

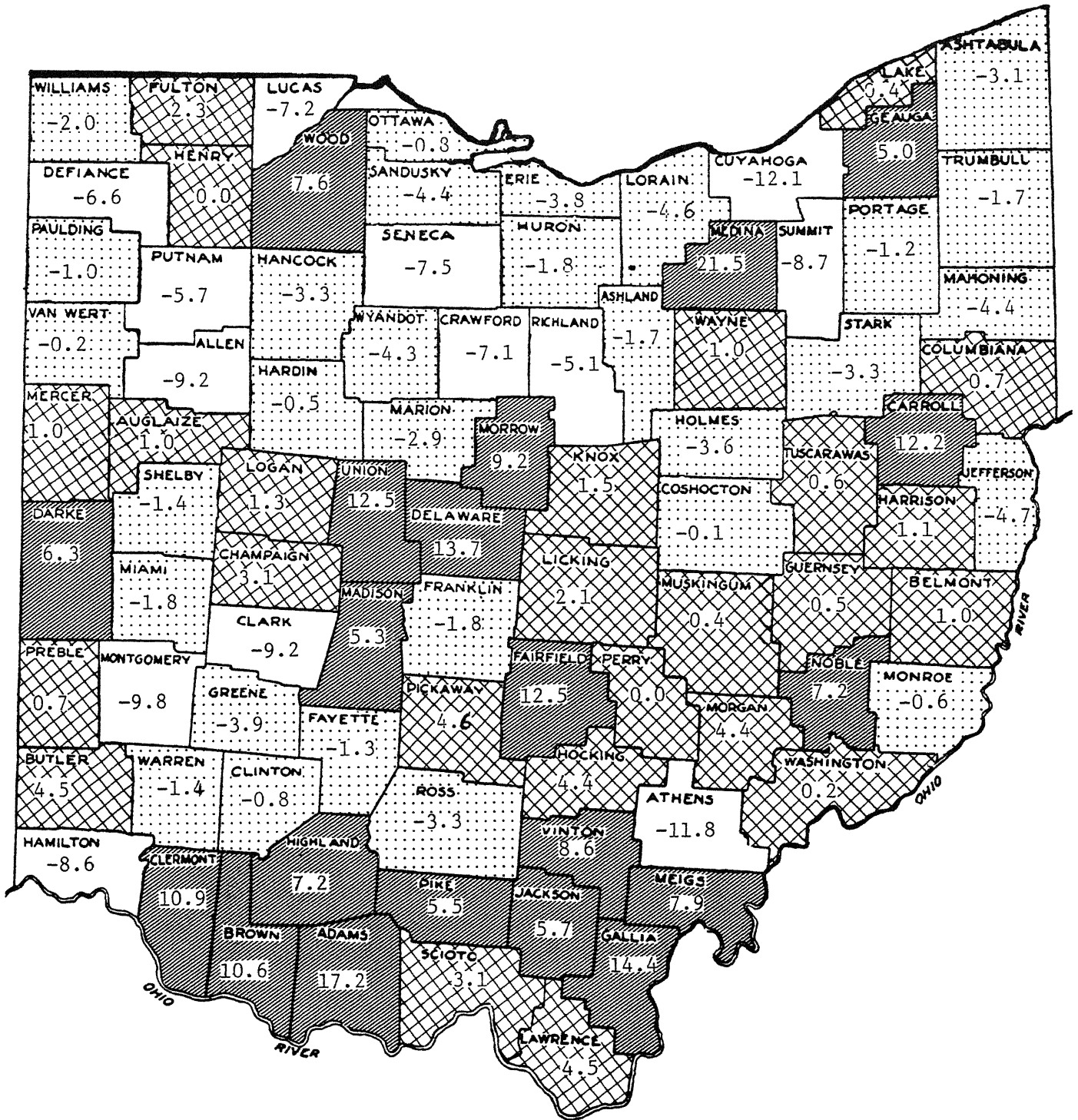
Net Migration of Population: Turnaround Counties; Ohio, 1977

