# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

There are **exciting changes** in how the performance of Arkansas schools is being measured, and the Northwest Arkansas Report Card highlights how students in area schools are performing.

Northwest Arkansas students are demonstrating greater growth in achievement and earning higher scores on the ACT Aspire than are the students in the state overall. Schools in NWA also have higher School Quality and Student Success scores, higher graduation rates, and are more likely to receive an “A” or “B” rating than are other schools across the state.

Schools are assigned **A-F letter** grades to help parents and the public better understand how well a school is performing. This grade is based on an Overall index that is a combination of a Growth score, an Achievement score, and School Quality/ Student Success Indicators.

We think the **Growth Score** is the most important measure of school quality. Growth measures how much individual students at the school increase their scores from year to year, and the Growth Score reflects how well schools are increasing students’ learning over time. Using growth as a measure of school success levels the playing field because all students are evaluated by the extent to which they grow from their own starting point; thus, students facing socioeconomic barriers to achievement have the same opportunity for growth as do their peers from advantaged backgrounds. All students can grow their understanding, and we should expect all schools to foster student growth, regardless of family income, first language, or learning needs.

The **Achievement Score** is a familiar measure of student performance that reflects how well students score on the state’s annual exams. Schools serving more advantaged students typically receive “good” scores because a high percentage of their students passed, while schools serving a larger percentage of students who lived in poverty, participated in special education, or were learning English often receive lower scores because a higher percentage of their students were unable to pass the test. The clear connection between Achievement Scores and student demographics suggests that point-in-time test scores are not a good measure of how well a school is educating students, but rather a reflection of the wealth of the community being served by the school.

The **School Quality/ Student Success Indicator Score** is a new indicator for schools that includes several measures like student attendance, reading at grade level, science achievement, and science growth. High school scores also reflect student enrollment in advanced courses, computer science courses, and community service learning. ACT performance and GPA are also considered. This indicator comprises a relatively small portion of the overall school index, and includes many measures not previously reported, which may mean that differences between district scores may reflect differences between how the data are collected and reported.

This report card presents information about these key performance indicators for the districts in Benton and Washington counties. The Growth, Achievement, School Quality, and Overall scores of each 15 traditional districts are compared to the average scores of the regional districts with similar enrollment 5 large districts and 10 small districts. The scores of the 5 public charter schools are compared to the average scores of all schools in the NWA area.



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# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

## Highlights of the NWA Report Card:

**We believe that the growth scores are the best indicator** that districts are doing what's really important: helping all students learn. An average district, where students are growing academically just as predicted, will have a growth score of 80. In some districts, however, students are demonstrating greater increases in their academic performance from one year to the next than we would have predicted. To have a 'good' growth score, to be in the top 25% of schools in the state, Elementary schools need a growth score of 83 or higher, Middle level schools need a growth score of 82 or higher, and High Schools need a growth score of 81 or higher.

**Springdale School District** had the highest overall growth score among the traditional districts, and was the only one where students demonstrated high academic growth at all levels: Elementary, Middle, and High School. Springdale students at the Elementary and Middle levels demonstrated the greatest academic growth in NWA.

**Haas Hall Academy and Haas Hall Bentonville** have the highest growth scores at the High School level. Many districts had high growth at one or two levels, and we recommend they focus on identifying how they are supporting student learning at the schools where students are not demonstrating high growth overall.

**Haas Hall Academy and Haas Hall Bentonville** have the highest point-in-time achievement in the NWA area, with both NWA Classical and Arkansas Arts Academy joining in outperforming traditional districts in achievement. **Bentonville School District** had the highest achievement score among the traditional districts, and students at the Elementary levels demonstrated the greatest academic achievement in NWA. Since point-in-time achievement is so reflective of student demographics, we want to point out that among NWA districts where more than half of the students are eligible for the free/reduced lunch program, **Rogers, Gentry,** and **Siloam Springs** reported the highest achievement.

**Lincoln School District** had the highest School Quality/ Student Success Indicator Score at the Elementary Level. **Bentonville School District** had the highest Indicator Score at the Middle Level and **Haas Hall Academy and Haas Hall Bentonville** have the highest School Quality/ Student Success Indicator Score at the High School level.

**Decatur School District** has the lowest student to teacher ratio, with one teacher for every seven students. Graduation rates were highest at **Farmington School District** where 99% of the class of 2017 graduated on time.

