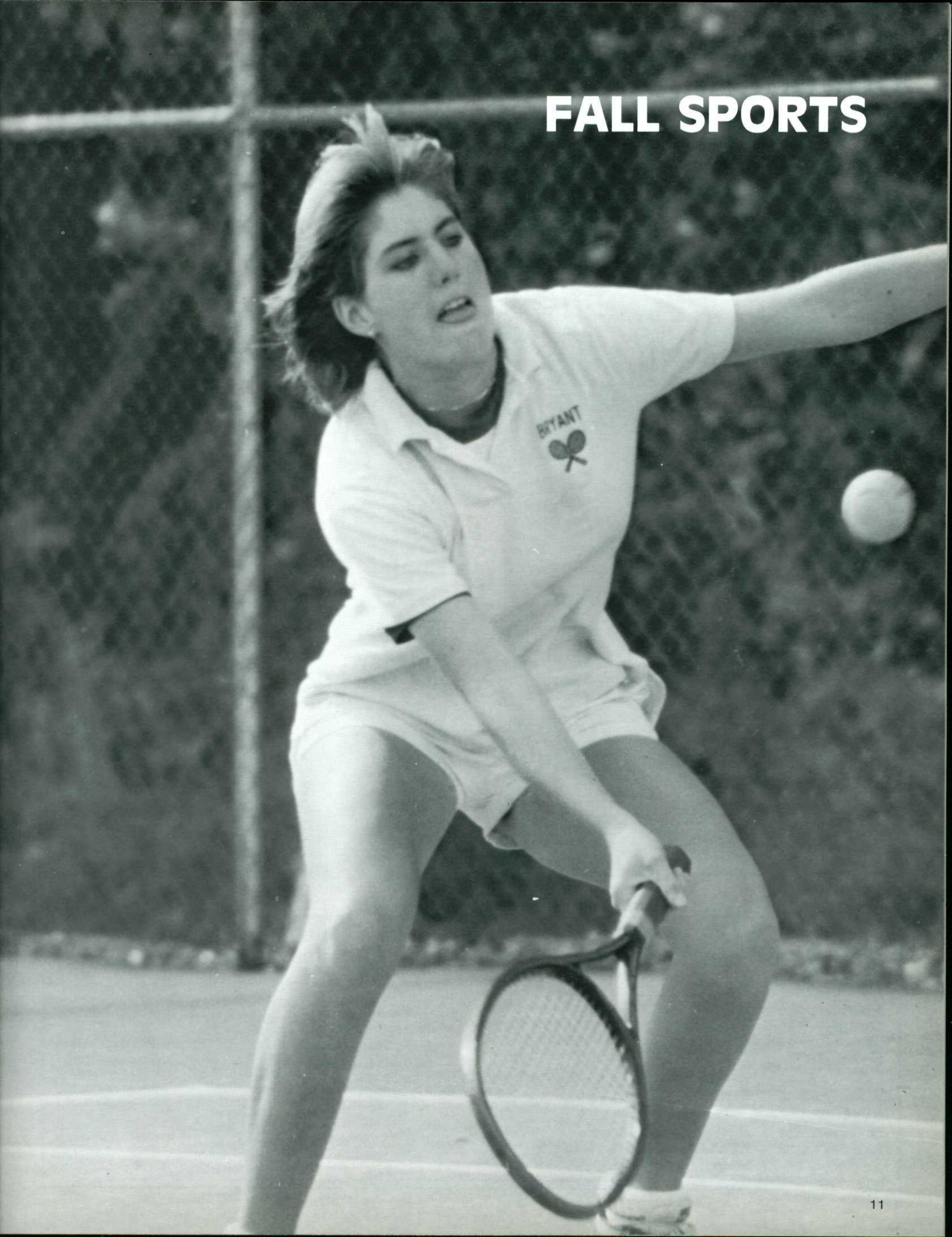
Bryant's women's basketball team wins Northeast-8 Conference championship and earns its first berth in a national NCAA Tournament.

## May 3, 1986

Bryant's baseball team is selected to play in the national Division II baseball tournament, the college's first-ever appearance in the NCAA event.

# MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

**Coach: Ira Brown**

No one can accuse coach Ira Brown of ducking a challenge. Brown, who coached the men's track team to two of their most successful seasons in 1985 and 86, takes over as head cross country coach this fall and his first task will be developing a competitive team.

The Indians, under the direction of former coach Fred Reinhardt, placed third in last year's Northeast-8 Championships, but two of the top four members of that team graduated last year.

Of course, Brown does have an excellent cornerstone for his rebuilding program with the return of senior John Wilbur.

Wilbur was the top Bryant finisher in 4 of 6 races last year, highlighted by a 5th place finish in the Tri-State Championships.

Brown will be without the services of Hank Sarazin and Gary Meinertz. Either Meinertz or Sarazin led the Indians in the races in which Wilbur didn't lead the team last year.

Brown's most successful veteran joining Wilbur will be senior Jim Roche. Roche was the Indians third man behind Wilbur and Sarazin and the 14th overall finisher in last year's Northeast-8 Conference championships.

The other veterans upon who Brown will rebuild the team are juniors Mike DeBlase and Pat Brennan and sophomores Steve Duncan and Bryan DuBos.

For the past 15 years coach Archie Boulet's linkmen have been one of the top collegiate teams in the East. Last year the Indians added to that reputation as they captured their fourth Northeast-8 Conference championship in the past five years, finished second in the New England Fall championships, second in the Toski Invitational and third in the ECAC championships.

The situation shouldn't be much different this year as Boulet will have eight of the top nine players back from the 85-86 squad.

Heading the list of returning vets will be sophomore Dave French, the Northeast-8 Conference individual champion. French compiled the top medal average on the team last fall with a 76.4 average over 270 holes of tournament competition.