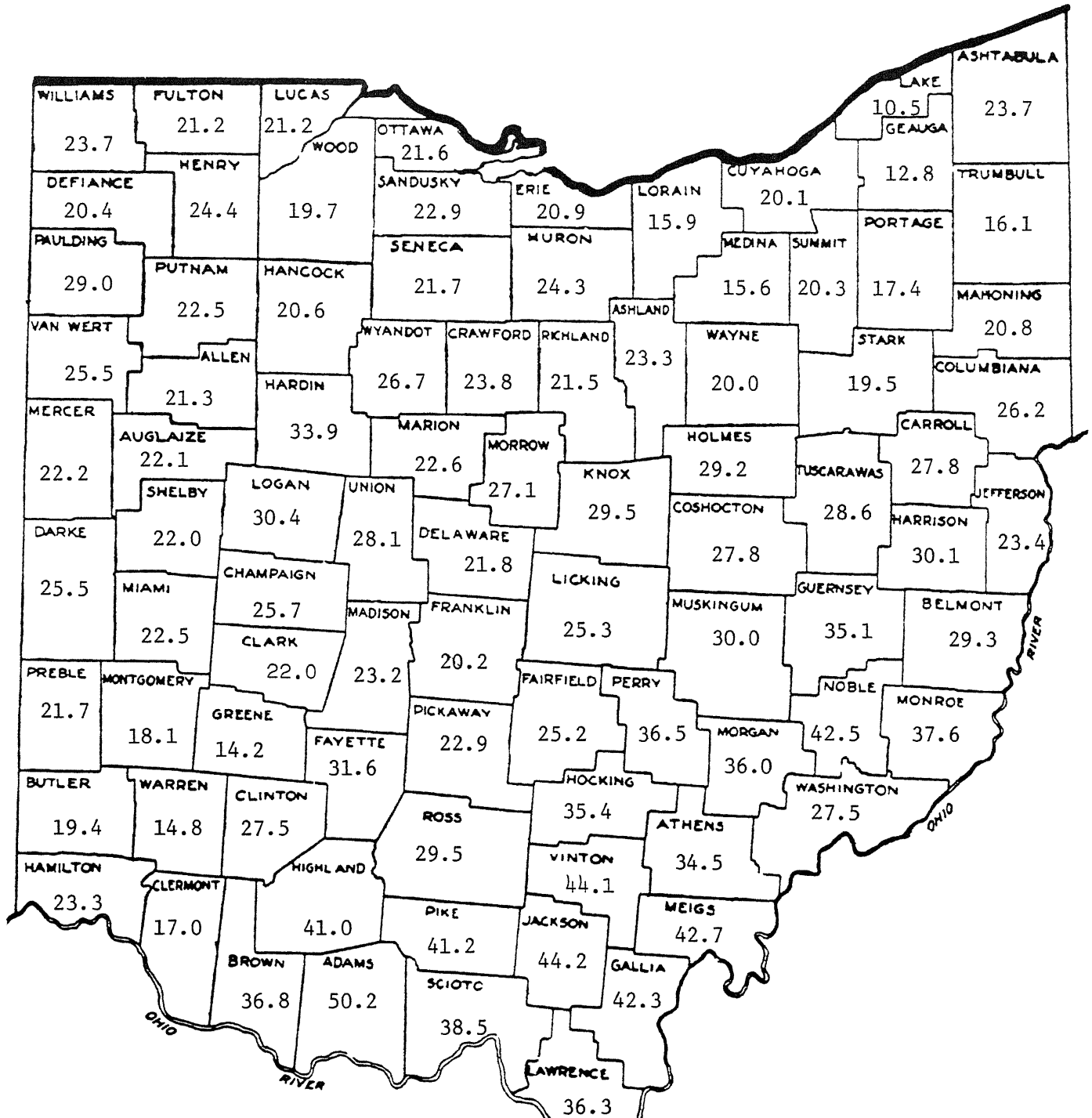

Population Over 50 Years of Age: Ohio by County, 1978



