BRYANT COLLEGE

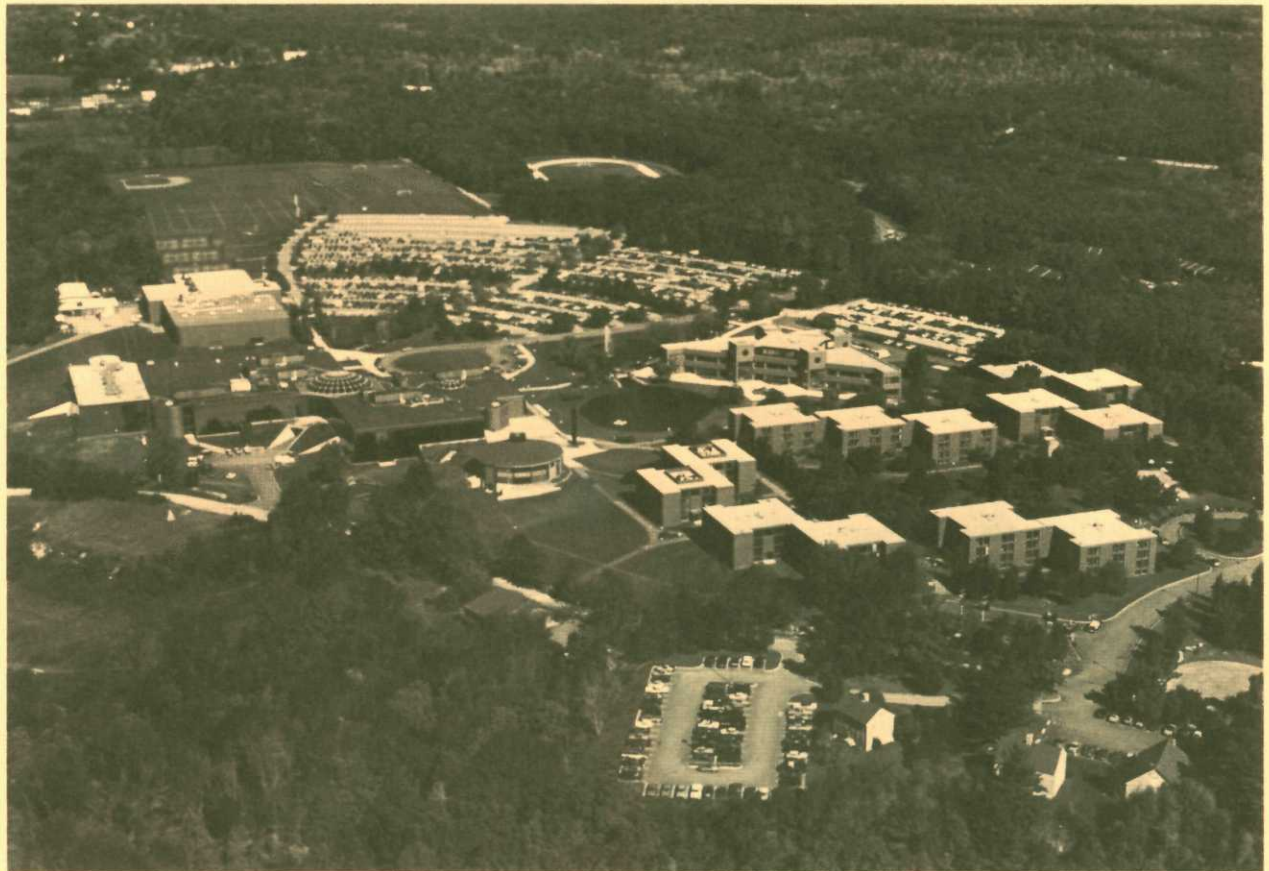

In essence, Bryant's goal is to provide a breadth of education that prepares its graduates not only for the problems facing society today, but also for the problems we don't yet know exist.

The College recently was recognized by Barron's, U.S. News & World Report and "American Best Colleges" as a superior value in higher education.

Although steeped in tradition the Bryant College campus is one of the most modern college campuses in the northeast. Located on 320 acres in picturesque Smithfield, R.I., the campus is less than an hour's drive from Boston and only 15 minutes from Providence. The suburban location of the College, combined with its proximity to



major metropolitan areas, offers a wide variety of cultural and educational experiences.