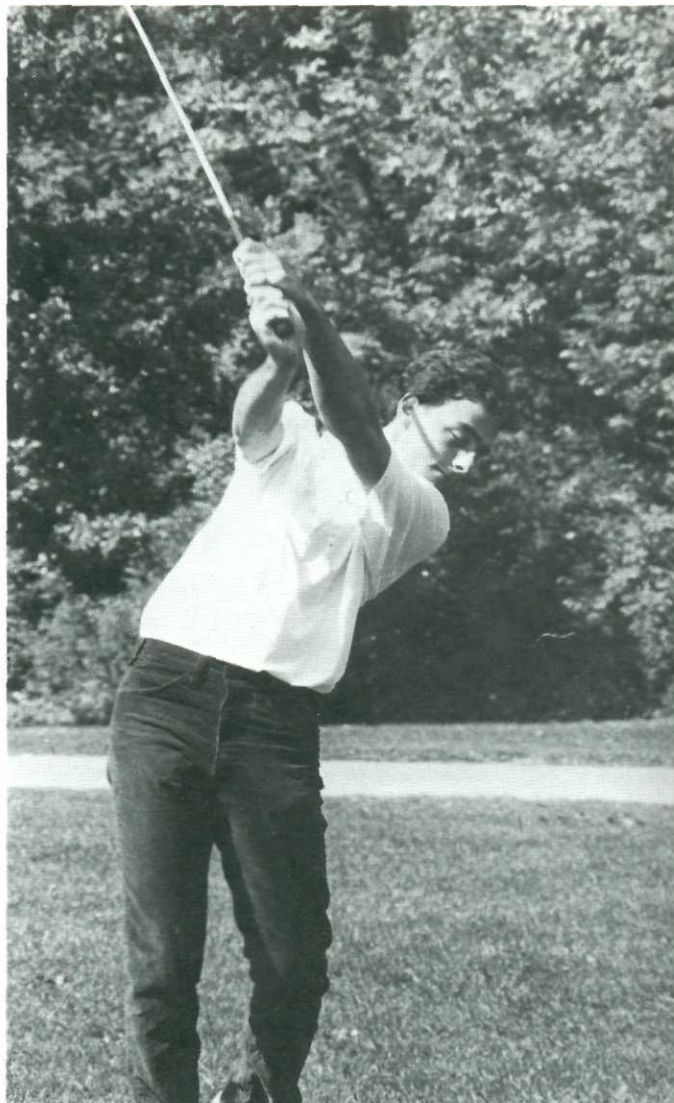
But French isn't the only reason Boulet feels the Indians should mount a serious challenge for the New England title this year. If coach Lorraine Hudak can fill the void created by the graduation of four key members of last year's 20-12 team the Lady Indians should enjoy another successful year.

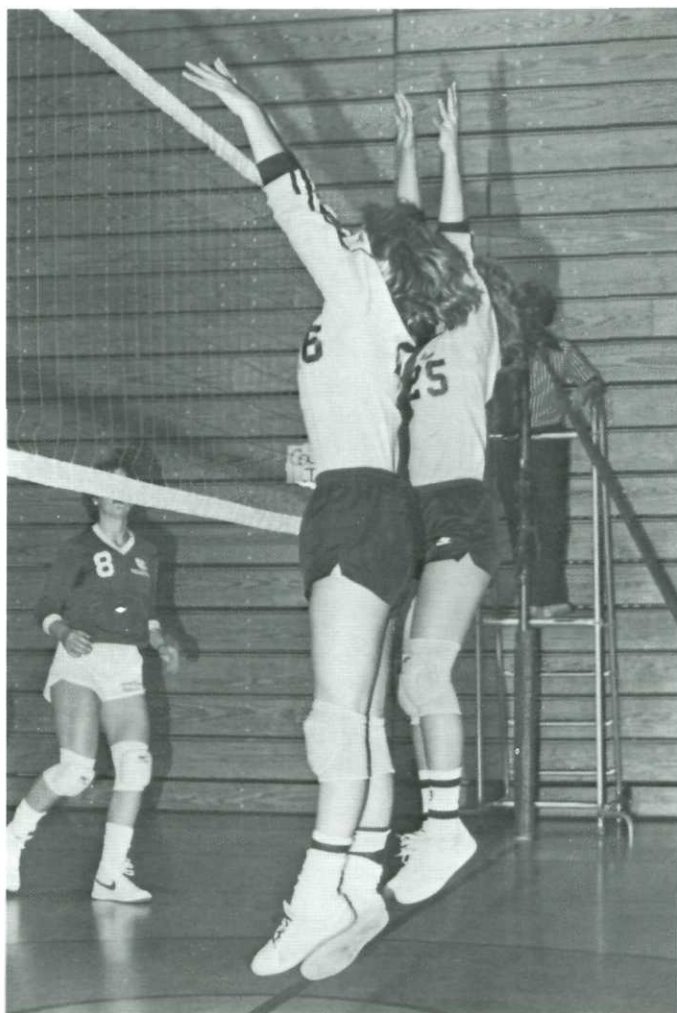

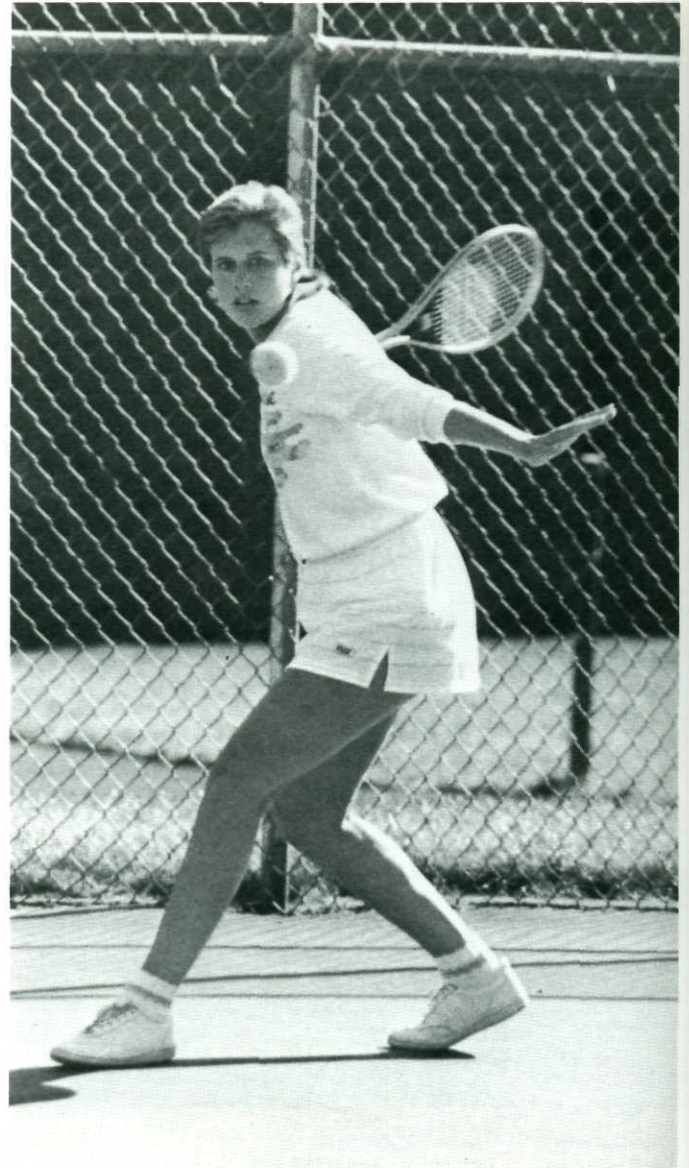

With nine starters back from last year's team that reached the title round of the Northeast-8 Conference tournament plus a host of promising newcomers, this could be one of the best years for Bryant soccer in the past decade.

