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Student workers voice their concerns to campus admin

More than 150 disgruntled Spartan Shops employees filled The Commons on Friday to address their concerns about the upcoming change in San Jose State's food service management with Chief Financial Officer Charlie Faas.

As previously reported by the Spartan Daily, Spartan Shops will be replaced by an unknown third-party company.

Faas said that two companies' bids are still being considered and will be decided in early May.

The students' main concern is their job security, since most of them work for Spartan Shops to pay for their school tuition, as well as other expenses such as rent.

Spartan Shops Executive Director Lisa Thomas said the company currently employs around 930 to 950 students. She also said employees typically work a maximum of a new company, students 25 hours per week.

SJSU braces for **CSU funding fallout**

Hundreds of San Jose State faculty, staff and administration lined Martin Luther King Jr. library's escalator to the second floor large meeting room to attend the SJSU Budget Forum on Thursday morning.

Organized by SJSU President Mary Papazian, Chief Financial Officer Charlie Faas and Provost Andy Feinstein, the forum's goal was to provide the campus community with a budget update and for the three to describe their plans for the upcoming school year.

Papazian began the forum with a bit of gallows humor, "You're all coming here to hear good news? I wish I had some."

Then she began to explain, using a PowerPoint presentation, the 2018-2019 state budget plan released by Gov. Jerry Brown versus what the California State University chancellor and trustees requested.

The CSU budget request was for an increase of \$263 million. However, the state plan provides \$92 million in increased funds.

explicitly budgeted out by the administration's budget with a set allocation of funding can be considered a "gray area item."

Papazian addressed the topic of tuition supplementing the budget and said there is "no interest in a CSU tuition increase" and that the suggested amount to cover funding would need to be \$228 more per student in tuition.

Group wants camp for homeless

Members of the Student Homeless Alliance (SHA) and homelessness activists spoke to media outlets in a press conference held in front of the Tommie Smith and John Carlos statue on Thursday.

SHA demanded a safe and legal area on campus for homeless San Jose State students and staff to live instead of them sleeping in their cars or camping illegally.

"We want land, we want sanitation services and we want security," SHA President Gigi Bolanos said, "We want to advocate for a sanctioned

encampment. That's our proposal, that's something that would provide immediate services to students and staff."

Bolanos said the group hopes to work with the school on where the camp would be located.

She also said some members of SHA suggested areas near of the sports complexes in SJSU's South Campus for the staff and student encampment.

The 18-member group missed the deadline to file as a student organization, so it couldn't reserve the area outside of Clark Hall. However, the group hosted the press conference despite it being unsanctioned.

Bolanos justified it by saying it was a use of studentuse land for a student-run event. Two men in suits spoke to Bolanos and asked for the area to be cleaned up after the press conference.

"We want a seat at the table," Bolanos said. "So when there's any discussion on student housing issues, any discussion on food instability we want to be there. We want them to know that we're willing to work with the administration."

In 2015, a CSU study found that 10,000 California CSU students declared themselves as homeless on their Free Application For Student Aid (FAFSA).

Researchers from the study believed that 10,000 was lower when compared to the actual number of homeless students.

Sociology junior Juan Marrufo said his parents lost their jobs during the Great Recession in 2007 and his family was homeless while he was in high school.

"We lived in the streets," Marrufo said. "It was really tough because we moved place to place. Sometimes we would hear gunshots. Sometimes we would have to see cops and have to move away."

However, he sacrificed his

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Spartans celebrate Earth Day on campus

What began as a street protest, Earth Day has turned into an annual event celebrated around the world.

In honor of the day, 52 booths surrounded Tower Lawn on Thursday as part of the Earth Day at SJSU event held by the Environmental Resource Center (ERC).

It is a long-standing annual event with a lot of history at San Jose State.

ERC Co-Director Liana Hua said it was the 51st year the event was celebrated at SJSU with the help of other organizations.

"The ERC works with Spartan Shops, [Facilities Development Operations], Associated Students and we pull this

event together and without them, we would not be able to have it this huge and wouldn't be able to have it on Tower Lawn," Hua said.

The first Earth Day on April 22, 1970 was originally a gathering of millions of people protesting the negative impacts of 150 years of industrial development, according to earthday.org.