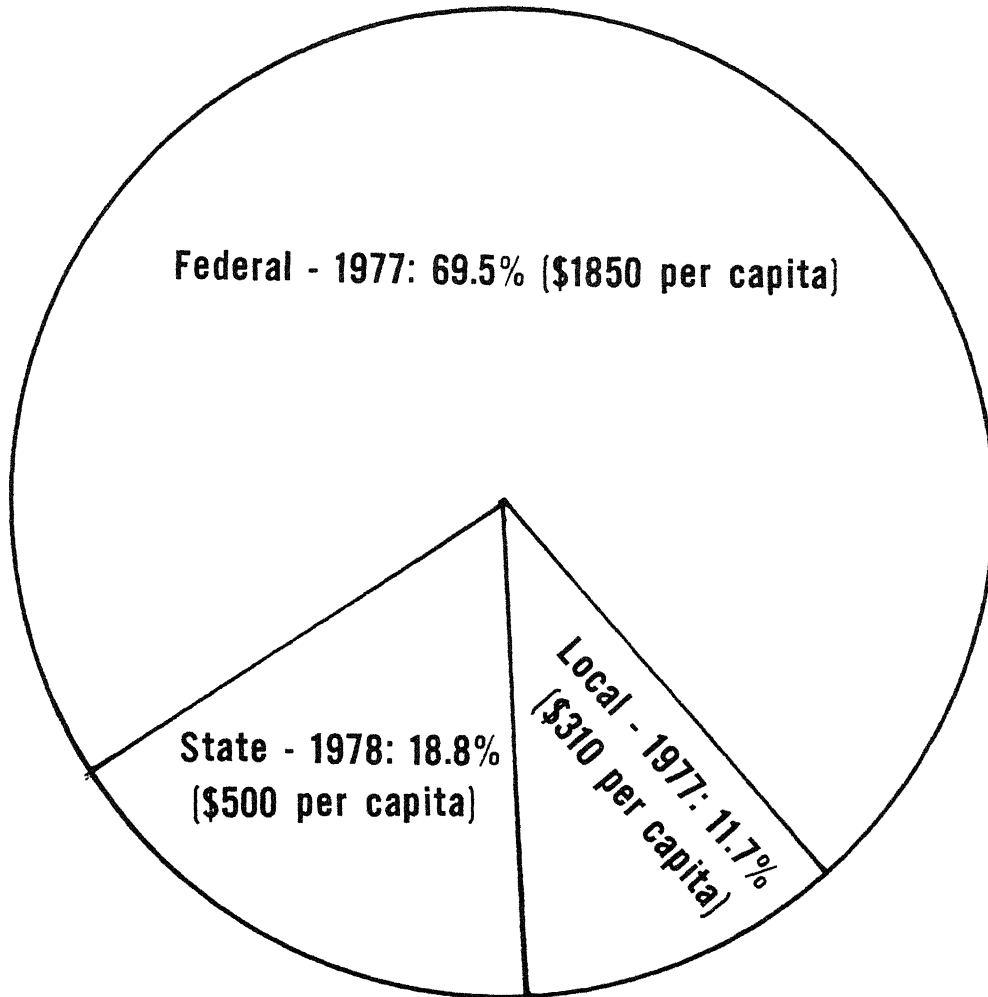

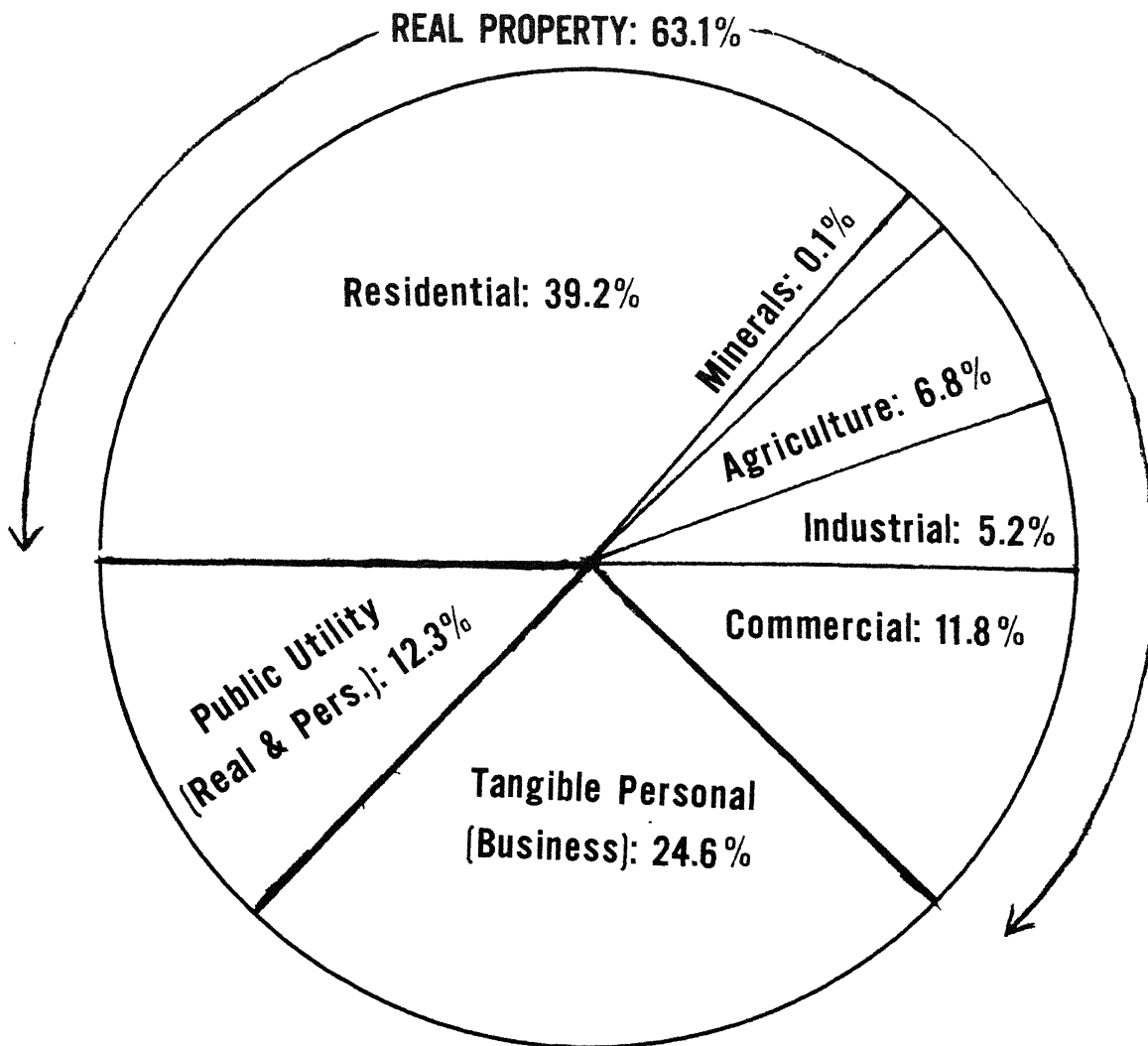
***Tax Collections by Level of Government:

