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
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

Head Coach Ed Reilly

hen Ed Reilly took over as Bryant's head coach in 1989, the task at hand was simple: rebuild a program that had suffered through a 16-68 record in the three seasons prior and recapture a College community that had become indifferent after years of futility. Eight years later, Reilly's revitalization of Bryant basketball has the campus electrified as the team embarks on what could be the most exciting season in school history.

Reilly, the first full-time coach in Bryant basketball history, brought an impressive resume when he arrived in Smithfield in the fall of 1989. His references read like a Who's Who of NCAA Basketball: former Brown and Providence head coach Joe Mullaney, former Princeton mentor Pete Carril, and George Blaney, now at Seton Hall.



A 1976 graduate of Holy Cross, Reilly served two years as head coach at Kingswood Prep in Connecticut. He took his first college job in 1978 when he became Mullaney's assistant at Brown University. He moved on to Princeton to work with the legendary Carril in 1980. Two years later, Reilly returned to his alma mater to assume the role of Blaney's number-one assistant. Reilly spent seven years at Holy Cross before being named at Bryant in 1989.

Reilly brought the Bryant program back to stay in 1993-94, when he led his squad to the NORTHEAST-10 Final and came within a point of reaching the NCAA Tournament. The performance did not go unnoticed by the New England Basketball Coaches Association as it named Bryant the Most Improved Division II program.

Coach Reilly directs his highly-successful boy's basketball camp held at Bryant each summer. The camp, which is held in two separate week-long sessions, drew over 400 participants last year.

Assistant Coach Ed Gagnon

Regarded as one of the top X's and O's coaches in the area, Ed Gagnon arrived here eight years ago as Coach Reilly's top assistant. Gagnon is no stranger to southeastern New England, coming to Bryant after an outstanding high school coaching career at Bishop Feehan High in Attleboro, MA. During his 16-year tenure there, he was one of the most successful coaches in Massachusetts, directing the Shamrocks to 220 wins and eight Southeastern Massachusetts Conference divisional championships.

Gagnon, a 1966 graduate of St. Francis (ME), assists Coach Reilly with the organization of daily practice sessions and is integral in the areas of scouting and recruiting.



Assistant Coach Glenn Senecal

Glenn Senecal enters his fifth season at Bryant. Well-known in New England college basketball circles, Senecal arrived at Bryant after three years as an assistant at Holy Cross. Prior to his tenure at Holy Cross, Senecal coached at Assumption and his alma mater, Nichols.

Senecal's responsibilities include daily practice sessions, scouting, and recruiting.

He also assists Coach Reilly at his basketball camp.

A Conversation with Coach Reilly

Let's talk about the upcoming season. What are your thoughts about this season's squad?

"I like our team. We have a good core of veterans who have started before and been through the wars. This is the first year since I have been here that we've gone into a season with so much senior experience. That should bode well for the team. The challenge to our coaching staff and to the players is to get them to step up as a group to a champion-ship level day in and day out. Our team's success will depend on our ability to reach that goal. We haven't accomplished our goal, which is to win the conference championship."

Herman Thomas and Noel Watson certainly give you experience in the backcourt. Can you elaborate on the guard situation?

"This appears to be the strength of our team with players like **Herman** and **Noel**. Herman is perhaps the quickest player in the league and Noel will be one of its premier players. But it's also a concern because we aren't that

deep. Foul trouble or injuries could be a problem.

Jason Bennett will fit right into the offense despite
being a freshman. Jerry O'Connor knows the system
and will see action primarily at the two.

Frank Hill will be asked to backup at the point."

Depth should not be a problem in the frontcourt. What do you need from the forwards and centers?

"We need to develop a more consistent inside scoring threat. Marc Mulherin was our top player last spring and on the Irish trip. He will defend the toughest opposing frontcourt player. Steve Wiacek gives us a dimension that not a lot of other schools in our league have a 6-11 center. I expect big things from him. Fred Wande is ready to take off and have a terrific year. Keith Miller came back in shape and ready to play. Jim Burton is a versatile player who can play the two, three or four. Earl Jones, who can play the four or the five, gives us a physical presence in the low post. He's so strong around the basket and is the most physical player on our team. David Turner is kid who is always ready to compete. He will move back to the three, although he has played all over the frontcourt."

How is the NORTHEAST-10 going to shape up?

"This will be a typical year in our league; there is good balance. Realistically, there are a number of teams, such as St. Michael's, St. Anselm, Bentley and Le Moyne, that will compete for the title. We'd like to think that we'll be one of them. It's funny, though, because often teams you figure to win it don't. I am more concerned about our team focusing on the things we need to do well rather than worrying about everyone else in the league."

