



Joseph Nye, University Distinguished Service Professor and Sultan of Oman Professor of International Relations at Harvard University, gave the Joseph J. Kruzel Memorial Lecture on February 11, 2009, at the Mershon Center for International Security Studies. The lecture is named after an Ohio State faculty member who was killed during government service in Bosnia.



Joseph Nye spoke about his latest book "The Powers to Lead" to an overflow audience of more than 100 people at the Mershon Center. He argued that the most effective leaders are those who use smart power, a combination of hard and soft power skills in proportions that vary with different situations.

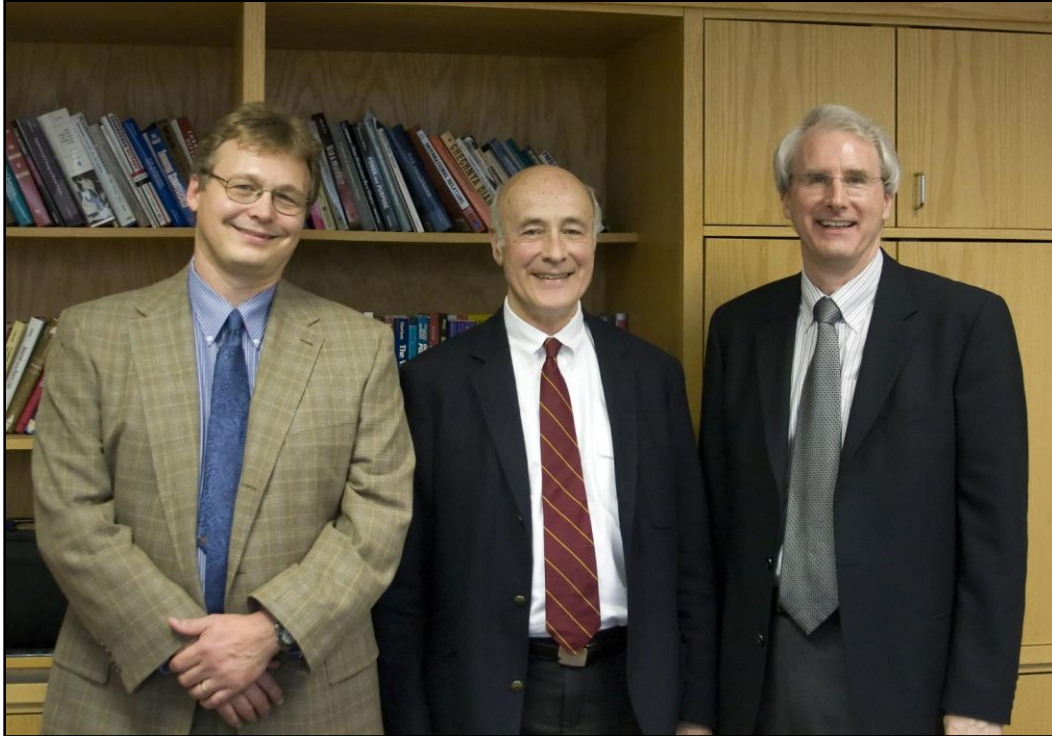