Included among the nine returning starters are the top two scorers from last year, sophomore Mitch Green and senior Mark Verille. Greene set a Bryant record for most goals in one season last year with 12 in 17 games. 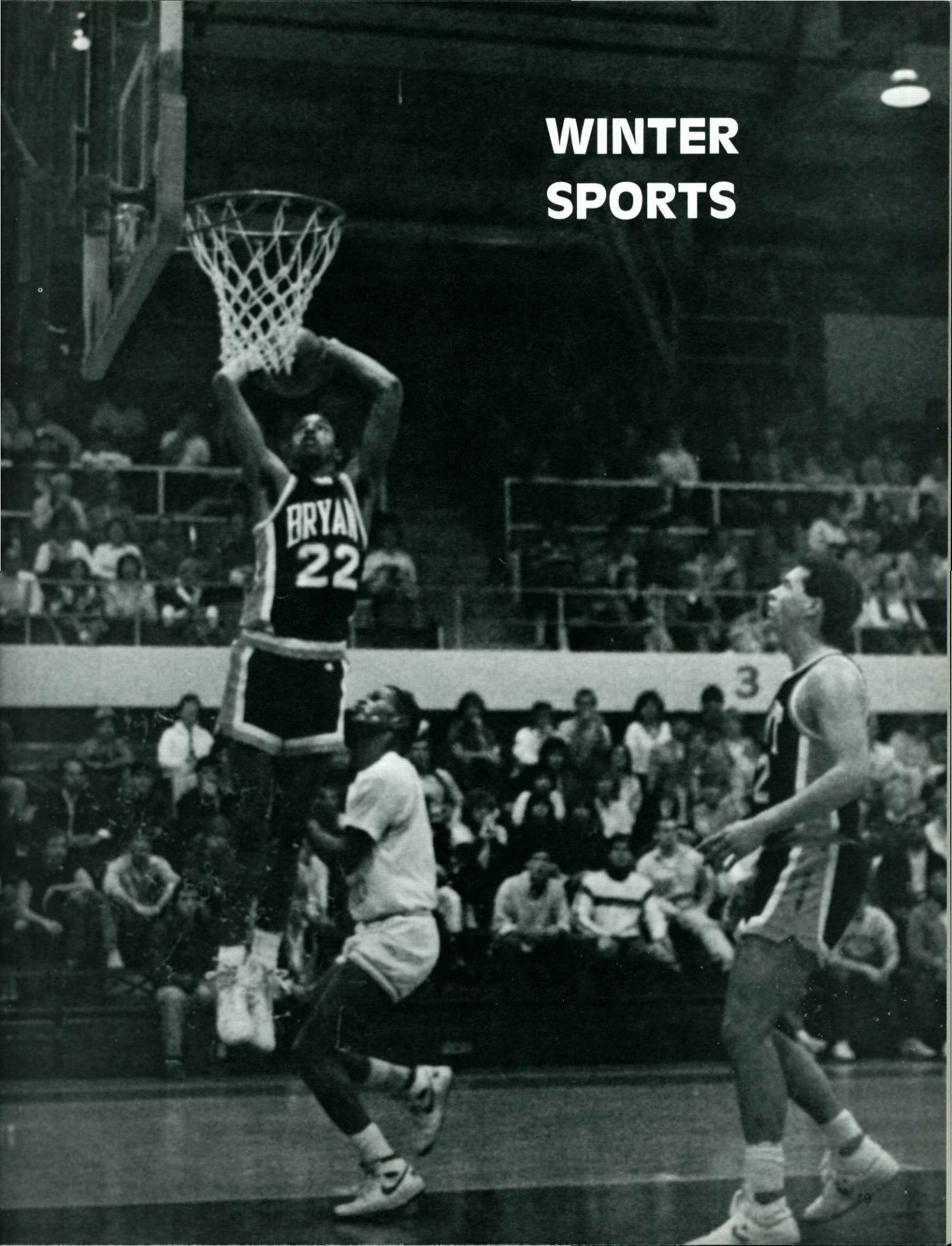

# MEN'S BASKETBALL

Seven lettermen and four promising newcomers will be trying to make 1986-87 the first winning men's basketball season in five years.

The biggest problem facing coach Leon Drury will be trying to replace the 30 points per game which were contributed by Gregg Cooper and Art Whitehead last season.

Cooper, the team's leading scorer last year with an 18.1 average graduated and Whitehead, the sophomore forward who averaged 11.8, is academically ineligible.

Drury is hoping for more offensive contributions from Derek Higgs and Jamie Ryan, two sophomores who showed promise in starting roles as freshmen last year.

Ryan, a 6-2 guard from Chappaqua, N.Y., averaged 7.7 while Higgs, a 6-5 forward from Queens averaged 6.3 points and 5.3 rebounds.

Michael Reed, the junior forward who averaged 7.1 ppg also is expected to rejoin Higgs in the frontcourt.

One thing Drury doesn't need to worry about is ballhandling. With senior Manny Barrows and sophomore Jeff Martin in the lineup the Indians possess two of the top playmakers in the Northeast-8 Conference. Barrows has been the NE-8's assist leader for each of the past two seasons.

But Drury knows if this is going to be a winning season, he needs help from the newcomers.

Three of the first-year men, Brain O'Donnell, Bob Arnemann and Jarrard Bradley will strengthen the front court.

O'Donnell, a 6-8 center from Easthampton, Mass., was an all-western Mass. selection last year at Easthampton High.

Arnemann, a 6-7 forward from Stonybrook, Long Island, was an all-league selection at Ward Melville High last year.

Bradley was a first-team All Suffolk County selection at Centerreach, Long Island, High last year.

The fourth first-year man is Chuck Santos, a junior college transfer from the Community College of Rhode Island.

# WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

**Coach: Ralph Tomasso**

Despite heavy graduate losses, the Lady Indians still could be a contender for the Northeast-8 Conference title this winter.

The biggest problem will be finding a replacement for graduated All-America Karyn Marshall. Marshall, the Northeast-8 Conference Player of the Year last season, scored 573 of the Lady Indians 2,172 points in 1985-86. She also was the only member of the team with double figures in rebounding, averaging 12.1 per game. The leading scorer for each of her four years at Bryant she finished her career as the College's all-time women's scoring leader with 1,986 points.

Also missing will be Debbie Voelkner, Ann-Marie Harrington and Diane Moskey, a trio that combined for an average of 24.7 points per game last year.

Without Marshall in the lineup for the first time in four years, the Lady Indians will need a much more balanced attack.

The return of letterwinners Donetta Barros, Kim Gallagher, Laura Scinto, Lori Mahler, Stephanie Ladd and Chris Root could help provide the needed balance.