At the time, people became aware of the effects of smog in the United States and around the world.

Evidence was also growing that indicated pollution led to development delays in children.

Fast forward over 40 years, it is believed more than one billion people in 192 countries now take part in what is the largest civic-focused day of action around the world, according to earthday.org.

Earth Day was founded by Gaylord Nelson, former Wisconsin senator and SJSU alumnus, as a response to the environment not being addressed in politics or by the media, according America's Library.

Hua said over 50 vendors throughout San Jose and Santa Clara came to the event to promote sustainable methods and living styles.

"What I love about Earth Day here at San Jose State is that it pulls resources from throughout our community and brings them on campus," ERC Co-Director Rachel Blake said. "It really gives students more awareness about different environmental behaviors

that they can implement in their daily lives."

Communications junior Megan Jose said she really enjoyed the event and how it taught her many surprising things.

"I think it is pretty cool because of the fact that you need to work and actually learn about stuff," Jose said. "I actually learned about gardening too and it's called permaculture instead of gardening, so that's pretty dope."

Jose also said she learned different facts about tap water and how to a hold a knife correctly in order to cut more efficiently.

There was annual tree planting ceremony.

Blake said the ceremony started three years ago and is about planting a tree in

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honor of somebody.

"This year, we planted a tree in honor of our department chair Lynne Trulio," Blake said. "It's a Valley Oak, which is really exciting because it is a native tree here on campus.

Other events included Yoga on the Fountain, where students could receive a free yoga lesson from San Jose-based yoga studio Be The Change and Caffeine & Greens, where students planted their own terrarium with other succulents or a bean plant and have some coffee.

After Papazian gave her statement, Faas addressed the crowd and explained in greater detail the specifics of SJSU's operating fund and the goal of creating a three-year budget. He also spoke on the ongoing questions related to

this matter. process," Faas said. "What we are looking to continue to do is be very transparent in this process. We're not looking at rolling out budget cuts."

According to Faas, all of the information on the PowerPoint slides, as well as the budget proposals and other documents, are available on the CSU website.

After the presentation, the more than 300 audience members had the opportunity to ask Papazian, Faas and Feinstein questions.

When asked about his role in this ongoing process, Feinstein, who will be leaving SJSU at the end of the academic year to become president of the University of Northern Colorado, said later this week he will be "meeting with provosts from across the CSU system to look into the academic side."

Another question was whether or not Lt. Gov. Gavin Newsom, who is one of the candidates in California's upcoming gubernatorial

election, would be more open to increased funding for the CSU. Faas replied, "Lt. Gov. Newsom so far hasn't exhibited a ton of support."

Papazian added on to that statement and said to the audience, "If any of you have any connections with any of the gubernatorial candidates, please use them now."

This sentiment echoes the last paragraph of Friday's message from White.

"Our future is now clearly and unambiguously in the hands of lawmakers," White's statement said. "I ask you to join with me as we sustain our advocacy efforts and close out the annual budget cycle in Sacramento strongly. I look for your continued support as we emphasize to our state leaders that full funding for the California State University is key to California's future."

Justin Villena, King Library supervisor in charge of media assistance, has been a CSU employee for three years and is currently part of the library's media services team.

"To me, it was a pretty big deal for the amount of people that were there," Villena said. "I would like to see more about what's going to happen with the budget in the future. I know it's just in the planning stages right now, but what's going to exactly happen? Where's the funding going to come from?"

time and his entire family was able to work and pay for a home on First Street in San Jose.

"Enough is enough," Marrufo said. "San Jose State needs to help us and homeless students."

Marrufo recommended emergency funds, which could be loaded on Tower ID cards, and scholarships for the homeless who are seeking to educate themselves at the university.

Pastor Scott Wagers of CHAM Deliverance Ministry was also at the press conference to support SHA's effort to provide housing for the homeless. CHAM Deliverance Ministry is a church in San Jose that has previously assisted the homeless.

"It's a shame in this country where there's so much wealth and there's so much promise that we can't house everybody," Wagers said.

Some members of the student body government observed the conference.

"We have been working a lot with student hunger recently," Associated Students Controller-Elect Malik Akil said. "I'm hoping that maybe within the next year we can do something to help out with student homelessness."