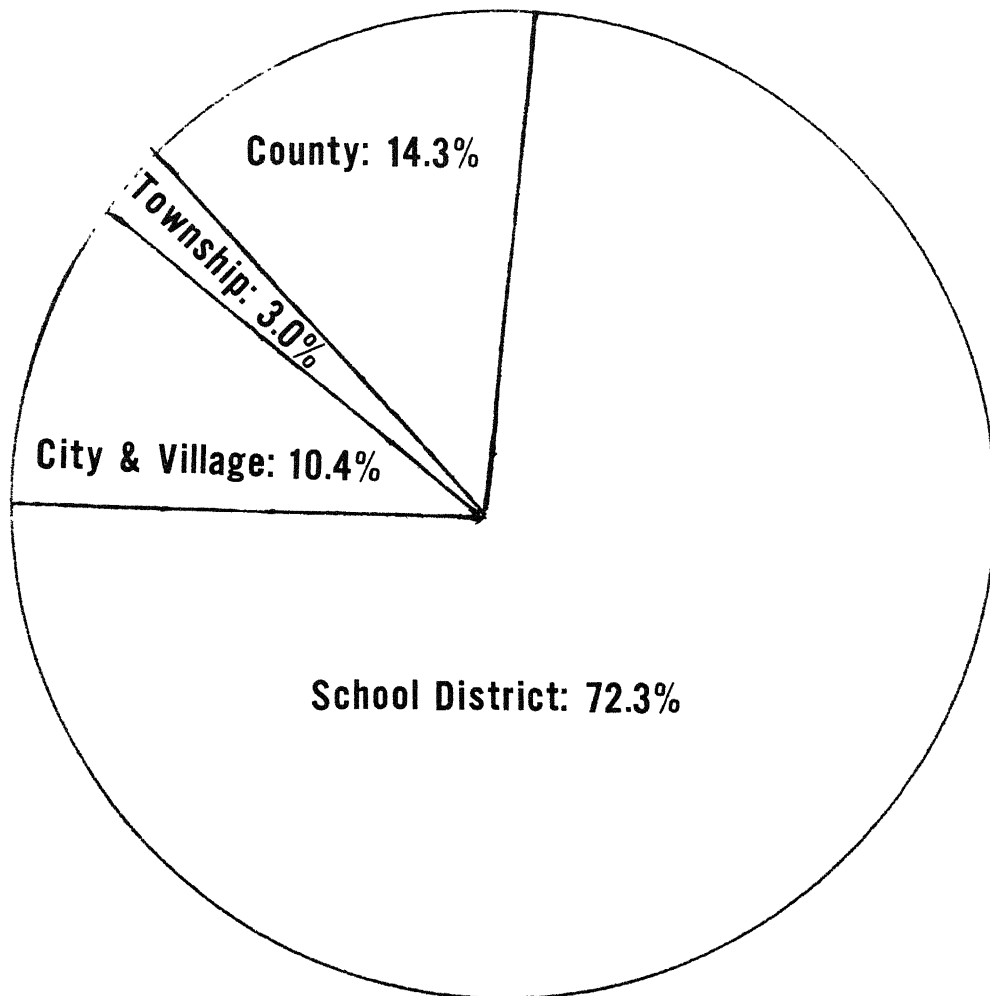
Property Tax: Where Does It Come From?

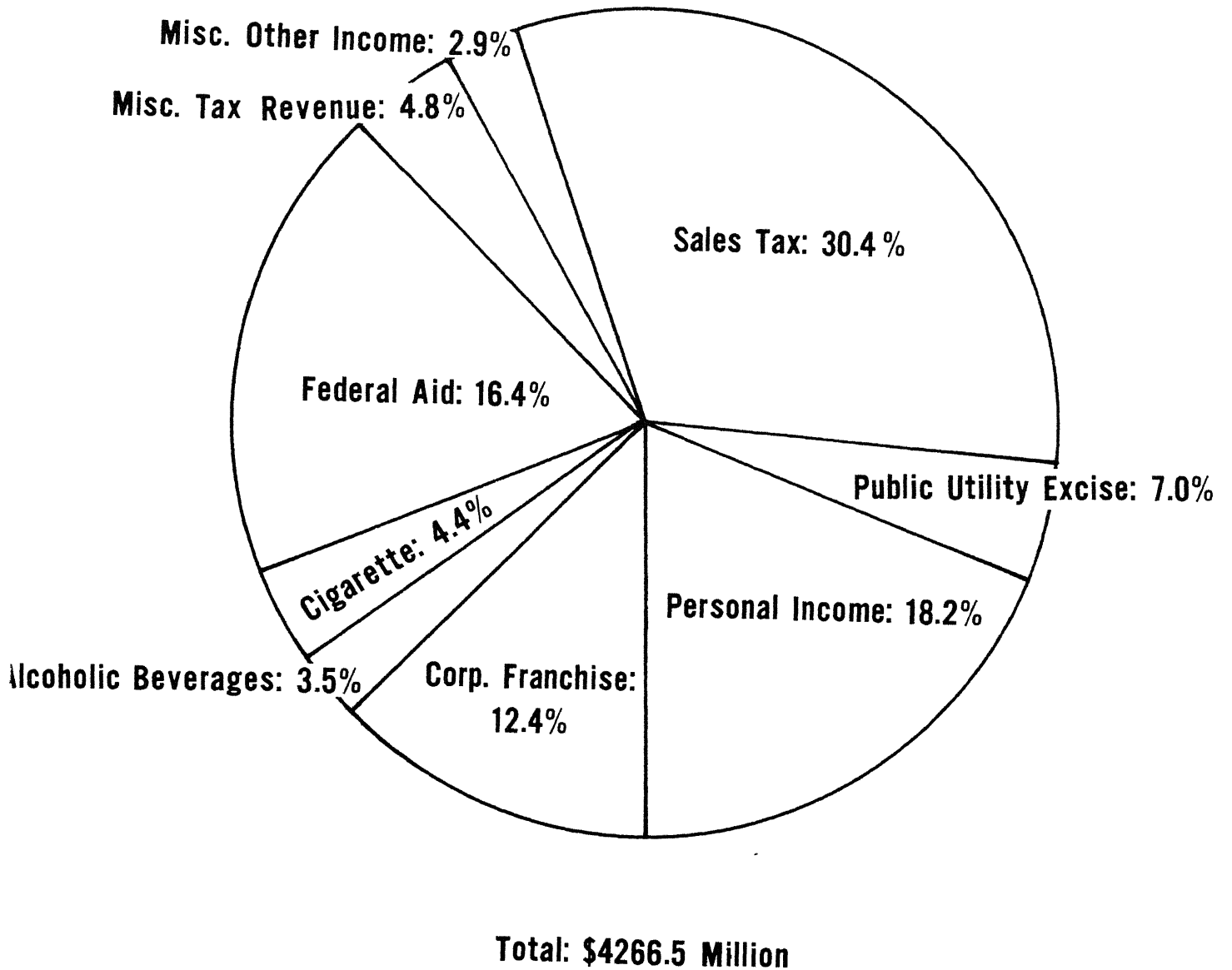
Property Tax: Where Does It Go?