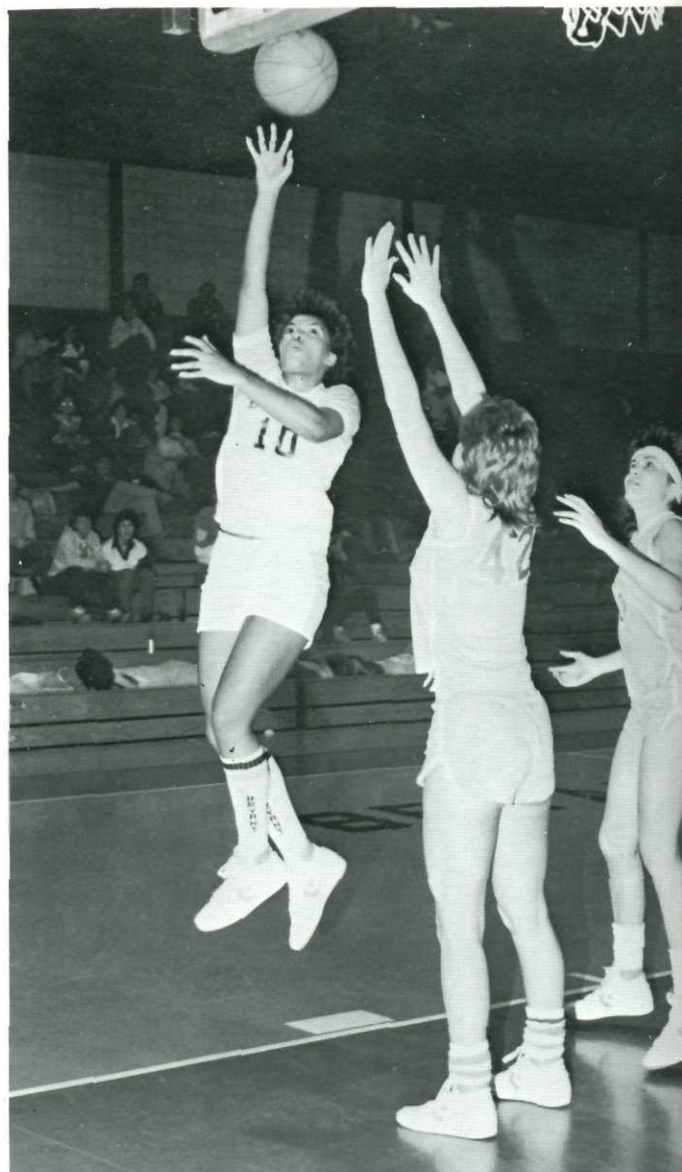
Barros, a senior guard, was the No. 2 scorer behind Marshall last season with a 12.8 average. Despite playing most of the season in the backcourt she also was the No. 2 rebounder with 6.4 per game.

Gallagher and Scinto will join Barros in the backcourt. Gallagher, a 5-9 junior, started 24 of the Lady Indians 28 games last year and averaged 5 points per game. Scinto, a 5-8 sophomore, saw considerable action in the second half of the season helping the Lady Indians capture the Northeast-8 Conference title.

Ladd and Root are a pair of sophomores who served as backup to Marshall last season. By the end of the season Ladd had moved into a starting forward spot next to Marshall. This year the duo is expected to be the main weapons in the front court attack along with 6-1 freshman center Karrie Giaramita.

Giaramita was the top scorer for Bishop Fenwick High in Saugus, Mass. last year.

The Lady Indians also should get plenty of offensive help from another newcomer, freshman Donna O'Brien. O'Brien, a 5-9 swingman, was a two-time first team All-State selection at Coventry, R.I. High.

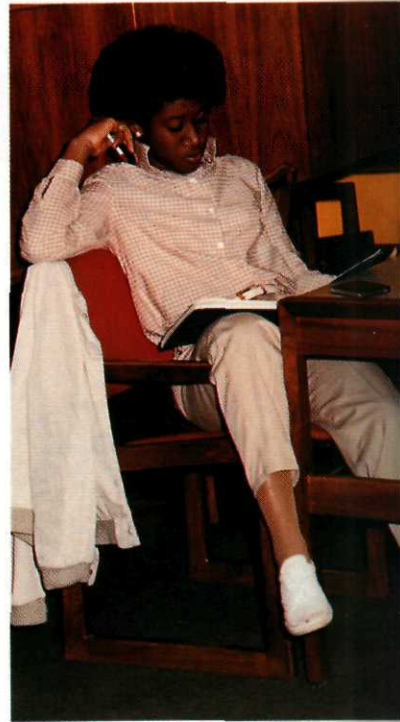
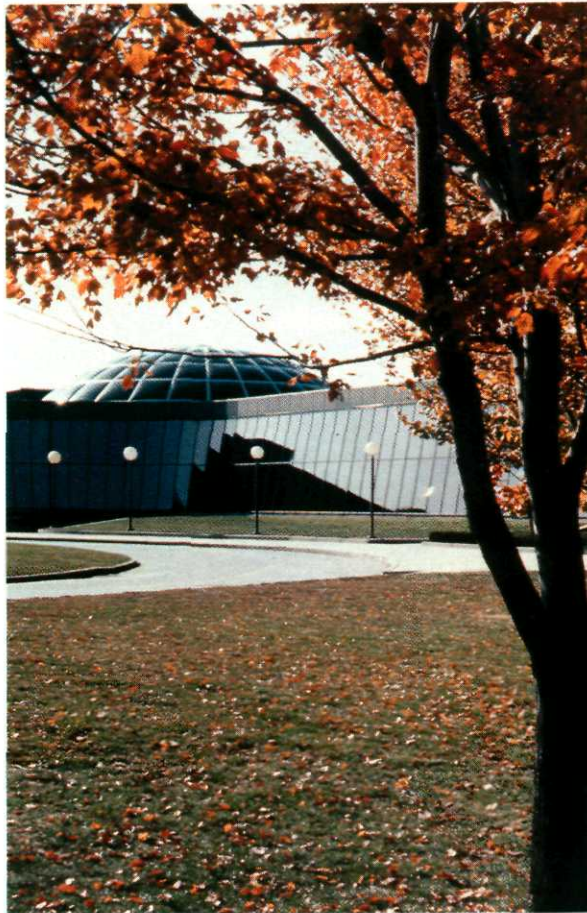
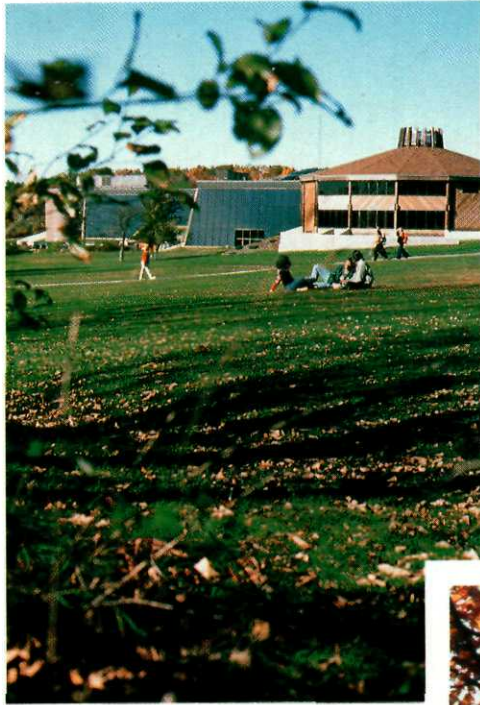

For well over a century, Bryant College has been dedicated to educating men and women for creative and responsible careers in business, industry and government.