Akil said he hopes he can give SHA a continuous platform on campus and if SJSU President Mary Papazian is invited, she will likely come.

"I know that she's a president that's willing to be here," Akil said.

The university currently provides a service called SJSU Cares, which allows students to tell their story to the university and see if they qualify for emergency housing assistance, counseling and food assistance according to the school website.

SJSU also recently secured a grant to fund a permanent food pantry and emergency housing services according to a quote from Papazian published on KPIX Channel 5, but the university administration has not yet commented endorsing encampment.

Valle also said that her main concern is about the student employees.

"They are trying to keep student employees, but we have some students full-time that want to work and are willing to go the extra mile for this company and the next," Valle said. However, it is not just students' jobs that are being affected.

Thomas said that the change also affects the faculty since their jobs are not going to be the same after the change. However, she said everyone is hopeful with the new opportunity.



Uchis' debut album isolates from competitors

The best way describe "Isolation" in simplest terms, is that it is just straight vibes and I enjoyed every second of it.

It is the debut studio album by the Colombian-American singer Kali Uchis. It contains 15 tracks and runs a little over 45 minutes.

I personally have not heard much from Uchis besides her feature on Daniel Caesar's hit song "Get You."

So besides knowing she had a great voice, I had no idea what to expect for this album, but what I got was something better than I ever imagined.

It is a clever and refreshing mix of songs of all kinds of different genres that transports the listener to what felt like Uchis' world and thoughts.

"There's no tracking where I'm going / There's no me for them to find," she sings in the tropical bossa nova-filled intro "Body Language," which feels like it's her telling us to listen to this album to find out who she is.

The track "Miami," is a hard-hitting song about being strong and independent. She sings, "But why would I be Kim? / I could be Kanye in the land of opportunity and

palm trees." "Flight 22" is a

soothing neo-soul love

song referring to the 1967 Piedmont Airlines Flight 22 plane crash. She sings "Take me all the way, Flight 22, baby / And baby we're not gonna make it / At least I'm going down with you."

The song shows that despite the impending fatal crash, it does not matter because she is happy that her love is by her side.

She also ventures into her Latin roots in the track "Nuestro Planeta," or "our planet." It is a dancehall reggaeton love song in Spanish and despite not knowing the language, the song really gets you moving and grooving, which shows that music break through language barriers.

The main highlight in the album is the track "In My Dreams." The Gorillaz production within the song could be described as a bedroom pop track. It is a surprising and welcome 180 in terms of sound. It is something you could hear in the background of an 1980s movie montage.

The track is about avoiding the real world and just living in your own head because "why would anyone stay awake after being so sound asleep" as "everyday is a holiday when you're living inside your dreams."

The track "Feel Like A Fool" is very Amy Winehouse-esque with its straight forward sax and

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Targeted ads cross a line

Many times when you access a website, there is a little pop-up that will say, "This website uses cookies" and asks for you to accept the notification in order to continue.

These cookies aren't the delicious ones you can eat.

In fact, these cookies will "tag" your browser and they will "follow" you as you use the internet on different devices.

According to Network Advertising Initiative, a cookie is a small piece of code that lets ad networks and sites share information what guests read or obtain.

When you move on to a new site that has a space for personalized ads, the page will recognize your tracking cookie and show you a "relevant" ad, according to Choose, a price comparison service.

If a site allows ads, it'll show you an ad for a site you have visited to try to persuade you to go back and buy something.

This can be called things, "targeted advertising" or "data driven creative," because this form of advertising can work in two ways.

Advertising professor John Delacruz said "data driven creative" is the term used when people use your information to personalize ads to offer you items that they think you are will want, viewing you as an individual instead of as a part of a group of people.

But I am here to focus on targeted advertising, because it crosses a line when it comes to the use of your personal information.

Targeted advertising pushes the boundaries of using your personal information and who knows where else our stuff is being given to.

"To me, ads themselves are an annoyance," business administration senior Jacob Tabares said. "The fact that people can store my online identity via purchases, likes or other means, it's kind of terrifying."