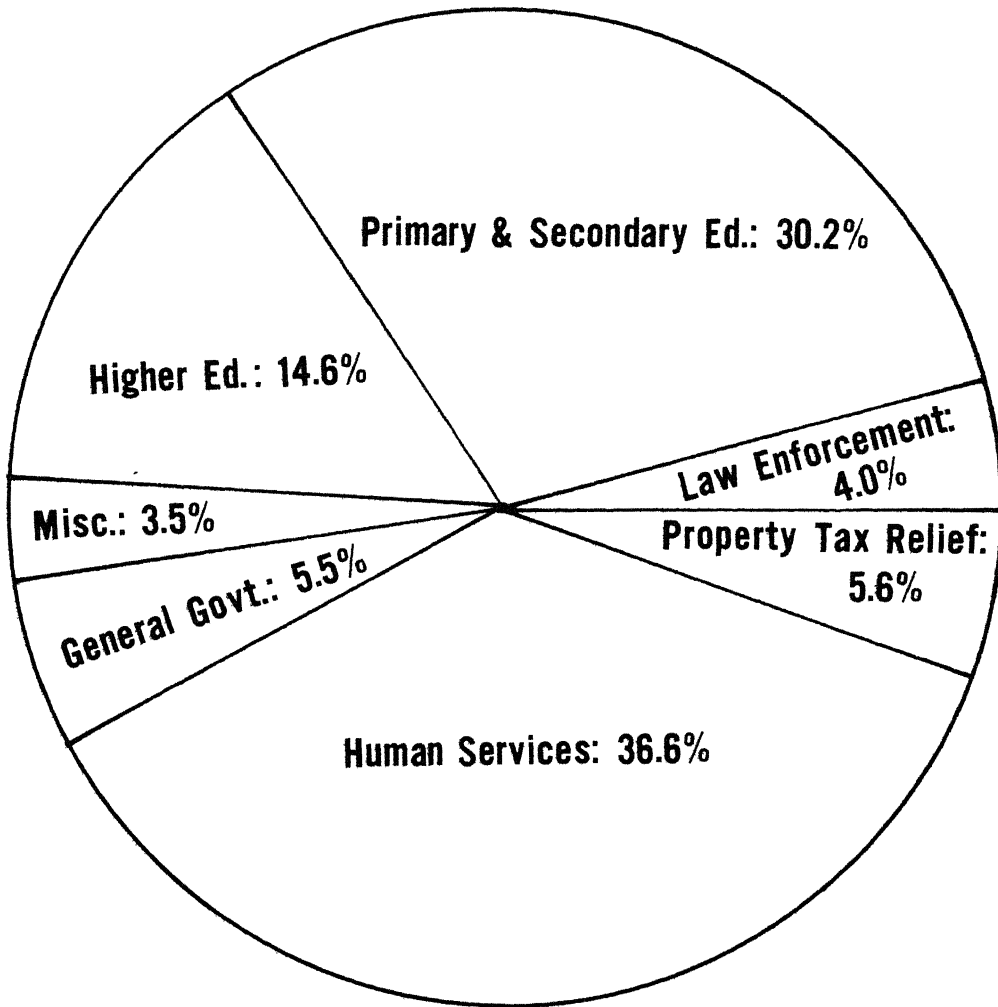

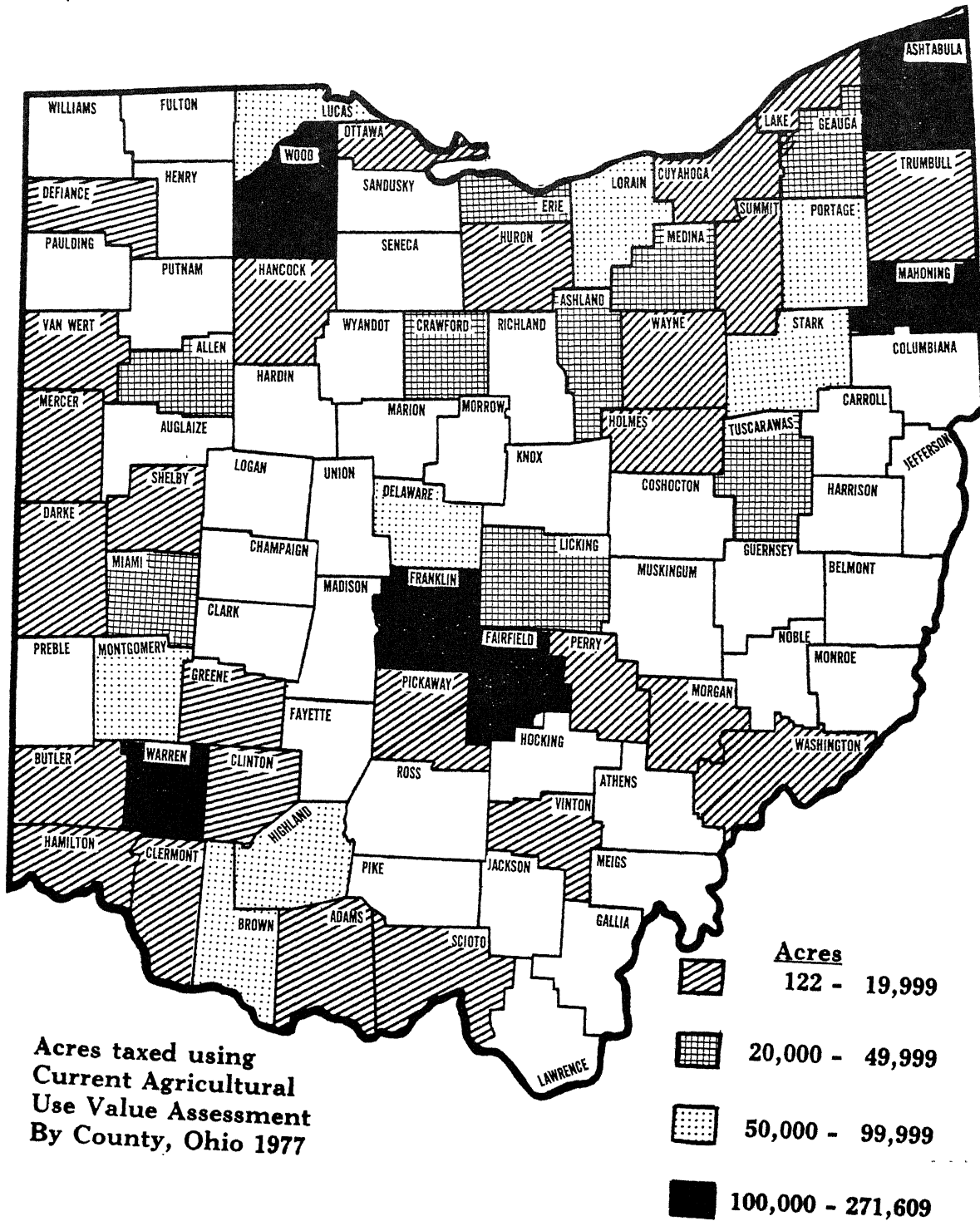
Real Property Reappraisal and Update Schedules: Ohio by County by Years

INTRODUCTION

The bibliography is designed to help users of local data find the publications cited in this directory. To use the bibliography—

1. Review the descriptions in the tabular detail column. These are frequently compressed to avoid repetition; hence, the tables listed may not give details on a particular subject for every location noted in the area column. However, if an item appears in the tabular detail column, it can be found among the tables listed.
2. Turn from the number in the source column to the same number in the bibliography. (Numbers have been assigned for the convenience of directory users and have no other significance.) This number provides a complete citation for the title of the report, and the address and ZIP code of the issuing agency. Government Printing Office (GPO) catalog numbers are included if available. Dates are shown for one-time and irregular reports and for series when the subjects covered may be expected to change substantially from those described, such as census data issued every 5 or 10 years.
3. Scan other references near the bibliography number. Because the bibliography is arranged alphabetically by issuing agency, these may provide related data.
4. To order from GPO, write to the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402; to order from the Census Bureau, write to the Subscriber Services Section (Publications), Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233. If the GPO catalog number for the reports of other Federal agencies is not shown in the bibliography, write to the agency at the address indicated. Certain publications listed may be out of print.

Some readers may use the bibliography as a guide to published Federal statistics for local areas from 1966 through 1976. In addition, as many of the agencies listed issue State and national data, the bibliography may be considered an extensive, although incomplete, list of Federal statistical sources. unpublished data for local areas

The *Directory of Federal Statistics for Local Areas* describes statistical tables issued, for the most part, in printed reports published by Federal agencies. Many of these reports are also available in one or more unpublished forms, including computer tapes and printouts, microfilm, and microfiche. In addition, a number of agencies provide data in their unpublished series that are not included in the printed reports. Often, these data cover smaller or more specific local areas or expand the range of statistics available for a particular area. To discover if such unpublished information exists on a particular topic, select a similar or related topic in the tables of this directory and communicate with the agency responsible for publishing it. Agencies are identified by number and their addresses given in the bibliography; reference numbers identical to those in the bibliography are provided in the source column of each chapter.

