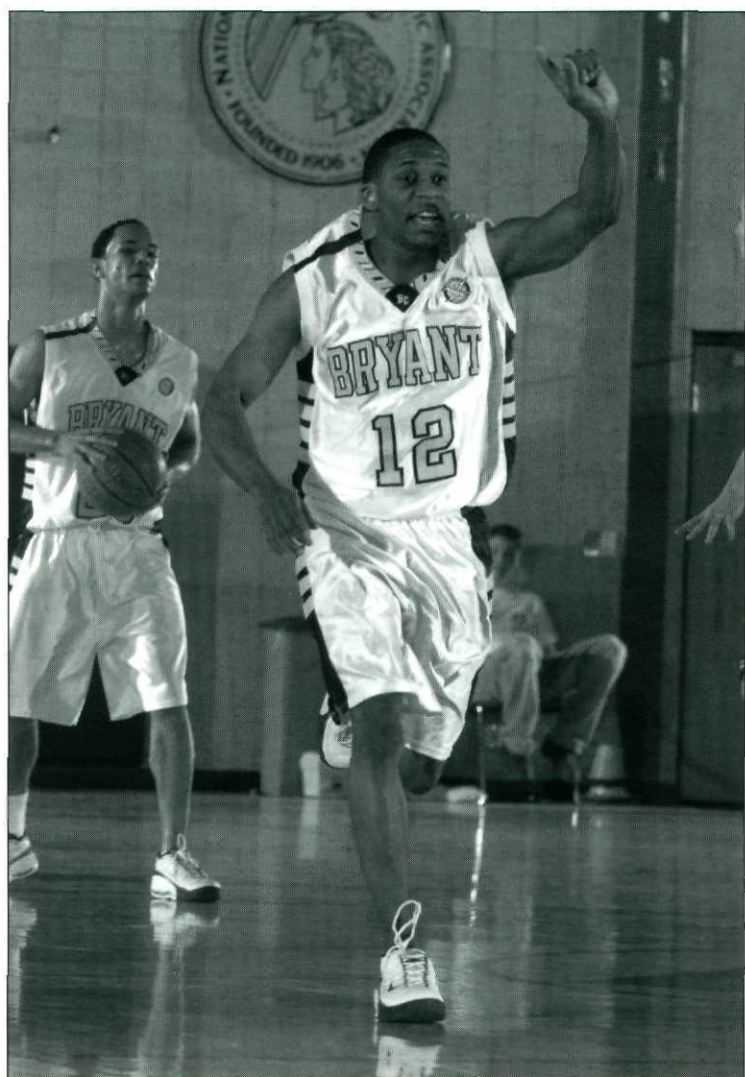
Statement Of Athletics Philosophy

Athletic Communications: The Bryant College athletic communications office is located on the second floor of the Bryant Athletic & Recreation Center. The phone number is (401) 232-6072; the fax number is (401) 232-6361.

Credentials: Credentials to Bryant basketball games can be obtained by contacting Chuck Sullivan in writing or by telephone. Credentials will be left at the ticket table.

Radio: Radio stations planning to broadcast Bryant basketball games must make arrangements with the athletic communications office at least two weeks prior to the requested game. Telephone lines will be supplied by the college, provided the requested notice is given. All calls must be made either on a collect or calling card basis.

Press Row Services: The Bryant athletic communications office will provide a game program, current press release, pregame statistics and the Northeast-10 Conference weekly report prior to the game. A full box score, play-by-play and shot chart are distributed at halftime and at the end of the game.

Postgame Interviews: A 10-minute cooling off period will be strictly enforced, after which Bryant head coach Max Good and selected players will be made available to the media. Postgame interviews will be conducted in the basketball office suite overlooking the arena. Requests for visiting coaches and players should be made through the opponent's sports information contact.

Player Interviews: Interviews other than those immediately following a game must be arranged by the assistant director of athletics for communications, who will coordinate a time so as not to interfere with the student's academic schedule.

Media Work Room: Space is available for media members who need to file postgame reports. There is ample work space with power outlets and telephones.

2001-02 Season Outlook

The new-look Bulldogs expect to move up in the Northeast-10 standings

It's time to forget everything you know about the Bryant College men's basketball team.

For even though the Bulldogs return eight players from last year's team, observers of Bryant basketball will be quick to notice that the similarities between last year's group and this year's ends with that simple number.

For starters, a new head coach is in place as former UNLV and Eastern Kentucky mentor Max Good begins his first year with the Bulldogs. And with a new coach comes a new philosophy. Whereas last year's Bulldog squad hung its hat on ferocious half-court defense and a patient, yet efficient offense, this year's Bryant team will approach things differently.

