## NOTES OF INTEREST

(993) The Assn. for Croatian Studies reports a growing membership but appeals to all to renew for the coming year. The ATS's executive committee includes: Profs. Joseph Bombelles, President; Francis H. Eterovic and Ante Kadic, Vice Presidents, and George J. Prpic, Secretary-Treasurer.

The newsletter of the Bulgarian Studies Assn. reports that the U.S. Setretary of Education, Shirtley Hufsteder, attended a conference in Sofia last June that had been called to draft an agreement on educational exchanges. According to the newsletter, the idea is to hold seminars alternately in each country to discuss educational issues, subjects, methodology and practice.

An informational booklet published by The Center for Research Libraries notes that it has more than 180 members and associates and a collection of more than 3 million volumes. Its holdings include one of the most complete collections of publications of the USSR Academy of Sciences from 1724 on, numerous newspapers and government documents from Eastern Europe as well as 47 newspaper titles currently being received on microfilm from Poland and Yugoslavia.