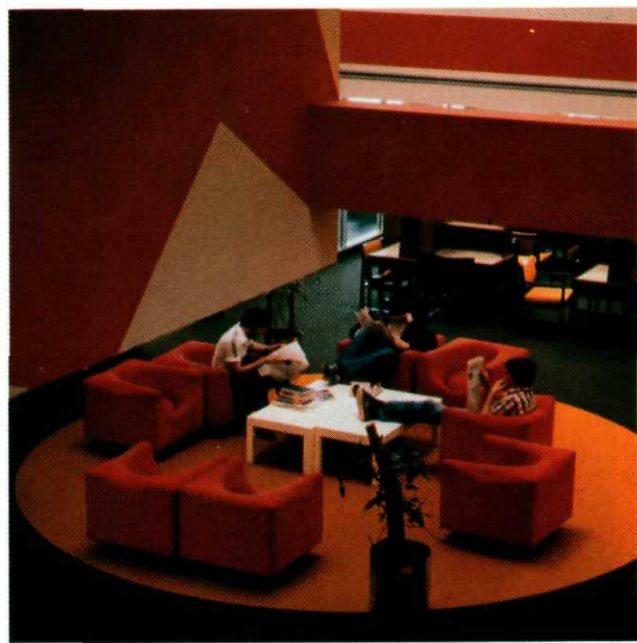
Founded in 1863, Bryant's motto then, as now, is "Education for Business Leadership."

Complementing the academic side of Bryant is a lively social environment in-



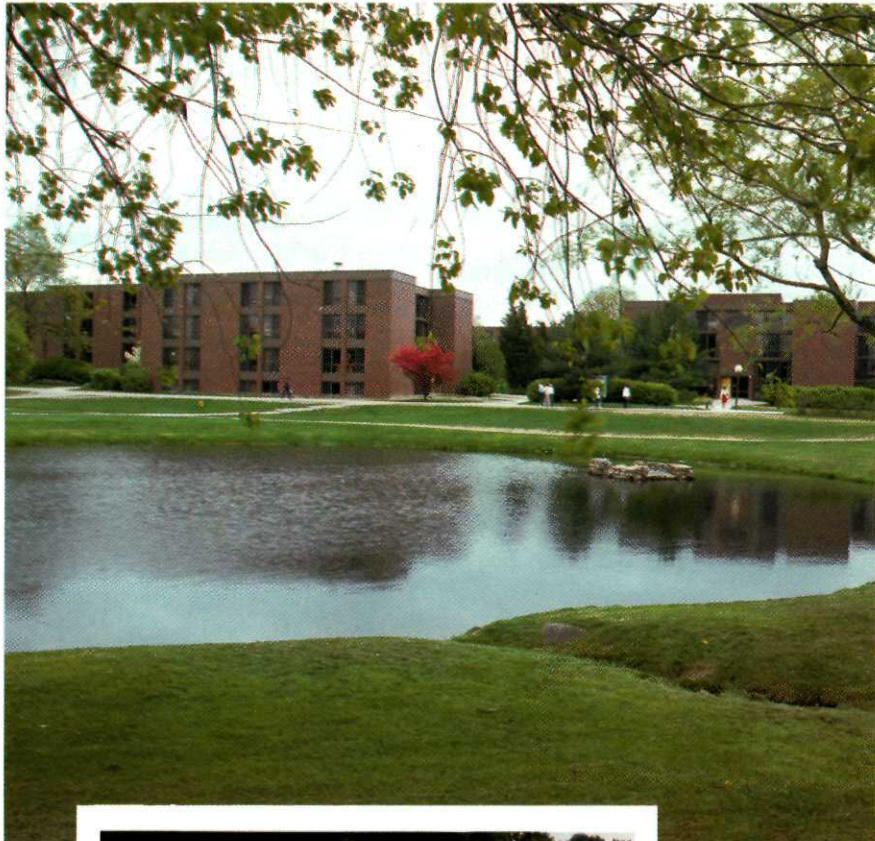


volving clubs, athletics, distinctive and innovative living styles and endless opportunities for making Bryant a full and rich living and learning experience.

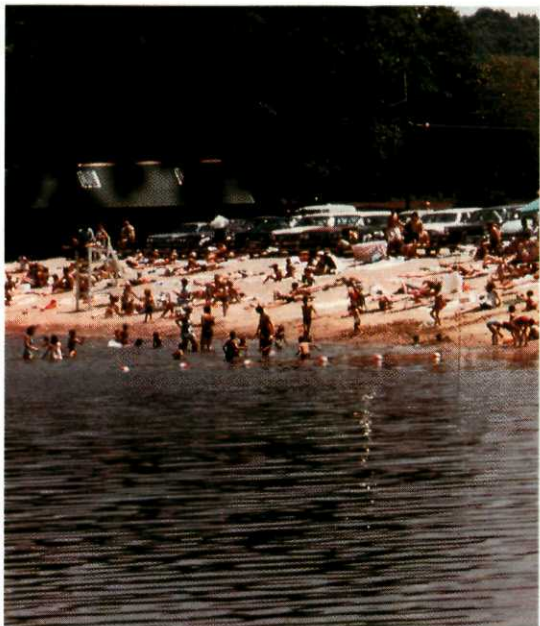
worlds — the serenity of a suburban campus and the convenience of an urban location.

Despite the loss of three of last year's top bowlers through graduation, coach Ken McKenzie expects 1987 will be another successful season for the Indian keglers.

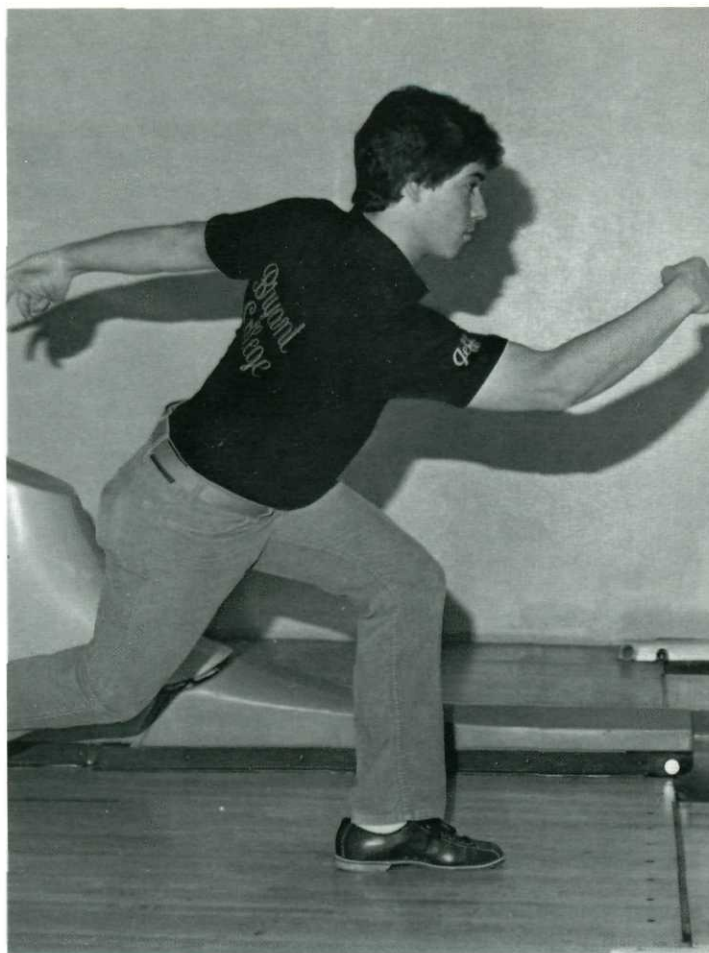
Anchoring the squad will be Pete Cohen and Jeff Grapes, a pair of seniors who have been members of the starting lineup for the past three years.