Good promises a squad that will run the floor, utilize full-court pressure and make things happen quickly on the offensive end. If a player has an open shot, he has the green light to take it. But he also better be prepared to chase the rebound if he misses and get back on defense quickly in transition.

Bryant was one of the better defensive teams in the Northeast-10 Conference last season, and the Bulldogs' 8-18 record belies just how competitive the team actually was. With eight players from that group returning, including

three who were regular starters as freshmen, the Bulldogs appear to have the veteran presence necessary to make strides in the conference this season. Factor in a freshman class that comes in with heavy accolades, and Bryant should be firmly in the mix for a spot in the Northeast-10 tournament.

Here's a look at how the Bulldogs shape up by position.

GUARD

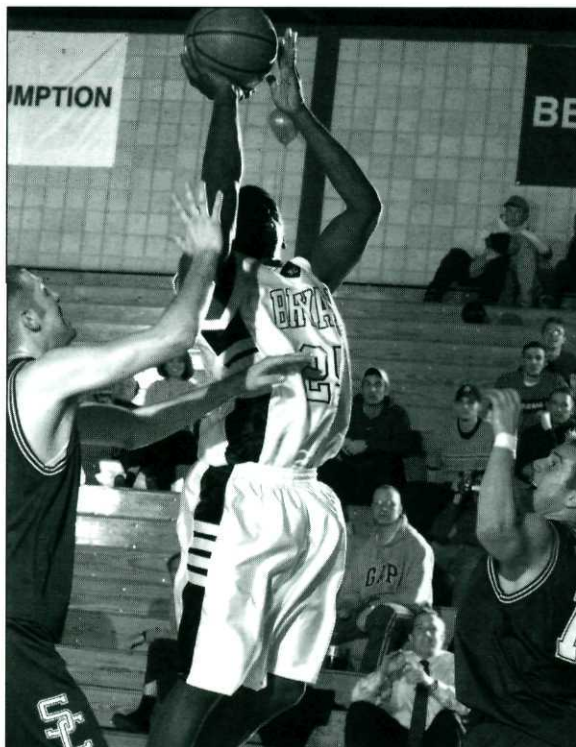
Bryant should not lack talent nor depth at the guard spots, with two returning starters, two more proven veterans and two good-looking newcomers in the fold.

Senior **Chinedu Onyekwu (Dorchester, Mass.)** is looking for a big year in his final season with the Bulldogs and hopes to shake off the inconsistency that plagued him as a junior. Onyekwu proved to be a dominant player at times, and if he can maintain that level throughout the season, Bryant will fare quite well.

Onyekwu is a good outside shooter who has a quick first step and can score around the goal as well. He is the top scorer among returning players after he averaged 9.4 points per game last season.

Sophomore **Gouty Gaye (Providence, R.I.)** made 13 starts as a freshman and established himself as a player to watch in the NE-10. Gaye has the skills and instincts inherent in a good point guard and also has the scoring ability of a shooting guard. He led Bryant in three-point field goals as a rookie, was fourth on the team in scoring and was second in assists.

Junior **Jon Wallace (Monroeville, Pa.)** will see time either as a starter or as the sixth man in his third year.

Wallace is looking to return to his form of 1999-2000, when he averaged double digits in scoring. A hard-working player with a good outside shot, Wallace will be a key contributor on the offensive and defensive ends.

Junior **Jim Choquette (North Branford, Conn.)** came into his own as a sophomore and made the most of his playing time. A dangerous three-point shooter, Choquette will see minutes when Bryant needs an offensive spark.

Freshman **Mike Niedzwiecki (Sutton, Mass.)** has been impressive in the preseason thanks to his athleticism and composure. An athletic combo guard, Niedzwiecki has shown that he should be able to handle the offensive and defensive facets of the game in his first year.

Freshman **Josh Longstaff (Portland, Maine)** enjoyed a storied high school career in Maine and has impressed the coaching staff in the preseason. Longstaff can handle the ball well and might well be Bryant's best outside shooter.

FORWARD

Graduation claimed Bryant's leading scorer, Brian Bigos, but two returning veterans and two promising newcomers account for a solid group of frontcourt players. If there is a common trait among the four, it's athleticism coupled with the ability to make the outside shot.

Sophomore **Jason Noel (Berlin, Mass.)** came on as one of the better frontcourt players in the Northeast-10 Conference toward the end of his freshman season, and he figures to be a solid all-conference candidate as a sophomore. Noel was Bryant's third-leading scorer as a rookie and was second on the team in rebounds. He is a force on the offensive glass and was the Bulldogs' most efficient shooter a year ago.

