Lien-Hang Nguyen is associate professor of history at University of Kentucky. She received her B.A. from University of Pennsylvania and her Ph.D. from Yale University. She has held fellowships at the Center for International Security and Cooperation at Stanford University, the former John M. Olin Institute for Strategic Studies at Harvard University, and International Security Studies at Yale University. 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Abstract

Although the Tet Offensive represented a major turning point in the Vietnam War, much of North Vietnam's decision making surrounding the offensive remains unclear. Based on recently declassified materials from Vietnam, this paper reveals how North Vietnamese domestic politics and foreign relations influenced Hanoi's strategy deliberation for the 1968 offensive.

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