Approximately 85 percent of the College's 3,000 full-time undergraduate students live on campus. Bryant students reside in some of the most modern student residences in the country. All of the residence halls, which include traditional hall-style dorms, suit-style dorms and townhouses are less than 20 years old and half of the students live in facilities that were built since 1985.

The city of Providence, home of several other colleges and universities, provides college town flavor with access to major professional sporting events and concerts at the Providence Civic Center, along with the Rhode Island Philharmonic Orchestra, touring Broadway plays at the Providence Performing Arts Center and the nationally recognized Trinity Square Repertory Theater.

With more than 400 miles of scenic shoreline, beaches and seaside resorts that serve beachgoers and sailors from throughout the world, Rhode Island offers a unique blend of geographic, historic and cultural diversity that provides a rare quality of life, especially for college students. Boston is the home of three professional sports teams — the Red Sox, Bruins and Celtics.

Bryant students also may take advantage of extensive career services and on-campus recruiting activities to help select and launch their careers, or to prepare for graduate or law school. With more than 200 of the nation's most prestigious companies, corporations and government agencies actively recruiting on campus and a national network of alumni ready to assist students in finding opportunities 88 percent of the Class of 1990 reported employment placement within 6 months despite a sluggish economy.

Academic and athletic excellence have a long tradition at Bryant and the past decade has been the most successful in Bryant history.

The College's varsity athletic program, includes 14 sports evenly divided between men and women. Since 1981 Bryant teams have won 23 conference and/or regional championships in the sports of golf, soccer, baseball, basketball and track.

As a member of the Northeast 10 Conference, Bryant has compiled an enviable record of conference championships and post-season tournament berths in both men's



and women's sports. The Bryant women's basketball team has won three of the past six post-season NE10 Conference championships

In addition to the varsity sports program each year about 250 Bryant students take advantage of an opportunity to compete in intercollegiate athletics through the club sports program. Although the club teams are funded by the College's Student Government, almost all club teams use the Bryant athletic facilities and scheduling is coordinated through the College's athletic department. All club teams play extensive schedules against colleges and/or amateur sports clubs in the northeast area.

Bryant athletes perform on some of the best athletic facilities in the northeast. More than 50 acres of the 320-acre Bryant campus are occupied by athletic facili-

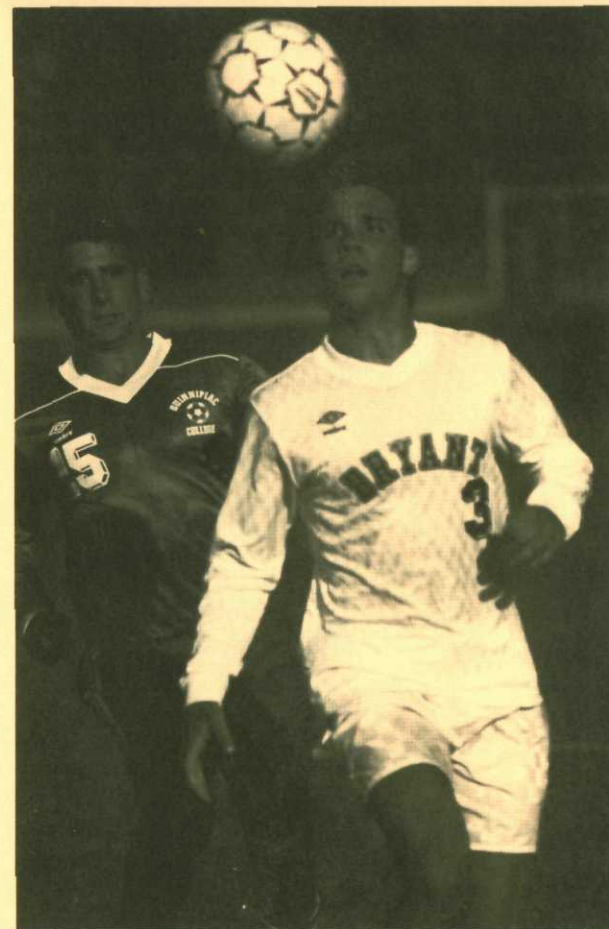

ties. The center of the athletic complex is the main gymnasium with its 2,700-seat arena; men's and women's exercise and weight rooms; locker facilities and athletic department offices.

The multi-purpose activities center, adjacent to the main gymnasium, houses a 30,000-square foot, all purpose gymnasium for both varsity and intramural sports. There also are five racquetball courts, a health-fitness center with a full line of nautilus equipment and free weights.