Junior **Erik Barlow (Hudson, Ohio)** saw his first year at Bryant end prematurely due to a knee injury. But with a full recovery, Barlow has returned to form

Freshman **Jarett Love (Roselle, N.J.)** was a two-time captain for a strong St. Peter's Prep team in New Jersey and has the potential to be a solid contributor in his first year with the Bulldogs. Love is an athletic swingman with all of the tools to enjoy a successful career.

Freshman **Cullen McCarthy (Mansfield, Mass.)** gives the Bulldogs size and skill at the post and should be an impact player as well. McCarthy is a solid rebounder who can step back and drain the outside shot as well.

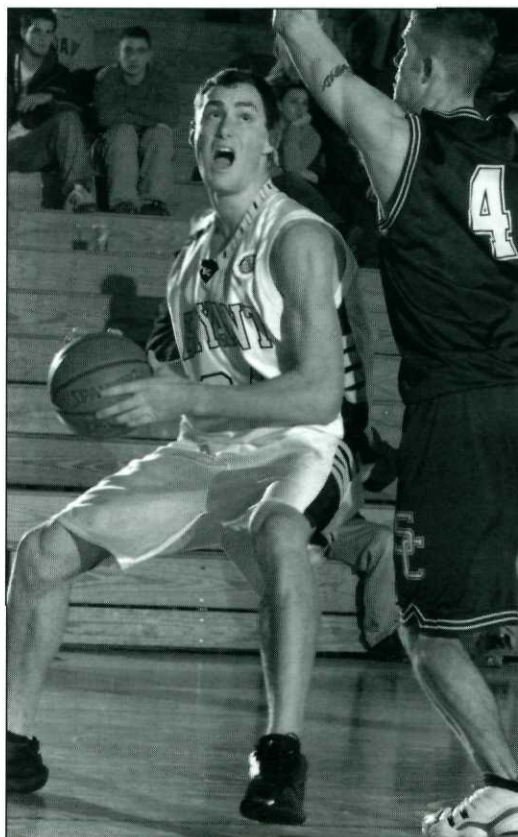
CENTER

Bryant boasts a pair of quality centers in the fold for 2001-02.

Sophomore **Mike Williams (Ellington, Conn.)** started 25 games for Bryant as a rookie, and he firmly established himself as one of the conference's best in his first year. Williams led the Northeast-10 Conference and shattered Bryant's single-season record with 70 blocks in his first year, and he also was the Bulldogs' leading rebounder.

Williams has gained strength during the offseason and is a legitimate all-conference candidate in his second year.