Companies like Netflix and Spotify have been caught using users' personal account histories for advertising

According Adweek writer Lindsay Rittenhouse, a weekly

American advertising trade publication, Spotify used a person's data to advertise for their company saying, "Dear person who played 'Sorry' 42 times on Valentine's Day: What did you do?"

Along with Netflix "To the 53 tweeting, people who've watched 'A Christmas Prince' every day for the past 18 days: Who hurt you?"

Calling out users in this way created some hate for

the companies.

Now there are people who believe that targeted advertising is more so the "data driven creative" side. It's nice for them to have ads personalized to fit only them.

According Rittenhouse, many consumers have accepted that marketers use an online log of their behaviors and spending habits to target digital audiences with relevant ads.

Rittenhouse said in her article that according to a Pew Research Center study, 47 percent of Americans are comfortable with retailers tracking purchases for better deals.

Thomas Shadoff, director of media at a Toronto-based ad agency, Bensimon Byrne, claims that when you use personal information and don't add value, it's intrusive.

Targeted advertising can make a person feel like they are being stalked.


It's similar to having a sales associate from a different store following you around, pestering you to buy a microwave while you're looking at shoes and are always in clothing stores. If something like this were to happen in real life, you would lose a customer.

"I believe in privacy," Delacruz said. "But there are boundaries as well and you got to be aware of those. So as long as things are being used, if not necessarily for good but not for bad, then I think we're entering a new world where this is going to become the norm.

At one point, Bill Russell was probably the greatest player in the league. Then came league


changed everything.

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Injuries won't stop Spartans' Lozano

In an instant, athletes can lose the opportunity to play for the season. Injuries are unpredictable, but they happen.

the season, SJSU played Tennessee at the Kajikawa Classic in Tempe, Arizona. During the game, Lozano tore her right meniscus.

Before the team's season really even got started, her season was over.

"When this injury first occurred it hit me really hard negatively. I was really excited for this season," Lozano said.

Even though she sits on the bench during games and isn't getting time on the field, Lozano still works hard.

She attends practices close

to the school at CEFCU Stadium and the batting cages. She helps feed the pitching machines and sometimes finds herself giving her teammates pointers because she is sitting out and observing as they practice.

"This injury has actually gotten me closer with the team," Lozano said. "They have become a huge support system for me, always asking how I'm doing."

Lozano also attends physical therapy for two hours, five days a week. Along with rehab, she has to go to weight training four times a week, which usually ends up being bright and early at 5 a.m. Monday through Saturday.

The team practices Tuesdays from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. On Wednesdays, the team practices at Mission College so Lozano does not go to that practice. However, she does make it to the Thursday practices.

"The more I thought about it, this is a humbling experience that I don't have this game for much longer," Lozano said. "It can be taken away from me in an instant

because of an injury. I am very thankful that it was just my MCL (medial collateral ligament) and that I'm still able to heal and get my one year eligibility back. It has motivated me a lot more. I want to come back stronger than I left it and I have a lot of goals for myself right now."

She recalls how her best friend Cassidy Clark, a health science sophomore and also a second baseman, has been supporting her throughout her recovery.

Clark said she has done her best to support Lozano mentally and physically.

"She has stayed strong and she's been very positive to the team still," Clark said. "She's always cheering for us, always watching our games when we are away, keeping up with us."

Lozano had goals of contributing more this year because she was set to play more. Because of her injury, Lozano is putting in as many hours as the players on the field so that she can be prepared when it's her time to play next season.

"When someone is sitting out, I don't feel like they should be judged at all Having everyone healthy

because they know their bodies," Lozano said. "I know some of these people who have had careerending injuries are just completely heartbroken that they are not in the game. It may seem like someone with just a knee brace sitting on the side, you may not know that they are in the recovery of an ACL tear."

Softball is a team sport.

After losing Lozano, head coach Peter Turner had to teach new players different positions. Players have to get moved around in order to substitute for a loss.

"Not having her on the road has been a huge void for this ball club," Turner said. "I certainly believe a lot of other athletes can learn a valuable lesson on her overall outlook on life and this game that she loves."

Turner said Lozano treats the sport with respect while also respecting her teammates.

"That's the intangibles that she offers that we just solely are missing," Turner said.

Lozano is set to get back in the game and play next season once her injury is fully healed.