You've never shied away from top-notch competition. Should fans expect the same from this season's schedule?

"Yes. Our schedule is very difficult. Every night in the league is a severe test. Our out-of-conference schedule is always difficult and this year is no exception. We open at Franklin Pierce, one of the top-rated teams in New England. We've got three outstanding teams from outside New England coming in for the Bryant Classic: Dowling from New York, East Stroudsburg from Pennsylvania and Rollins, who has been one of the top teams in the Sunshine State Conference. We have to be more resilient this year. We played very well early on last season; we really battled

the top-ranked teams. We didn't keep that pace up throughout the season, though. We can't let setbacks become major setbacks. We have to respond in a championship fashion. That's where senior tough-mindedness comes in."

Captain • Senior • Guard • 5-9, 160 • Bronx, NY/ Mt. St. Michael Academy

This three-year captain will run the show for Coach Reilly... will be asked to score more as well as distribute... offensive catalyst who can make the smart pass or hit the clutch shot... possesses blazing speed and extraordinary quickness... dedication to improve perimeter shooting paid dividends last season as Herman became Bryant's best three-point threat, shooting 46.2%... has played in all 82 games the past three seasons... liberal arts major... led Bulldogs in scoring four times as a junior including a career-high 28 points in 90-88 loss to St. Anselm... all-league choice at Mt. St. Michael Academy... Last season: started 26 games... scored in double figures 12

times... paced an 88-75 win at UMass-Lowell with 21 points... dished out season-high seven assists twice (at Bentley, vs. New Hampshire College)... season-high six boards at AIC... 17 points and six rebounds in NE-10 semifinal loss to St. Anselm.

One of NE-10's premier players... strong and versatile... terrific outside shooter... look for Noel to create more out of the half-court set, making him an even more lethal offensive threat... squad's top scorer past two seasons... honorable mention all-NE-10 as a sophomore... reached 30-point mark twice that season, including a career-high 34 at St. Anselm... accounting major... first-team all-state in basketball and honorable mention all-state in football as a senior at Killingly... named National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete... Dean's List student... Last season: named second-team all-conference... top Bulldog scorer in 18 contests... led team not only in scoring but rebounding at 6.5 rpg... recorded 20+ points eight times... torched New Hampshire College for 29 points and 11 rebounds... his 25-point, nine-rebound outburst lifted the Bulldogs past Franklin Pierce in the season-opener... tallied 28 points vs. AIC.

Last season: only player to start in all 27 games... scored in double figures in 15 contests... 23 steals... exploded for a career-high 21 points and 12 rebounds in an 81-75 victory over Merrimack... his 16 points sparked the Bulldogs' overtime win over St. Michael's.





ryant College has been educating America's business leaders for 133 years. In response to the everchanging challenges of the business environment throughout the world, Bryant offers a nationallyacclaimed education that blends both business principles and the liberal arts.

Bryant ranks among the nation's top three business specialty schools in the 1996 U.S. News & World Report's, "America's Best Colleges" annual guide. Bryant is one of the business programs that hold accreditation from the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business- a distinction that is shared with the finest university-based business and management schools in the nation.

Bryant's classes average 30 students. The student-faculty ratio of 18 to 1 ensures the personal attention both in and out of the classroom. Over eighty percent of the faculty have doctoral or the highest degree possible in their fields.

Results of a recent annual survey show that over 90 percent of our graduates have jobs or are attending graduate school within six months of graduation.

A Beautiful Campus

Pryant's wooded campus is situated in Smithfield, RI. Three-hundred eighty-seven acres of New England countryside that include rolling hills, quiet woods, scenic ponds, and open fields make up the campus. The College offers a secure and spacious setting that is close to the attractions of metropolitan areas. Bryant provides an excellent atmosphere for study and plenty of opportunities for on- and off-campus recreation.

The hub of campus academic activity is the Unistructure, an all-encompassing building that contains classrooms, faculty offices, and administrative offices. A focal point of the Unistructure is the plexiglass-domed Koffler Rotunda, a central gathering place for members of the Bryant community. Also located in the Unistructure is the Edith M. Hodgson Memorial Library, one the finest business libraries in New England. The residence halls, computer center, student center and athletic complex are all within walking distance.

Many student-oriented services are located at the Bryant Center. Conveniences include the campus bookstore, typing and word processing facilities, copy and resume services, a unisex hair salon, dry cleaning, game and music rooms, a wide-screen TV lounge, an interfaith chapel, and areas to study and talk.

Bryant's housing options are one reason why so many of our students live on-campus. On-campus housing is guaranteed at Bryant and the accommodations are excellent. The Freshmen Complex houses up to 600 first-year students in its two residence halls. Sophomores and juniors may choose the privacy and luxury of a suite in the village area. Many seniors settle into one of the 84 townhouses located near the edge of campus.