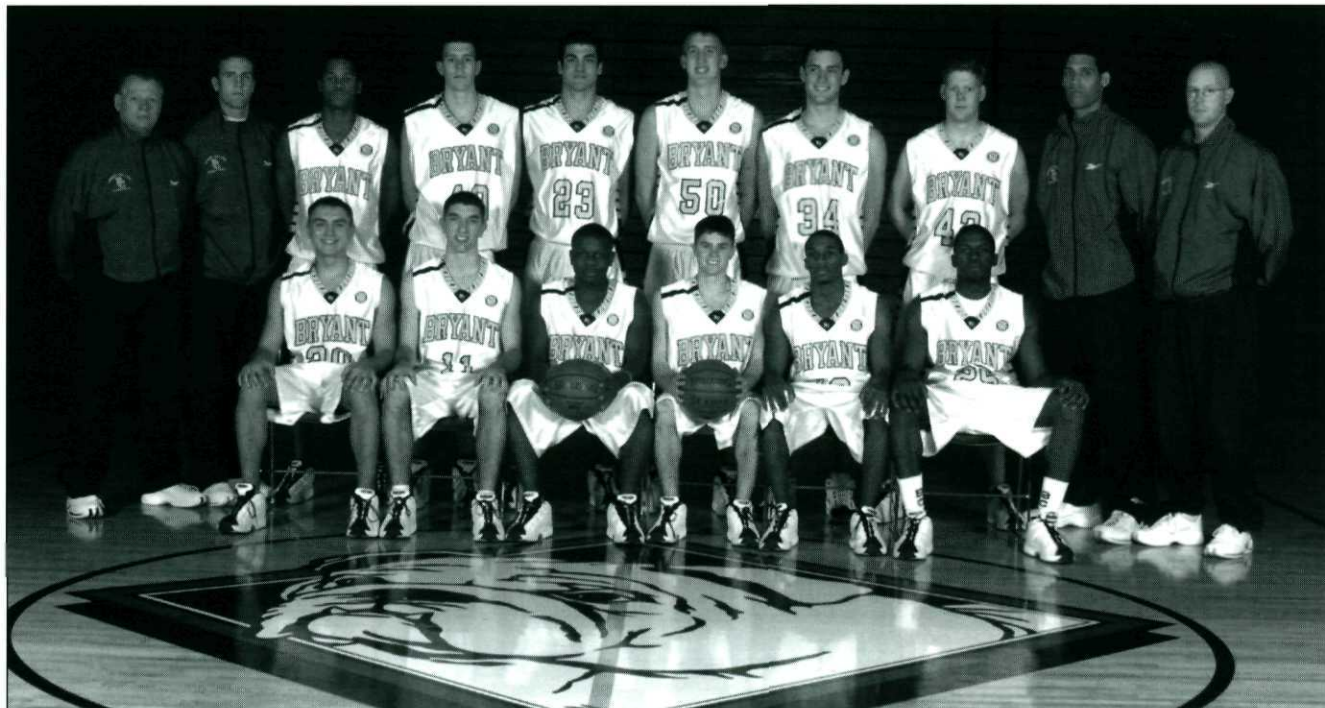

Max Good

Head Coach • First Year



Max Good was introduced as Bryant's head men's basketball coach April 6, 2001. He comes to Bryant after spending the 2000-01 season as the head coach at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas.

Good, 60, who led UNLV to a 13-9 record after taking over the program from former head man Bill Bayno, was in his second season as an assistant coach with the Runnin' Rebels when he was elevated to head coach.

He becomes just the fifth head coach in Bryant's 38-year history of varsity men's basketball, replacing Ed Reilly, who resigned in February after 12 seasons with the Bulldogs.

Before joining the staff at UNLV, Good spent 10 seasons as the head coach at Maine Central Institute in Pittsfield, Maine, where he amassed an overall record of 275-30 (.902), enjoyed three undefeated seasons, won five New England Prep School Athletic Conference championships, registered a 79-game winning streak that spanned three seasons, and coached seven players who reached the NBA and 87 who went on to play Division I college basketball.

Good also spent five seasons as head coach at Eastern Kentucky University, registering an overall record of 96-129 (.427). He was named the Ohio Valley Conference coach of the year in 1987 after leading the Colonels to a 19-11 record. His squad was 18-11 in the following season. He was an assistant coach at Eastern Kentucky for five seasons before being promoted to head coach. He has an overall collegiate head coaching record of 109-138.

While well known for his success on the court, Good also saw

his players achieve in the classroom. His program at Eastern Kentucky had an 85-percent graduation rate under his watch, and 122 of his 128 players at Maine Central Institute academically qualified for NCAA Division I and II competition following their prep years at that institution.

Good graduated from Eastern Kentucky in 1969 and received a master's degree from that institution in 1970.

Among Good's former players who have moved on to the NBA are Cuttino Mobley of the Houston Rockets, and Erick Barkley of the Portland Trail Blazers. Three of Good's players were selected in the 2000 NBA draft, including Barkley (28th pick to Portland), DerMarr Johnson (sixth pick to the Atlanta Hawks) and Mamadou N'Dyaye (27th pick to the Denver Nuggets).

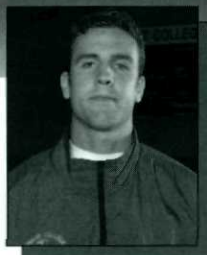

Brian Keefe



Assistant Coach

Brian Keefe enters his first season as an assistant men's basketball coach at Bryant College after one season at the University of South Florida.

In his one season with the Bulls, Keefe worked extensively with All-Conference USA selections Altron Jackson and B.B. Waldon, while assisting head coach Seth Greenberg's team to an 18-13 record. Prior to joining Greenberg's staff at South Florida, Keefe spent one season as an associate coach with the Boston Amateur Basketball Club, one of the elite AAU basketball programs in the nation. Under the direction of head coach and current Boston Celtics director of player personnel Leo Papile, Keefe performed various coaching duties while working with some of the elite players in New England.

A native of Winchester, Mass., and a graduate of the University of Nevada-Las Vegas (1998), Keefe began his collegiate playing career at Cal-Irvine before transferring to UNLV. As a sophomore with the Anteaters, he averaged 16.4 points while shooting .448 from the field and .369 from the three-point line.