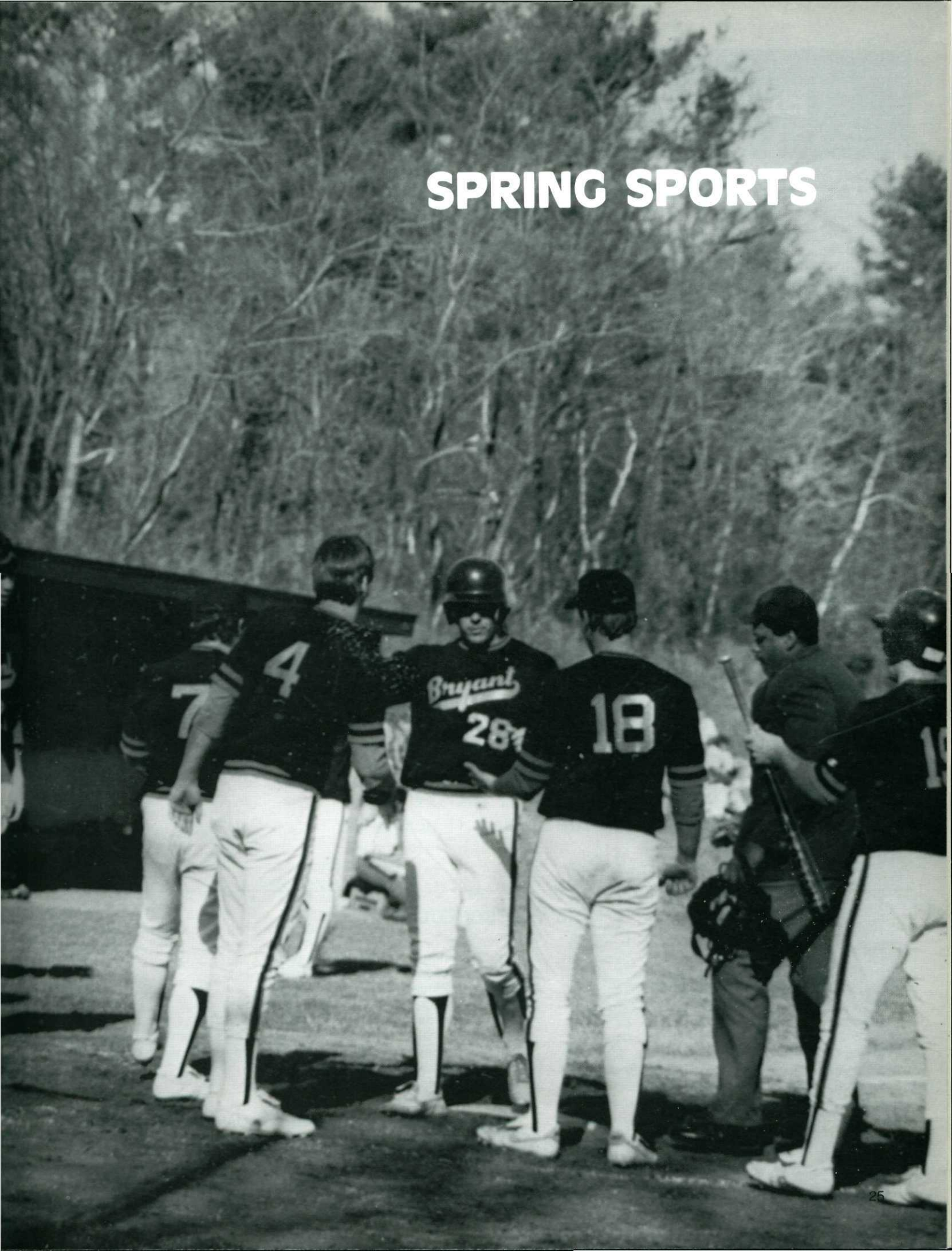

# BASEBALL

## Coach: Dale O'Dell

How do you replace 171 hits, 24 home runs and 40 percent of your pitching victories?

That's the problem facing coach Dale O'Dell in his first year as the Indians head mentor.

O'Dell should still have 18 of the 25 members of the team that set a Bryant record with 22 victories last season, but six of the seven graduates played key roles in the 1986 success story.

Missing from the lineup for the first time in two years will be Tony Garganese, Jim Abbott, Tom Mendillo, Keith Murphy, Bruce Gaudreau and Chris Train.

Offensively Garganese, Abbott, Mendillo and Murphy combined for 171 of the Indians 346 hits last year. They also collected a combined total of 24 home runs, 36 doubles, 6 triples and 28 stolen bases.

Defensively Gaudreau and Train combined for 8 of the Indians' 22 pitching victories.

But O'Dell still has plenty of talent both at the plate and on the mound.

Heading the offense should be junior shortstop Jon Sjogren and senior third baseman Tony Bellagamba.

Sjogren, playing his first season since transferring from Florida Southern, finished second to Garganese in hitting with a .340 average.

Bellagamba was the No. 4 hitter on the team last year with a .333 average. His 39 hits in 117 plate appearances gives him a total of 86 hits in only two years of varsity competition.

O'Dell also is hoping for strong plate contributions from Mike Calabro, a sophomore catcher who hit .303 in his first year of college ball last year, senior outfielder Mike Robinson, who hit .286 and John Cunningham, a junior infielder who hit 244.

A big question mark on the mound will be the availability of senior righthander Jeff Vigeant. Vigeant was one of the leading members of the mound staff last year before suffering a rotacup injury midway through the season. He underwent surgery this summer and hopes to be ready for duty in the spring.

The other veteran members of the mound corps will include junior righthanders Kevin McCadden, Pete Inglese, and Dave Podgorski, sophomore righthander Doug Battaglini and senior Brian McAuley.