There are many things that contribute to a 'good' school, but we believe student academic growth is perhaps the most meaningful measure of school performance or school effectiveness. Many NWA districts had high growth at one or two school levels, and there is evidence of variation in growth rates between schools within the same districts. We recommend district and school leaders examine where their students are not demonstrating high growth, examine high growth schools to see what those schools are doing differently, and consider how they can further support learning for their students.

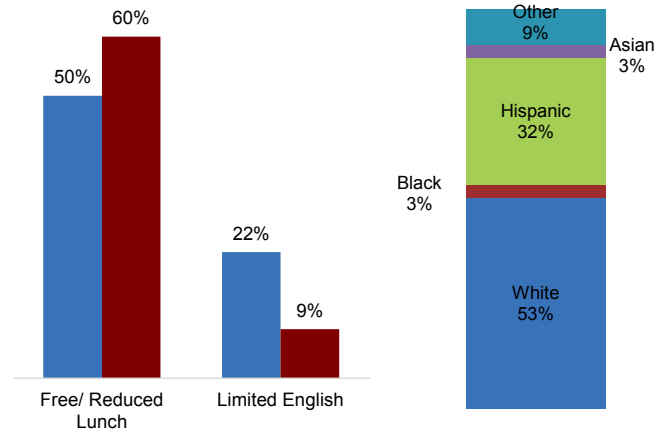

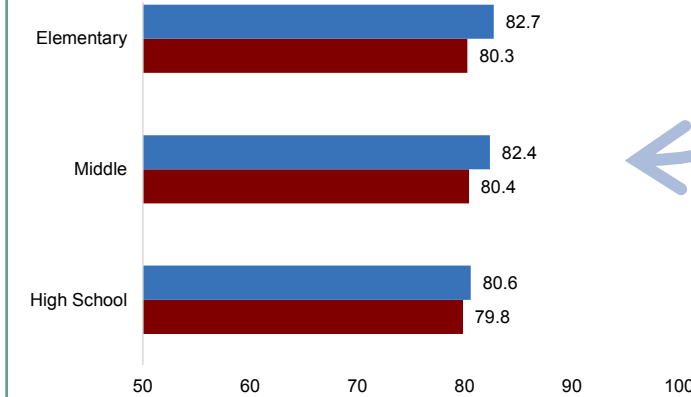

### Growth Score:

This indicates how much the district's students in grades 3-10 improved over time on state assessments in English language arts and mathematics. This score also includes how well non-native speakers are progressing toward English language proficiency.

Districts serving fewer At Risk students don't always have higher growth scores. Growth scores are less related to student characteristics than achievement scores.

Growth scores range from 70.2 to 89.7.

Achievement scores range from 1.9 to 117.6.

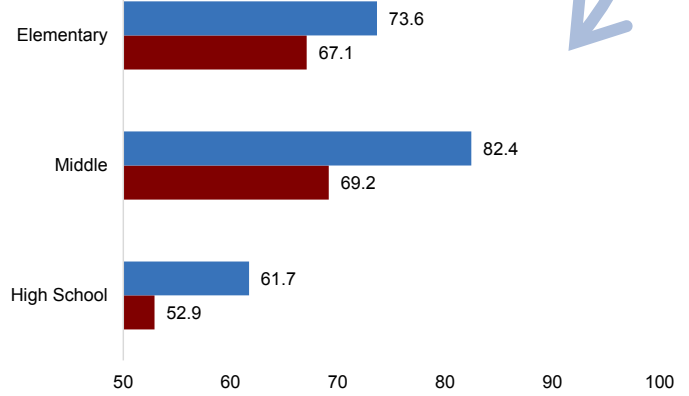

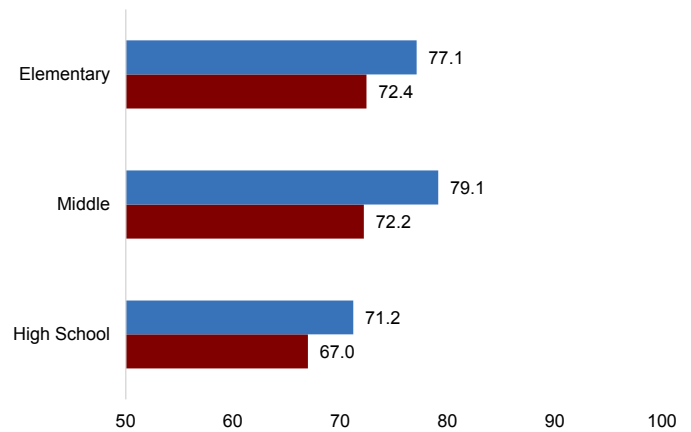