The social life at Bryant is busy. Students enjoy a wide range of activities such as films, concerts, lectures and sporting events. The College's clubs and organizations on-campus are also very popular.

A Great Location

ecause of its central location, Bryant offers a choice of exciting off-campus destinations. Rhode Island has many geographic, historic and cultural attractions as well as shoreline that stretches for an astounding 400 miles.

Movies, restaurants, and a shopping mall are just minutes away. Only 15 minutes down the road is the state capital of Providence. This is the place to go for a wide variety of fine ethnic food, professional sports, concerts and other special events.

Historic Newport, an hour's drive south, boasts fabulous beaches, a renowned jazz festival, world-class sailing events and waterfront mansions. Boston, home of Red Sox baseball, Bruins hockey, Celtics basketball, the Museum of Fine Arts, the Boston Symphony Orchestra, theaters, clubs and thousands of college students, is one hour north by car. Even New York City, with its endless attractions, is a three-hour drive.

While all students may have a car on-campus, regular train and bus services are available. The newly-built T.F. Green Airport in nearby Warwick, RI, is 25 minutes away.

Sophisticated Technology

ryant facilitates innovative thinking by providing the latest technology for its students. The Koffler Technology Center contains more than 200 computer terminals, microcomputers and work stations. Students can be assisted by equipment provided in the PC Lab, Word Processing Lab, Advanced Applications Lab or the Actuarial Lab.

The Center also houses a new NYNEX Telecommunications Center, which provides state-of-the-art equipment for desktop publishing, video conferencing and other forms of data transmission.

The Davis classroom, New England's first multi-networked learning environment, is where classwork can be done on three platforms-MAC, DOS, and Internet.

On-campus communication options include E-mail, Gopher, Internet and WorldWide Web. Students can access the College's communication technology directly from their room through the campus-wide network.

- Sixty-two student-athletes were honored by the NORTHEAST-10 as members of the conference's all-academic squad.
- Forty percent of the College's student-athletes registered a 3.0 g.p.a. or better.
- The women's cross country team posted an outstanding 3.41 g.p.a. The Bulldogs also finished second at the NORTHEAST-10 Meet.

idely regarded as one of the top NCAA Division II conferences in the nation, the NORTHEAST-10 membership includes institutions which blend proud academic with rich athletic traditions.



The NE-10 expanded outside of New England in 1996. Le Moyne became the first New York-based institution to enter the fold this year, and Pace University will begin league play next season. These schools join the nine New England members, American International, Assumption, Bentley, Bryant, Merrimack, Quinnipiac, Saint Anselm, Saint Michael's and Stonehill.

Last year, NE-10 basketball was displayed in the national spotlight when four women's teams reached the NCAA Tournament. On the men's side, the conference was represented in the NCAA Regional Finals.

While the NORTHEAST-10 in nationally known for its basketball programs, the conference is very competitive and continues to grow in other sports. The conference sent teams in nine sports to the NCAA Tournament last year. In 1994, Merrimack captured the NCAA Division II softball national championship and AIC's softball team played in the World Series last spring. The fall marked the first-ever NE-10 field hockey championship.

Conference champions are crowned in 13 sports.

Facilities

ryant's outstanding athletic facilities have attracted top-notch student-athletes in New England since the campus moved to scenic Smithfield in 1971. Within walking distance of the dormitories and townhouses are 35 sprawling acres of attractive playing fields.

Bryant's challenging 3.2-mile cross country course is recognized by coaches and runners as one of the finest in New England. The course hosts Bryant and NE-10 meets, NCAA Division I competition and state and regional high school meets. The Junior Olympics held its national championship here in 1993.

Bryant unveiled its \$400,000, eight-lane track on April 23, 1994. Runners from all over New England enjoy the track's ability to accommodate fast meet times and rigorous training sessions.

The six tennis courts, three soccer fields, baseball and softball diamonds, field hockey field and space for club and intramural sports add to Bryant's wide-range of athletic opportunities.

The Bryant indoor sports complex compliments the College's versatile outdoor facilities. The hub of College's athletic facilities is the Bryant Gymnasium, home to both the basketball and volleyball teams. The Gym's three beautiful hardwood courts make it ideal for tournaments and camps. Twenty-four hundred seats surround center court to give the Bulldogs a decisive homecourt edge as evidenced by Bryant's 46-9 home record last season. The Gym also hosts special events, concerts and guest speakers.

The MultiPurpose Activities Center, with its three multi-dimensional courts, is utilized by baseball, softball and tennis for off-season practice, and for intramural sports. The MAC accommodates Bryant social events as well.