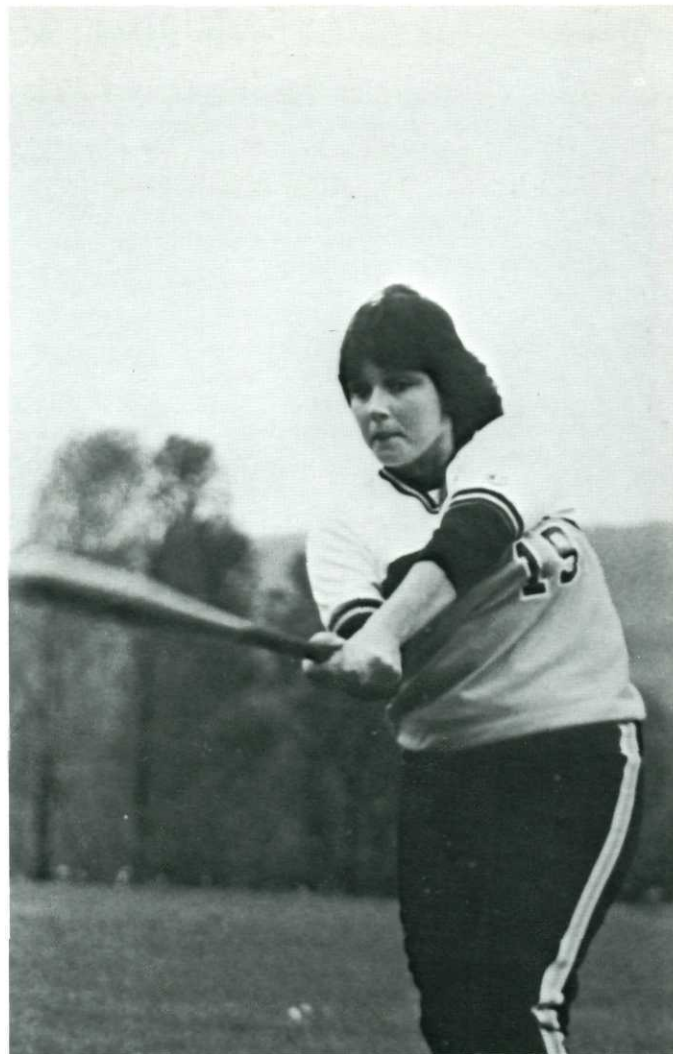

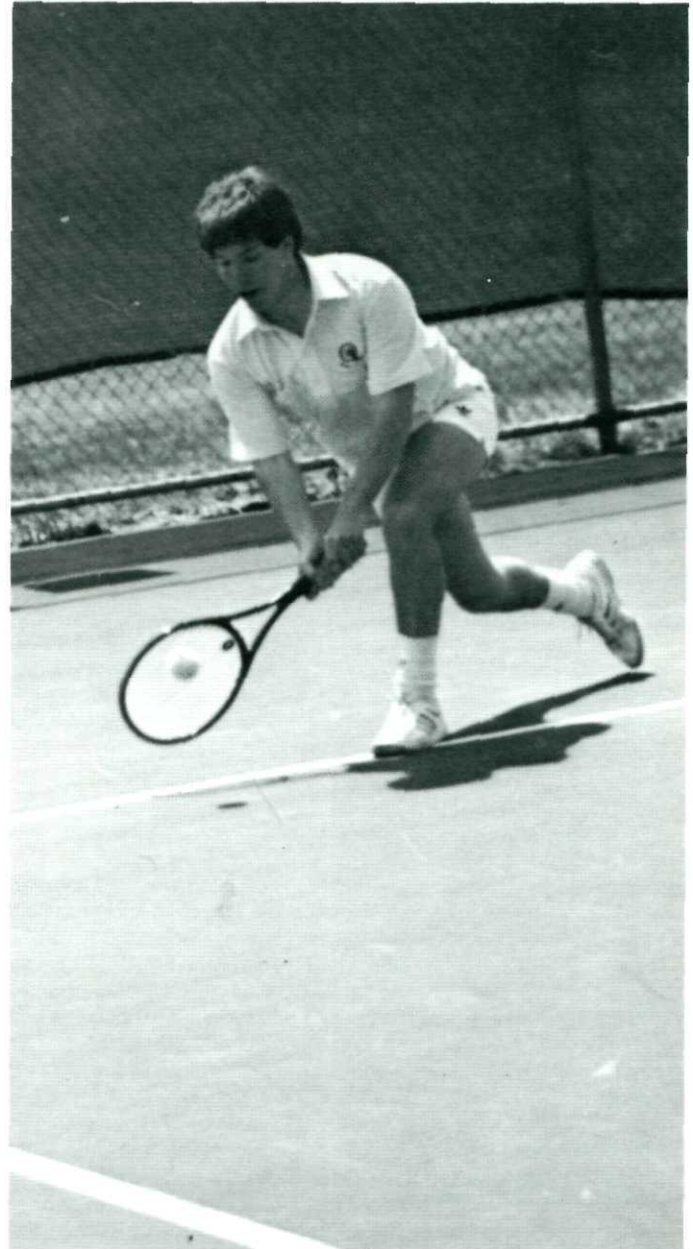

Last year was one of the most successful spring track seasons in Bryant history and coach Ira Brown is hoping for a lot of the same in 1987.

Last spring the Indians won the Tri-State championship and sent a representative to the national NCAA championships for only the second time in Bryant history. The return of that star, middle-distance runner John Wilbur is one of the big reasons for Brown's optimistic outlook.

Wilbur won the Tri-State 800 title with a meet and Bryant record-setting effort of 1:57.5. Two weeks later he took 8 seconds off the Bryant record with a time of 1:49.7 in the Northeastern University Invitational. Wilbur also won the 800 crown in the Boston College relays.

Wilbur also set a Bryant record in the 1,500 last year with a time of 4-minutes flat.

But Wilbur isn't the only Bryant record holder Brown will have in the lineup this spring.

Senior Mike Sameski, who set a 400 record with a clocking of 49.2. in 1985, will give Brown strength in the long sprints.

Brown's top weapon in the short sprints will be Bob Seiple, last year's Tri-State 100 champion who set the Bryant 100 meter record with a time of 10.9 in 1985.

Mike DeBlaise, who set a School record in the 10,000 last year, gives Brown scoring potential in the distance events. Steve Duncan and Ed Podraza also should provide points in the distance events.

The Indians also look strong in the field events with Rich Johnson, set to go after a school record in the hammer. Other field performers will include Tony Cohutt and Mark Thompson in the javelin, Bill Baer and Tom Cohen and Brien Walther in the shot, Pete Haas in the high jump and Steve Rezzi, Paul Shoemaker and Larry Brodeur in the pole vault.