Outdoor athletic facilities included separate playing fields for the men's and women's soccer teams, a varsity baseball field, a varsity softball field, six tennis courts, a quarter-mile running track and an international style cross country course.

During the summer months the Bryant campus also serves as the pre-season training facilities of the New England Patriots of the National Football League.

In addition to competing in the Northeast 10 Conference, one of the leading NCAA Division II conferences in the country, Bryant teams also engage in both northeast regional and national non-conference competition. During that period Bryant athletes also have earned 28 All-American selections.

Bryant also ranks among the nation's leaders in what should be the most important statistic for any college athletic program - Grade point average. Since 1983 the combined cumulative grade point average for senior athletes in all Bryant varsity sports has been 2.87. During that period, 39.8 percent of Bryant senior varsity athletes were named to the Dean's list.

THE COACHES

ED REILLY Head Coach

Ed is beginning his third year as the Indians head coach.

In the summer of 1989 he took on the assignment of rebuilding the Bryant College basketball tradition.

After serving 10 years as an assistant coach at Division One colleges, Reilly became the first full time basketball coach in the history of Bryant's Division Two program.

Ten years ago Bryant was the No. 1 ranked Division Two team in New England and nationally ranked throughout the season. From 1973 to 1981 the Indians posted a combined 166-89 win-loss mark. The .650 winning percentage was one of the top marks in the country. From 1985-1988 the Indians had won a combined total of only 17 games. In 1987-88 they set a school record for most losses in one season with a 7-23 record.

"I want to make the Bryant basketball program as well respected as Bryant's academic reputation," said Reilly shortly after being named coach in June 1989.

"I want to bring some energy into the program. To bring a work ethic that carries over to the players."

It's the same work ethic Reilly had lived for 10 years as a Division One assistant.

He spent a decade with some of the best basketball minds in the country - Joe Mullaney, Pete Carril and George Blaney. After spending two years as a high school coach at Kingswood Prep in Connecticut, he became Mullaney's assistant at Brown University in 1978. Two years later he went to Princeton to work for Carril. He spent two years with Carril, one of the nation's college coaching deans, before returning to his alma mater at Holy Cross as Blaney's top assistant.

Last year Bryant fans got a small glimpse of the good old days as the Indians won the Bryant Invitational tournament championship in December. It was the first tournament championship for a Bryant team in a decade.

Reilly lost the top scorer from last year's team when Julius Sacko graduated last spring, but the next eight scorers from last year's squad are back in the lineup this season.

Senior guard C.J. Simmons was only one-tenth of a point behind Sacko in last year's scoring race with a 12.8



with a 12.8 average. Simmons, who was one of the top three-point shooters in the NE-10 Conference last season with a .412 percentage from three-point land, should go over the 1,000 career point mark this season.

Rich Rose, the senior forward who started 78 games over the past three years is looking for the best season of his collegiate career. Rose tied for third on last year's scoring list with a 9.3 ppg average and was the No. 2 rebounder with a 6.3 average.

Glenn Tatro, Dave Burrows and Colin Lawson, three sophomores who saw a lot of action as freshmen last season, will play a major role in the hopes for a successful season. Tatro and Lawson, a pair of guards, averaged 9.3 and 7.7 respectively and Burrows, a 6-5 forward averaged 9.2 points and 4.9 rebounds last season.

Reilly also will have three other veterans, Scott Meyer, Jack Newbauer and Ed Daniels ready for action along with seven outstanding newcomers.

ED GAGNON Assistant Coach



This is Ed's third year as assistant to head coach Ed Reilly.

Ed came to Bryant two years ago after an outstanding high school coaching career at Feehan High in Attleboro, Mass.

During his 16-year tenure at Feehan, Ed was one of the most successful coaches in southeastern Mass. He compiled a 220-160 record while directing the Shamrocks to eight Southeastern Mass. Conference divisional championships.

At Bryant he assists coach Reilly with the daily practice sessions in addition to scouting and recruiting duties throughout the northeast.

STEVE BARRETT Assistant Coach



This is Steve's second year as a member of the Bryant coaching staff.

Before joining the Bryant staff he had served as assistant coach of the varsity boys basketball team at Boston Latin High School.

A 1986 graduate of Boston College, he also had served as freshman basketball coach at Matignon High in Cambridge, Mass. for two years prior to moving to Boston Latin. He also has coached several year AAU teams.

At Bryant his main responsibilities are scouting and recruiting.