Along with the unpublished data products already available, some agencies can make special compilations from their raw data in terms defined by a prospective purchaser. In some cases, an agency may lack adequate resources to perform certain types of tabulations, and no agency will prepare a tabulation that violates legislated requirements to keep confidential the individual identity of persons or establishments whose responses make up the statistical aggregates it issues. Readers interested in obtaining special tabulations should contact the statistical office of the agency that issues similar tabulations, as identified in this directory.

Census Bureau Data on Computer Tapes

Census Bureau data are available in two computerized forms: Summary data and microdata. Summary data on tape are similar to, but more extensive than, data in the printed reports described in the chapters of this directory. Microdata tapes, on the other hand, provide information about individual, unidentified respondents in a form that allows the information to be compiled by the data user into tabulations or summaries tailored to his own needs. Announcements and descriptions of new unpublished Census Bureau data are provided in part II of the *Bureau of the Census Catalog*, described in appendix D.

Summary Data

Public-use summary tapes—In many Census Bureau data series, computer tapes presenting summary data provide more tables, categories, and areas than do the corresponding printed reports.

- **1970 Censuses of Population and Housing summary tapes: First count to sixth count.** Data are provided in six series or counts. Certain counts include summaries for types of geographic areas not otherwise published: ZIP code areas, enumeration districts, block groups, and census tracts outside standard metropolitan statistical

areas (SMSA's). Other counts provide extensive tabulations for types of areas for which relatively little is published: County subdivisions (minor civil divisions or census county divisions), city blocks, or small places. Even for larger areas, there are more cross-tabulations on tape than are included in the printed reports. For a subject index and cross-reference guide to all six counts, consult the *Index to 1970 Census Summary Tapes*, described in appendix D.

- **1970 census special tabulations.** As a result of special tabulations prepared at customer expense, data files are now available providing data by school districts and traffic zones, and on such specialized topics as household income, detailed occupation by race and by county, and racial categories other than White or Black.
- **1972 Census of Governments.** Financial and employment data for local governmental units covered in the census of governments are provided on tape. These statistics are also summarized by county.
- **1972 Census of Retail Trade: Merchandise Line Sales.** Data are provided for SMSA's and States on the types of retail establishments counted in the census and on the merchandise lines sold by each type of business. Corresponding data have been published only at the national level.
- **1972 Census of Manufactures: Location of Manufacturing Plants.** The number of manufacturing establishments is provided by 4-digit standard industrial classification (SIC) code, by county, by employment-size class. Because these data are not considered subject to disclosure restrictions, they provide more detail on industries than other data in printed reports from the census of manufactures.
- **County Business Patterns.** As with the tape for *Location of Manufacturing Plants*, the *County Business Patterns* tape provides the number of establishments by 4-digit SIC code, by county, by employment-size class, without disclosure restrictions. Aggregate employment and annual payroll figures are also presented by SIC, by county, if no disclosure about individual companies would result. Corresponding figures are provided in published reports only if a given industry within the county has 50 employees or more. *County Business Patterns* data encompass almost all types of business, including some that are not covered by the economic censuses.

Summary tape files are also available in other series. For example, the 1972 Economic Censuses and the 1974 Census of Agriculture provide, in computerized form, data already available in print.

Public-Use Microdata Tapes

Microdata are unaggregated records for individual respondents in a census or survey, made available in a form that can be

ised outside the Census Bureau and modified so that individual respondents cannot be identified. Since the microdata files available from the Census Bureau for public use contain records or only a small sample of respondents, the files are of greatest use to those who want data covering large areas. Subject detail, however, is as varied as the questions asked in the census or survey. The files that follow identify some areas smaller than States:

- **1970 census public use samples.** The county group series of tapes carries records for groups of counties with 250,000 or more population, including all SMSA's and many individual counties meeting the population criterion. Sample sizes of 1 or 2 percent of the respondents are available. Other public use sample series identify States or census regions and divisions.
- **Annual Housing Survey.** Fifty-nine selected SMSA's with 250,000 or more population are sampled on a rotating basis every third year; inquiries cover not only detailed information on housing characteristics but also attitudes about the desirability of the neighborhood and the adequacy of its public services. In each sample, 5,000 to 15,000 households are surveyed.
- **Annual Demographic File (ADF)** The ADF provides data from the March supplement of the Current Population Survey. SMSA's of 1 million or more inhabitants are identified, but the sample size is fairly small (about 1/1400) for SMSA tabulations. The Survey of Income and Education, conducted in 1976, provides a much larger sample size for population characteristics of large SMSA's for that survey year.

Census Bureau Data on Microfilm and Microfiche, and Unpublished Tables

All Census Bureau printed reports (other than advance or preliminary reports) are also made available on microfiche.