As a junior at UNLV, Keefe averaged 7.7 points and connected on 44.7 percent of his three-point attempts. As a senior, he helped direct the Rebels to a 20-13 record, a Western Athletic Conference title and an appearance in the 1998 NCAA tournament. Keefe was named to the WAC All-Tournament team after averaging 13.3 points and shooting .406 from three-point range over four games. His 13 three-pointers are a WAC tournament record.

Assistant Coach

Brent Cook, who worked as an assistant men's basketball coach at Saint Joseph's College in Satndish, Maine, since 1997-98, begins his first season at Bryant College.

During Cook's tenure at Saint Joseph's, the Monks produced an 81-30 record, including a 39-9 mark against conference opponents. In 1998-99, Saint Joseph's posted a school record of 26 victories and claimed a second straight trip to the national tournament, earning a No. 5 national ranking and posting the nation's longest win streak (23 games) to open the season.

Prior to joining the staff at Saint Joseph's, Cook spent two years as an assistant to at Champlain Regional College in Lennoxville, Que.

The Bryant student body is made up of 2,500 students representing more than 30 states and 40 countries. The size of Bryant's classes averages 30 students, ensuring personal attention both in and out of the classroom. More than 80 percent of Bryant's faculty have doctoral degrees or the highest degree possible in their fields.

Vision 2010

As part of the strategic planning initiative undertaken under the leadership of Bryant College president Ronald K. Machtley, the college has introduced a new long-term plan designed to make Bryant the institution choice for students seeking a small-college experience.

Vision 2010 points to the importance of providing an educational experience of exceptional value. At its core, this means that the college will provide an education

A Beautiful Campus

Bryant's wooded campus is situated in Smithfield, R.I. Three hundred eighty-seven acres of New England countryside that include rolling hills, quiet woods, scenic ponds, and open



fields make up the campus. The college offers a secure and spacious setting that is close to the attractions of metropolitan areas.

The hub of campus academic activity is the Unistructure, an all-encompassing building that contains classrooms and faculty and administrative offices. A focal point of the Unistructure is the plexiglass-domed Koffler Rotunda, a central gathering place for members of the Bryant community. Also located in the Unistructure is the Edith M. Hodgson Memorial Library, one of the finest business libraries in New England. The residence halls, computer center, student center, and athletic complex are all within walking distance.

Many student-oriented services are located at the Bryant

Center. Conveniences include the campus bookstore, typing and word-processing facilities, copy and resume services, a unisex hair salon, dry cleaners, game and music rooms, a wide-screen TV lounge, an interfaith chapel, and areas to study and talk.

Seventy-nine percent of Bryant's students live on-campus, and the housing options are one reason why. Housing is guaranteed at Bryant, and the accommodations are excellent. The Freshman Complex houses up to 600 first-year students in its two residence halls. Sophomores and juniors may choose the privacy and luxury of a suite in the village area. Many seniors settle into one of the 84 townhouses located near the edge of campus.

The social life at Bryant is active. Students enjoy a wide range of activities driven by more than 60 clubs and organizations in addition to regular on-campus activities such as concerts, feature films, intramural sports, music programs, performing arts series, and philanthropic events, which are available to all students.

A Great Location

Because of its central location, Bryant offers a choice of interesting destinations. Rhode Island has many geographic, historic and cultural attractions as well as a shoreline that stretches an incredible 400 miles.

Movies, restaurants and several shopping malls are just minutes away. The state capital of Providence, just 15 minutes from the Bryant campus, is the place to go for a wide variety of fine ethnic food, professional sports, concerts, and other special events.

ball, Bruins hockey, Celtics basketball, the Museum of Fine Arts, the Boston Symphony Orchestra, theaters, clubs, and thousands of college students, is one hour north by car. New York City, with its endless attractions, is only a three-and-a-half hour drive. While all students may have a car on-campus, regular train and bus services are available. T.F. Green Airport in nearby Warwick, R.I., is 20 minutes away.

Providence

Considered by many to be America's newest renaissance city, Providence is a trendy alternative for the younger generation. The

city, where the average age of the population is 29, has been called, “a young, hip getaway with youthful exuberance,” by USA Today.