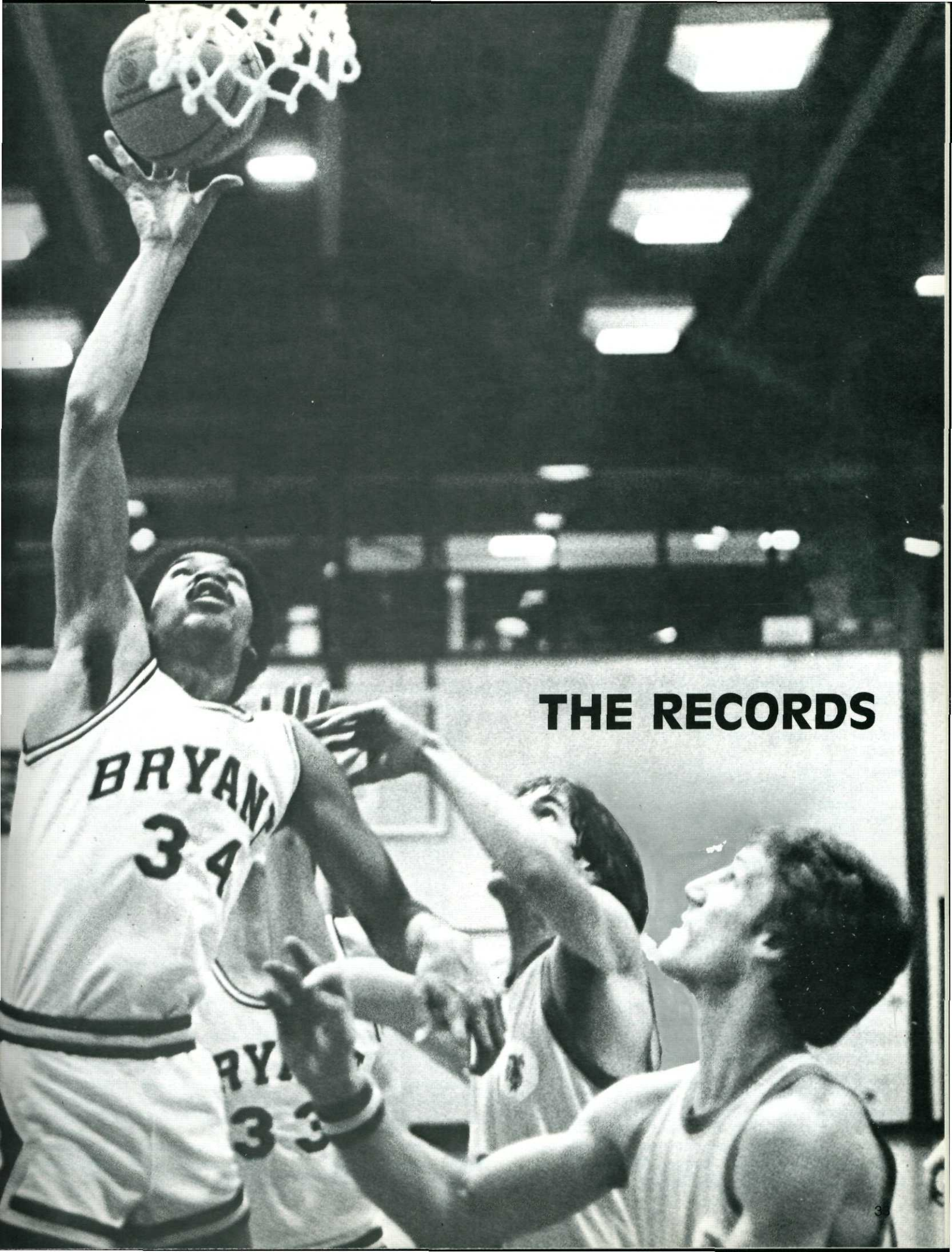

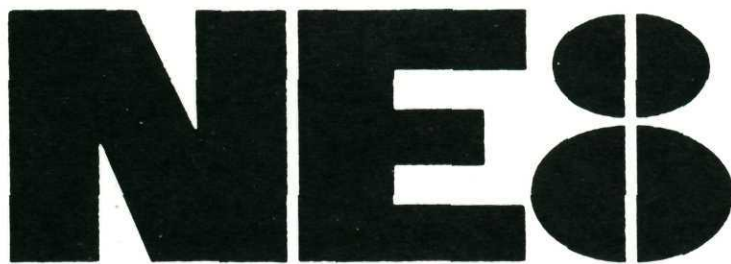

The Northeast-8 Conference is the premier Division II athletic conference in the country.

Officially formed in 1980, the NE-8 has been the model for several other collegiate conferences organized over the past five years.

Since the first year when only three sports (men's basketball, men's soccer and baseball) were involved in Conference competition today 12 sports crown a Conference champion each year.

In three sports, (men's and women's basketball and softball), the Conference champion is granted an automatic berth to the national NCAA Division II tournament.

Even before conference champions began earning automatic berths in the national tournament, NE-8 members had made more combined national tournament appearances over a 15-year period than any other Division II Conference in the country.

In men's basketball alone, NE-8 members have combined to make 56 trips to the NCAA national tournament over the past 15 years. Last year teams or individual athletes from NE-8 appeared in 13 national NCAA tournaments. Bryant teams and athletes accounted for four of those appearances as the baseball and women's basketball teams earned berths in their national tourneys and individual members of the men's track and golf team qualified for the national competition.

Last year also was the first season for the Conference's all-sports President's Cup competition. (See chart on this page). Bryant finished second among the Conference's eight schools with 68½ points in the combined men's and women's competition.

The Bryant male athletes finished first in the six male sports with 39½ points compared to 37 for runner-up Springfield.

Bryant enjoyed its best year of Conference competition in 1985-86. Three Bryant teams — golf, women's basketball and baseball — captured Conference championships. In addition, both the men's and women's cross country teams, men's tennis and women's soccer placed third in Conference tournaments giving Bryant top three finishes in seven of the 12 Conference sports.

In June of 1987, the Conference will expand to 10 colleges with the addition of St. Michael's College of Winooski, Vt., and Quinnipiac College of Hamden, Conn. At that time, the name of the Conference will officially change to the Northeast-10.

# How to Reach Bryant College

The Bryant campus is located close to the interstate highway network which allows accessibility to major cities of Massachusetts, northern New England, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania and Washington, D.C.

Located on Route 7 in Smithfield, Rhode Island, Bryant can be reached:

*From the north* (northern New England, Massachusetts) by taking Routes 91, 89, 93 or 95 south to Route 295 south in Rhode Island, to Route 7;

*From the west* (Connecticut, up-state New York and points west) by taking Routes 87, 90, 84, 86, 44 or 6 to 146 south or 295 north in Rhode Island, to Route 7;

*From the east* (eastern Massachusetts) by taking Routes 44 or 195 west to Route 95 north, to Route 146 west, to Route 116 south to Route 7;

*From the south* (southern Connecticut, southern New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Washington, D.C. and points south) by taking Route 95 north to Route 295 north in Rhode Island to Route 7.

The Theodore F. Green Airport, 22 miles from campus in Warwick, RI, and the main bus terminal and railroad station in Providence provide convenient transportation from all New England states and beyond. Transportation to campus from these terminals must be arranged by the parents and student.