Several series of unpublished data have been issued on computer-output microfilm. Either the film itself or paper copies of frames from the film may be purchased. These include—

- **1970 census data for minor civil divisions and census county divisions.** These tabulations on microfilm show information similar to that given in the PHC(1) *Census Tracts* reports, described in the subject chapters of this directory.
- **Nonmetropolitan census tract data.** Over 100 counties outside SMSA's had tracts in 1970. Data for these tracts were not published in the *Census Tracts* reports but corresponding tables are available in photocopy form.
- **MEDList microfilm.** The Master Enumeration District List (MEDList) provides geographic codes and population and housing counts for all States, counties, minor civil divisions, census county divisions, enumeration districts, and block groups in hierarchical order. (Maps for use with this list must be obtained separately.)
- **Merchandise line sales data for SMSA's and States.** The data on microfilm are the same as those described in the section on summary tapes in this appendix.
- **Computer-generated narrative profiles.** These profiles are available for SMSA's and their central cities, and for Congressional Districts. Data from the 1970 census are presented in narrative form, a form especially useful for audiences not accustomed to reading statistical tables. The Congressional District profiles are available on microfiche, while the SMSA/central city profiles can be obtained in photocopies.

Information about unpublished Census Bureau data may be requested from the Data User Services Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233, except for microfiche, which can be obtained from the Bureau of the Census Library at the same address.

Who Needs It?

You need it! I need it! Your butcher, your baker, your candlestick maker needs it! . . . As a matter of fact, every one of Ohio's nearly 11 million men, women and children needs it. Just ask anyone you meet if he or she would settle for a diet without meat or fruit or vegetables. A grass-less and tree-less landscape. A flower-less garden or a home without a houseplant. Would you?

What is It?

Agriculture is the science of cultivating the land and producing plants and animals useful to us. A look at the map and table at the right will show you

Agriculture is Ohio's No. 1 industry, with cash receipts from farming in 1977 of \$2,826,717,000.

the scope of this essential industry. It's what makes every meal possible, provides the flowers that bring beauty to our lives, grows wood for houses and furniture and gives us some of our clothing materials.

Who is It?

Although nature is generous in providing the land, water, air and sun — vital elements for growing the products of agriculture — people must manage these resources to find the best cultural practices and the most efficient ways of operation. Ohio farmers plant the seeds; operate the equipment for tilling the soil and harvesting the crops; improve plant nutrition to grow the most on each acre of land; and care for the cattle, swine and poultry that assure an adequate supply of milk, meat and eggs. Today farmers and other agricultural producers operate 97,697 farms, 1,000 greenhouses and 1,200 nurseries and care for more than six million acres of woodlands.

Who Else Helps?

But farmers are only part of the agricultural team that makes our present standard of living possible. Other people are needed — people in what we call "agribusiness." For example, with nearly 11 million customers, Ohio farmers can't personally supply them all in a simple farmer-to-customer operation. So they depend on *factory workers*, *power equipment dealers* and *energy suppliers* to mechanize their farms and allow them to produce far more with each hour's work than their predecessors.

Today, farmers have large investments in land, buildings, machinery, equipment and livestock. They look to *financial experts* to provide the working capital needed.

And farmers depend on *researchers* and *educators*, such as personnel of the Cooperative Extension Service, to keep them up to date on the newest methods of plant and animal nutrition, pest control and business management. Such information often reaches them through efforts of *agricultural writers* and *broadcasters*. Farmers sell their products through *wholesalers* and *retailers*, who can market the products quickly and economically to customers throughout Ohio and the world.

Processors refine many farm products, such as meat, grain, vegetables, fruit and wood, for consumer convenience and long-term use. Farm and nursery crops, livestock and forest products are moved from production points to consumers by a variety of *transportation workers*. For example, our demand for variety and freshness in foods calls for more and faster transportation than ever before. All along the line, team members look to *legislators* for laws that protect their right to conduct business.

This farmer-to-consumer team provides an estimated 750,000 jobs in Ohio. Together, agriculture's team provides us products from the farm, greenhouse and forest, and generates jobs and dollars that make our high standards of living possible.

What's in the Future

Ohio's farmer-to-consumer team faces many challenges in the years ahead to keep agricultural products readily available at affordable prices to Ohio's people. Scientists must breed plants and animals for

higher yields and more resistance to insects and diseases. Educators must continually train new recruits for all phases of the agricultural job market and offer continuing education programs to those employed in agriculture. Power equipment designers and manufacturers must develop new, highly efficient labor savers. Everyone on the team must, in some way, harness the capacities of electronic devices to simplify many everyday decisions. And society must enable the entire team to work in an environment that encourages high quality products at reasonable prices. Agriculture's future is everybody's future.

Did You Know?

- 57 Ohioans can live on the food produced by only one farmer.
 - Ohio exports \$957 million worth of farm products — more than a third of total production.
 - Soybeans are the most important source of farm income in 31 counties. Last year, soybeans produced more cash receipts than any other Ohio farm crop — \$622 million.
 - Dairy products are the most important source of farm income in 26 counties.
 - Ohio produces more greenhouse tomatoes than any other state.
 - Much productive farmland has been kept in agriculture as a result of a recent real estate tax law, which has meant tax savings of more than \$14 million for Ohio farmers.
 - 84% of the persons helping farmers in Ohio are family members; the other 16% are hired non-family. In the U.S., 31% of the workers are hired non-family.
 - Total gross farm income in Ohio was \$3,362 million. Of this \$2,722 million went for production expenses, not including costs for owner labor and management.
 - U.S. exports of agricultural products in 1977-78 were more than \$27 billion, up 14% from the previous year. This created a favorable trade balance of about \$10 billion from agricultural exports.
 - Last year, 88% of the farm land transferred in Ohio was purchased by active farmers.