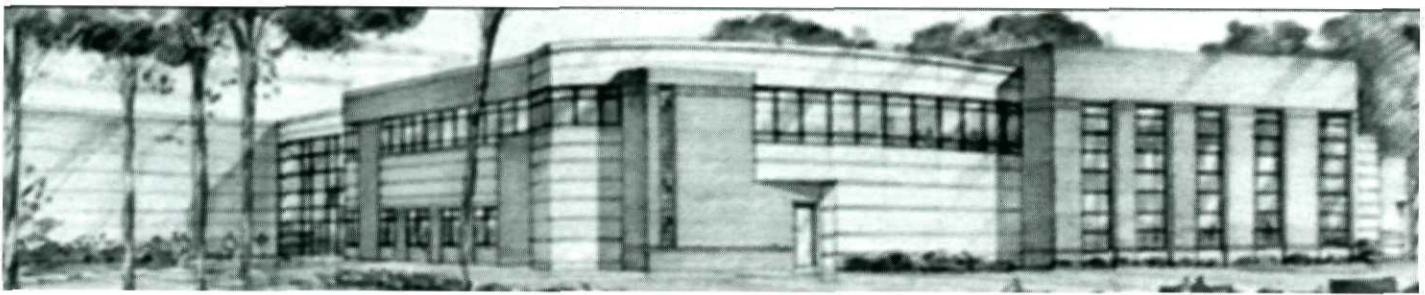

The College Hill and Wickenden Street neighborhoods teem with cafes, eateries, antique and craft shops, music shops and galleries that attract younger residents and myriad college students. Dozens of music and dance clubs, many of which attract top national headliners, dot the waterfront.

Providence also is the home of the Providence Bruins, the AHL affiliate of the Boston Bruins. The city hosted NBC's Gravity Games in 1999, bringing extreme sports back to its birthplace — the first edition of ESPN's X Games were held in the city in 1995. The Boston Red Sox' Triple-A farm team, the Pawtucket Red Sox play just a short ride from downtown Providence.

Bryant College is located just 15 minutes northwest of Providence — close enough for its students to take advantage of an unlimited number of internships and cultural and recreational opportunities. Public transportation is readily available to and from the Bryant campus.





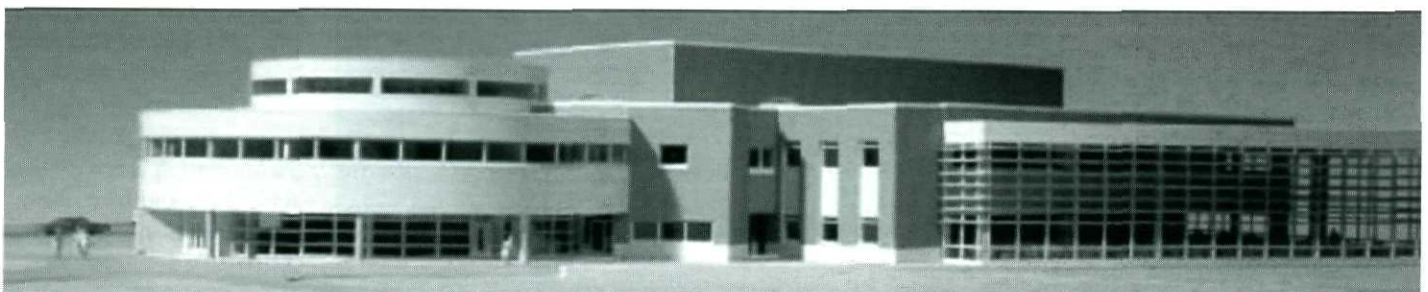
The Wellness Center

Opening in December 2001, equipped with a six-lane, 25-yard swimming pool; a 9,000-square-foot fitness center that is modeled after private sector health clubs; an aerobics and martial arts studio; and free weights, the Wellness Center will ensure that our students are healthy in body as well as in mind.

The George E. Bello Center For Information And Technology

The George E. Bello Center for Information and Technology will transform the student learning experience and prepare our graduates to compete in an increasingly demanding and complicated world. Designed by the nationally renowned Gwathmey Siegel and Associates Architects, the 71,000-square-foot building represents the height of information-age technology. In addition to housing The Douglas and Judith Krupp Library, it offers group and individual study areas, electronic classrooms, a digital library, a trading room that simulates real-world financial trading conditions, a grand hall that serves as the centerpiece for both formal and informal gatherings, a cyber café, and much more.

Bryant Athletics & Recreation Center

Home of Bryant Basketball

The Bryant basketball program boasts what is arguably the finest home facility in the Northeast-10 Conference in the Bryant Athletic & Recreation Center.

The arena, which can accommodate 2,700 spectators, features a completely resurfaced court and boasts new state-of-the-art lighting. In addition to the competition court, the main arena also houses two courts that are used during practice sessions.

The Athletics & Recreation Center also features brand new, state-of-the-art locker rooms for the Bryant basketball teams. The carpeted locker rooms provide for a spacious and comfortable team area and are equipped with fine wood lockers, a new sound system and television monitors.

In addition to the main arena, the Athletic & Recreation Center serves as the hub for the entire department of athletics. The facility houses the Jarvis Varsity Fitness Center, which is a fully equipped wellness area that is used exclusively by Bryant student-athletes.