The newly-renovated Jarvis Fitness Center addresses the diverse needs of Bryant athletes. Jarvis is equipped with the latest cardiovascular and strength equipment, and a new aerobics room. The fitness center's extended hours accommodate each athlete's academic and conditioning schedules.

The Bryant sports medicine area is located on the main level of the complex. The sports medicine staff at Bryant provides outstanding health-care to the College's 250 student-athletes. Athletes are treated with the latest in rehabilitation equipment. Physicians are available on-campus for examinations.

Hackett is responsible for the operation of the College's Division II athletic program with 14 varsity teams and over 250 student-athletes, as well as club and intramural activities. The revival of Homecoming Weekend, the inception of basketball's 'Black and Gold Night,' and the Bryant Athletic Awards Banquet are highlights of Hackett's tenure at Bryant.

Her knowledge of the inner workings of college athletics stems from the wide spectrum of sports-related positions Hackett has held. She served as athletic director at Smith College in Northampton, MA for five years prior to coming to Bryant. At Smith, she organized the 100-year celebration of the first women's collegiate basketball game in 1993. Hackett also established the first Homecoming Weekend in 1989.

Hackett spent nine years at the University of Iowa, first as assistant then as associate director of women's athletics. She has also served the Big Ten Conference in various capacities, such as chairing the Big Ten Women's Athletics Administrators Board in 1986-87. Hackett has also supervised and coordinated many of its conference championships, including men's and women's track and field, swimming, tennis, golf, gymnastics and field hockey.

Hackett has also served the NCAA on many occasions, most recently this fall as the chair of the NCAA Division II Women's Soccer New England Regional Committee.

Hackett holds a doctoral degree in physical education with a specialization on athletic administration from Iowa. She also received master's degrees in business administration and physical education there. She did her undergraduate studies at Indiana University, earning a B.A. in German.

Coni Fichera, Assistant Director of Athletics

oni Fichera's responsibilities touch on all aspects of the Bryant athletic program, including compliance, event management and supervising all the club sports. She is instrumental in the planning of special events, such as Homecoming and 'Black and Gold Night.'

Prior to Bryant, Fichera interned at the Eastern College Athletic Conference from September 1992-May 1993. Her duties focused on the conference's legislative services.

Fichera is a 1992 graduate of Plymouth (NH) State College, where she earned her B.S. in physical education and business. Fichera was a two-sport

athlete at PSC, playing four years on the Panther field hockey squad, which she captained in 1992, and two seasons on the women's lacrosse squad. Her on-field accomplishments earned her the Panther Athletic Club award as the college's outstanding senior female athlete. Other honors bestowed on Fichera include "Who's Who in College Athletics," the National Dean's List and the Pinkerton (NH) Academy Hall of Fame, where she attended high school.



Jon Sjogren, Head Baseball Coach/ Facilities Manager

Jon Sjogren joined the Bryant staff as the College's head baseball coach in 1991. Two years later, he added the position of athletics facilities manager to his list of duties. Sjogren is in charge of the daily operation of the MultiPurpose Activities Center, gymnasium and the athletic fields as well as the scheduling of outside events.

The 1992 and 1996 NORTHEAST-10 Coach of the Year, Sjogren led his alma mater to a school-record 24 wins and the conference final last season. In 1992, he piloted the Bulldogs to 21 wins. Sjogren starred for Bryant from 1985-88, hitting .440 with eight home runs in his senior season.

Charlie Mandeville, Head Athletic Trainer

Charlie Mandeville has been treating Bryant's student-athletes for the better part of two decades. He works with all intercollegiate sports and supervises the sports medicine area.

Aside from his duties at Bryant, Mandeville has cared for the New England Patriots, the Boston Red Sox and the U.S. Olympic Camp during in his career. In 1994, Mandeville was honored by the American Athletic Trainers Association as

"Trainer of the Year." Mandeville, a graduate of Rhode Island College, is also the head coach of the women's cross country team.



Nicole Piette, Assistant Athletic Trainer

Nicole Piette is in her second year as Bryant's assistant athletic trainer. Her duties range from directing Bryant's rehabilitation program to supervising the Jarvis Fitness Center.

In addition to her responsibilities at Bryant, she also works at the Berkshire Place Nursing Home in Providence. Her previous experience includes Brown University, where she was an assistant trainer, and Sports Therapy of Rhode Island.

Piette is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association. She graduated from the University of Rhode Island with a B.S. in physical education. At URI, Piette was a Dean's List student, and a member of the Kappa Delta Pi and the Golden Key National Honor Societies. She also starred on the Rams' track team.