The Athletic & Recreation Center also features a multipurpose activities center, which serves as the site for a variety of campus events. The multipurpose center allows Bryant's varsity programs an effective indoor practice facility and also accommodates the Bulldogs' intramural athletics program as well as campus functions and concerts.

Bulldog Stadium



The centerpiece of Bryant College's outdoor athletic facilities, Bulldog Stadium was completed in 1999 to coincide with the varsity debut of Bryant football.

With a seating capacity of 4,400, Bulldog Stadium utilizes a design that is usually reserved for larger stadiums, ensuring excellent sight lines and maximum comfort for spectators. A 3,200-seat permanent bleacher comprises the backdrop for the home side of the field, while 1,200 additional seats are available on the visitor's side. Three hundred seats in the stadium are equipped with backs and armrests.

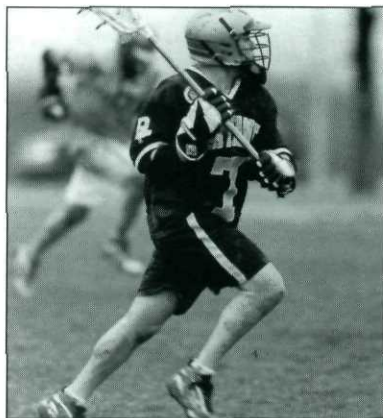
Bulldog Stadium's playing surface was laser-graded, and special turf was installed in time for the 1999 varsity season.

The college sponsors 21 varsity sports and supports those programs with the region's finest facilities. Bulldog Stadium, home of Bryant's football, soccer and lacrosse teams, was completed in 1999 and has drawn praise for its comfort and accessibility.

Bryant also unveiled new complexes for baseball and softball in 2000 that have quickly become the envy of other institutions. Both

facilities feature stepped dugouts, bullpens for home and visiting teams, efficient drainage systems, and electronic scoreboards.

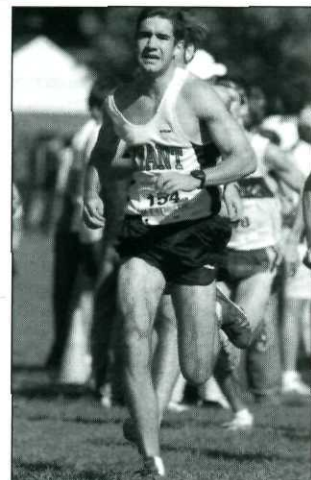

The center also is host to the Jarvis Varsity Weight Room and a 31,000-square-foot Wellness Center, which was completed in 2001.

With its breadth of varsity programs and the top-notch facilities to match, Bryant's athletics programs have enjoyed an unparalleled period of success in recent years.

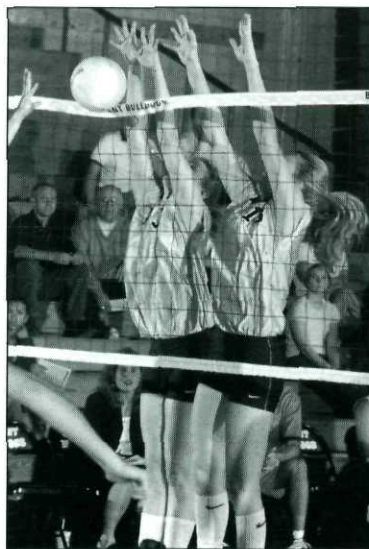
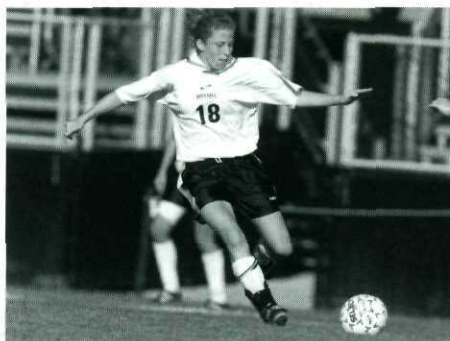
Two Bryant teams, volleyball and men's golf, qualified for the NCAA Division II Championships in the 2000-01 season, while a third, men's cross country, sent an individual to the national finals for the first time in school history. The men's golf team captured its 17th Northeast-10 Conference championship in the last 20 years, while the baseball, men's tennis



men's lacrosse and volleyball teams all placed in the top three in the NE-10 regular-season standings.

The men's and women's basketball teams, as well as the baseball and men's golf teams, have all been nationally ranked in recent years, while the men's lacrosse team was ranked as high as No. 6 in the nation in the 2001 season. The Bulldog field hockey squad, meanwhile, earned a national top-10 ranking this past fall, while the women's soccer team finished the 2001 season ranked No. 24 in the nation following its NCAA tournament appearance.

Three Bryant student-athletes earned District I Academic All-America recognition in 2000-01 as football standout Greg Wolyniec earned the honor for the second straight year, while baseball's Chris Carpentier and volleyball's Jeanette Rulli were first-time selections. Wolyniec also was the winner of the prestigious ECAC/Robbins Scholar-Athlete Award, given to one male athlete and one female athlete in Divisions I, II and III for excellence in academics and athletics.

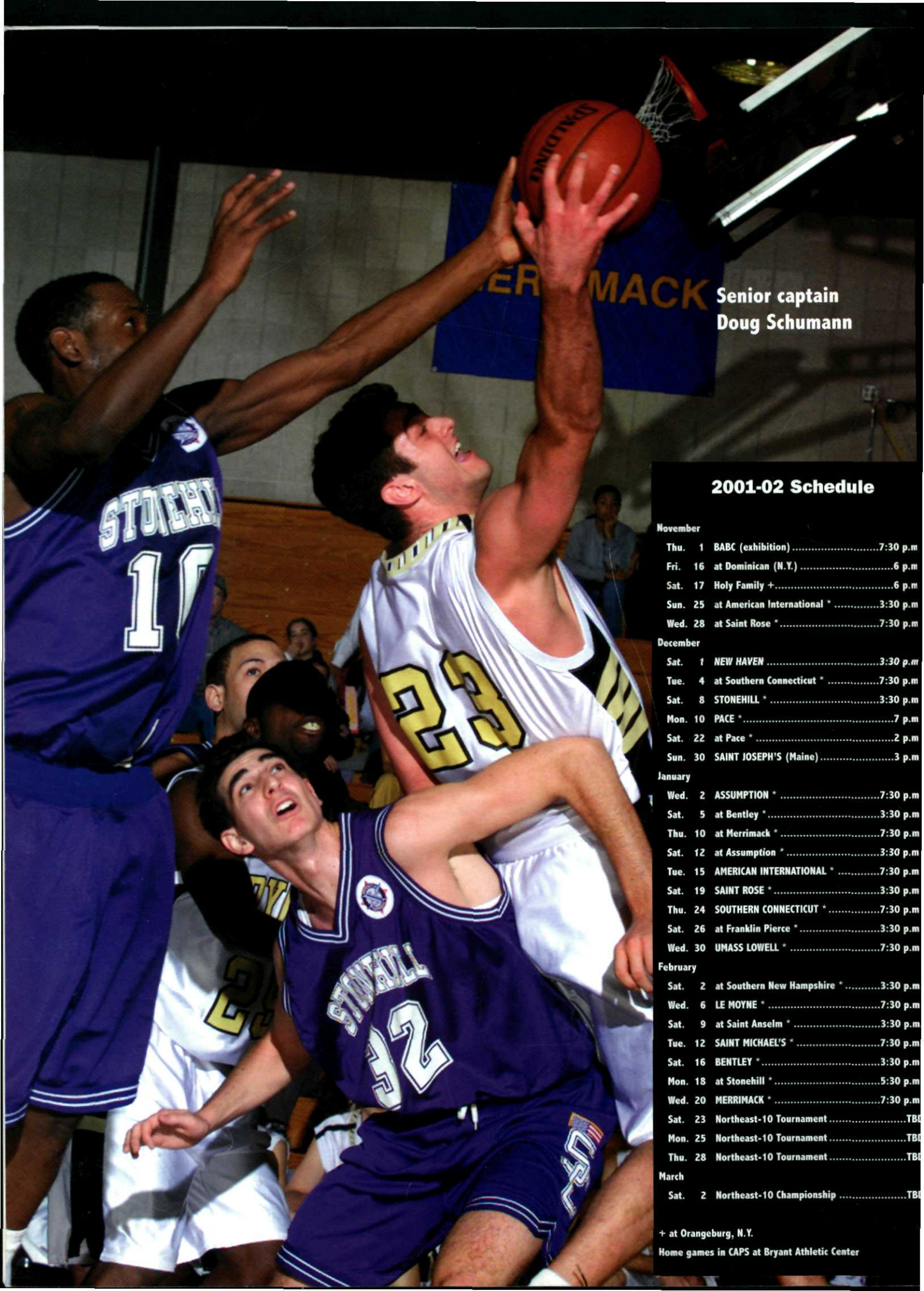
